Voting is your right and privilege

Voting is one of the most ba- the first Tuesday after the first sic privileges, rights and responsibilities a citizen has.

In New Jersey, you are eligible to vote if you reside in a municipality at least 30 days before an election.

You must be at least 18 on or before Election Day, and cannot be serving a sentence, on parole or probation as a result of being convicted of an indictable offense in any state.

In, general, voting questions can be answered by the municipal clerk or by the county clerk.

Primary elections are held

Monday in June.

The primary is held for parties to select Democratic and Republican party candidates to represent the parties on the November General Ballot.

General elections are held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November to elect national, state, county and municipal officials.

Polls are open for both elections from 6 a.m. to 8 p.m.

With the change in the law allowing the school elections to move to November, all annual school elections are now on the November general ballot.

The change does not require any school budget that remains under the 2 per cent cap to be placed on the ballot for voter approval.

CALIFON

A borough of only 1,076 people and covering just one square mile, Califon prides itself on being small, close-knit and quiet, while still boasting an excellent school and recreation for all ages. Califon is located between Lebanon and Tewksbury townships in Hunterdon County.

According to Mayor Charles Daniel, "Califon's best quality is its citizens.

"Be it the local school, the park, the local businesses, the fire department, the rescue squad... we care!"

Califon's small town atmosphere and access to natural gems like the Columbia Trail and a prime trout fishing section of the South Branch of the Raritan River are big draws for visitors and prospective homebuvers, said Daniel. And despite the borough's size, there is no lack in activities for residents throughout the year.

"Califon's Memorial Day Parade and Celebration are no doubt the best celebration in the county," said the mayor. "This year's parade featured various local Boy and Girl Scout troops, community service organizations and religious groups, along with local fire and rescue squads, antique cars, tractors and more. "A good old fashioned parade and celebration - perfect for Califon.'

In addition to the Memorial Day festivities in May during the first week of December a Christmas tree lighting takes place, complete with a countdown to the lighting and carols sung by local children. Santa Claus tours the town on a fire truck. There is an Easter egg hunt on Palm Sunday, and the volunteer fire company sponsors a carnival every July featuring 4th of July fireworks and festivities. Last year the Califon Fireman's Carnival celebrated its 99th year.

The borough hosts its annual street fair in October, featuring vendors from throughout the area selling various wares. Shops on Main Street open and food, drinks and entertainment are available during the event.

Califon also honored the late Jon Slusher,

who served as editor of the Hunterdon Review from 2003 to 2010, with its memorial 5k run. Slusher, a Califon resident and member of Voorhees High School's track and cross country teams, passed away in 2010 after battling brain cancer.

This year the fair weekend will also commemorate the borough's 100th anniversary.

Califon was officially formed as a borough from Tewksbury and Lebanon townships in 1918. The South Branch of the Raritan River, originally used as a boundary to divide Tewksbury and Lebanon Township, provedto be confusing and impractical as a border.

Before it became a municipality, Califon was a station on the High Bridge Railroad Branch of the New Jersey Central Railroad, abandoned in 1976. The station is now the home of the Califon Historial Society.

The name Califon is believed to have been shortened from "California," a name created by Jacob Neighbor around the time of the California Gold Rush. One local legend says the name was shortened due to postal workers who found "California, N.J.," a confusing address. Some suggest the name was changed in the 1870s when it proved too large to paint on the railroad station.

Califon has a rich historical background. Some 170 structures are registered with the National Register of Historic Places. The borough is known for its Victorian houses. marked with names of builders and dates established rather than street numbers.

Califon runs its own public school for children in kindergarten through grade eight; students then attend Voorhees High School for grades nine through 12.

The borough is governed by a voter-elected mayor and six-member Borough Council. The mayoral term is for four years and council term is three years.

MEMORIAL DAY PARADE

The members of the 15th New Jersey Volunteer Infantry showed parade goers how soldiers were dressed and armed during the Civil War during the 18th annual Califon Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 27.

TOWN OF CLINTON

The Town of Clinton measures 1.4 square miles and is home to about 2,719 residents, many of whom are families with children. It is located in central Hunterdon County. Many find the community attractive because it is easily accessible from Interstate 78 and Route 31.

Clinton, which celebrated its 150th anniversary with a huge block party in 2015, features family-friendly recreation, shops, and many historic places of interest. The town is located on the South Branch of the Raritan River and is surrounded by Franklin, Union and Clinton Townships.

A number of annual recreational events take place in Clinton, including Sprintin' Clinton, a 5K race/run in July, and the Haunted Mill, where the Red Mill Museum Village is decorated as a haunted village in October. The Clinton Sunrise Rotary Club also hosts The Great Rubber Ducky Race each year to benefit the American Cancer Society, where rubber ducks are sold and raced over Clinton's waterfalls.

Clinton is also home to a great deal of history, including two former mills on either side of the South Branch: The Red Mill is a showpiece of the Red Mill Museum Village, and the Stone Mill is home to the Hunterdon Art Museum.

The art museum was established in 1952, and the museum's building was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1981. The independent museum exhibits both well-known and emerging artists schooled in contemporary styles of art, in addition to hosting of art programs for adults and children.

Red Mill Museum Village is open to the public from April through October and exhibits a collection of more than 40,000 artifacts, including textiles, baskets, farm equipment, woodworking tools and Victo-

rian household items. In addition to annual recreation events and concerts, the museum also sponsors programs and workshops for locals and visitors.

In March of 2014, Clinton hosted its innaugural St. Patrick's Day Parade organized by the Friendly Sons of St. Patrick of Hunterdon County. People pack Main Street each year for the event, which features dozens of floats and plenty of Irish pride. The event was preceded by the 2nd annual Run o' the Mill 5k race. In recent years, Clinton saw the completion of the terrace at the Hunterdon Art Museum, which provides residents a place to enjoy the downtown area.

Clinton was officially formed as its own town April 5, 1865, although the town existed long before as a milling town located in what was then Lebanon Township. After originally being known as Hunt's Mill, in 1829 it was named for Dewitt Clinton, a governor of New York who sponsored the Erie Canal. During the Revolutionary War, Clinton was a Patriot-oriented town and is believed to have been the first town in New Jersey to organize a regiment of minutemen, who later marched to New York under the leadership of Col. Charles Stewart.

Clinton has one school, Clinton Public School, for children in kindergarten through eighth grade. High School students attend North Hunterdon High School in Clinton Township.

The town is governed by a voter-elected mayor and a six-person town council. They meet at 7:30 p.m. the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month in the municipal building located at 43 Leigh Street.

CLINTON TOWNSHIP

Clinton Township is located in northeastern Hunterdon County and is bordered by Raritan, Readington, Tewksbury, Lebanon and Franklin Townships, as well as the Town of Clinton and High Bridge Borough, and completely surrounds Lebanon Borough. The semi-rural municipality is about 34 square miles and home to 13,478 people, according to the 2010 U.S. Census.

The Township Committee is continuing to work towards meeting its affordable housing obligations and there are a numbe of projects currently in progress.

The committee is moving forward on renovating the old municipal building in the historical Annandale section of the township. The building, which is also part of the township's housing plan, has fallen into disrepair over the past few years. Members of the committee agreed that something needed to be done with the building and plans are now progressing for its renovation.

As for things to do in town, former Mayor Kevin Cimei highlighted Community Day as one of Clinton Township's best events

"We have Community Day each year in the spring, where there is a 15K/5K/1-mile run in the morning that attracts hundreds of runners from all over the state followed by an afternoon community gathering with food, events, rides, games, and music," he said. "It is a great opportunity for residents and neighbors to get together."

In general, the ex-mayor cited Clinton Township as "a great place to live, work and raise a family. We have great schools, recreation, nearby shopping and all in a safe, less congested and beautiful area."

Clinton Township has its own municipal court with a full staff and facilities.

pendent court system in 2008 after breaking away from the North Hunterdon Regional Municipal Court system.

The township is home to six historical districts, including Annandale and Potterstown, and 72 state registered Historic Places, as well as many locally significant sites.

Clinton Township was officially formed from Lebanon Township in March 1841 and was reduced slightly in 1871 when High Bridge Borough was formed.

The township was named after its largest settlement at the time, Clinton. Annandale was formed when the Central Railroad of New Jersey arrived in the township in 1852 and formed Clinton Station.

The village that grew around the railroad and became the center of the township later was renamed. After World War I, the township became a place of interest when the federal road department provided funding to pave an old Lenape Indian Trail, the Easton-Brunswick Road, now Route 22, one of the first in the state. Another local trail became Route 31.

Clinton Township has four schools to serve elementary pupils. Lebanon Borough students attend the middle school.

The township is also home to North Hunterdon Regional High School.

The township is governed by a voter-elected mayor and four Township Council members, who are elected to staggered three-year terms.

They meet at 7:30 p.m. the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month on the third floor of the township's public safety building on Route 31.

Hunterdon County Parks

The Hunterdon County Division of Parks and Recreation is governed by the Hunterdon County Freeholders with input from the Parks Division Advisory Board, which is comprised of volunteer citizens appointed by the freeholders.

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board makes recommendations to the freeholders on all matters regarding county park lands and public recreation opportunities. More than 8,358 acres of land has been purchased for purposes of environmental preservation, and for the public's recreational enjoyment.

The Hunterdon County Division of Parks and Recreation has 16 full-time staff members to carry out the mission of the county by implementing recreational activities, environmental education programs, and special events. Each year, more than 300,000 citizens utilize the parks and programs Hunterdon County has to offer.

Parks are open dawn to dusk, every day. Office hours are from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m Monday - Friday. Offices are closed on Saturdays and Sundays, but the garden and park are still open.

In 1963, a Parks and Recreation Citizens Advisory Committee was formed to preserve open space in the county. For nearly a decade, this group has worked to pave the way for the development of a county-wide park system.

The first county parkland, the Wescott Nature Preserve, was established in 1966, through the donation of 15 acres of land in Delaware Township by Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Wescott. Additional donations were subsequently made in 1970 and 1994. Ralph and Ann Peters sold 102 acres to add to the preserve in 2006. Today, Wescott Preserve is 182 acres.

Presently, the Hunterdon County Park Division comprises 8,634 acres of land which can be categorized, and best described or represented as unimproved natural areas, improved natural areas, linked greenway areas, general use areas and special use areas. Each of these park area categories provides a different type of environment and public use. Of course, each type also has different maintenance and habitat management goals and requirements.

The county's long-term goal is to have roughly 12,000 acres of land in the park division through fee simple purchases and conservation easements. This may also include lands that are jointly purchased by Hunterdon County, the state, municipalities and nonprofit conservation organizations or owned outright by the State Division of Environmental Protection or the New Jersey Water

The Hunterdon County Arboretum, the administration offices of the Hunterdon County Division of Parks & Recreation, are located on Route 31 in the Lebanon section of Clinton Township. The Arboretum grounds consist of 135 acres, which includes several beautiful trails - the longest being the Outer Loop - a 1.1 mile loop that is flat and mostly shady. Visitors are welcome to enjoy the gardens, hike the trails, come inside to sign up for a class or trip, to see the collection of taxidermy specimens and to enjoy the antics of the Arboretum's own turtles - a box turtle and a painted turtle - in tanks at the perfect height for children's viewing pleasure.

Supply Authority and managed by the Hunterdon County Department of Parks and Recreation for public park, recreation and conservation purposes. This would place the county's total parkland holdings at nearly six percent of the total available land area or about 279,680 acres in Hunterdon County.

The county's 29 individual "park" areas can be described as essentially "passive" park areas. Some of which serve to buffer waterways, forming greenway corridors. Some contain parking areas, picnic and camping areas, and nature study opportunities. Several are more "developed" and contain formal group areas and a ball field. The majority of county park properties are located in Readington, Clinton, Lebanon townships and Bethlehem or along the South Branch of the Raritan River, Many hiking, bicycle and horseback riding trails are located in these park areas. Areas such as Cold Brook Preserve, Round Mountain Preserve, portions of the South Branch Reservation, Wescott Preserve, Hoffman Park, Charlestown Reserve, and Teetertown Preserve. One of the newest trail systems is at the Schick Reserve, which is 10 miles in length.

Picnic facilities are located at Echo Hill Environmental Education Area, the County Arboretum, Deer Path Park, several areas along the South Branch Reservation, Hoffman Park, Point Mountain Preserve and the Mountain Farm Section of Teetertown Preserve. Deer Path Park, in Readington Township, the site of an annual summer free concert series, also has several large, reservable group picnic facilities.

Parking is provided at most of the above-mentioned areas. Horse trailer parking is not provided in all the areas that have horse trails, however, so a phone call to the park office is recommended.

Deer hunting is allowed on more than 7,000 acres of county park land. The county's controlled hunting program restricts individual hunters to specific park sites, limited by the size of the park and surrounding public safety zones. An overall ratio of one hunter-to-20-acres of "huntable property" is maintained. Hunters return survey information at season's end to help the county measure the effectiveness of the program. Fishing, on a catch-and-release basis, is allowed in virtually all park areas. There are two trout-stocked ponds - one at Hoffman Park and one at Teetertown. A trout stamp is required to fish trout stocked waters.

High Bridge began as a mining town when William Allen leased 3,000 acres of land in 1742 on which to found an ironworks company. Along with his partner, Joseph Turner, he later purchased 10,849 acres, including today's High Bridge. Last year the borough celebrated the 275th anniversary of the Taylor-Wharton Foundry in the fall.

High Bridge Township was formed in 1871 and included not only today's borough but also portions of Lebanon, Tewksbury and Clinton townships.

The township was reduced and established as High Bridge Borough on Feb. 19, 1898. he name High Bridge comes from a 112-foot-high, 1,300-foot-long bridge built by the Central Railroad Company across the Raritan River in 1851.

In 1859 the bridge proved too large to maintain and was filled in with an embankment.

High Bridge's rich history is displayed at Solitude House, believed to have been built by William Allen around 1725. During the American Revolution it was used to hold the political prisoner John Penn, the last royal governor of Pennsylvania, and his attorney-general.

A stone annex behind the house is believed to have been a storehouse which Allen and Turner used for trading purposes. Today, Solitude House is an occasional museum and event host.

High Bridge runs its own elementary and middle schools, while high school students attend Voorhees High School in Lebanon Township.

The town is run by a voter-elected mayor and six-person council which meet the second and fourth Thursday of each month (except July, August and November) at the new Borough Hall at 97 West Main Street, between the Police and Emergency Squad buildings.





HUNTERDON COUNTY

Prior to 1714, the land that is now Hunterdon County laid entirely in Burlington County and included what is now Sussex, Warren and Morris Counties and a portion of Mercer County.

The Lenni Lenape or "Original People" lived in Hunterdon County. Two of the tribes, the Minsi and Unami, were thought to live there.

A survey between 1912 and 1915 discovered 462 camps, villages, burial sites and rock shelters in the county. The first Indian purchase was made in 1688.

Col. John Reading holds the distinction of being the first settler in the county. John Holcombe was also one of the earliest settlers, living in Lambert-ville in 1705.

Hunterdon County is named for Governor Robert Hunter for the name of his old world home, Hunterston, rather than merely his surname.

The top governing body in Hunterdon County - the Board of Chosen Freeholders being its exact name - originated in England, dating back to the 16th century. "Freeholders" as a term, is unique to New Jersey but it is comparable to similar officials in other states where they are called county commissioners or supervisors.

As top governing officials of Hunterdon County, the five freeholders are chosen by popular vote in the November general elections. One or two of the five members is elected each year. Any subsequent vacancies are filled by an appointment made by the remaining members to the board for the unexpired term of the vacated seat.

Men of distinction who served as freeholders and justices in Hunterdon County include William Trent, for whom Trenton is named, John Hart, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, and U. S. Senator John Lambert.

The first courthouse in Hunterdon was built in May, 1792. Prior to that the county court-

house was located in Trenton.

The original courthouse was burned on Feb. 13, 1828, and a new courthouse on the current site of what is now the "Historic County Courthouse," located on Main Street in Flemington, was constructed that year.

On Jan. 2, 1935, the Lindbergh Trial, known as the "Crime of the Century," began at the Flemington Courthouse.

Bruno R. Hauptman was tried for the fatal kidnapping of aviator Col. Charles Lindberg's son from his Sourland Mountains home, found guilty, and electrocuted. The press camped out across the street at the historic Union Hotel, now an endangered site.

John Deats of Hunterdon invented the Deats Plow in 1828. An unusual two-story gazebo built in 1892 and owned by John Deats is now located at the County Arboretum, located on Route 31 North in the Annandale section of Clinton Township

The original Fulper Pottery facility is located in Flemington, bought by Abraham Fulper from Samuel Hill in 1850 when it was known as Stangl Pottery. The location was home to to a Pfaltzgraff pottery and dinnerware outlet for years, and in 2012 it was turned into an

art studio, restaurant and event venue, the Stangl Factory.

The iron truss bridge over the South Branch of the Raritan River at Main Street in Clinton was designed by Francis C. Lowthorp and built by William Cowin of Lambertville.

New Jersey's only surviving covered bridge is located in the Sergeantsville section of Delaware Township.

John Ringoes' tavern in Ringoes was the scene of many meetings of rebellious patriots who in 1766 organized the Hunterdon Chapter of Sons of Liberty, propelled by indignation of the Stamp Act and other oppressions perpetrated by the British.

Ringoes also has the distinction of being the oldest known settlement in Hunterdon County

The huge rock jutting out on Goat Hill overlooking Lambert-ville and New Hope is called Washington's Rock. It was used as a lookout spot a few weeks before Washington's Christmas night crossing of the Delaware.

Washington was known to have stayed at the Holcombe house in Lambertville on June 21 and 22, 1778, hosted by Richard Holcombe.

The oldest dwelling still standing in Hunterdon is thought to be the Holcombe-Jimison Farm-

stead's main house north of Lambertville, circa 1711, which was left to the Hunterdon County Historical Society.

The first Hunterdon County Fair was held on Feb. 11, 1865, sponsored by the Hunterdon County Agriculture Society.

The county seat of Hunterdon was moved to Flemington in 1790.







READINGTON TOWNSHIP

The largest township in Hunterdon County, Readington Township is bordered by the Lamington River and Rockaway Creek to the north, Somerset County to the east, the South Branch of the Raritan River to the south and Clinton and Tewksbury townships to the west. The township measures almost 48 square miles and had a population of 16,126 in the 2010 U.S. Census.

Readington Township has been very active preserving open space. More than 8,000 acres have been preserved, including farmland and open space. Along with acres of undeveloped land, Readington offers several parks and recreational opportunities. The county's Deer Path Park is located within the township.

Many activities are sponsored by the township's Recreation Committee, including volleyball, basketball and soccer for children and adults. Along with sports, the township sponsors and organizes trips, Easter egg hunts, Halloween events, a Memorial Day parade and a summer camp.

The largest attraction in the township, if not the region, is the annual QuickChek NJ Festival Ballooning at Solberg Airport over the last full weekend of each July, drawing more than 100,000 attendees and more than 100 hot air balloons from around the world.

Other attractions include its three museums: the Bouman-Stickney Farmstead, the Eversole-Hall House and Cold Brook School. The buildings, which date back to the 1700s and 1800s, display furnishings and antiques meant to replicate the houses as they looked in the past. The museums host programs where students in first, fourth and fifth grades, and the general public, visit the museums to learn how life may have been for people living in the past.

Readington Township began as Readings Township on July 15, 1730, when created on the order of a Royal Charter from King

George II of England, and it officially became Readington Township in 1798. It was the first township to be created after Hunterdon was made a county. The village of Readington, originally populated by Dutch farmers, existed some time before, with a mill being erected there between 1710 and 1715.

Readington children attend elementary schools in the township. High school students attend Hunterdon Central Regional High School in Raritan Township.

Readington Township is governed by a voter-elected five-person Township Committee that elects one of its own to serve as mayor for a year. They meet at 6:30 p.m. the first and third Mondays of each month in the Municipal Building, opening to the public at approximately 7:30 p.m.

TEWKSBURY TOWNSHIP

A rural community with a balance of both open space and development, Tewksbury Township is located in northern Hunterdon County and borders both Morris and Somerset counties.

It covers about 32 square miles and has a population of 5,993 according to the 2010 U.S. Census. The 2000 Census listed population at about 6,500.

Occupying 31.8 square miles and with 6,076 residents according to the 2009 figures, Tewksbury Township is part of the four-state Highlands region, now recognized as a critical natural resource, due especially to its value as a source of drinking water, not to mention recreational opportunities.

The township traces its origins to George Willocks' purchase of land from Lenape Indians in 1708 and to the West Jersey Society purchase of 100,000 acres two years later. Germans from the Palatinate arrived in the mid-18th century, and under the leadership of the Lutheran Bishop Muhlenberg, built a church, cemetery and home in what is now Oldwick. New Germantown, used to refer to current Oldwick, first appeared in 1754 and survived until the rise of anti-German feelings during World War I, when the village was re-named "Oldwick," an Anglo-Saxon name for "Old Village."

Tewksbury Township was divided from Lebanon Township, and by royal patent, became a township on March 11, 1755. The name, Tewksbury, is believed to have originated from a connection with Tewkesbury in Gloucestershire, England. The two townships established a sister city relationship in 2003.

The settlement of Pottersville began in the early 1750's as a milling center. In 1783

the mills became the property of the Sering Potter family, hence the name "Potter's Mills," changed to "Pottersville" with the establishment of the post office in 1840.

Mountainville, so named because it sits at the base of Hell Mountain, dates back to 1788 with the settlement of Adam Teets along the Rockaway Creek.

The earliest settler of Fox Hill (now Upper Fairmount) was German emigrant John Peter Fox (Fuchs). Around 1710 the area was named for Fox. Presbyterian churches were established there and in Lamington in the 18th century.

The village of Cokesbury did not coalesce until well after 1814 when the Methodist congregation organized and built the church, which gave the locality its name. The church derived its name from Bishop Francis Asbury and Bishop Dr. Thomas Coke, both Methodist missionaries.

The township operates two schools:

Tewksbury Elementary School for kindergarten through grade four and Old Turnpike School for grades five to eight. Students attend Voorhees High School in Lebanon Township.

The government consists of a voter-elected five-person Township Committee that annually selects one of its own to be mayor for the year. They meet at 7:30 p.m. the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month at the old municipal building, 60 Water St., in the Mountainville section of the township.
