

mental stress problems, financial problems and so on. The task force is attempting to help those people.

Waiting to get the word on FEMA is one of the things that has held up the task force and the city, as well. If we don't get FEMA funds for the private sector, it's going to make it more difficult for Council Bluffs to recover properly. FEMA funds for the private sector are absolutely critical," Narmi said.

So far the task force has been successful in setting up a tornado hot line as a referral service for tornado victims. About 80 people called the hot line in the first four days. The calls ranged from people saying they had no insurance and no resources to help put their lives back together to people wanting to know how to get checks from FEMA, Narmi said.

The task force has also been responsible for distributing flyers outlining dos and donts in dealing with contractors and repair services and emotional responses to the tornadoes.

The group has also set up volunteer recruitment committee headed by Wayne Hough of the Council Bluffs Ministerial Association and Jim Peterson, executive director of the Pottawattamie County Red Cross chapter.

The committee will work to match up needs coming in over the hot line with volunteers that may be able to meet those needs, Narmi said.

Other committees established by the task force are: Material needs, headed by Chuck Rafensperger of the Omaha Food Bank and Salvation Army Capt. Tom McDowell of Council Bluffs. The committee will handle contributions of food and clothing.

Anne Marie Aita, a representative of Mercy Hospital and a member of the Outreach and Council Bluffs ministerial associations, will chair the funding committee, which will
