



Building on a maritime past

World-famous yachting races. An arts festival packed with fun for all ages. History at every turn. Marblehead's coast offers the best of summer on the North Shore.

Nestled between historic Salem, scenic Swampscott and the wild Atlantic, Marblehead was settled by English colonists around 1629.


About 200 Colonial-era homes and buildings still dot the town's streets, drawing in visitors for walking tours that boast sites such as the Jeremiah Lee Mansion on Washington Street, a pristine 1768 Colonial Georgian built by Massachusetts' wealthiest merchant and shipowner at the time.

Visitors can take in one of the last pyramidal skeletal lighthouses in the United States on trips to Chandler Hovey Park off Ocean Avenue. Built in 1896, Marblehead Light Station is a roughly 100-foot tall, cast-iron structure with a central tower cylinder that replaced an 1830s-era lighthouse and is the last of its kind in New England.

Even more beautiful than the town's historic architecture is its stunning views of the ocean and deep ties to marine activities.

While fishing vessels filled Marblehead's harbor until the mid-19th century, racing yachts now pack its span of coastline each year for the annual Marblehead Race Week competition. Started in 1889, yachtsmen from around the world sail to Marblehead

to take part in the competition during the last full week of July.

Race week events include Junior Race Week and the Helly Hansen Sailing World Regatta Series. A yearly race between Halifax, Nova Scotia and Marblehead that was first held in 1905 is also hosted each summer. Information on Race Week and competition schedules can be found at www.mheadrace.


Want to get on the water but don't have your own boat? Jordan's Launch on Front Street has 20-25 minute boat tours around Marblehead Harbor for \$10 per person each summer. Satori Sailing also offers sunset sails, private day charters and adult sailing lessons.

Of course, any trip to Marblehead isn't complete without a walk along the beach. Devereux Beach has a concession stand, picnic tables and

Marblehead Arts Festival

Champagne, road races and live music

The Marblehead Festival of Arts will bring art, culture and family fun to the town's coastline from July 3-7 this summer — and with a new event.

A 10K road race/walk will be hosted in addition to the festival's second annual 5K race. Both will kick off at 7:45 a.m. Saturday, July 6, with registration closing at 7 a.m. Participants can register online ahead of the race, and proceeds will support local art scholarships.

In the days ahead of the race, the festival will begin with its annual ocean-side Champagne Reception fundraiser where guests can enjoy wine tastings and live music.

Sixteen musical acts will

perform at Crocker Park throughout the festival.

An Artisans' Marketplace will be held from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. July 4 and 5 on the grounds of Abbott Hall, giving visitors the chance to purchase one-of-a-kind pieces from local artists.

Other art will be on display throughout the festival. Professional artists and novices alike can also come together to capture Marblehead's shores during the Painting-the-Town tradition, held each year during the festival.

paid public parking for those looking for a quick stroll in the sun or all day fun, and is on the way to Marblehead Neck.

Grace Oliver Beach's shallow waters and small size makes it an ideal spot for beach days with young kids. Nearby is Crowninshield Island. The tiny island's sandy beach sits beside rocky shores, a meadow and a salt marsh, all of which can be accessed by foot during low tide.

Gashouse Beach has boatlanding access, as does the pebbly Riverhead Beach near Devereux.

More rocky coastline can be found at Fort Beach, just down the road from Fort Sewall. First used as a defensive point in 1644, Fort Sewall would go on to hold prisoners in underground rooms and bunkers and defend the USS Constitution from British frigates during the War of 1812.

Some of the best views of Marblehead Harbor can be

seen from Crocker Park off Front Street. Or for a pickup game of tennis, basketball, baseball or street hockey, visit Seaside Park on Atlantic Avenue across from the Marblehead Police Station.

Those looking to tee off on the North Shore this summer can take part in the Marblehead Open Golf Tournament on July 8. Hosted by the Marblehead Chamber of Commerce, the event will open up the impressive greens of the Tedesco Country Club along the town's border with Salem and Swampscott.

For birdwatchers and nature enthusiasts, the Massachusetts Audubon's Marblehead Neck Wildlife Sanctuary is the perfect place to spot rare birds and enjoy swamps, woodlands and other species native to the North Shore. Migratory birds like warblers also call the sanctuary home each spring and fall.

Downtown Marblehead has cozy restaurants and bright storefronts that attract locals and visitors alike. Some shops sell the town's famous colonial-era molasses cookie called Joe Frogger, a sweet that's been loved by fishermen and townsfolk for centuries.

The old footpaths of colonial Marbleheaders make for a scenic walk through time on Marblehead Neck and downtown. On Washington Street. Abbott Hall hosts Town Hall and a historical museum where visitors can view the "Spirit of '76" painting by Archibald MacNeal Willard, a piece that was famously exhibited at the 1876 Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia.

Festivals pack Witch City calendar

A summer stretch of festivals represents a golden opportunity for residents to enjoy Salem before the October tourists arrive at summer's end.

A heavy slate of events give locals a choice among choices on most weekends this spring and summer, kicking off with Salem Public Schools' "SEE ME" festival on Saturday, June 1, and closing with the Salem Jazz and Soul Festival on Saturday, Aug. 17.

That doesn't include the routine offerings that spring out of Salem's Artists Row beginning May 4, Salem Flea's monthly outing from May to September, and the Farmers Market, which will run Thursdays from June 13 to Oct. 12.

JUNE 1: "SEE ME"

First run in 2023 (bit.lv/4aGanAT), Salem Public Schools' "SEE ME" exhibition launches at Peabody Essex Museum, 161 Essex St. The show explores how the city's young people see their history and how their cultures have shaped them. The exhibition formed as a way of connecting the city with its school community.

JUNE 7-9: Salem Arts Festival

The 16th Salem Arts Festival, a joint effort of Salem Main Streets and Creative Collective, runs throughout downtown Salem for three days. The festival includes live shows, hands-on art activities, pop-up exhibits, murals being created by artists in real time, and installations that are "bound to be Instagram-worthy," the event's page reads. (bit.ly/4aiweOW)

JUNE 18: Juneteenth Celebration

With the enshrining of Juneteenth as a federal holiday in 2021, the North Shore Juneteenth Association has since annually hosted flag raisings and celebrations to commemorate the end of the enslavement of Black Americans in the United States, as well as highlighting the achievements and positive contributions of Black Americans each June. (bit.ly/49pLKas)

JUNE 22: Pride Parade and Festival

This year's North Shore Pride ceremonies will kick off rain or shine Saturday,



June 22, with a parade at noon traveling between Shetland Park on Congress Street and Salem Common. A festival on the Common will run concurrent with the parade, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., and an afterparty will run at Bit Bar on Derby Street. JULY 20: Negro Election Day

The 284th Negro Election Day and Salem United's festivities around the now-federal holiday will be honored for its 284th year across two days: Friday, July 19, for a flag raising at noon in Riley Plaza, off of Washington and Norman streets. The official day of Negro Election Day, the third Saturday in July, will see Salem Willows spring to life as the park opens at 8 a.m. The parade will run out of Shetland Park beginning 11:30 a.m., and a presentation of a gift flag

JULY 28: The World **Needs You Here**

Mental Makeover's annual 3-mile walk "The World Needs You Here" will stand strong on Salem Common on Sunday, July 28, beginning at 10 a.m. Discounted rates are available through the week of the event, with money raised to support scholarships honoring beloved community members who have died by suicide. Packet pickup and event-day registration begins at 8:45 a.m. (bit.ly/3xrIfDj)

AUGUST 3: Salem Maritime Festival

The 2024 Salem Maritime Festival will take over the Salem Maritime National Historic Site, 160 Derby St., on Saturday, Aug. 3, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Planned events include the Great Salem Maritime Cardboard Boat Regatta, which will launch "at 10 a.m. sharp (the tide waits for no one!)," the National Park Service website reads. New reservation adds to places to explore

Beaches. Theaters. Parks. Festivals. Hiking trails. When it comes to summer activities, there is no lack of options in Beverly.

The center of much of the city's summer fun is Lynch Park, 16 oceanside acres on Ober Street known as the "Crown Jewel" of Beverly. The park has two beaches, a rose garden, performance shell, splash pad, playground, snack stand, picnic benches, and great views of the ocean.

Lynch Park is free for Beverly residents with a valid parking sticker. For non-residents, parking is \$25 on weekends and holidays, \$15 on weekdays, or \$5 for seniors and active military on weekdays.

Other beaches are Dane Street Beach and Independence Park, both on Lothrop Street; Obear Park on Livingston Avenue in Ryal Side; and Pleasantview Park alongside the Bass River on Porter Street in the Goat Hill neighborhood.

The city has lots of open

Beverly Homecoming is back — for the 59th time

BEVERLY — For all of the things to do in Beverly during the summer, nothing has been more enduring than Beverly Homecoming.

The annual festival will mark its 59th year in 2024. The event will be held over six days from Aug. 6-11.

Homecoming's signature event is LobsterFest, which is held on the Wednesday of Homecoming week from noon to 8 p.m. at Lynch Park. People can buy a traditional boiled

lobster, lobster roll, chowder, chicken or other items and eat at picnic tables under a big tent while listening to local bands. Local businesses, nonprofits and elected officials set up around the park to share information with the usual large crowds.

LobsterFest serves as the major fundraiser to pay for Homecoming, which is run by an all-volunteer nonprofit organization.

Other big events include the

Lip Sync Extravaganza, a fun competition among the Beverly Recreation Department's summer campers (and camp counselors); Senior Day in the Park, when the city honors the Senior of the Year; and the Yankee 5K Road Race.

Homecoming wraps up Sunday with three separate concerts at Lynch Park and the fireworks show at night. The fireworks can be seen from Lynch and several other places along the Beverly (and Salem)

waterfront.

Many, though not all, of the Homecoming events are at Lynch Park, the city's oceanside park on Ober Street. Beverly residents can park at Lynch for free with a resident sticker. For non-residents, parking is \$25 on weekends and holidays, \$15 on weekdays, or \$5 for seniors and active military.

The full Homecoming schedule will be available at beverlyhomecoming.org.



space and hiking trails. Trails can be found at Bald Hill next to the Centerville School; Beverly Commons off Webster Avenue; Green's Hill next to the Ayers Ryal Side School; JC Phillips off Cabot Street near Wenham Lake; Norwood Pond off Red Rock Lane; and Sally Milligan Park on Cross Lane.

This summer will mark the opening to the public for the first time of 66 acres at Moraine Farm, the Frederick Law Olmsted-designed landscape near Wenham Lake. The Trustees of Reservations bought the

property in 2022 and has combined it with the existing parcels it owns at Moraine Farm to create a new reservation.

Beverly is home to another Trustees of Reservations property, Long Hill. Located at 576 Essex St., Long Hill features structured and naturalistic gardens surrounded by more than 100 acres of woodland.

As for things to do inside this summer, Beverly has no less than three theaters — The Cabot and Larcom Theatre, two Vaudeville-era theaters located in the downtown, and North Shore Music Theatre on Dunham Road.


The Cabot and the Larcom both offer live entertainment, while The Cabot also has movies. Jay Leno will be at The Cabot on May 11.

Beverly also has a thriving downtown restaurant scene, on Cabot and Rantoul Streets. One of the newest additions is Mission Boathouse, which became Beverly's first waterfront restaurant when it opened in 2023.

Beverly's arts district in the heart of the downtown includes Montserrat College of Art galleries displaying work by its students, the Historic Beverly museum and visitor center, The Larcom and The Cabot, and a variety of public murals.

Beverly Main Streets, a nonprofit that promotes the downtown, hosts a variety of events. 



A seaside paradise with flip-flop flare

Manchester-by-the-Sea wraps itself snugly around its famously picturesque harbor, framed in leafy trees and edged by the expansive green lawns of Masconomo Park, where its gazebo pavilion is home to the town's summer concert series, now in its 22nd year. One of the best picnic spots on the North Shore, this is where you'll want to toss a frisbee, walk a dog, watch a ball game, or just sit back and take it all in from a park bench.

Incorporated in 1645, this classic little New England town is known for its exquisitely preserved early American villagescape. It has a reputation as an upscale town, but — as one popular restaurant puts it — it's a "flip-flop friendly" place come summer.

Flip-flops, sandals, shorts and T-shirts are pretty much Main Street's dress code come summer, which starts with Memorial Day celebrations, moves on through June to Independence Day's fireworks over Singing Beach beginning at nightfall on July 3, followed the next morning at 10 with a parade down Main Street, which — if you like good old-fashioned unabashed Americana — you won't want to miss.

Manchester-by-the-Sea — where the eponymous Oscarwinning movie was filmed — first thrived on fishing, then moved on to fine furniture crafting, a heritage much in evidence in its antique shops and in the restored rooms of Trask House (circa 1823), home to the Manchester-by-the-Sea Museum.

Fishing and fine furniture may have been first to bring affluence to these shores, but it

was Manchester-by-the-Sea's natural coastal beauty that later drew the true wealth of Boston elite to these shores to build the summer "cottages" that transformed it into their summer colony.

Unlike New York's Gilded Age industrialists whose "new money" built Newport's summer "cottages" as ostentatious displays of wealth, Manchester-by-the-Sea's

"cottages" — though grand in scale — really are cottages. Built on a classic simple Yankee coastal aesthetic, they're larger versions of the colonies of simple summer cabanas their owners built on the wide, white sands of the jewel in

Manchester-by-the-Sea's crown: Singing Beach.

Singing Beach — so called because its mile and a half of wide, white sands are said to be so fine they "sing" beneath your feet — was in 2022 named one of the 10 best beaches in the country by Jetsetter magazine. A popular destination for anyone who likes their beaches serenely beautiful, it draws day visitors from Boston via the MBTA, and luckily for them, Singing Beach is walkable from the train station in the town center.

Actually, walking is a popular choice for many because parking spots (\$30 for nonresidents, weekdays only,

when space allows) go fast at Singing Beach and admission by foot is just \$10. The closest non-resident parking is at Masconomo Park, about a halfmile from the beach, and local Boy Scouts sell parking spaces behind the train station for \$25 per day on weekends during the summer. The walk-on fee for the beach applies.

Not much for walking? Hop onboard a golf cart and let the Beach Bums — enterprising young locals — shuttle you and your beach gear on a "tipsonly" basis.

If hiking is more your idea of a perfect summer day, make tracks for the Coolidge Reservation, a Trustees of the Reservations property where a heavily forested trail will take you out to Coolidge Point with its great lawn and some of the finest vistas of Massachusetts Bay, its beaches, woodlands, salt marshes, and — on a clear day — Boston's impressive skyline.

Back on the harbor, board a Frayed Knot charter for a summer sail or sailing lesson or just sit back and soak up the sea in all its summer glory. For the more adventurous, there's stand-up paddling on the protected harbor and on to Sand Dollar Cove, the islands and beyond. Still not tired? Sweeney Public Park (113 Summer St.) offers pickleball and basketball courts, a Little League baseball diamond, softball diamond and skateboard park, all lit for night play.

As the great 19th century master portraitist John Singer Sargent is said to have said while visiting Manchester-bythe-Sea's own master artist, Charles Hopkinson, "Whatever did you do to live in such a paradise?"

An old-fashioned Fourth

Manchester-by-the-Sea's Fourth of July begins this year on July 3 when Singing Beach is the setting for spectacular show of fireworks starting at 9 p.m. and lasting about half an hour.

Manchester's fireworks are not an annual but a biannual event, so if you're in town this Fourth, you're in luck and you're in for a treat.

Downtown on the waterfront, the celebrations begin at 7:30 p.m., with a free, prefireworks music concert at Masconomo Park.

Like most things in Manchester-by-the-Sea, Singing Beach is walkable and the Manchester Parks and Recreation Department advises you to leave your car behind if possible. Pack a picnic and a blanket and join the locals on a beach whose history is almost as interesting as the town itself. with sand so fine it's said to "sing" beneath your feet.




Uncle Sam marches down School Street during the annual Fourth of July Parade in Manchester-by-the-Sea.

The morning of the Fourth, the parade steps off at 10 a.m., starting at Lincoln Street, between Memorial Elementary School and Manchester Essex Regional High School, then travelling up Vine Street, crossing over Norwood Avenue, and continuing up Vine Street to School Street. The parade will take a right onto School Street and proceed to Pleasant Street. From here the parade will take a left onto Pleasant Street, then a left on to Pine Street. It will go down Pine Street and take the left onto Central Street where it will go up Union Street to Norwood Avenue and end at Coach Field Playground

If you like your music stirring, your bands smartly uniformed and marching in precision timing, your cars and fire engines antique, your entertainers entertaining and vour homemade floats and costumes as patriotic as all get out, this is the parade for you.

Manchester-by-the-Sea's annual Festival by the Sea which this year falls on Saturday, Aug. 3, from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., is a summer celebration of all things Cape Ann: arts, music and food. Artist and tented artisan booths spread throughout downtown, with live music playing all afternoon at Masconomo Park. Admission is free, and the event happens rain or shine.



Broad beach and lush nature trails beckon

Whether it's hiking, swimming, kayaking, or sunbathing, Ipswich has a wealth of summer activities for everyone to enjoy.

Known as the "Birthplace of American Independence," Ipswich has a rich history that is on full display, with the largest collection of remaining 17th-century houses in the U.S.

But the biggest draw of the summer remains Crane Beach, a picturesque beach with saltwater inlets, purple sand bars, and acres of clam flats and oyster beds. The beach is part of the Crane Estate on Argilla Road and belongs to the nonprofit Trustees of Reservations, which manages more that 120 properties throughout

Massachusetts. Every year over 350,000 people annually visit the beach to enjoy 1,234 acres of sandy seaside fun. Visitors can take a plunge into the water, observe wildlife, and trek over 5 miles of marked trails through the dunes at Castle Neck and Steep Hill Beach.

Day passes are required for weekend admission and highly recommended for weekday admission. The passes and more details on access to the beach this summer are available to all on the Trustees website, https://thetrustees.org/content/crane-beach-faq/.

On nearby Castle Hill, 290 Argilla Road, part of the

Crane Estate and managed by the Trustees, a diverse list of musicians, dancers, and performers will be playing starting June 29 as a part of the annual Castle Hill Picnic Concerts. Come for the clams, stay for the shops

Driving through Essex is not so much like driving into another town as it is driving into another century. Here, houses are as they were back when they were built, and they were built, some of them, as far back as the 1600s and early 1700s, so not surprisingly, this tiny town, founded in 1663, is home to antique shops more than 15 of them at current count.

And then there are the restaurants. On Essex's narrow strip of causeway are strung colorful seafood eateries which serve up the steamed lobsters and shellfish Essex is famous for, and then there are the M40 2024 SUMMER GUIDE

clams. Essex is surrounded by clam flats, and where there are clam flats there are clams, and Essex is said to have the best in New England.

A coastal "prairie" is one way of describing the vast salt marshes that stretch as far as the eye can see — along with the clam flats - and much of it can be explored by touring. Essex River Cruises offers tours regularly — from 90 minutes to seven hours - with narrated public sails and special offerings such tidal beach clam bakes all through summer, If kayaking is more your

speed, you're in the right place. Either way, you will see and experience up close and personally the secrets and wonders of Essex wetland and wildlife.

The town of Essex was built on ship-building and the Essex River was how the town transported its ships to Gloucester to join in its once vast fishing fleet. As famous for its schooners as it is for its clams, Essex schooners, great and small, were built by the thousands over so many generations and centuries that they are said to be part of the town's DNA.

Step aboard the Essex Shipbuilding Museum, 66 Main St, and you can see schooners still being built by a team of master crafters under the direction of master shipwright Harold Burnham who keeps his family's centuries-old ancestral torch alive in the neighboring boatyard. In recent years, two of Burnham's newly built schooners — the Thomas E. Lannon and Ardelle — offer





unforgettable public and charter sails on Gloucester Harborr and beyond.

If folk art is your thing, the 165-acre coastal farm Cogswell Grant, owned by Historic New England, is worth a visit. A renowned collection is displayed in the 1728 farmhouse in which it was assembled by Bertram K. and Nina Fletcher

Walking tours are a popular way to see historic Essex by land, and there is plenty to see. There are 16 historic sites on the self-guided Historic Essex Walking Tour. You'll set out with brochure in hand and over a one-mile stretch of the Essex River Cultural District you'll find everything from a

1797 Paul Revere bell to the birthplace of the fried clam. Not to mention, some terrific shop browsing. Having worked up an appetite, you'll want to choose a restaurant. We recommend all of them. Or maybe even just an ice cream cone, made even more delicious with a view of the sun setting low over the salt marsh.

Home through the centuries to waves of immigrants drawn by its cod-rich waters, Gloucester has the kind of character — and colorful characters — that can only be found in a working seafaring town.

It's famously proud of its annual St. Peter's Fiesta, a four-day late June celebration of its faith in the patron saint of fishermen. You don't have to be Italian to love Fiesta. Its boat races, parades, great street food, fun and rides appeal to everyone, and its famous — or should we say infamous Greasy Pole — event is one amazing blockbuster, crowd-rousing way to kick off summer.

Fiesta is followed shortly by an Independence Day that lasts for days. A Horribles Parade that's as original as Gloucester itself is followed by fireworks over the harbor, and then there are the block parties — three of them over the summer — that turn downtown into a fun for all.

But first things first. One of the best ways to see Gloucester is to do it as the fishermen do: from the water. There are lots of ways to accomplish that, from booking an unforgettable sail on one of two magnificent Essex-built schooners, the Thomas E. Lannon or Ardelle, or by hopping aboard the M/V Lady Jillian, the water shuttle that for just \$10 will scoot you around the Inner Harbor, connecting Gloucester's two Cultural Districts, Harbortown, and Rocky Neck.

Whale watching will also give you a great view of why the the nation's oldest seaport has been the subject of much of America's greatest maritime art. But more of that later. Staying with the whale watching; there are several whale watching operations in Gloucester, all with boats running



regularly from docks on the waterfront. Gloucester is home to Ocean Alliance, a renowned center for whale research and conservation headquartered in a picturesque barnlike structure at the entrance to the Inner Harbor. Ocean Alliance is visitor friendly with programs and events throughout the summer.

Also viewable west across the Outer Harbor — beyond the great green lawns, playing fields, concert pavilion and white sands of Half Moon Beach that make Stage Fort Park so much a part of summer — is the magnificent medieval period Hammond Castle Museum, the creation of John Hays Hammond Jr. (1888-1965), Gloucester's ingenious inventor of breakthrough technology that was the foundation for all modern radio remote control, including missile guidance systems.

Hammond was an eccentric lover of art and history, and Hammond Castle, imported element by architectural element in the early 20th century from European castles, sits high on a bluff overlooking the Atlantic, today a thriving museum offering tours, exhibits, events, educational programs, and entertainment all summer long.

Gloucester is home to many museums, including the Maritime Gloucester on the working waterfront and the exquisite Cape Ann Museum, whose downtown campus is home to masterworks by centuries of artists, including Edward Hopper who in mid-20th century established his career with famous watercolor portraits of Cape Ann streetscapes and houses. In 2023, the museum celebrated the 400th anniversary of the founding of Gloucester with a major Hopper retrospective that drew tens of thousands of visitors.

Gloucester's contemporary art scene can be overshadowed by its art history, but art thrives today in studios and galleries that stretch from downtown (aka: Harbortown), east across the harbor to the scenic, historic Rocky Neck Art Colony.


and Gloucester's art is not all visual. Music is as much on the menu as seafood, and Main Street's new main attraction, The Cut, is a cutting-edge entertainment center, with a 500 capacity concert venue and gastro pub.

Then there's Gloucester Stage Company, a summer mecca for serious theatergoers who flock here to see first-class productions of new and original pieces as well as classics, acted and directed by top-rate talent drawn from the stages of Broadway, Boston, and beyond.

All through summer, the sight of sails riding the waves of the harbor never fails to thrill, and a great place to watch them from is Stacy Boulevard, with its gorgeously landscaped gardens framing The Man at the Wheel, Gloucester's iconic statue memorializing the lives of thousands of men who

have "gone down to the sea in boats" never to return.

Stacy Boulevard is also an ideal spot to watch another of Gloucester's summer highlights, the Schooner Festival, held annually over Labor Day weekend, and drawing schooners of all sizes and stripes to compete, race, and say a fabulous farewell to summer, as only Gloucester can do it, by parading their stately sails across the harbor.

Galleries, granite, and world-class performance centers

Where to begin with this beauty of a coastal treasure? Originally part of Gloucester, Rockport separated into its own distinct-in-every-way town in the mid 1800s. Its center, nestled snugly around its famously rock-ledged harbor, is where classic New England meets Scandinavia, a uniquely quaint culture colored by Nordic immigrants who settled here in the mid 19th century to work its quarries and fish its waters.

One of America's earliest art colonies, art is as much a bedrock of this town as the granite it cut and shipped from its quarries to build 19th century America cityscapes. You'll see its art, past and present, in its Main Street galleries, where the Rockport Art Association & Museum—now in its 103rd year—still reigns with its own handsome galleries.

Just off Main Street's Dock Square the waterfront's most famous attraction, Bearskin Neck, reaches out into the harbor, a narrow finger of land jam-packed with a bustling bazaar of artists' studios, colorful shops offering great shopping,

and — like the rest of Rockport — restaurants and eateries serving seafood plucked fresh from the waters that surround it.

Nearby Bradley Pier is home to one of the most picturesque fish shacks

anywhere, Motif No. 1,' so called because it's said to be the No. 1 subject in the nation for plein air painters who line Rockport's waterfront with their

Rockport rocks all summer long

Rockport does things a little differently, Like its fireworks, for instance. Instead of doing them on the Fourth of July, they do them Aug. 10. On Fourth, what Rockporters do, and they do it in their own inimitable way, is a bonfire. A very big bonfire on the beach.

But before the bonfire and fireworks, a harbinger of summer is Rockport's weekly Farmers Market, held Saturdays, June 15 through Oct. 12, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., in Harvey Park at the intersection of Broadway and Mt. Pleasant Street.

On Independence Day, the Rockport Firemen's Parade

steps off rain or shine at 6 p.m. from Rockport High School, proceeds left on South Street, goes through Mount Pleasant Street, passes Dock Square, continues up Main Street and finally turns right on to Beach Street leading to Back Beach around 8 p.m.

At Back Beach, people stack out spots with blankets and beach chairs to take in an hour-long concert by Rockport Legion Band at the bandstand and the following bonfire of wood pallets piled high.

The Aug. 10 fireworks show will start at 9 p.m. from Granite Pier.

easels.

Back on "the mainland" and wandering up Main Street, you'll be tempted by more great shopping and seafood, so might miss the deceptively simple entrance to the spectacular Shalin Liu Performing Arts Center, an intimate architectural tour de force where musicians play on a stage whose "back stage" is, thanks to a vast sweep of transparent glass, the sea.

Shalin Liu's annual Summer Chamber Arts Festival is, like Bearskin Neck, jam-packed with offerings. A sampling of its 2024 schedule includes everything from elegant quartets to jazz, blues, American song book and opera, to Graham Nash, Tom Rush and its season-ending finale, its Celtic festival.

The other world-class performance center in Rockport is the Windhover Center for the Performing Arts, a rustic nest of former farm buildings now housing performance stages, rehearsal studios, and dormitories that draw some of the dance world's best touring companies.

Founded in 1967 as a summer colony for young dancers by Ina Hahn, herself a dancer in some of Broadway's greatest shows, Windhover has remained a summer dance colony for companies such as the Paul Taylor touring company, which returns this August.

Windhover annually stages the popular summer "Quarry Dances" on the waters and rock ledges of neighboring quarries. It also has expanded its repertoire to include original theater works by local and visiting artists, collaborating with the Gloucester Stage Company.

Nature is the star of the show at nearby Halibut State Point Park and Halibut Point Reservation. Once home to Rockport's thriving quarry industry, Halibut Point's long abandoned quarries are today filled with fresh water, reflecting its steep granites ledges in constantly changing sea light.

The park itself offers tours, activities and spectacularly scenic hiking along its seafront vistas and (stargazers, take note) what is said have the clearest view of the night sky in the region. Take a tour of its "watch tower," learn about its once thriving quarrying and handle quarrying tools and implements. Most programs are free.

And what of the beaches, the boating, kayaking and diving? Rockport's beaches — Front, Long, Cape Hedge, and Old Garden — are walkable from the town center. One of summer's signature sights comes late on a weekend afternoon when families toting fishing poles, inner tubes, wet towels and all manner of beach and diving gear head back to the town's inns and boutique hotels.

From the festivities of Memorial Day to Independence Day's firemen's parade and bonfire towering above the sands of Back Beach, to August's Illumination Night—a midsummer night's dream of spectacular fireworks and a town bathed in the light of countless strung paper lanterns—Rockport rocks summer like nowhere else.



New England charm by the sea

There is truly something for just about everybody in the city of Newburyport.

The birthplace of the U.S. Coast Guard, the city is equally famous for its art, music and waterfront dining.

Newburyport started out as an agricultural enterprise by English colonists in the northern "Waterside" area of Newbury in 1635, then became a separate town in 1764 and eventually a city in 1851.

The home of prosperous shipping and fishing industries, the city flourished in the 18th and 19th centuries but would eventually fall on hard times in the post-World War II era.

Newburyport would, however, become the first municipality to make use of federal urban renewal funding for historic preservation in the 1970s and created a downtown which has become a destination for thousands of visitors, every year.

The downtown offers small shops, art galleries and an

A love letter to Greece

At Ya Mas, authentic, from-scratch food warms the heart and soul



One glance at the menu of Ya Mas Greek Taverna & Bar in Salem, New Hampshire, and customers know they are in for a unique culinary odyssey.

"Your myth begins here..." it states at the top in cerulean blue on while — the colors of the Greek national flag.

When owner Athanasios Sioras decided in July to move his popular scratch kitchen eatery from Pelham into what was previously Bertucci's at the Mall at Rockingham Park, the initial goal was to expand

seating capacity and create a more generous space for his customers and staff. The first-generation Greek American sought to maintain the rustic charm of the Pelham location while amping up the luxury factor at the new spot.

Sioras is committed to bringing a superior-quality, Boston-like dining experience with reasonable prices to Southern New Hampshire. And he has the restaurant credentials to make it happen — including time spent honing his craft at the award-winning restaurant at Boston

Harbor Hotel, a five-star waterfront establishment overlooking the historic city port.

Ya Mas' ambiance has retained its decidedly Mediterranean vibe. Family photos, heirlooms and antiques still adorn the walls; Grecian music plays in the background; and the air is filled with that famous Greek hospitality —generous and inviting.

Guests at Ya Mas are transported back to ancient Greece, dining under a golden, vintage-style encaustic tin ceiling and amid classic Greek architectural columns and 30 elegant crystal chandeliers. Visitors are greeted by a replica or perhaps the most famous Greek sculpture from the Hellenistic period, Venus de Milo, also known as Aphrodite of Melos.


"Don't miss the chance to take a selfie with this Greek beauty," the restaurant's social media sites state.

The Greek goddess of love and beauty would certainly approve of one cozy nook at the eatery, a table that includes a romantic green love seat for two.

Talented chefs prepare the caliber of food that customers have come to expect from a visit to Ya Mas.

"We're all about family-style meals where you can order a little of everything, and everybody can share and enjoy all the different flavors we have to offer," Sioras says.

Ya Mas means "cheers" in the Greek language. And for patrons of the restaurant, it also means platters of briny marinated Greek olives, vegan grape leaves, hummus, tzatziki and



eggplant, served with roasted pita. It's fall-off-the-bone braised lamb shanks with red wine and a secret spice and herb mix, mouth-watering moussaka, and fresh grilled octopus. It's the pasta dish known as pastit-sio, made with ground meat and béchamel sauce, or the ever-popular earthy spanakopita with spinach and feta, wrapped in a buttery house-made phyllo. And don't forget the delectably sweet baklava and other classic Greek desserts.

Any Greek restaurant worth its salt needs a decent feta, and for Sioras, that means importing a 100% sheep milk cheese from the rugged, mountainous Epirus region, up near the northwestern border of Greece and Albania.

"It's very creamy," he says of the beechwood barrel-aged delicacy.

A majority of cheeses served at Ya Mas are made from sheep and goat milk, more velvety options than cheese from cow milk. They are also lactose-free, Sioras points out.

In keeping with Greek tradition, Ya Mas provides a genuine farm-totable dining experience, with most of its fresh products sourced from local farms — fruits and vegetables from Brookside Farm in Pelham; dairy items from the historic family-owned High Lawn Farm in the Berkshires; and premium Black Angus beef ranched out of Creekstone Farm in Kansas. Sioras uses only 100% American prime lamb from Colorado, as well as acorn-fed Durac pork and Bell and Evans poultry. Wild, line-caught fish is flown in from the Hellenic Republic twice a week, and all bread is imported from Attica, Greece.

But beyond scrumptious classic Greek fare, Sioras has infused his new eatery with a few fresh upscale offerings for customers to enjoy, such as a raw bar with delicacies from the sea — oysters, littleneck clams, lobster, crab, ahi tuna and more.

The 145-seat eatery is now available to reserve for private dining experiences for parties of 10 to 80 guests.

Mixologist Asterios Natsios, a native of Greece who previously worked in Athens and on the island of Crete, has an extensive knowledge of spirits and craft cocktails. His concoctions include Persephone's Porn Star Martini, a mixture of vanilla vodka, passion fruit and sparkling wine, and the Mykonos Blue cocktail, served in a hip fish glass.

Natsios changes up his selection of cocktails four times a year. He off rs a varied microbrew program, and of the 170 reds, whites, roses and sparkling wines he sells, 70% are from Greece. The bar is stocked with 30 types of Greek spirits — including 10 varieties of ouzo, the anise-flavored aperitif that is the pride of Greece, as well as an extensive collection of scotches and a full line of Japanese whisky.

In every way, Sioras and his friendly staff at Ya Mas Greek Taverna & Bar strive to offer a completely authentic Greek experience.

"It feels like you're walking back in time," he says.

The annual Yankee Homecoming Parade is scheduled to step off at noon Sunday, Aug. 4, and will roll down High Street.

Newburyport is also the birthplace of the U.S. Coast Guard and Aug. 4 is always included in Yankee Homecoming, as it is National Coast Guard Day. Each year, Yankee Homecoming acknowledges the contributions to the community the Coast Guard has made.



abundance of dining and takeout options while Waterfront Park offers scenic walks along the Merrimack River.

Washington Monument and U.S. Treasury Building architect Robert Mills designed the Custom House Maritime Museum on Water Street, which features vaulted ceilings and cantilevered staircases, while displays tell of the city's seafaring past.

Chartered cruises, fishing trips and whale watches depart from the local docks on a regular basis and Somersby's Landing Sculpture Park features large sculptures by New England artists at the West End of the waterfront boardwalk.

Based out of the Cushing House on High Street, the Museum of Old Newbury offers a broader history of the city, while maintaining the stories of the three Newburys — Newburyport, Newbury and West Newbury — over 300 years.




Maudslay State Park is a 480-acre horticultural and agricultural estate where people

Salisbury Beach

Carousel, concerts. coastal trails



People from all over New England and further afield flock to Salisbury Beach for the summer.

The state of Massachusetts purchased the beautiful 3.8-mile sandy stretch that makes up Salisbury Beach and Salisbury Beach State Reservation in 1933 and developed it to ensure public access to the ocean.

The Department of Conservation and Recreation controls a large portion of the beach bordering private properties of summer homes and rental cottages.

Residents and visitors have fallen in love with the seaside boardwalk, which has even been featured in some Hollywood projects since it opened in 2017.

At the southern end of the property is the Salisbury Beach State Reservation, where folks have the chance to swim, boat, fish, and take in the local wildlife. Facilities include a 484-site campground, a few large parking lots for daily beach visitors, and boat-launching facilities.

Step off the beach and you will discover an array of video arcades and food stands to keep busy and entertained. Paid parking lots are available throughout the beach center, including a municipal lot on the corner of Beach Road and Route 1A.

Children will be delighted to take a ride on the recently added Historic Carousel Pavilion. From Memorial Day to Labor Day the carousel operates Sunday through Thursday from noon to 9 p.m., and Fridays and Saturdays noon to 10 p.m.

Delighting crowds every Saturday at 10:15 p.m. from June 29 through Aug. 17 will be the Salisbury Beach Fireworks show.

A newer offering in Salisbury's music scene is RiverFest, set for Aug. 24. The festival, produced by radio station WXRV 92.5 The River, was held in Newburyport for years prior to moving



Plum Island

Beaches, birds and more

Plum Island is one of many destinations on New England's coastline to hold various natural wonders.

What makes the area so unique is its combination of public space, refuge land, and a beach that form this 11-milelong barrier island straddling Newburyport and Newbury. It provides the perfect chance to spend days relaxing, whether it be bird-watching, biking through the beautiful scenery, or just enjoying the tranquil surf.

Plum Island earns its name as the beach plums bloom then ripen in the late summer. There are also gorgeous cranberry bogs.

Those looking to enjoy a scenic day at the beach will find it at Northern Plum Island Beach, which can be entered from several points along Northern Boulevard. Paid parking lots provide the best access, the largest being at the northern end of the island, in Newburyport.

Also at the northern tip is the historic Newburyport Harbor Light, also known as Plum Island Light. Constructed in 1788 of wood with that traditional look, it's the exact image

that pops into mind when we think of a lighthouse.

Anyone seeking to see the best of what nature has to offer can travel along the Atlantic flyway to the 4,700-acre Parker River Wildlife Refuge, a vital stopover point for more than 300 species of waterfowl, shorebirds and songbirds. Administrated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the refuge was established in 1941 to provide feeding, resting and nesting habitat for migratory birds.

Sitting on the refuge is the Pink House, a landmark which has been synonymous with Plum Island since it was first constructed in 1925, drawing in eyes thanks to its unique pink paint job.

Folks' opportunities to check out the historic house may be running out, as after decades entertaining tourists and developing a strong following, it is under threat of being torn down.

Much of the summer sees

large sections of the beach closed off to protect the piping plover, a particularly endangered species of bird, which nests, lays eggs and raises its young in the refuge. Closing off parts of the beach provides the small gray and white birds an opportunity to feed and nest undisturbed. All sections of the refuge are typically reopened by mid- to late August.

An entrance fee of \$5 per

car or \$2 per walker or biker is in effect year-round at the refuge. An annual pass can be purchased for \$20. Pets are not allowed.

Traveling through the refuge eventually leads to Sandy Point State Reservation, 77 acres at the southern tip of Plum Island. The reservation is one of the state's most beautiful coastal beaches.

Across from the refuge entrance is Mass Audubon's

Joppa Flats Education Center, which overlooks the Merrimack River and offers opportunities to explore wild-life-rich habitats.

Whether you are on your way out or in, it is worth stopping at Plum Island Airport to watch the planes take off. There you can visit a museum that chronicles the airport's history, including W. Starling Burgess' landmark 1910 flights.

The 24nd Sand Sculpting Classic takes place June 20-22. Watch as world-class, sand-sculpting competitors create works of art with more than 200 tons of sand. The sculptures remain up, and illuminated for all to enjoy, day or night, through June 22.

The Hampton Beach Village District will now be holding 7 a.m. yoga sessions on the beach Tuesdays and Thursdays from June 25 to Aug. 29. The free yoga lessons will be held

The Seafood Festival returns Sept. 6-8 to Ocean Boulevard. In


