





The NPS App was created by National Park Service rangers—people who know national parks—to help you make the most of your visit. The NPS App takes park information and combines it with a great suite of features.

You can download content from entire parks for offline use. What do you want to do in a park—hike? Take a bus tour or scenic drive? Visit a museum? Join a ranger program? Become a junior ranger? Discover all the fun, entertaining, and educational activities parks have to offer.

Interactive Maps: Each park has a detailed map that includes points of interest, along with roads, trails, and other information to plan your trip.

Nature's beauty is on constant display at the Grand Canyon. Visitors are awed by the canyon's powerful landscapes, its breathtaking plunging depths, the temple-like buttes, and the panoramic multi-colored topography. Scenic wonders within park boundaries include high plateaus, plains, deserts, forests,

cinder cones, lava flows, streams, waterfalls, not to mention one of the world's great whitewater rivers.

Human activity in the Grand Canyon area dates as far back as the prehistoric era. Today, at least 11 Native American tribes are culturally linked to the park.



ASK A RANGER

The Grand Canyon Visitor Center is a must-visit for anyone traveling to the park. It provides a wealth of information, resources, and services that will help visitors make the most of their visit to this iconic natural wonder.

Visitors can start their tour by exploring the exhibits and displays at the center. Here, they can learn about the formation of the Grand Canyon and the various rock formations found throughout the park. There are also interactive displays and multimedia presentations that bring the canyon's history and beauty to life.

The center also features a large bookstore where visitors can purchase souvenirs, books, maps, and other items. There are also several ranger-led programs and walks that visitors can sign up for, including hikes to popular viewpoints and guided nature walks.

Drive here

Ready for a road trip? There are several ways to drive to Grand Canyon National Park

From Phoenix: If you're starting from Phoenix, you can take I-17 to Flagstaff, and then take Route 180 to the South Rim of the Grand Canyon.

From Las Vegas: If you're starting from Las Vegas, you can take Route 93 to Kingman, Arizona, and then take I-40 to Flagstaff, before taking SR 64 to the South Rim from Williams.

The east entrance of Grand Canyon can be accessed through Cameron, Arizona via SR 64.

Grand Canyon Airport, is a small, regional airport located in Tusayan, Arizona, just outside the south entrance to Grand Canyon National Park. The airport has a single runway and offers regular daily flights to and from cities such as Phoenix and Las Vegas, making it convenient for tourists to reach the Grand Canyon. Upon arrival, visitors can take shuttle buses or rent cars to get to the park, which is just a short drive away.

There are also several tour operators and ground transportation providers located in the terminal, making it easy for visitors to plan their Grand Canyon adventures.





CAMPING OPTIONS AT GRAND CANYON NATIONAL PARK

Which Rim? NORTH VS. SOUTH

The Grand Canyon South Rim offers several camping options for visitors. The most popular option is the Mather Campground, which is located within the park and has over 300 sites for tents and RVs. The Desert View Campground is another option located on the South Rim and offers 50 sites for tents and RVs. There are also several commercial campgrounds located near the park, including the Trailer Village RV Park and the Grand Canyon Camper Village, which offer RV sites with full hookups

The Grand Canyon North Rim offers several camping options for visitors looking for a more remote and serene experience. The North Rim Campground is the only campground located within the park and has sites for tents and RVs. If the North Rim Campground is full, there are places you can camp near the park. Camping options include the USFS DeMotte, Jacob Lake and Tuweep campgrounds, and the commercially operated Kaibab Camper Village.

The Grand Canyon is one of the most stunning Natural wonders in the world, and camping in the park allows you to immerse yourself in its beauty and serenity. Whether you're camping on the South Rim or the North Rim, or exploring the backcountry, you'll have access to breathtaking views and awe-inspiring landscapes.

Sleeping under the stars offers a chance to escape the hustle and bustle of everyday life and to enjoy the peace and quiet of nature. Whether you're sitting by the campfire or simply enjoying the sounds of nature, camping at the Grand Canyon is an opportunity to connect with the great outdoors.

MATHER CAMPGROUND

Mather Campground is located on the South Rim of the Grand Canyon and is open yearround. It offers over 300 campsites, which can accommodate tents, RVs and trailers. There are flush toilets and drinking water is available throughout the campground. No hookups are available. Pine loop is a tent-only area where generators are not permitted. From March 1 through Nov. 30, most campsites are by reservation through recreation.gov. This campground offers 10 first-come, first-served sites during peak season.



DESERT VIEW CAMPGROUND

Desert View Campground is located on the South Rim, 25 miles east of Grand Canyon Village. The campground is open from early May to mid-October, weather permitting. It has 50 campsites that can accommodate tents, RVs and trailers up to 30 feet in length. Each site is equipped with picnic tables, fire rings and food storage lockers. The campground does not have hookups. Campsites available by reservation only at www. recreation.gov, and can be made up to 6 months in advance at (877) 444-6777) or www.recreation.

GRAND CANYON NORTH RIM

The North Rim Campground is open seasonally from May 15 through Oct. 15 and is located inside Grand Canyon National Park. The Canyon's rustic and less populated North Rim is home to abundant wildlife, hiking trails and unparalleled views. The 85 campsites are by reservation only through www.recreation.gov. There are no walkup sites available. The campground is equipped with restroom facilities, drinking water and picnic tables.





TRAILER VILLAGE

Trailer Village is the only in-park RV campground with full hookups (sewage, water, and electrical with 30 amp and 50 amp sites available) Open year-round, Trailer Village features paved pull-through sites which can accommodate vehicles up to 50 feet long. Trailer Village is operated by Delaware North. Reservations can be made up to 13 months in advance. If visiting during the busy season (May through October) making reservations one year in advance is recommend. Visit their website to make reservations at visitgrandcanyon.com.

Inside the Park

GRAND CANYON HISTORY

The Grand Canyon measures over 270 miles long, up to 18 miles wide and a mile deep, making it one of the biggest and grandest canyons in the world.

On February 26, 2019, Grand Canyon National Park celebrated 100 years since it's designation as a national park.

For its 100th birthday, Grand Canyon commemorated the past and inspired future generations to experience, connect with, and protect the park's unique natural, cultural and historic resources.

As a UNESCO World Heritage Site, Grand Canyon National Park visitors travel from around the globe to visit the canyon.

In the last 100 years Grand Canyon has boomed as a mecca for visitors, explorers, adventurers and others.

It was U.S. President Theodore Roosevelt who first created Grand Canyon National Monument in 1908, and in 1919 President Woodrow Wilson upgraded Grand Canyon from a monument to become the 15th national park in the United States. Around 40,000 people visited the park that year, but by 1956 the number surpassed one million. On an average year, Grand Canyon has nearly 5 million visitors annually.

PAYING TRIBUTE

In 2016, Grand Canyon commemorated the grand reopening and rededication of Desert View Watchtower located at the east entrance of the park. Desert View went from a souvenir shop to a place to pay tribute and highlight Native American cultural heritage.

The park began to use the Watchtower as a place where Native Americans could display and demonstrate various artforms. The cultural demonstrations continue to take place regularly during the spring and summer and include jewelers, silversmiths, weavers, potters and musicians. Demonstrations are intended to help park visitors learn more about the history and diverse cultures of the region.

The Desert View area has been used as a gathering place for thousands of years. Visitors can see a glimpse of the ancient past at the Tusayan Ruin and Museum.

Today Desert View represents the physical and cultural gateway from Grand Canyon National Park to the Navajo and Hopi reservations.

The revival of Desert View as a cultural heritage site provides opportunities for the public to continue to connect and learn about the park's associated tribes.

DAY HIKING AT THE GRAND CANYON

Hiking at the Grand Canyon isn't for the faint of heart. There are no easy trails that descend the rim, and all trails require a steep climb out.

Over 250 people are rescued from the canyon each year, many from heat related illnesses or poor conditioning. The difference between a great adventure in Grand Canyon and a trip to the hospital is to be prepared. Visit the Grand Canyon Visitor Center and/or do research before hiking. Always carry plenty of water and avoid hiking in the summer months as temperatures increase as you descend.

Both the South Rim and the North Rim offer rim trail hikes that have spectacular views of the inner canyon, some on paved trails.

Rim Trail. This trail runs from the village area to Hermits Rest and offers easy walking with beautiful views of the inner canyon. You can start at any viewpoint in the Village or along Hermit Road. Just be aware that there is no water west of Bright Angel Lodge. You can customize your hike by using the shuttle buses, and part of the trail is paved and accessible.

Bright Angel Trail.

This trail is steep, but offers day hikes ranging in distance up to 12 miles (round trip). You'll find some shade along the way, but the upper portion of the trail may be icy in the winter or early spring. Be sure to check the water status at the Visitor Center or Backcountry Information Center before you go.

South Kaibab Trail.

Another steep trail, the South Kaibab Trail offers some of the best views for a relatively short hike. The trail descends to the river, but there you can turn around at anytime. The traillhead is only accessible by shuttle bus (Kaibab Trail Route) for day trips. There

is no water and little shade, so be sure to bring plenty of your own.

Hermit Trail. This trail offers hikes to Santa Maria Spring (5 miles round trip) and Dripping Springs (7 miles round trip). It's a tougher trail than the Bright Angel and South Kaibab Trails, with an unmaintained steep trail that requires caution. The trail starts 500 feet west of Hermits Rest and water from springs must be treated before drinking. This hike is recommended for experienced desert hikers.


Grandview Trail. The Grandview Trail is very steep and offers hikes to Coconino Saddle (2.2 miles round trip) and Horseshoe Mesa (6.4 miles round trip). Like the Hermit Trail, it's a tougher trail than the Bright Angel and South Kaibab Trails, with an unmaintained steep trail that requires caution. The trail starts on the canyon side of the retaining wall at Grandview Point on Desert View Drive (12 miles east of the village). This hike is more difficult than other hikes at the Canyon.

BACKCOUNTRY HIKING

If you wish to camp anywhere in the park, other than in developed campgrounds on the North Rim or the South Rim, you must obtain a permit from the Backcountry Information Center.

A backcountry permit is required for overnight camping outside of Mather Campground, Desert View Campground and North Rim Campground.

Backcountry camping requires planning ahead. Visit https://www.nps.gov/grca/planyourvisit/backcountry-permit for more information.



BECOMING A JUNIOR RANGER

Are you ready for an exciting and educational journey at Grand Canyon? The Junior Ranger program is for young explorers who want to learn more.

Junior Ranger books are filled with fun and engaging activities that you can complete during your visit here. Head over to one of the park's visitor centers to pick up your very own Grand Canyon Junior Ranger Activity book.

This program is specially tailored for young adventurers. To earn your badge, you'll need to complete the requirements listed in the booklet for your



age group. This may include attending a ranger-led program in the Village or at Desert View, writing your observations, drawing pictures, and even creating poems. You can get your hands on the Junior Ranger Activity Book at locations such as the Grand Canyon Conservancy Main Store, Yavapai Geology Museum, or Kolb Studio.

If you plan to visit between May 15 and October 15, you can become a Junior Ranger on the North Rim. Head to the North Rim Visitor Center to pick up the North Rim Junior Ranger Activity Book.

Grand Canyon Explorer Junior Rangers is available for all ages. Pick up the Canyon Explorer Junior Ranger Adventure Guide when you hike or ride a mule into the Grand Canyon's backcountry. You can find the guide at corridor trail campgrounds or backcountry ranger stations.

Visit the INorth Rim

A UNIQUE VIEW OF GRAND CANYON

Because of its location, the North Rim of Grand Canyon National Park is known for having less tourism and unlike its adjacent rim, it is only accessible seasonally, opening in mid-May and closing in October.

Those wanting to visit the North Rim from the South Rim can access it via a 4.5 hour drive of 220 miles. The only other access point is hiking across the canyon from the South Rim, a total of 21 miles. Those hiking should keep in mind that the North Rim sits at 8,000 foot elevation.

Upon arrival, visitors will find one lodge, Grand Canyon Lodge and one campground, operated by the National Park Service. Other campgrounds are available outside of the park.

The Grand Canyon Lodge North Rim operations include lodging, groceries, retail, food and beverage services, and the gas station. At the lodge, food and beverage services are available.

In addition to the Lodge, visitors will find services that include the Backcountry Information Office and Grand Canyon



Grand Canyon Lodge

The Grand Canyon Lodge was built in 1928 by architect Gilbert Stanley Underwood. Native stone and timber were used to make the lodge with much of the main lodge featuring Kaibab limestone that makes up the cliff at Bright Angel Point.

A fire burned the main lodge and several cabins, however, it was rebuilt in 1936. It was designated a National Historic Landmark on May 28, 1987.

Grand Canyon Mule Rides

For those wanting a unique experience, Grand Canyon Mule Rides offers trips of a life-time.


With three rides to choose from, visitors are sure to find an option that fits their needs. Rides include a one hour rim ride, three hour mule ride to Supai Tunnel or a three hour trip to Uncle Jim's Point along the Ken Patrick Trail. All rides are with experienced guides and mules are selected for their gentle temperament, being trail wise and sure footed.

Getting there:

The North Rim is located 30 miles south of Jacob Lake on Highway 67. Once you reach the gates of the park, the rim lies an additional 14 miles south. Jacob Lake is located on Highway 89A.

Get ready for an epic day trip between the North and South Rim of the Grand Canyon that you won't forget. Join Kayak the Colorado for an adventure that includes paddling down the scenic Colorado River and viewing the magnificent Horseshoe Bend from a unique perspective.

First things first, you'll need a backhaul service to transport you and your kayak upriver. Don't worry, Kayak the Colorado's expert guides have got you covered. They also offer a variety of kayak and watercraft rentals, so you can choose the perfect vessel for your

adventure.


Start your day trip at Petroglyph Beach and paddle 10 miles to see ancient carvings that are estimated to be up to 6,000 years old. On your way back downstream, stop at one of the many picturesque picnic spots to refuel and relax. Make sure to pack an extra set of clothes in case of a capsizing event safety first.

Be on the lookout for the diverse wildlife that inhabits the Grand Canyon, including horses, big horn sheep, and even the endangered California Condor. If you're planning on staying overnight,

- The Grand Canyon has a resident population of California condors, one of the world's most endangered birds.


Mule rides

For the adventuresome visitor looking to create the memory of a lifetime, take a mule ride down into the Grand Canyon or perhaps along the rim. There are two guided rides using a time-honored method of canyon transportation: the sure-footed mule.


Horses may be iconic to the American West, but the equine of choice at Grand Canyon has long been its hybrid relative, the mule. These animals combine the sure-footedness of a burro with the larger size and strength of a horse, and have been carrying canyon visitors since the late 1800's. More than 600,000 people have taken Grand Canyon mule rides since they were first offered in 1887. In 1904, Fred Harvey became the exclusive provider of mule rides at the South Rim of the Grand Canyon. Xanterra, then known as Amfac Parks & Resorts, purchased the Fred Harvey Company in 1968.

There is no Grand Canyon adventure more unique than a mule ride. The overnight rides go deep into the canyon, staying overnight at Phantom Ranch. If you only have a short time to visit the South Rim, but are still longing for adventure, you can take the 2-hour Canyon Vistas Rim Ride. While it doesn't take you into the canyon itself, the views along the way are stunning.

Grand Canyon National Park Lodges offer a fourmile, three-hour mule activity (two-hours in the saddle) that departs five miles east of the Village at the Yaki Barn. Bus transportation is included to and from Yaki Barn. The mule ride travels along the East Rim Trail. There are up to 20 riders per departure. 

A wrangler's dream

Mule wrangler Lisa "Tex" Parker went from a life in New York City to guiding mule rides to the bottom of Grand Canyon National Park

Three mule rides to Phantom Ranch is what it took to convince Lisa "Tex" Parker that at some point she would have to come back to the Grand Canyon to work.

She vowed she would make that happen...and she did, having now worked three seasons as a wrangler for Xanterra Travel Collections South Rim Mule Operations.

"My boyfriend Jack Rinaldi and I first visited the Grand Canyon in 2011," Parker said. "We then came back in 2013 and signed up for a mule ride to Phantom Ranch. We had Assistant Livery Manager Don Bristow as our lead wrangler at the time — he cracked jokes the entire

ride and we had the best time of our lives. We fell in love with the inner canyon."

The couple's next visits were in 2014 and 2015 where they once again signed up for a Grand Canyon mule ride to Phantom Ranch.

"We planned to ride down again in 2016 but the trail was closed due to a rock slide, so we settled for the two-hour Canyon Vista Ride instead," Parker said.

A few years later, Parker contacted the mule barn to see about employment. At the time she was living in New York City working for Belgian designer Diane von Furstenberg.

"I got the impression that they didn't think someone from New York City would make the cut as a wrangler," she said. "I had to be persistent because I had been brushing up on my riding skills on the beach in Brooklyn and also gaining experience as a guide."

"When she was applying for the job, she said she was from Queens so I kept asking her if she was sure she knew how to ride," said Xanterra Livery Manager John Berry.

In March of 2019, Parker was hired as a wrangler.

"I worked through to November then we headed back to New York City," Parker said.

Last year, Parker returned to the Grand Canyon.

"You just fall in love with the place, the human history, the beauty....it's such an incredible national park," she said.

In 2021 Yanterra South Rim Mule Operations employed

In 2021, Xanterra South Rim Mule Operations employed 13 guides, 10 are women and they have one woman packer.



STROLL AROUND **HISTORIC ROUTE 66**







Lorenzo Hubbell Trading Post, once the premier Trading Post Company of the American southwest territories. is now Winslow's Chamber of Commerce/Visitor Center. It houses numerous exhibits and collections including ancient Native American artifacts, Santa Fe Railroad equipment that includes tools of the industry and Fred Harvey memorabilia, original western art, Wild West territory information, Route 66, Meteor Crater and much more. Homolovi State Park




