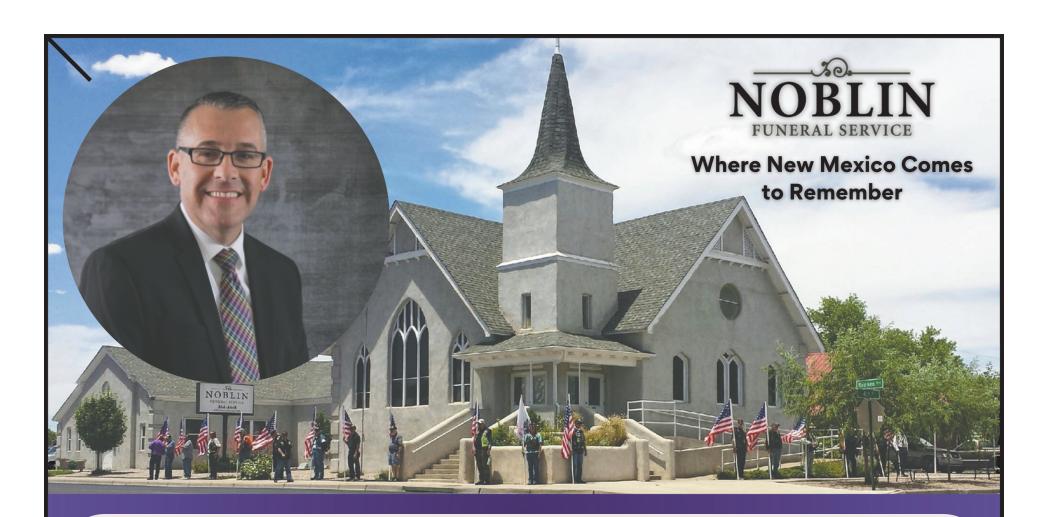
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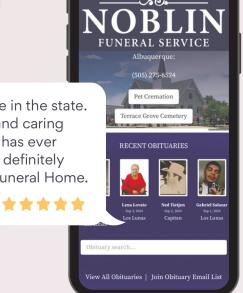

Socorroans learning to help community thrive

El Defensor Chieftain Editor Socorroans Helping Each Other (SHEO) community outreach coordinator Stephen Sanchez tackles challenging situations holistically and believes in giving his patients a hand up, not just a handout.

"A lot of times, their money situation is the manifestation of their other problems, because that's where it hits them," Sanchez said.

SHEO has been supported financially by one family that felt there was a gap in services, especially after many families were struggling with COVID. In partnership with Presbyterian Socorro General Hospital, their mission is to connect people to the resources they need to improve their lives.

They offer emergency help with electric and water bills and, in some situations, rent. SHEO has established a working relationship with Socorro Electric Co-op and the City to avoid utility shutoffs.

But the program is more than helping people pay an overdue bill, it's about empowering community members to take control of their finances, rather than simply providing temporary solutions.

Sanchez takes the time to talk to his patients to better understand their perspectives. He tries to figure out what is going on below the surface, and he says sometimes those conversations get tough.

"So there are a lot of tricky situations. When you start getting into people's personal lives, they're very complex. It's not a one-stop thing. And so I just try to look at the big picture and think okay, what would I do their shoes." Sanchez said.

He often opens up about his story of being in debt to offer them hope for their future.

"I've made bad decisions, bad credit, debt, just the works. And

I know what it took to get out of it and the commitment to paying off debt," Sanchez said, "I know what it is like to be in this situation, but you can get out of it if you commit to it."

After years of fixing his financial issues, he is proud to say he was able to buy his first home.

"That was a miracle for us because it took a long time to fix it. So I share my story, I'm open with them about it," Sanchez said.

Sanchez said one of the most important skills he helps people with is creating a budget. He said he has realized that many people have never created personal budgets before and he has seen first-hand how it has benefited his patients.

"The trickiest part is getting people to open up about their problems with money and their spending habits. And so I tried to defuse that right away, telling them, 'Look, I'm here to serve you,'" Sanchez said. But once people let him in he is able to identify spending issue that are hurting them financially. The benefit trickles down to their kids.

He often works with people on fixed incomes, which can be a struggle with rising costs. If people are having a hard time getting employed, he'll help them write up a resume and coach them through making a good impression for an interview.

"I get all sorts of different people, and so I've learned to just work with them where they're at. And, you know, not everyone's the same. Some people need encouragement. Some people just need hope and help. And some need just the straight, raw truth," Sanchez said. He always recommends that people budget in a savings and to treat their savings account like a bill.

"I tell people things are going to happen, things are going to come up. That's life. You have to plan for those things. And so that's the whole goal here." Sanchez said. "With the economy, nothing's promised, and things could get worse for people."

He said one of his patients came in needing help paying a bill because his new business was struggling. Sanchez found out that he didn't have business cards, so he made some and told him to go door to door and pass them out. He walked him through practice runs of presenting himself to a potential customer.

"I just talked to him Monday, and he said, 'I paid my own bill. I got work this weekend'. So it's helping people to do it themselves," Sanchez said. Sanchez said there are just

Sanchez said there are just some things SHEO can't help with, and when that comes up, he reaches out to other local programs and makes referrals. Sanchez believes in building long-term relationships with participants, providing ongoing support and resources to help them succeed.

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Enriching the lives of seniors and students through the Foster Grandparent Program

"It's a win-win situation," said Kathryn Gutierrez, coordinator of the Foster Grandparent Program in Valencia County. "It benefits both the foster grandparent and the students, socially and as well as educationally."

The FGP is a federally-funded volunteer program for older adults who wish to work with children in their communities. Participants serve as mentors and tutors for children in elementary school classrooms and head start programs. They especially assist students with special needs or other circumstances deemed necessary.

The FGP is a nation-wide program and there is now a program established in every county in New Mexico. Gutierrez said the program based in Los Lunas was the first FGP program to be established in New Mexico.

"It began as a national demonstration project in 1965 here at the Los Lunas Hospital and Training School," she said. "In 1998, after 33 years of the training school being open, it closed, and all of the individuals were placed out in the community. That is how we ended up in the schools."

Currently, local foster grandparents assist at four schools within the Los Lunas Schools district, two within the Belen Consolidated Schools district and at Adelino Early Childhood Development Center.

"They offer a sense of com-

fort, a sense of community and they provide that comfort to these children, and I think that's really important," said Gutierrez. "They play big roles in shaping these little individuals and helping to educate them."

Foster grandparents can provide anywhere from 10-40 hours of weekly service. An added benefit is that foster grandparents receive an hourly stipend of \$4 an hour and they build their own schedule, deciding what days they want to volunteer and for how long.

Meals are provided and, if needed, transportation can

also be arranged to pick up foster grandparents and drop them off.

"They're assigned to a classroom and they'll stay in that classroom for the whole year, and oftentimes they go back to that same school and to the same teacher," said Gutierrez.

The day-to-day duties of a FGP vary and are based on what the teacher decides is needed. This can take the form of assisting and guiding students in need with their assignments, reading to students and generally providing a helping hand and friendly presence in the classroom.

Students light up when they see their foster grandparent, said Gutierrez, and they are also cherished by parents and the teachers they aid. The impact they have on the well-being and education of students is well known, but Gutierrez emphasized that foster grandparents themselves also benefit greatly from the program and many of them find a lot of fulfillment through their role.

"At that age, oftentimes they're alone, so I think it's just that sense of community and being a part of something," said Gutierrez. "They feel like they are welcome and that they're needed. They will definitely be the first to tell you that they don't do it for money. Those small checks, they're nice, but they also get to be part of something that they enjoy. They love kids, and I feel like it keeps them healthy and active."

Foster grandparent Willie Ortega, who volunteers at Raymond Gabaldon Elementary in Los Lunas, agrees that she loves her role and she always looks forward to coming in.

"I'm so happy when I come; I have no complaints," said Ortega. "A lot of jobs you kind of dread and stuff, but not this one. I'm excited to get up, I'm excited to come and I just love it. The teachers are so nice and everyone treats you good."

Ortega has been a part of the program for several years and one can tell just from a brief visit to the classroom how adored by the students she is and vice versa.

"I like helping the kids. They're happy to see me, and I'm happy to see them that's my favorite part," she said.

Foster grandparent Antonio Apodoca who has been volunteering at RGE for 15 years, mainly in fourth-grade classrooms, said he enjoys how much he learns from the kids.

"I enjoy working with the students; It's been a great experience," he said.

Lita Aragon, also a foster grandparent at RGE, said "it's

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Veguita Senior Center is thriving once again

Bobby Martin and Lisa Moll-Martin poured themselves fresh cups of hot coffee and enjoyed a conversation in the natural morning light coming through the ceiling-high windows at the Veguita Senior Center.

They lived in the area for eight years and said they've come in more now with the reopening than before. Lisa commented on how nice and fresh the center has looked since it reopened.

"This place is really inviting, and the people in the community need it; this is a pretty remote area; people need these services," Bobby said.

When the doors to the Veguita Senior Center closed in March of 2023, the future of the facility was unknown.

"Since I've worked here, it's all Linda has been talking about, reopening the Veguita Senior Center," Desiree Smith, Socorro Senior Center Administrative Assistant, said.

City of Socorro Employee Linda Mares, the manager of the Socorro and Veguita Senior Center, is passionate about taking care of the seniors in the community. She believes the need is there, especially in the rural areas of Veguita, where many don't have access to essential utilities and groceries.

"It's important. We got to take care of our people," Mares said.

She said they are continuing to do home deliveries in Veguita to the folks who are homebound once a week. They

take those seniors one hot meal and four days' worth of non-perishable items. She has noticed that many live in substandard or temporary housing and sometimes without electricity.

"There is definitely a lot of need," Mares said.

The center also offers free rides to and from seniors' homes to ensure they have access to lunch and other activities. Since reopening, they've held a dance with the band Suavecito performing and are scheduling more activities as things pick up again.

The official reopening of the Veguita Center on July 15 is win for the rural community in Veguita, and people are starting to trickle in again.

After being closed for over a year, Mares said she and

her crew have worked hard to get it ready for the seniors. They have new flooring, new paint and contractors are now working on upgrading the restrooms.

She said they also received help from the RISE participants, the Socorro County Detention Center's jail based rehabilitation program, came out and helped cleaning up the lot.

She also credits staff who have worked hard to make it happen.

"A huge thank you to all my staff. We have a good crew here, we use some of our Socorro crew to come and help out here. Vice versa," Mares

She said that as people start coming back, she'll work on bringing the program-

ming they have in Socorro to Veguita.

"We have pool players already coming in, so they're excited about that." Mares said "We need to keep our seniors active."

She also hopes to get the kitchen up and running too, but for now she said lunches will be brought in from Socorro.

In recent years, the three senior centers in Socorro County faced a lack of financial support, and all ended up closing their doors at one point or another.

With Magdalena and Socorro centers up and running Veguita is the last to reopen.

In 2022 the Socorro County Manager at the time, Michael Hawkes told the commission at a meeting that, "We're finding it harder and harder to fund a non-mandated service that the state should be funding."

He said the county has been supporting the three senior centers for the last 10 years by absorbing an average of over \$300,000 a year, and he expected that the cost could go up to \$400,000 a year.

In February of this year, Mares went to the Socorro Count Board of Commissioners and requested use of the facility, and a deal was worked out. The funding for the senior center comes from the Non- Metro New Mexico Agency on Aging.

Mayor of Socorro said he is in support of the Veguita Center reopening.

"We're happy to be able to help the northern part of the county with a senior center that they can enjoy the benefits of everything that we're offering and Socorro." Mayor Ravi Bhasker said.

But the fight to keep the doors open will continue, Mares said the Veguita Senior Center is on a trial run for a year.

She works closely with the financial department at the city to ensure they stay on budget and the center doesn't become a burden.

"I'm glad city, county, state, and everybody is working together to take care of our seniors." Mares said.

The hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., with lunch served between 11 a.m. and noon. They will observe all government holidays.

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interesting and (the students) tell me a lot of things. Staying at home all day can get a little too boring sometimes, so it's nice to get out a little bit in the morning and help kids."

Ortega, Apodoca and Aragon said they would all recommend the program to other older adults. They also shared that they form lasting relationships through the program and students remember the impact they've had on their lives

"I see them in the store and stuff and they'll run up and say hi to me," said Ortega. "A couple weeks ago, I saw one of the kids in my gym. He's in his 20s, all grown up already, and he remembered me and he gave me a big hug."

"Sometimes I see a lot of them have gone on to graduate high

school and have gone to college and they send me graduation cards," Aragon recalled. "It's so nice to see that they remember you."

Gutierrez said the foster grandparents also form friendships amongst each other and with the program leaders, demonstrating just how impactful the program is in so many people's lives.

"They're full of wisdom and stories," said Gutierrez. "It's a wonderful thing seeing how close we become to them, and how important they become to us."

Since the pandemic, the number of foster grandparent volunteers has significantly decreased, especially since they had to pause the program during that time, so if you are an older adult that is patient and loves children, Gutierrez said they would love for

you to apply.

"I think that it can be their calling, if they just give it a try," she said.

Gutierrez said the program is a low-income based program that one would need to qualify for, but beyond that, one just has to be 55 and older and pass the program's background checks to join. No prior experience in a school setting is needed, as training will be provided. She also noted that the supplemental income is tax free and does not affect Social Security, Medicaid or housing benefits.

"It's really endearing to witness," she said. "They feel important, they feel wanted and know that they belong somewhere."

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The search is on for senior savings

aking a dollar go further in a challenging economy is a noble goal. For some New Mexico senior citizens on a fixed income, searching for ways to trim spending while leading a fulfilling life, is more of a necessity.

While resources to help in the search are available, they are not always obvious or easy to find. Those resources, at no or low cost, can be found for food, legal services, education and other areas.

Visits to Valencia County businesses, senior and community centers, plus conversations with average citizens, public and private authorities reveal savings options.

Discounts

No matter the age, who doesn't love a discount?

Random calls to a fistful of locally-owned businesses revealed about half offered senior discounts. A senior menu was available but no discount per se' at one restaurant. A home service business didn't have a specific discount but would negotiate.

However, inquiring about discounts can be difficult.

"I hate asking for them
— it's awkward," said Barb,
a regular at the Fred Luna
Multigenerational Center in
Los Lunas. "I would really
like a printed list."

That was a common request, with some uncomfortable using phone apps or internet.

Another woman said, "I just want to be treated with respect," when it comes to services.

While answering a News-Bulletin survey, Beatrice at the Bosque Farms Community Center agreed.

"Yes, it's uncomfortable (to request discounts) because vendors look at me like I'm crazy," she said.

Seniors shared their favorite discount locations, including Ross, Subway and Mitchell Theaters. National restaurants such as Applebee's, Chile's and Denny's also offer discounts.

As do Walgreen's, on first Tuesday of each month; Albertson's, on first Wednesday of each month.

"It's busy, busy that day," said one Albertson's employee.

Many discounts aren't advertised, another frustra-

tion. However, New Mexico Rail Runner Express promotes free Wednesday rides for the 60+ crowd, with reduced fares daily. Rio Metro bus service is free.

Entities differ on what age qualifies for senior discounts. Many consider a senior citizens as 65 and older, while others start at age 60 or even 55.

Food

Donations are taken at senior citizen centers across Valencia County, said Lydia Maldonado, who oversees the five facilities.

"It's the donation of food, canned goods," most in demand, Maldonado said. "We put them out there and they will go first.

"You see the need when people come in for lunches," said Maldonado about the meals served weekdays for a suggested \$2 donation in Belen, Meadow Lake, Los Lunas, Bosque Farms and Rio Communities, which is currently closed for renovation.

"Our numbers have gone up. We're feeding a lot more people, county-wide" Maldonado said. "A lot of the seniors go to food distributions," said Rose Poitras, Bosque Farms community center director, mentioning a weekly dinner at Grace Fellowship Church in Los Lunas.

St. Vincent de Paul in Belen also distributes food, Tuesday and Wednesday.

An enthusiastic response follows the suggestion that pizza is a good option.

"It feeds a large group," said Lorraine, a visitor to Belen Senior Center. "You can eat it the next day."

At the same gathering, Bev says she doesn't eat out.

"I cook all the time — I'm glad I grew up when I did so I know how to fix things — beans, enchiladas."

Legal matters

A line snaked around the hallway Sept. 6 at 13th Judicial District Courthouse in Los Lunas for the first free in person Legal Service Clinic since the Covid pandemic. Many waiting for help are seniors.

"The need is tremendous," said Simone Seiler, attorney supervisor with the 13th Judicial District Court. "A lot of people can't afford legal consultation."

That includes a Los Lunas woman in her late 70s.

"I think it's wonderful. I don't know what else I would do," the woman said, admitting to being a bit frazzled as she clutched papers to help explain a family dispute to a volunteer lawyer.

Virtual clinics are held periodically, but Seiler believes "face to face" makes it "easier to understand what's going on, easier to be sure you are being heard."

Seiler says there are legal resources for seniors and others — Senior Citizens Law Office, Modest Means Helpline, Pegasus Legal Services (for guardianship issues), Law Help New Mexico and New Mexico Aging & Disability Resource

Silver Sneakers' classes promote health, happiness, friendship

BELEN - Regular physical activity is good for the body and mind but, as bodies age, keeping an exercise routine may prove necessary.

Getting and staying active as we grow older can have numerous benefits, and the Silver Sneakers program is designed to help older adults do just that, and it is covered by Medicare and other types of insurance.

The Silver Sneakers class at Elite Muscle Gym and Fitness Center in Belen has been going strong for many years, and so has its dedicated and active participants.

Gay Conger has been instructing the class for about six years, and the 81-year-old retired physical therapist says the program's motto, "Fun, Fitness and Fellowship," is exactly what is happening in her classes.

"They make new friends here and they also reconnect with each other from way back when," Conger said of her members. "The number of people who attend the class fluctuates, depending on the weather and other factors.

"It's just so important that when you get older you stay active, to work on the balance and coordination, and of course, the social aspect," Gay said. "When you get older, we have a lot of folks who have lost their spouses, and they tend to isolate themselves. This is an outlet for them."

The Silver Sneakers classes at Elite is held from 10:30-11:30 a.m. every Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

For the past 15 years, Josie Romero, of Rio Communities,

and her husband, Alan Cox, have been faithfully attending the class for many reasons.

"We just come and we all have a great time and laugh," Josie says. "We can all talk to each other; this is where we socialize."

While Medicare will pay for Silver Sneakers' memberships at 65 years and older, Josie couldn't wait. After she retired, she wanted something to do, so she joined and paid the gym membership when she was 62. When she reached 65, she was all in.

"We do this because we need to. I really believe Gay is so good," said Josie, who is 77 years old. "We exercise everything — we do the stretching, we use the bands and lift weights. We are getting stronger and, by God, if you

don't move you know what happens."

Gay, a certified classic instructor, says her class focuses on fall prevention drills and exercises to improve strength and endurance. A chair and hand-held weights are also used.

"There are more energetic certifications for seniors who want to be really active," Gay said, "but we don't offer them here — yet."

Other programs under Silver Sneakers, which can also be found in online classes, include yoga, circuit, cardio mix, water exercise and others.

Also 77 years old, Anita Hendrix, of Belen, began taking the Silver Sneakers class three years ago after the Covid pandemic. She had been doing Jazzercise, but it became a little too much for her.

"This is low impact and more designed for stability, stretching. Balance is a very important factor in this program," Hendrix said. "It doesn't wear you out as far as exercise programs go. It helps seniors strengthen our bodies."

Hendrix recently returned to the program after taking care of her ill husband, who, unfortunately recently passed away. She said she noticed a significant difference in her balance and mobility when she wasn't exercising.

"My body just loves it and I feel so much better. My mind is sharper, and the social connection is also very important," she said. "I have more confidence in just the way I move. I'm more stable and

it means a lot, especially for people our age."

Ramona Silva not only attends the class three days a week, but the 72-years-old Belenite walks four miles two days a week.

"I can tell it's been helping my body a lot since I retired," said Silva, who has had two knee replacement surgeries. "Exercise, to me, is very important."

A few weeks ago, Silva experienced a fall. She went to her doctor and the recommendation was for her to go to physical therapy, but she thought otherwise.

"I told my doctor I didn't need physical therapy because I have Gay. I just needed a couple of days off and I came back. Just with her exercise, after a couple of weeks, I feel better. I'm back to myself.

"I love coming here. I'm going to continue coming here as long as I can — and as long as we have (Gay)."

One of the newbies in the class is 75-year-old Sandra Sanchez, who has been exercising in the Silver Sneakers class for the last eight months.

"I enjoy coming because of the camaraderie, the friendships you develop. When you fall, they pick you up," Sanchez said. "I feel more energetic. Instead of plopping down on the couch, I can go outside and work on my flower garden."

One of the more active participants in the class is Gay's husband, Reynold, who is a self-described exercise nut himself. He encourages anyone and every one to get up and start moving, regardless of one's age.

"I think more people need

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to exercise. Most people just don't get enough exercise to keep healthy," Reynold said. "In my case, I've been a gym member here for about 20 years and, when I joined, I was running marathons and doing a full gym workout."

After joining Silver Sneakers eight years ago, he would continue to do his full gym workout along with the classic program.

Unfortunately, Reynold suffered a stroke five years ago and lost 20 percent of function in his left side. Despite the setback, he's determined to maintain and regain his strength.

"I need the exercise just to keep functioning. When I get done here ... I'll do a partial gym workout primarily to strengthen my left side," he said. "After having been through therapy, I'm working on maintaining or improving my muscle strength. I've sort of turned into a physical fitness nut just to stay level."

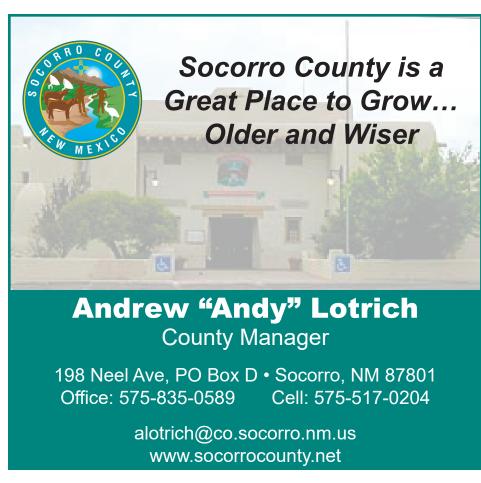
Being able to connect with her members, Gay says she's happy she's made a difference in the lives of people who she's helping. She also gives credit to the owners of Elite, Mario and Pauline Vallejos, for supporting the program and clients.

"They provide this local outlet for teenagers but they also want to be here for and are advocates for our seniors," Gay said of the Vallejos'. "I think they have a soft spot for our seniors. They want this program to continue here and are actively looking for other instructors to possibly expand the program."

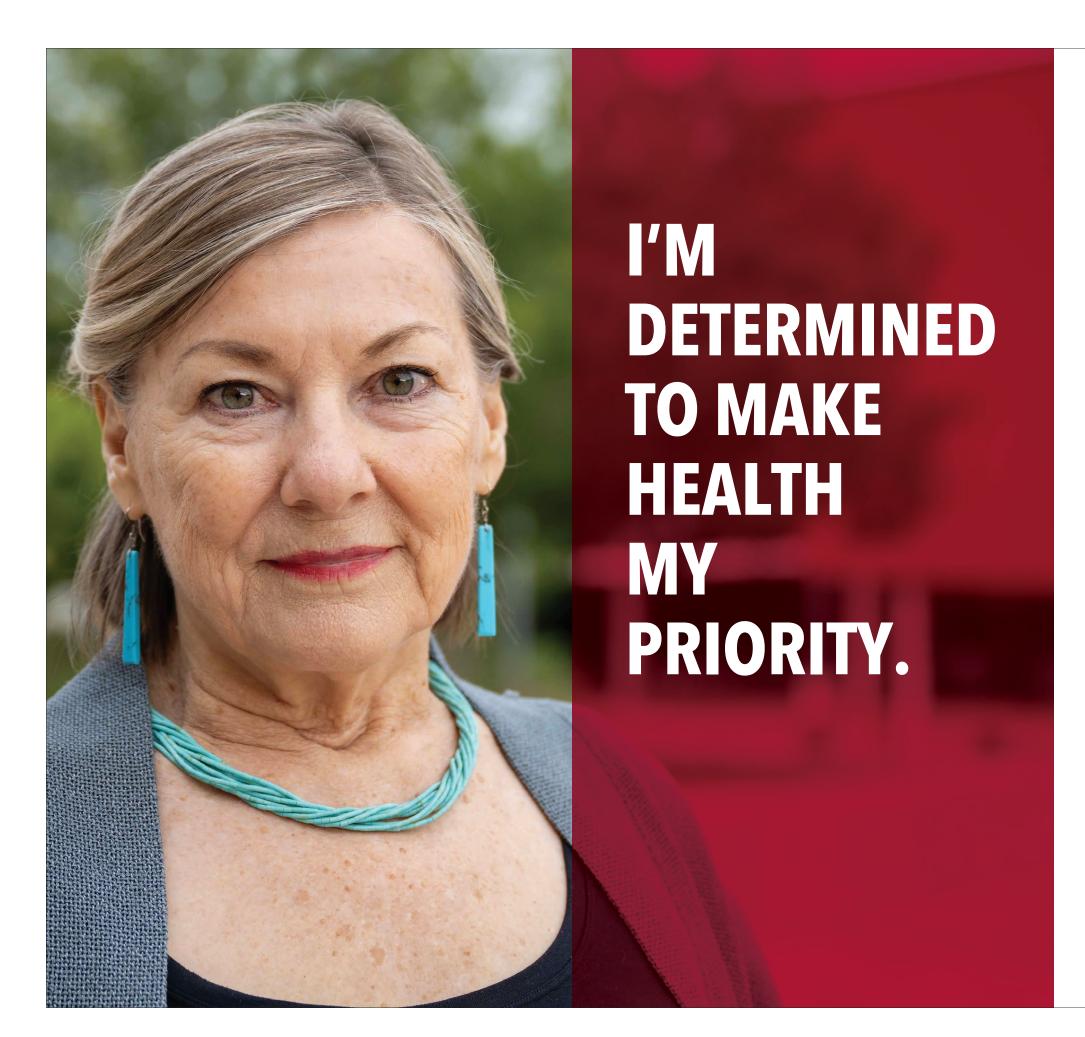

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Senior centers in Valencia County offer variety of services

It's been 59 years since U.S. President Lyndon Johnson signed the Older Americans Act, the first federal level initiative aimed at providing comprehensive services for older adults.

Created out of concern about a lack of community social services for Americans 60 and older, the act helped create a national network of state and area agencies on aging, as well as local programs, including those like the Valencia County Older Americans Program.

The VCOAP's most-used program is it's meal service, which is accessed by seniors at five congregate meal sites throughout the county and home-delivered meals, both available for seniors 60 and older.

The county provides Older Americans Program services, including meals, at three locations — the Belen Senior Center, the Del Rio Senior Center in Rio Communities and the Meadow Lake Senior Center — and provides meals at the Fred Luna Multigenerational Center in Los Lunas and the Bosque Farms Community Center in the village of Bosque Farms.

Lunch is served from 12-12:30, Monday through Friday, except for Bosque Farms, which serves lunch from 12-1 p.m. every week day. (The center in Rio Communities is closed for renovations.)

The OAP meal program also provides home delivered meals to qualifying seniors Monday through Friday, and in some cases on weekends as

well.

The central qualifying question for home-delivered meals is, "Are you physically unable to cook a meal for yourself?," Maldonado said. Seniors are assessed for nutritional needs, if they have to follow a specific diet due to a medical condition, as well as details such as how many servings of fruits and vegetables they get in a day.

The assessment also asks whether a person is unable to leave their home due to physical or mental limitations, including health conditions that can put them at high risk if exposed to COVID. Income is not a factor in determining eligibility for home meal service, she said.

"You could live in the biggest house, have the best

kitchen, but if you can't cook a meal for yourself, that doesn't matter," Maldonado said. "For some of our seniors, this is the only warm meal they will get in a day. Nine times out of 10, they're going to get approved because is they're asking, they really need it."

To find out if you qualify for home delivered meals, call the OAP office at 505-864-2663.

The program serves anywhere from 580 to 600 meals a day, about 50 percent of which are delivered to homes.

Maldonado has said Valencia County has "a lot of senior hunger."

According to data from "Feeding America, The State of Hunger in America Report Series, 2020-21," 12.5 percent of New Mexico adults 60 and

older faced the threat of hunger in the past 12 months.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau's 2022
American Community Survey, about 9,600 seniors 60 and older live in Valencia County, and 18.8 percent of the total population of 76,205 people are 65 and older. The 2023
American Community Survey indicates about 3,800 people 60 and older, 18.6 percent, live below the poverty level.

The VCOAP also provides older adults with opportunities for socialization, both spur-of-the-moment and through planned activities.

Monthly dances are held at the Belen center, and from 10 a.m. to noon, bingo is offered at the three centers run by the county on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays. On Wednesdays at the Belen Center, the fun switches to cornhole.

AARP and others offer free aid for tax preparation. At the Belen Senior Center, Greta, of Rio Communities, mentioned her volunteer tax work.

"I love meeting the people and helping them. Some are in tears when I say, 'no charge,'" Greta recalled.

Education

Education opportunities are available for people 65 and older at UNM-Valencia campus at only \$5 per credit hour, including use of the Wellness Center. Some restrictions apply.

Senior facilities also offer periodic classes on various topics.

Health and fitness

Beth Valasquez, of AARP New Mexico, says starting in January, a 2022 drug law will "cap outof-pocket prescription drug costs every year, beginning at \$2,000." Velasquez says the estimated annual savings are \$1,500.

Additionally, Velasquez says AARP is supporting efforts to aid family care givers, including respite.

Senior facilities often have donated medical equipment, such as walkers and wheelchairs, while several non-profits offer more advanced supplies.

Poitras believes a good way to save money is to exercise and eat right.

"You will save on your health. Lower health expenses," she said. "Hanging out with friends lowers health expenses because people are happier — the library, community center, churches, have things they offer at free or low cost."

The Valencia County centers have numerous offerings, includ-

ing Zumba, line-dancing, Tai Chi, bingo and guest speakers.

Housing

Lack of housing is concerning, according to Maldonado, who says there is a big homeless population among seniors.

"There are no apartments or senior housing available," Maldonado said.

She advocates for a homeless shelter in the county.

Maldonado says the Valencia County Resource Center in Belen is a good place for advice on housing issues.

For many questions, your local senior facility may be a good place to start.

"When people call with a need, I've got a list of things that I look through," Poitras said.

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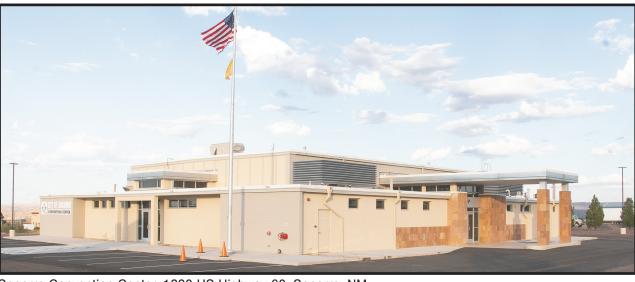

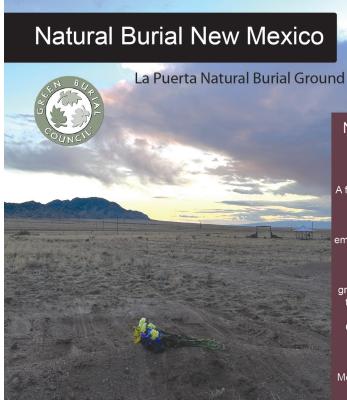

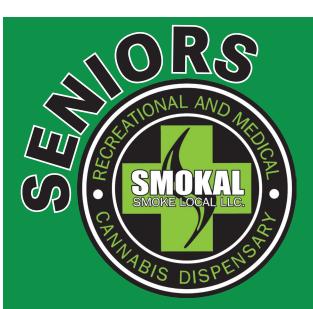
Alberta Academy Day Care

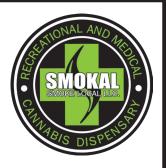
