Why our Town is called Bear River City—Are we in Wyoming or Utah—Those Questions Satisfactorily set at rest—Direct your Letters to Bear River City, Wyoming Territory.

DEAR SIR:—I am informed by Special Agent Clappitt that you wish the present name of your Post-office changed to Bear River City. I have some interest, in common with yourself and the "rest of mankind," in hoping the name of Bear River be not the one adopted.

Lying on my desk now is a letter directed to "F. J. Bowles, Esq., Bear River, Utah, Territory," from E. B. Howard, Detroit, Michigan. Now as there is one office in Utah already called Bear River City, you can imagine my perplexity. As it is, the letter in question may be for your office; the "city" in such cases being often dropped. Are we so barren of invention that we must go on duplicating and re-duplicating names. Let me take the liberty, in the interest of Postmasters and their clerks, who will be put to needless trouble by confounding offices, and of the public whose letters will be mis-sent and delayed, to urge the re-christening of your city. It will doubtless be a permanent point, and as Bear River, on the northern route, is the Head of a route, and at the junction of the Montana and Idaho routes, and will also be permanent, at least for some time, a change in the name of your place is very desirable. Thro' the INDEX you can do much, and I trust you will give the subject your attention.

Our brother in the fraternity appears to overlook the fact that the junction of the Idaho and Montana stage road is called "Bear River North," and that it is in Utah, while our place is "BEAR RIVER CITY," Wyoming. To give a town the name of some person or invent some insignificant term, does not convey an idea of where it is, while to name it after its own geographical location, defines the point precisely. Hence, BEAR RIVER CITY.

It has been contended by some that the line of Wyoming does not extend as far west as this place, tho' we know to the contrary. The longitude of Fort Bridger has been defined time and again by different government officials who set it down at 33 degrees, 32 minutes and 23 seconds west from Washington, and as the organic act of Wyoming makes meridian 34 the boundary line between Wyoming and Utah, it gives us 34 miles west of Fort Bridger, and as Wells, Fargo & Co.'s long distances only make it 28 1/2 miles from Fort Bridger to this point by stage road, it is plain to every one that 34 miles west of Fort Bridger by a survey line takes in the whole of Bear River Valley, and considerable beyond, probably to the point where the stage road strikes Yellow Creek, ten miles west of here. Hence, we prove conclusively that we are not "duplicating" the name of "Bear River North, Utah."

We applied to the department upwards of two months ago for a post-office to be established in Bear River Valley, near the railroad crossing, to be styled Gilmer, Carter county, Wyoming, although at that time there was no town here. The reason we did it was because we were positively advised that the winter town, and indeed an important point of permanency, would soon begin to spring up here. Upon our arrival here we met Gen. Clappitt, Special Mail Agent, and requested him to recommend that the name of our office be changed from Gilmer to the more strikingly emblematical one of

BEAR RIVER CITY, which he has done; and as we are in the new Territory of Wyoming, it is impossible for route agents to confound our mail with that for any point similarly named in Utah. We opened the office one month ago, since which time mails have been received daily, from the east and west, with as much regularity as Wells, Fargo & Co.'s \$1,700,000 contract will admit of. We would advise the people that they need no longer use thirteen cent envelopes to enrich the swindlers, but that Uncle Sam's three cents postage on letters and two cents on papers will grant ingress and egress to communications to or from Bear River City, Wg. Ty.

THE LATEST NEWS.

Chicago, 13.—New York specials say there was an improved tone in all markets at the opening, but in the afternoon it was reported that the run on the banks was large of creditors at the clearing houses, which was accepted as an indication of another looking up of greenbacks. Everything declined and this increases the pressure to realize in all directions. There is a feeling of great uncertainty in regard to the future. The markets are influenced by every rumor, it being known that it is in the power of a combination to withdraw their money from the banks any time, thereby creating stringency. It is feared that there will be serious troubles to-morrow.

United States officials are investigating the Cuba filibustering schemes, but there has been no arrests. Col. Gibbons, chief officer, says he has two millions in the bank at St. Thomas, and has been promised three war ships and four steamers. The expedition will sail in detachments and be landed at some convenient point near Havana.

The Tribune's New York special says there is quite a calm feeling in Wall street, but notwithstanding the money market is supplied at the legal rate with currency, there is an utter lack of confidence in the value of stocks. The Exchange is in a demoralized condition, and there is a fear of bank contraction, which has already caused such great undermining in prices; and the treasury movements fail to influence things for the better. Bank and mercantile failures in the West it is feared may spread. This acts as a damper on all movements for a rise. The Assistant Treasurer has received in all \$4,000,000 in three percent. certificates. It is not yet decided exactly in what manner these certificates shall be used. The Treasurer is of the opinion that if no bonds or gold are sold, there is all the relief that ought to be expected. If any legal tenders are re-issued, it would be because the requisitions on treasury demand it, and not for the purpose of interfering with the money market.

The banks generally are poor, and the contraction of loans on their part is bound to go on; as there is a considerable drain of currency to the south and west, they will want money to ship a large crop as soon as cold weather sets in.

Milwaukee, 13.—Quite a panic prevailed in business circles to-day in consequence of the failure of the Wisconsin State Bank, hitherto considered one of the soundest banks in the city; the liabilities are very heavy, the bank having discounted largely on wheat and paper. Runs have been made on other banks, but no serious trouble is anticipated.

San Francisco, 13.—Johnson, Democrat, is elected to Congress from the northern district by a small majority. The Board of Regents have elected Gen. Geo. B. McClellan President of the University of California.

Late Arizona advices report numerous Indian outrages. Governor McCormick disapproves of the recent massacre of Indians by the whites near La Paz, and has ordered the arrest of the principal actors.

Madrid, 12.—The party in favor of a republic is gaining ground. Gen. Pierran has united with Don. Escalanti to push forward the republican cause. The democrats express some dissatisfaction at this coalition.

New York, 13.—Generals Rosecrans and Longstreet sailed for Mexico to-day.

John P. Bailey has been appointed Supervisor of national revenue for Washington, Montana, Idaho and Oregon.

Albany, 13.—The second trial of Gen. Cole for the murder of Hiscock commences to-morrow.

New York, 12.—The Democrat's cable special says the Pope, through his nuncio at Madrid, still refuses to recognize the new government of Spain; and says that at a meeting of the French bishops and cardinals in Rome, several reformatory measures were, to the great surprise of the Conservative members, favorably received by the majority. Among the measures is one to reverse the decree of the Council of Trent, concerning the celibacy of the Catholic clergy, and for allowing them to marry.

Another was to abolish the Latin liturgy, and to use instead, the language of the nation in which the service is performed. These measures will be submitted to the coming council.

Twenty thousand men on the railroad grade, five thousand in the timber, three thousand teamsters, one hundred thousand farmers, fifty thousand miners and five thousand bummers, indeed, the whole mountain region, are drawing their supplies from the mammoth wholesale houses at this point.

A private letter from Laramie, dated 14th inst., says "a heavy fall of meteors here last night from 11 o'clock until daylight—a perfect shower during over half the night. It was truly grand as well as awful. The Indians killed a wood chopper six miles from here yesterday morning. The vigilantes here are on the qui vive."

The agent of Wells, Fargo & Co. says people are foolish for sending money by mail. We responded that we supposed it is the game of the swindlers to have every mail robbed, and thus compel us all to pay them one fourth per cent. for expressing that which should be taken under the seventeen hundred thousand dollar contract.

Mr. Randall, brother of our Postmaster General is in town from the northern country. He thinks more money is changing hands here than in Helena, Montana, or Salt Lake City, Utah. He is a partner with Huntley in the Fort Bridger and South Pass mail contract, and is enroute to see that the service is properly performed.

Mr. A. W. Street, the Salt Lake postmaster, gave us a pleasant talk this morning. Like every other person heretofore familiar with this locality, he expresses the profoundest surprise at the great amount of business now being transacted where one month ago there were only the camps of railroad graders, timber contractors, oil borers, &c., now the first commercial outfitting city of the mountain region. He and General Clappitt both take stock in our town.

Mr. S. B. Reed, contracting engineer of the U. P. R. R., called at our sanctum the day before yesterday, on his way from Echo to Quaking Asp. He corroborates the assertion of Dr. Durant, vice-President, and Col. Seymour, consulting engineer, as to the intention of the company to put in timber and coal side tracks here. These master spirits of this great work, all agree as to the necessity of taking such steps at the only point on the Railroad from Omaha to San Francisco that is both a coal and a timber station.

Dr. Durant, vice-President, Col. Saml. B. Reed, contracting engineer, Col. M. Seymour, consulting engineer, and Major Lawrence, assistant engineer, are having their winter quarters built at Stafford & McGowan's, in this city. Welcome, thrice welcome, ye enterprising, go-ahead, never tire, master spirits of the nation's greatest artery—the Union Pacific Railroad.

We notice the meat market of J. Curr & Co. has removed to the north side of Sulphur Creek, and located just west of the U. S. Restaurant. Hank has got the largest and best "outfit" of the kind in Bear River City. He opened up yesterday morning with a rush of customers that surprised the whole establishment. He was equal to the emergency, however, and gratified everybody that called. That is the place, sure, to buy your choice meats, game, and fowl. It

Mr. C. C. Rich, son of the Apostle who presides over the Bear Lake district, and correspondent of the *Deseret Evening News*, came to town a few days since with a train of vegetables for our market, which he sold at big cash figures, then stalked into our office with Mr. "Cub" Johnson, and gave us a most interesting description of matters in the region of monsters. These gentlemen say that not only is this the depot of supplies and the market of the whole Bear Lake settlements, but that the Sublet's cut-off and Lander's cut-off, leading into Idaho and Montana, make a direct air line connection with an excellent road from here down the Valley of Bear River. Mr. Johnson is positive that "monsters" do exist in Bear Lake, for he had side and front views of one lying nearly still, at which he threw stones until his arm was tired out. These gentlemen say they came in to Bear River City to see the "civilization" that they have heard so much about marching "westward" and Mr. Rich thinks he is now fully up in the role of "civilization," and intends to report fully to the denizens of the mountain valleys. Among other points in his report he will include three men strung along on a beam, as his forefathers were wont to hang out pork.

AN INCIDENT OF THE HANGING.—We learn that when the "justice dealing band" entered the jail on Tuesday night of last week, to invite the three garroters to take a walk, the first party they met was a youth by the name of Daniel Spencer alias "Pony." Him they seized and were about to gag, previous to swinging his soul into eternity, when "mistaken identity" occurred to some cool mind and they dropped the youth with, "your time will come next." Time rolled on and they did not forget, but "Pony," who expected them, lost fifteen pounds of flesh through fear, though only guilty of a little drunken squabble. He promised faithfully to leave town if they would let him go. So he paid his fine and dug out with lightning speed.

THE MOUNTAINEER.—At this famous resort, depending from the centre of the ceiling, there is a crude sketch of a scene which transpired in the Snake River Valley, wherein figures very prominently and conspicuously, JEFF STANDEFER, the mountain chief. The painting represents Standefere mounted on a cream colored steed, his revolver raised, the smoke issuing from its deadly mouth, and a Snake brave in the act of falling from his pony. In the back ground are the Snake mountains, in the edge of which there lurked 300 Indians. By calling at "The Mountaineer" Jeff, or his partner who was with him in the Snake country, will explain the whole scene with its horrors, dangers and difficulties, while Billy Huston will make you comfortable and happy with his superior liquid refreshments and funny side jokes.

THE RAILROAD.—Col. Young, one of the tie contractors at this place, says that it is impossible to hire men to cut or teams to haul the amount of timber required by the company this winter. Trestle work is to take place of embankments at most of the deep fills. One single gorge, twelve miles east, in Quaking Asp Mountain, is thirty-five hundred feet long. Of the eight hundred teams that are distributing timber east and west from this point, five hundred are ox, and their owners cannot be induced to keep them here much later at any price. They must be driven into Salt Lake Valley to winter, railroad or no railroad. The track's snow laid to Byrne's Rancho, distant eighteen miles by stage road and twenty-seven by railroad. A range of high snowy mountains intervenes that sleighs alone have heretofore been able to traverse, and even they very irregularly during mid winter. The way the snow flies in this country will render it utterly impossible for the track to be laid far beyond this place before spring. These assertions coincide with the views of every man conversant with winters here. The snow often drifts to the depth of fifty feet, and of course will fill up the cuts. Bear River is the winter terminus.

SWEETWATER ITEMS.—A party just returned from a flying trip to South Pass City says everything looks encouraging for a lively camp next spring. There are some 300 or 400 men who intend wintering there, and all at work either for themselves or for wages. Miners are in demand at \$5 per day. Everybody has money, but it's principally in dust, very few greenbacks in circulation. There are old Montana miners working Rock Creek, and are averaging from \$8 to \$23 per day; they cut through what the prospectors last spring thought was bed rock, and found a second at a depth of some 18 or 20 feet, and are making it pay well. The mine owners and mill men are laboring under great disadvantages on account of scarcity of miners, but work is being pushed with great energy, even under these circumstances, on the following quartz leads: Miners' Delight, James Dwyer, Young America, Cariso, and Liberty, and Messrs. Odell, Whelan & Swearingen are rushing their work on the Mineral Star and Bobtail leads with the expectation of having their mines properly opened, as well as have some 2000 tons of ore out on the dump ready for the mills in the spring. The arrastras have shut down for the winter. Tozers' mill is still running with profit to the mill and miners.

City Ordinance.

An ordinance defining the limits of Bear River City for municipal purposes.

1st. Be it ordained by the Common Council of Bear River City, that the limits of said city shall be one mile square, radiating from the square platited by the town company.

CITY ORDINANCE.

2d. That it shall be unlawful for any person to carry concealed weapons of any kind within the corporate limits of said city.

3d. That it shall be the duty of the police officers to notify any person wearing or carrying pistols, revolvers or other deadly weapons within the corporate limits of the city, that it is contrary to the ordinance of said city, and that if any person or persons shall continue to carry such weapons after such notification, such person shall forfeit and pay a fine in a sum not exceeding one hundred dollars.

4th. That it shall be unlawful for any person to discharge any fire arms, air gun or other deadly weapons within the corporate limits.

5th. That it shall be unlawful for any person to be on the streets or in any public place in said city under the influence of intoxicating liquors.

6th. That it shall be unlawful for any person to make loud or unusual noises, or to behave in a boisterous or undecent manner, or in any way disturb the peace of the citizens of said city.

7th. That it shall be unlawful for any person to make an indecent exposure of their person in any street or other public place.

8th. That any person found guilty of any of the above named offences shall forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars.

9th. That when a person is convicted and sentenced to pay a fine for violating any of the ordinances of said city, in case of inability or refusal to pay such times, such person shall be made to labor upon the streets or other public works until such fine and cost is paid. That such person shall be allowed for each and every day of eight hours service the sum of one dollar and board, at the expense of the city. That such labor shall be done under the instruction of the City Marshal.

10th. That it shall be the duty of the City Marshal, his deputy or any regular policeman to arrest any person committing any of the above named offences and take him or her before the proper officers to be dealt with according to law.

In accordance with the provision of the law in such cases made and provided, (this being a case of emergency) it is ordered that the above ordinance be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage hereof.
