HAD DELIVERED ADDRESS THIS MORNING-TRAGEDY OCCUR-RED AS HE RETURNED TO HIS HOME

SHOTS FROM TWO ASSAILANTS WHO WERE ARRESTED

The Associated Press London, June 22 -Field Marshall Sir Henry Hughes Wilson was shot and killed just outside his home in Eton Square, London, this afternoon. The two assailants of the mar-

shall were arrested. The field marshall had delivered a speech in Liverpool street station in the city this morning in connection with the unveiling of a war memorial. He had apparently just returned home when the tragedy occurred. The Central News account of the tragedy says that Wilson stepped from his automobile when two men suddenly appeared and opened fire upon him with three revolvers. He was struck by three shots, the account adds, and died al-

most immediately. Field Marshall Wilson was formerly chief of the imperial general staff of the British army. He retired from this post early this year. A few months ago he accepted an appointment as military adviser to the Ulster government and made frequent visits to Ulster, but spent most of his time in London, however, attending the house of commons.

Assailants of the Marshall giving their names as Connelly and O'Brien were captured by the police after the shooting and one tried to kill himself. Wilson was carried into ---his-home-and-died before a physician could be summoned. 

BEEN KILLED IN OPEN WARFARE

SIXTEEN NON-UNION AND THREE UNION MEN

DEAD

Herrin, III. June 22. - Nineteen are known to have been killed in open warfare of union men sympathizers with employes of the Strip mine meat here of the Southern Illinois Coal Company. An incomplete checkup showed that sixteen non-union men and three union men are dead. One of the non-union men was found ainging to a tree with his body ridiled with bullets. The bodies of sixteen non-union men were found in the woods near the Strip mines, six which Detectives Frank Aughe and miles east of here. A man named McDowell, foreman at the mine, was beaten to death and the other fourteen exclusive of the man hanged were shot to death. It was stated that the men were massacred whenthey attempted to escape after being taken prisoner by the union forces. Dead non-union men are reported to have been among the forty-four prisoners captured at the Strip mine.
