

# Abernathy Arrested As Poor Driven From Camp

WASHINGTON (AP)— Police armed with shotguns and tear gas moved through and took possession of the Poor People's Campaign Resurrection City today. At the Capitol, other police arrested the Rev. Ralph David

Abernathy, the campaign leader. Police Chief John Layton said about 80 arrests were made at Resurrection City, where the residents had been told they could no longer stay on public land.

Abernathy was arrested peacefully, with about 100 other campaigners, on charges of violating a prohibition against demonstrations on the Capitol grounds. Despite the massive show of force—1500 police were on hand

— there was no serious violence as police cleared the camp. As police with their shotguns and tear gas guns at the ready approached the gates of the camp the only sound was a man singing civil rights songs over the camp's public address system.

The police moved down in two lines checking each of the shanties and tents to see if any campers remained. Halfway through the encampment they found a tent containing more than 50 demonstrators singing and clapping. This group submitted to arrest nonviolently and they were taken one by one to waiting police buses.

William Rutherford, executive director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, which ran the Poor People's campaign, called the police operation orderly. Two tear gas canisters did go off on the sweep down the camp. One apparently was part of the booby trap which went off when police ripped open a shanty door. Police fired the second one apparently assuming there was someone inside.

The arrest process at the tent took more than a half hour with the demonstrators including women and children singing such songs as "Do Right, White Man, Do Right." Police packed the arrested persons into buses to haul them away for booking.

One of those removed in this fashion was Hosea Williams, a right hand man to Abernathy and leader of most protest demonstrations since the encampment was opened.

"There was only one case of brutality," Williams said, describing the tactics used by police, "where police hit a white youngster in the stomach and gave him a judo chop. Other than that there was pretty much what we expect of police."

"This is the beginning of something, not the end of something," Williams said through the barred window.

"We will make the entire Washington D.C. a Resurrection City. No longer will we be in mud—we'll be on good pavement. Instead of baloney and cheese sandwiches we'll have good hot meals and be sleeping real beds."

"In other words, we're in a better position to fight the Pharaohs than ever before."

The arrested demonstrators seemed in high spirits and almost relieved that Resurrection City had died so quietly.

They were joking and calling from the bus. "They stole my bottle of scotch," said William Corbett of Norfolk Va. "I'm coming back. We're all coming back."

Abernathy, who has frequently proclaimed he would be arrested, offered no resistance as

## Eight Fires Set Inside Old Prison

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)— Rioting inmates who armed themselves with ball bats and homemade knives set fire to eight buildings inside the century-old Ohio Penitentiary Monday morning. At least 20 persons were injured.

But by noon, four hours after the first fire broke out, officials said order was being restored in the prison. Many of the more than 300 convicts involved in the rioting were herded onto the prison's baseball diamond to be returned to cells.

The convicts also battled guards with scissors from the prison tailor shop and butcher knives from the kitchen.

Two hundred Ohio National Guardsmen were alerted at 8:30 a.m. and ordered to the prison at noon to prevent further disturbances. Six hundred other guardsmen were ordered to standby.

Officials estimated damage at well over \$1 million from the eight fires.

One major fire temporarily trapped nearly 100 persons in the prison's hospital.

Maury C. Koblenz, state corrections chief, said "there is a degree of control within the prison by various law enforcement units."

No shots were fired, Warden Ernie Maxwell said.

Maury Koblenz, state corrections chief, said at least 20 persons were injured, including 10 prison guards.

Maxwell said the hospital fire was the most critical of the disturbance. He said 92 to 100 inmates and employees were in the hospital, but were brought out by heavily armed guards and police.

Hundreds of inmates milled in the prison yards, but an official said he believed the disturbance was led by a cadre of only 15 to 20 convicts.

The cause was not known immediately, and Koblenz said there had been no communications with the rioting inmates.

He said he had no knowledge of any demands by the convicts. At least seven fires erupted inside the walled prison, which houses 2,750 inmates. Some of the fires were still burning three hours later.

Maxwell said the hospital fire was "out of control 10 to 20 minutes."

Munk said that he got out of his patrol car to talk with the youths when he found a small quantity of marijuana in a match box next to the youths' car. As he engaged them in conversation, Munk said that he observed cigarette ashes and marijuana seeds and "still green marijuana" next to the vehicle. Munk placed the four youths under arrest and searched them and their vehicle.

Tagged in the search and held in evidence were the match box containing the small quantity of marijuana, the seeds and ashes and green marijuana found next to the vehicle, a pipe taken from one subject, a small plastic bag containing marijuana, another

# McCarthy Joins ABM Foes

WASHINGTON (AP)— Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy today joined opponents of an administration request for funds to begin deployment of the Sentinel Antibalistic Missile (ABM) System.

McCarthy, a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, coupled his criticism of the ABM plan with a new attack on the Johnson administration's foreign policy.

His remarks were in the text of a prepared Senate speech. The Senate votes late today on an amendment to eliminate from a pending military-con-

struction bill the \$227.3 million listed for ABM deployment. Sens. John Sherman Cooper, R-Ky., and Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., chief sponsors of the amendment, predict a narrow victory.

They cite high cost and uncertainty over the ABM's military value in urging that the funds be cut from the \$1.8-billion construction measure.

McCarthy called the decision to go ahead with the ABM a good example "of an attempt to buy security through misplaced, simplistic reliance on technology rather than by facing up

# B52s Hit Cong Training Base

SAIGON (AP)— U.S. Air Force B52 bombers today smashed a Viet Cong training center 13 miles from Saigon.

The B52s, have bombed closer to the capital only once. Last Feb. 13, at the height of the Viet Cong's Tet offensive on Saigon, they struck a suspected enemy troop concentration 10.5 miles north of Saigon.

The U.S. Command said ground observers in the training camp area southeast of the capital reported that secondary explosions lasted for six minutes after the eight-engine bombers left the site. A secondary explosion means ammunition or fuel going up after the 500- and 750-pound bombs have exploded.

In the last two weeks, the B52s have flown nearly 100 missions within a 75-mile radius of the capital, trying to cut infil-

tration corridors from the Cambodian border and prevent enemy troops from massing for a threatened attack on Saigon next month.

In five raids Sunday, the B52s aimed at enemy troop concentrations and infiltration routes in Phuoc Long Province, next to the Cambodian border 75 miles north of Saigon.

Saigon was spared of any shelling for the third consecutive day today, but the Viet Cong shelled two airfields, a province capital and four government military posts.

Government headquarters said the shelling killed two government soldiers and wounded six soldiers and 15 Vietnamese civilians.

It was the quietest night in two months in the capital and almost everywhere else in the country, U.S. sources said the enemy likely may be "laying back" to receive replacements, retrain, refit and resupply for

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# French Voters Show Support For De Gaulle

PARIS (AP)— President Charles de Gaulle's forces appeared headed today for an overwhelming majority in the French National Assembly after strong gains in the first round of the national elections.

Left-wing extremists warned that "the battle has only begun" as preparations began for the runoff elections next Sunday.

Frightened by the May weeks of student violence and nationwide strikes, the French people heeded De Gaulle's theme of "Gaullism or Communism" and elected 142 of his followers Sunday.

Gaullist candidates also were in favorable positions for the runoff elections in 150 other districts, indicating that the president and Premier Georges Pompidou might win a majority of more than 100 in the 487-seat assembly.

In the last assembly the Gaullists and their allies had a majority of only one.

It was an unexpected triumph for the 77-year-old general who less than a month ago threatened to resign at the height of the national convulsion.

It was also a stinging defeat for De Gaulle's opponents of the center and left. Only 12 non-Gaullists were elected in the first round in Metropolitan France—6 Communists, 4 Centrists and two members of rightist parties. And in comparison with the vote in the first round of the 1967 general election, the Communists' percentage of the total vote dropped from 22.51 per cent to 20.03, the non-Communist Leftist Federation slipped from 18.96 to 16.50 and the Centrist Party of Modern Progress and Democracy declined from 12.34 to 10.64.

Despite the Gaullists' initial triumph at the polls, most of the problems that set off France's "mad month of May" remain unsolved, and the wholesale wage raises handed out to get 10-million striking workers back to their jobs will almost certainly bring widespread inflation.

Former Premier Pierre Mendes-France, a left-wing leader who was in trouble in the Grenoble district, warned the government that it probably would have trouble with "those who voted for it but who for all that are not ready to give up their demands."

## Death Claims Verne Burrell At Age Of 68

Verne Burrell, prominent in Napa civic, business and fraternal circles, died Sunday at his home, 220 Winding Way, of complications from an unusual type of heart attack that had apparently occurred three to five days before.

Mrs. Burrell, 68, had been ill for several days and his physician was with him when he died. During the examination Mr. Burrell went to the bathroom. When the doctor heard Mr. Burrell fall, he administered cardiac massage with out success.

Mr. Burrell's wife, Clara, who was his business partner for many years in the operation of Burrell's Fountain and Candy Store, on First Street and Churchill Manor, was catering a wedding reception when he died. She has operated a catering business for the past two years while Mr. Burrell was employed as a tour guide for Christian Brothers Winery. They were married Feb. 25, 1928, in Oregon.

He was born and raised in Oregon and was a graduate of Oregon College of Education in Monmouth, Ore. Before the Burrells came to Napa in 1944, he had been a principal of a junior high school for eight years.

They owned the fountain on First Street until 1959, when they acquired Churchill Manor and operated it as a guest house until he retired because of ill health. They lived on Clark Avenue for a few years and had made their home at the Winding

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## Same Weather Due Tomorrow

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)— California's weather took on the characteristics of midsummer today—a cool coast and a hot interior.
