




ABOUT THIS GUIDE



Latest figures show the Essex-Hunterdon-Morris-Somerset area served by **The New Jersey Hills Media Group** with more than 300,000 residential households, including single- and multiple-family dwellings.

TOWN OF BOONTON

Historic Boonton in recent years has been transforming its downtown back to a quaint Main Street thanks in part to a Main Street USA program. Many buildings have undergone renovation, and the sidewalks are adorned with planters and seasonal flowers.

The beautification project has enhanced the downtown's public image and revitalized the business district, which is lined with a mixture of mom-and-pop boutiques, design and computer companies, restaurants and historic buildings such as the Darress Theatre and Boonton Holmes Library.

Located about seven miles north of Morristown, 2.45-square-mile Boonton is home to many people seeking the convenience of access to three major highways: Route 46 and interstates 80 and 287. Residents today are primarily executives, skilled workers and independent business owners.

Boonton was established as a village in the early 1700s. The original town was on the Rockaway River, about a mile and a half downstream from the current center of town and now under the waters of the Jersey City Reservoir.

As early as 1747, Obadiah Baldwin operated an iron ore refining forge at that place, where water power was in ample supply. Under David Ogden, owner of the site and a large tract of surrounding land, and later his son Samuel, the ironworks grew, and a village of workmen and their families emerged. This village was named by the Ogdens "Boone-Towne" in 1761 in honor of the Colonial governor Thomas Boone.

Throughout the Revolutionary War, the ironworks enlarged to include a rolling and slitting mill, the first in the county. It supplied iron products for the military – axes, kettles, horseshoes, tires, cups, rods and sheet-iron. After the war, operations

were continued.

In the 1890s, wealthy New Yorkers discovered the area and the Gilded Age began. Diversification was the key to Boonton's survival. In 1907 Richard Seabury made the world's first molding of organic plastics.

The largest industry in the town of Boonton during the 20th century had its beginnings in 1917, when E.A. Stevenson & Co. established the "Butter Works" on the site of the old Knox Hat factory, and processed coconut and vegetable oils and manufactured margarine.

Its varied history has left behind an antique and architectural legacy, found in the 1740 Dutch wing of the Miller-Kingsland House on Vreeland Avenue and the 1928 Art Deco John Hill School on Lathrop Avenue. Vestiges of Boonton's own Iron Age

can be found in foundations and structures in the "hollow" between Plane Street and the river.

The intersection of Cornelia and Cedar streets is the heart of a National Register Historic District, where the mill workers and artisans began to build in the 1850s. St. John's Episcopal Church, the landmark centerpiece of the district, was built in 1863 on a lot deeded by the New Jersey Iron Co.

According to the 2010 U.S. Census, Boonton's population is 8,347. The town is governed by a mayor and board of eight aldermen who are elected to two-year terms. The meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. the first and third Mondays of each month at Town Hall on Washington Street. In July and August meetings are held on the third Monday only.

BOONTON TOWNSHIP

The rolling hills and fields of eight-square-mile Boonton Township are the pride of its conservation-minded residents. This pastoral community is preserved by a concerted local effort to protect the natural character and rural charm of its farmland and other open space.

The township has continued to support the renovation of the historic Oscar Kincaid House and preserved farmland property.

The township's recorded history began around 1710 when Quaker William Penn chose to locate in the northern valley, which contained 1,430 prime field and woodland acres.

James Bollen's bordering plantation stretched south and was described as "situated on a fork of the Rockaway with an Indian plantation on it."

In 1765, David Ogden purchased the Great Boonton Tract of about 3,600 acres. When Boonton Township was created in 1867, most of Penn's land, part of the Bollen and Great Boonton tracts fell within its boundaries.

The first settler of record was Frederick DeMouth of French Huguenot lineage. By 1758, his Rockaway Valley plantation comprised 672 acres, and it was on this land that the large Stickle, Bott and Kincaid farms would prosper.

Well-educated and prosperous families settled the early community and supported an excellent school system. From as early as 1783, eight different learning institutions were constructed. The township continues to support its schools by renewing a sending agreement with Mountain Lakes High School and overwhelmingly supporting its school budget.

In 1842, the Rockaway Valley Church was erected by a congregation organized in 1785 by Jacob DeMouth. In 1918 the Mount Zion Baptist Congregation was founded by the Rev. David R. Russell.

McCaffrey Lane, the oldest recorded thoroughfare in the area, was built in 1767 by Samuel Ogden, son of David Ogden. In 1822, N. Main Street was created along the proposed route of the Morris Canal.

In 1824, the Morris Canal and Banking Co. was chartered with John Scott, commissioner of Powerville.

By 1928, radio broadcasting's popularity brought new industry, prosperity and residents to the area. Aircraft Radio Corp. developed radio technology to be used in aircraft as well as over commercial radio airwaves. World War II hero Gen. Jimmy Doolittle made the first "blind" aircraft landing in 1929 at Mitchell Field using the company's equipment. By 1933, ARC-designed equipment was installed in the first fighter squadrons of the U.S. Army, Air Force and Navy.

A third company, Johanson Manufacturing Corp., a family-owned electronics and fiber optics company founded in 1945 and international in scope, settled in the township and remains there today.

One of four campuses of St. Clare's Hospital is located in the township and offers specialized adult medical day care as well as behavior health services. St. Clare's recently began a campaign that will include updating the facility.

The township is largely residential and is home to 4,263 residents, according to the 2010 U.S. Census.

Township government consists of a voter-elected five-member Township Committee. Its members annually select a chairperson from committee members. Committee meetings are held at 7 p.m. the second Monday and fourth Tuesday of each month at the municipal building.

Morris County: A Rich History

Centrally located in the Highlands region in northern New Jersey, Morris County blends natural landscapes, a history spanning the Colonial era through the technological breakthroughs of the 20th and 21st Centuries, with charming communities and impressive corporate campuses.

Situated about 30 miles from New York City, Forbes Magazine described Morris County as "... a suburb of the New York area which reaps the benefits of the big city's financial industry." Forbes also rated Morris as one of the top 10 wealthiest counties in the country. Between 2015 and 2019, Money Magazine has selected several communities in Morris County as being among 'The Best Places to Live.'

U.S. News and World Report in 2019 named Morris County as one of the top 30 counties in the nation. And Morris County was ranked as the healthiest county in N.J. in 2019 by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.

Morris County was incorporated on March 15, 1738/1739, from portions of Hunterdon County. The inconsistency in the year relates to the Old Style (OS) and New Style (NS) calendars being used during the colonial period. Morris County was named in honor of the first Governor of the Province of New Jersey, Lewis Morris (1671-1746).

Within its 469 square miles of land area, the county contains 39 municipalities with a 2014 population from the U.S. Census Bureau estimated to be 499,727, making it New Jersey's 10th most populous county. At its most distant points, the county stretches 30 miles from east to west and 30 miles from north to south.

Roads, bus and rail service link the 39 municipalities in the county to the metropolitan region. Two public airports, the Morristown Municipal Airport and the Lincoln Park Airport, are located in Morris County.

There are also an additional 12 FAA certified private corporate heliports and airports, one military heliport at Picatinny Arsenal and one medical helipad at Morristown Medical Center in Morristown. Three major airports, Newark Liberty International, John F. Kennedy and LaGuardia International Airport, are accessible by highway, train, and bus lines.

The area's civilian work force exceeds 263,000 as of 2014. The U.S. Census American Community Survey for 2020 shows total adult population in Morris County with a bachelor's degree or higher is 56.5 percent.

their headquarters or major operations in Morris County.

Morris County is rich in history and home to more than 150 historic sites listed on New Jersey's Register of Historic Places, with most also being included on the National Register of Historic Places. Four of these sites – Morristown National Historical Park, Historic Speedwell, Stickley Museum at Craftsman Farms, and Villa Fontana, home of Thomas Nast – have been designated as National Historic Landmarks by the Secretary of the Interior.

Strategic Location

During the Revolutionary War, Morristown's strategic location between New York City and Philadelphia prompted General George Washington and the Continental Army to make their winter encampments in Morristown in 1776-1777 and 1779-1780. Washington used Colonel Jacob Ford Jr.'s mansion as his headquarters during this time. The mansion is the centerpiece of the Morristown National Historical Park, the first national historical park in the country.

It also was in Morris County, at what is now Historic Speedwell in Morristown, where Alfred Vail and Samuel F.B. Morse perfected and first publicly demonstrated the electro-magnetic telegraph in 1838. Vail's distant cousin, Theodore Vail was educated in Morristown and served as the first president of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company (AT&T).

Noted statewide for its recreational facilities and preservation of natural landscape, the Morris County Park System (www.morrisparks.net) is the largest county park system in New Jersey based on acreage.

The park system attracts about 3.5 mil-

lion visitors annually, and holds and supervises 20,383-acres of parkland, 150 trail miles and 38 recreational, historical, horticultural and environmental facilities. These include the Patriots Path hiking trail network, which includes accommodation for the seeing impaired; active and passive recreation fields, four award-winning golf courses, picnic sites, gardens, camping, cross-country skiing, and lakes. Some notable locations in the county park system include, Fosterfields Living History Farm, the Frelinguysen and Willowood Arboretums, Mennen Sports Arena, Central Park of Morris County, Historic Speedwell Village, and Lee's County Park Marina on Lake Hopatcong.

Education

Education in Morris County commands a leading role, with outstanding public and private elementary, secondary and higher educational facilities. The Morris County School of Technology in Denville offers high school students and adult learner's vocational education and training. The School of Technology offers both shared and full-time programs for the county's high school students and continuing education programs for adults.

Fairleigh Dickinson University's Florham Campus in Madison, the College of St. Elizabeth in Morris Township and Drew University in Madison, and the two-year County College of Morris (CCM) in Randolph, provide easy access to higher education.

County College of Morris offers more than 45 Associate Degree programs and over 25 certificate programs covering nearly 80 areas of study with affordable tuition. Popular programs include Liberal Arts and Sciences, Communications, Cyber Security, Humanities, Business, Management, Marketing and Related Support Services, and Health Professions and Related Programs.

While the seven-member Board of County Commissioners oversee and approve activities relating to the business of running the county, such as county budget, road construction and repairs, appointments to the various county commissions and agencies, and other miscellaneous county issues, the county administrator supervises day-to-day operations of the many departments of county government.





DENVILLE TOWNSHIP

Covering 12.10 square miles and calling itself the “hub” of Morris County, Denville is home to almost 20,000 residents. The town’s beautification efforts, which include a 30-foot clock tower at the corner of historic Broadway and Bloomfield avenues, brick walkways, garden planters and gaslight-style lighting, have attracted numerous shoppers to the now bustling downtown district. Offering varied stores, restaurants and ample parking, pedestrian-friendly downtown includes Broadway, Main Street, Diamond Spring Road and First Avenue.

The municipality is bisected by Route 46 and has Interstate 80 and Route 10 running along its borders. Bordered on the north by the Rockaways, to the northeast by the Boontons and to the east by Mountain Lakes, the town attracts many county residents to its events and downtown businesses.

Settlers may have come to Denville as early as 1690. They were primarily Dutch and English from Long Island, Quakers from Philadelphia and Germans. William Penn and other proprietors began to survey and stake out lands in the Denville area about 1715. Between 1730 and 1760 forges and mills were erected along the Rockaway River. Denville village developed around Job Allen Iron Works.

What is now called Den Brook was the real attraction, with its abundant water

supply and 200-foot drop from Shongum Lake to what is now Estling Lake. Water power attracted many small industries, each requiring water wheels and dams, resulting in lakes and ponds, many of which remain.

Denville is governed by a voter-elected mayor and a seven-member council who meet at 7:30 p.m. the first and third Tuesdays of each month at Town Hall at St. Mary’s Place.

TOWN OF DOVER

Located in the center of northern New Jersey, Dover always has served as a small town that attracts residents from all communities for its eclectic mix of merchants and special services; it remains such a community today.

A hub for New Jersey Transit and Lakeland Bus Co. and home to many specialty industrial and commercial businesses, Dover has more than 18,000 residents. Dover boasts some restaurants known to diners from as far way as New York City.

Federal Express has opened a 150,000-square-foot distribution center on the site of the town's former landfill. The center has brought more than 300 jobs to the town. The popular flea market, held on Sundays is back in its downtown spot.

Founded in 1722 and incorporated as a town in 1869, Dover has a busy business district and quiet residential streets.

Iron forging was the source of Dover growth into the middle of the 20th century. John Jackson used the availability of iron ore from nearby mines and the accessible water power to create an iron forge. The Morris Canal and the Lackawanna Railroad provided the transport necessary to secure Dover as a vital center for the manufacture of war materials from the Revolutionary through the Korean wars.

In 1753, Moses Hurd bought the original forge from Jackson. Hurd was said to have come from Dover, N.H., suggesting his influence in the naming of the area. Documents indicate the use of the name Dover in the 1790s.

By 1800, Dover was established as an industrial town. While the Morris Canal was being dug, Dover was incorporated as a village in 1826. The main street was named after one of the new forge owners

from New York City, Joseph Blackwell. The canal was in use by 1831; however, the 1848 completion of the railroad rendered the canal a slow means of transportation.

Dover was incorporated as a town by 1869. A library was established in 1902, and the first trolley went through town in 1904. Dover had a high school program by 1885 and designated high school building by 1901.

The town grew around the railroad, factories and other industries. It has been host to several waves of immigrants, from Germans and Italians in the early 20th century to Hispanics most recently.

Governed by a voter-elected mayor and board of aldermen, the town is divided into four wards. There are two al-

dermen per ward with the mayor elected at-large, each for two-year terms. Meetings are held at 7 p.m. the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at Town Hall on N. Sussex Street.

MONTVILLE TOWNSHIP

With easy access to New York City, still with a suburban feel, Montville has been a town in transition over the past decade. Many acres of farmland that used to make up this pastoral town have been replaced by luxury housing, which has made this town the hot spot for those seeking a pastoral environment in northeast Morris County.

The township has easy access to interstates 287 and 80, which makes it within commuting distance of Manhattan, Newark, Parsippany and Morristown.

Montville is known for its commitment to public school education. The township's 19-square-mile area is comprised of three sections: Towaco, Pine Brook and Montville. About 80 percent of its residents have access to public water and sewer.

This year, for the second year in a row, the township was named one of the top 25 places to live in the United States by "Money" magazine, which cited its scenery, mixture of housing, community involvement and high student achievement among its attractions.

The township was formed from territory set off from Pequannock. It is bounded north and east by Pequannock Township and the Passaic River, south by the Rockaway River and west by the Rockaway River and Boonton Township.

The area first was settled by Dutch farmers from New York City (known then as New Amsterdam) in the early 18th century. By the 1740s, the settlement had grown in size and construction began on the first road, now known as Route 202.

During the Revolutionary War, the area was on a major military route from Morristown to the Hudson River. Gen. George Washington's troops often took this route and Washington stayed in the Towaco section of Montville in June 1780. That building, on Doremustown Road (Route 202), recently was preserved and renovated by the town.

Post-Revolutionary War, Montville's northern Towaco section was scaled by the construction of the Morris Canal in 1828 and the building of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western Railroad in 1870.

Officially named after the Mandeville Inn with specific boundaries in April 1800, the town corrupted its name to Montville. The Montville Inn is at the site of the pre-Revolutionary War Mandeville Inn.

From 1800 to 1820, Montville was a hamlet containing about 16 dwellings, two barkmills, tanneries, three sawmills, one gristmill, a cider mill and distillery, a blacksmith shop, a carpenter and wheelwright shop and one small store.

Major growth was not experienced until after World War II, when commercial development escalated along Route 46 in the Pine Brook area. Northern Montville retains some elements of its rural origins, especially in the Lake Valhalla and Taylortown sections. Although recent developments there

are changing that landscape as well.

To date, the township has utilized Open Space Trust funds to purchase 1,033 acres of open space. Morris County has acquired an additional 535 acres within the town's borders. These areas include miles of walking/hiking trails, waterfalls and mountain-top views of Montville and the New York City skyline.

Eight of Montville's 18th century Dutch farmhouses were collectively placed on New Jersey's Historic Register in 1991 and the National Register in 1992. Built of unearthened stone, homes were solid with walls 11/2 to two feet deep. Montville's current population is estimated at 25,000. Its government is a bi-partisan five-member Township Committee that elects a mayor and deputy mayor from itself.

MOUNTAIN LAKES

Created in 1924, this bedroom community for executives and their families has been known as an enclave of lakes and parks.

But it was not always this way. In 1910, this 3.1-square-mile borough was rural woodlands owned by a few families with names such as Righter, Grimes, Ball and Van Duyne. In the space of 10 years, the entire face of Mountain Lakes changed to a planned suburban community of large stucco houses known as "Lakers."

During the single decade of the 1920s the natural and architectural character of Mountain Lakes was developed as a refuge for New Yorkers who wanted to escape the pace of the city. Despite superficial changes, the original design, imagined by local engineer Lewis Van Duyne and executed by developer Herbert J. Hapgood, remains intact – strict land-use laws ensure that. Stone pillars still mark the town's entry points, nine man-made lakes and a scenic walking path follow its Boulevard.

The period in which Hapgood designed was one of eclectic architectural styles. His work pays a debt to Gustav Stickley's Craftsman architecture, with a Colonial revival influence. Craftsman design is characterized by use of natural materials – oak floors, exposed beams and trim, chestnut paneling and large brick and stone fireplaces. Homes were built to fit into the landscape.

After World War II, the Fox Development Co. purchased a large, relatively flat tract

of land between the railroad and Intervale Road. The company erected about 67 smaller homes that filled a housing demand for returning veterans and their families.

The approximately 4,250 residents are especially proud of their education system. SAT scores at Mountain Lakes High School consistently have been among the highest in the state. To keep its standards high, the borough is putting the finishing touches on its \$10.6 million renovation plan for the high school that added some 34,400 square feet, including a new auxiliary gymnasium, media center/ library and band room. Ad-

ditional renovations included adding classrooms, updating the administrative and guidance offices and the cafeteria.

There is one commercial area on Midvale Road by the N.J. Transit commuter train station. There, a few shops, a deli and local businesses exist.

The borough has a council-manager style of government, which consists of seven voter-elected members. The council chooses a mayor and deputy mayor from among its members. Meetings are held at 8 p.m. the second and fourth Mondays of each month in the Borough Hall, 400 Boulevard.

ROCKAWAY BOROUGH

Although the discovery of iron ore originally lured people to this community in the 1700s, it is the rustic charm and great trout fishing along the Rockaway River that has helped Rockaway Borough to thrive.

Incorporated in 1894, Rockaway Borough celebrates its 116th year this year. It has more than 6,400 residents. The first settlers arrived about 1730. By 1760, Rockaway Village had become the center for trade, manufacture and religion. General merchandise stores clustered along Newark Street, now Main Street, near the Presbyterian Meeting House. A gristmill, sawmill and forge had been built on the Rockaway River.

By the time of the Revolutionary War, about 50 people lived in Rockaway Village center. The population of miners, forge men and farmers came down from Mount Hope, Hibernia, White Meadow, Dover and Denville to the village center to attend church, go to the post office, which was established in 1792, to buy and sell grain, lumber, tools and necessities and to socialize at the Gaston House or Conger Tavern. By 1784, children of Meeting House members attended school built on Meeting House grounds.

Rockaway became a focal point of iron manufacture and stronghold for Revolutionary War activity.

There are several Revolutionary period houses remaining in the borough, notably the three Jackson houses. Since most early settlers live on their farms and near their forges, most existing structures of this period lay outside the village. The Gaston House or Inn remained on the site of the present Quick Chek shopping center until the 1930s. By the early 1900s, there were two major railroads, a trolley line, an iron found-

ry and two basins of the Morris Canal, a bicycle factory, a three-story department store selling everything from bonnets to bedsteads and three hotels, including Riggot's Hotel at the intersection of Main and Wall streets, a favorite of Annie Oakley when she performed in "Buffalo Bill's Wild West" in New York City.

The volunteer fire department and rescue squad on Main Street celebrated 100 years of service in 1997. The borough's free public library was designated a National Historic Site. It was built as a private home in the early 1800s by Col. Joseph Jackson, the "Iron King of Morris County," for his son. The library is home to a collection of Civil War letters.

A recent Open Space grant of \$850,000 and a grant from the Morris County Municipal Utilities Authority of \$150,000 enabled the Borough to purchase approximately ten acres of undeveloped property off Beach Street behind St.

Peter's and Paul's Church. The borough also received Open Space funds to purchase the Donatoni property on West Main Street, which has two recreation fields, playground equipment and a bike/walking path. Park Lake, which is shared by the Borough and Rockaway Township, offers a swimming area and flat walking/bike path that is popular with both walkers and joggers. A new refreshment stand and handicapped accessible bathrooms have been added. Other recreation facilities that have been recently renovated include Friendship Field with sod and a resurfaced basketball court at Centennial Park.

The borough is governed by a voter-elected mayor and six-member council. Meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. the second and fourth Thursdays of each month at Community Center on Union Street.



ROCKAWAY TOWNSHIP

At 45.6 square miles, Rockaway Township in the northwestern section of the county is the largest municipality in Morris County with an ever-expanding regional mall and several major highways traveling through it.

Opened in 1989, the Rockaway Town-square Mall, is one of the most modern shopping malls in the state.

The community is an interesting mix of industrial and commercial areas as well as suburban homes.

Although sparsely populated in the northern sections, sections in the south are more densely populated.

In August 2004, the Highlands Water Protection and Planning Act was signed into law. The law affects a large tract of the northern portion of the township and will regulate future development. This historic law protects drinking water for more than 4.5 million people and helps preserve New Jersey's dwindling open space.

Water always has played a crucial role in the development of Rockaway Township. Formed in 1844 when Morris County divided some of its larger townships, Rockaway is based on the Lenape word, "rechouwakie" meaning "the place of sands." The area first was settled in 1715 when the earliest land grants were recorded between William Penn and the Lenni Lenapes or "original people."

By 1750, the Lenapes had disappeared from Morris County, but left many well-defined trails and paths, which led from one lake to another.

By 1776, Morris County was the principal smelting center of the United States with Rockaway being home to a great number of iron forges. Three blast furnaces were located in Mount Hope, Split Rock and Hibernia, which

produced pig iron.

The Split Rock Furnace is the only one still standing, located below the dam of the Split Rock Reservoir. The forges and furnaces at Hibernia and Mount Hope furnished the Continental Army with shovels, axes, cannon, cannon balls, grapeshot and other supplies.

Another forge, the Middle or Aetna Forge, was located on land now known as Picatinny Arsenal, built in 1749 on the Burnt Meadow branch of the Rockaway River.

The federal government bought the Aetna Forge in 1880, along with 1,866 acres and used it as the site of a powder magazine. In 1907, the first powder factory opened at the arsenal and pioneered

new types of armaments, which were used in two world wars.

Today, industry is diversified and includes golf courses, ski slopes, newspaper publishing, corporate and manufacturing activities. The current population is around 25,000.

A mayor council governs Rockaway Township with a mayor, six council members representing wards, and three at-large members. Meetings are held at 7:30 p.m. the first and fourth Tuesdays at the Municipal Building.


