

LUFBERRY MEETS DEATH IN FRANCE

FAMOUS AMERICAN "ACE" KILLED DURING THRILLING AIR FIGHT—HE WAS STRUCK BY A MACHINE GUN BULLET.

With Americans at Lorraine, May 20.—Major Raoul Lufberry, an American "ace" and former member of Lafayette escadrille, was killed today during a running air fight.
He was struck by a machine gun bullet and fell from a monoplane within American lines.
His body was recovered.
Pershing states that Lufberry was possibly wounded or killed before he fell from his plane. He was engaged in a long running fight and was flying upside down at a height of 2,000 feet when he fell.

SECOND RED CROSS DRIVE OPENS THIS EVENING

All preparations are complete for the mammoth demonstration tonight, which will celebrate the opening of the second Red Cross War Fund campaign.

The parade will start from the corner of Second and Brown streets at 7:30 o'clock, and will consist of the following units:

- Napa Band.
- City and County Officials in automobiles.
- Napa Canton, I. O. O. F.
- Boy Scouts under Mr. E. L. Bickford, with banners.
- Napa Aerie of Eagles.

- Decorated automobiles containing citizens.

The line of march will be: From Second and Brown streets south on Brown to Third, to Main, to Pearl, to Brown, to First, to the Empire Theater.

The Red Cross nurses and donated automobiles will form on Coombs street, between First and Second, facing Second.

The Boy Scouts will form on Second street, between Coombs and Brown, facing Brown.

Ladies of the Red Cross walking will form at the corner of Second and Coombs streets.

Fraternal Orders will form on First street, between Coombs and Randolph, facing Coombs.

Following the parade all will proceed to the Empire Theater, where an interesting and attractive program will be rendered. Patriotism will be the key-note of the gathering, with pictures especially appropriate to the occasion.

CONDUCTS RAID THE 21-STERS

Sheriff Kelton Swoops Down on Notorious "Stone Bridge House" Near St. Helena—Proprietress Is Arrested.

Sheriff Kelton, Under Sheriff Mills and Deputy Sheriff Henry Cavagnaro raided the notorious "Stone Bridge House" near St. Helena that was closed only a few months ago under Red-light Abatement proceedings instituted by District Attorney Coombs.

They placed the proprietress, Mrs. Mary Selowsky, and a girl inmate, under arrest.

Mrs. Selowsky was charged with conducting a house of prostitution and the girl was accused of vagrancy.

Both defendants were brought to Napa before Justice Anglim, who admitted them to bail in the sum of \$350.

Sheriff Kelton says there were several young men in the house at the time of the raid.

GETS U-BOAT

HUGE ARMY IS ASSEMBLED FOR SMASH

GERMANS HAVE MOBILIZED NEARLY TWO MILLION MEN FOR RESUMPTION OF WEST FRONT OFFENSIVE.

Paris, May 20.—Preparing to resume the great offensive the Germans have concentrated 140 of their best divisions between the North Sea and Oise.

These comprise two-thirds of the army and they total about 1,630,000 men.

There is every indication that the coming offensive will have the objectives of threatening Amiens, cutting the Amiens-Clermont railway, forcing the evacuation of Ypres, separating the British and French armies and forcing the evacuation of Northern France. The Germans would thus realize their dream of a submarine base on the channel.

Against this dream the allies have taken every precaution and they await the onslaught with supreme confidence.
