

# Fair licensed, rides inspected

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair is approved and licensed by the N.C. Department of Agriculture and is a member of the N.C. Association of Agriculture Fairs and International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

Midway rides provided by Dreamland Amusements are inspected by the N.C. Department of Labor.

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair began in 1980, 50 years after the last County Fair had been held in Columbus County. It was a project of the Columbus County Law Enforcement Officers Association. The first fair was completely dependent upon big circus tents, but as time passed nice buildings were built to house the commercial and educational booths, livestock barn and food stand. In more recent years an old building was remodeled to serve as the fair's office building.

Early on, the fair board asked the public to help give the fair a suitable motto, and a contest was held. The fair board liked "It's A Family A-Fair," so that became the motto.

Several years ago the fair called on the public again to choose a name for the fair's mascot, a gigantic fiberglass rooster who stood sentinel on the fairgrounds. "Fearless Fair-ley" was the name chosen by the fair board.





# Dreamland provides rides for family fun

Dreamland Amusements has been providing exciting rides for children and adults for the Columbus County Fair for many years, and their rides spend winters right here in Columbus County. The company has a 15-acre winter headquarters in downtown Delco, 15 miles west of Wilmington, where the equipment is stored until spring.

The rides then go on the road, traveling from New Hampshire to Miami, Fla.,

supplying rides, games and food stands for county and state fairs and also playing concert dates. The equipment has been featured in TV ads, at many private parties, corporate rentals and concert dates. The company supplies silent generators, benches and covered seating areas. At many fairs Dreamland Amusements does an extensive landscaping package. The company markets its events through cable TV, radio, coupon distribution as well

# Sweet potatoes take center stage at 2024 fair





# Demolition Derby is Friday, Saturday nights



One of the most popular and exciting events at the Columbus County Agriculture Fair is the Demolition Derby, held each year on Friday and Saturday nights, beginning at 7 p.m.

Registration will be from 4 to 6:30 p.m. at the track, and there are no entry fees. There are four classes of vehicles, 4-cylinder class (small car), 6-cylinder class (up to 3,500 lbs.), 8-cylinder class (3,501 lbs. & up ) and pro class (any cylinder).

#### 4-Cylinder Class, 6-Cylinder **Class** 8-Cylinder Class rules

- 1. Any stock hard top automobile or station wagon is allowed.
- 2. Safety belts and safety

helmets with goggles or shield are required.

- 3. All glass must be removed except windshield. If windshield is removed a center bar is required.
- 4. All decorative chrome must be removed, but door handles may be left on.
- 5. Gas tanks are to be inside of car, six gallon ed or chained. If welded, tanks (plastic or metal). Tanks must be properly secured and covered. Original tanks must have holes punched in them and flushed clear of gas, or be removed from car.
- 6. No special bumpers, trailer hitches, reinforcements or added weight are allowed on any part of the vehicle. \*\*Bumper shocks can be removed and the bumper welded\*\*.
  - 7. Doors should be weld-

must be in 4-inch welds.

- 8. Trunks should be chained shut or welded by 4-inch welds. Hoods can use 5/8-inch bolt or be chained. Tailgates of wagons should be chained or welded so as not to open during heat.
- 9. All sun visors, windshield blades, and headliners must be removed.
- 10. Fenders may be cut for wheel clearance only.
  - 11. Batteries should be

secured inside vehicle and covered with tarp or heavy material to prevent explosion.

12. No solid white cars accepted! Cars may be decorated in any manner as long as it is in good taste. Driver's door only should be painted white for derby number to be applied at registration. Numbers are issued on first-come-first-serve ba-

13. Tires must be filled

with air only.

14. Radiators must remain in its original posi-

15. Drivers: Do not leave your vehicle unless instructed to do so by derby flagman! Leaving the vehicle is grounds for disqualification. Stay with your car until it has been removed from the track.

16. Any car catching fire that stops the event is automatically disqualified for that heat.

- 19. No larger than 3/4 threaded bolts for chassis & body bolts.

#### Demo Derby Pro Class Rules

- 1. Any stock hard top automobile or station wagon is allowed.
- 2. Safety belts and safety helmets with goggles or shield are required.
- 3. All glass must be removed except windshield. If windshield is removed a center bar is required.
- 4. All decorative chrome, must be removed, but door handles may be left on.
- 5. Gas tanks are to be inside of car, six gallon tanks (plastic or metal). Tanks must be properly secured and covered.

Original tanks must have holes punched in them and flushed clear of gas, or must be removed from car.

- 6. No special bumpers, trailer hitches, reinforcements or added weight are allowed on any part of the vehicle. \*\*Bumper shocks can be removed and the bumper welded\*\*.
- 7. Doors should be welded or chained, if welded must be in 4" welds.
- 8. Trunks should be chained shut or welded by 4" welds. Hoods can use 5/8 inch bolt or be chained. Tailgates of wagons should be chained or welded so as not to open during heat.
- 9. All sun visors, windshield blades, and headliners must be removed.
- 10. Fenders may be cut for wheel clearance only. Height of vehicle must not be over 24" from bottom of bumper to ground.
- 11. Batteries should be secured inside vehicle and covered with tarp or heavy material to prevent explosion.
  - 12. No solid white cars

accepted! Cars may be decorated in any manner as long as it is in good taste. Driver's door only should be painted white for derby number to be applied at registration. Numbers are issued on a first-comefirst-serve basis.

- 13. Any size tires, fourpoint role cage/bars are acceptable. No hump plates or kickers!
- 14. Radiators must remain in its original position.
- 15. Drivers: Do not leave vehicle unless instructed to do so by derby flagman! Leaving vehicle is grounds for disqualification. Stay with car until it has been removed from the track.
- 16. Any car catching fire that stops the event is automatically disqualified for that heat.
- 17. All cars must immediately stop at the sound of horn, light or flagman.
- 18. All hoods & trunks must have a 12" diameter hole cut for safety.
- 19. No larger than 3/4 threaded bolts for chassis & body bolts.





# County fair team wins awards in five statewide categories

Representatives of the Columbus County Agriculture Fair accepted five awards at the N.C. Association of Agricultural Fairs Convention Banquet, held Jan. 6 in Cary.

Jess Hill, fair board president, said he and his fellow fair workers had been "blessed" to win the association's Image Award, Innovation Award, Youth Award and Agriculture Award.

Most important among the recognitions, Hill said, was that, "The matriarch of our fair, Mrs. Ann Ferguson, won the most prestigious award for an individual to receive, the 2023 Holmes-McBride Humanitarian Award for her years of dedicated service to the fair industry."

#### What the awards mean

The Image Award "is the largest award a fair can receive" and "encompasses the totality of the fair," Hill said, over "a multitude of categories."

Hill said the Columbus County Agriculture Fair had won the Image Award twice in the past. He thought the award committee had been impressed by the fair's recent introduction of new events and revival of others such as the livestock show, first responders' tug-of-war and Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation's pole-climbing safety demonstration.

However, Hill said, "the defining factor" in winning the Image Award was

"the hard work and collaboration of countless volunteers."

The Innovation Award recognizes the creation of "something different to make the fair better," in this case the fairgrounds' new educational tobacco barn, Hill said.

Board Member Ethan Jordan showed his commitment to the fair's future by working "at the forefront of a great team of young people" putting on the livestock and pig shows and caring for animals all week, Hill said. The fair's many displays showing the importance of agriculture won it this year's Agriculture Award, he said.

#### 'Married to' the fair

In nominating Ann Pugh Ferguson of Chadbourn for the Holmes McBride Humanitarian Award, Hill wrote that she "has been an instrumental 'saw dust soldier' for decades," making sure that the fair "would not only continue but thrive."

Hill praised Ferguson for faithfully supporting the involvement of her late husband, Jimmy Ferguson, longtime president of the fair and past recipient of the humanitarian award. Hill said that Jimmy Ferguson's "wing woman, his companion and wife" deserved her share of credit for the family's legacy of "leadership, dedication and commitment" to the fair.

Calling Ann Ferguson the "matriarch" of Columbus County's fair, Hill said that, "She has literally and figura-





# How to enter exhibits at the Columbus County Agriculture Fair

Chance to win money, ribbons

- 1. Exhibitors' entries will be accepted for registration at the Evelvn Rabon Building on Friday from noon-4 p.m. and on Saturday before the fair, from 10-4 p.m. No other entries will be accepted after 4 p.m. on Saturday. Cakes will be accepted Monday at 9 a.m. Judging will be done on Monday.
- 2. All entries for the Old Macdonald Farm will be accepted on the Monday of the fair week from 8 a.m. to noon, dependent on the availability of space. All poultry entries must be from NC. Poultry cannot cross state lines.
- 3. All articles must have been prepared, made or grown by the exhibitor within the last 12 months.
- 4. All entries must be registered with the clerks in charge of registration at the Exhibit Building. All exhibits on display

must remain in the Exhibit retained by the exhibitor is offered, but shall not be Building throughout the fair week. Articles may be reclaimed by the owner (ticket holder) following the fair on Monday from 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Any article removed from the Exhibit Building before Monday will forfeit any cash prize awarded to said article.

- 5. Exhibits will not be accepted by mail or public transportation.
- 6. Exhibitors must see to the proper delivery of any article or livestock on the grounds and the proper care to the latter, as no charge for transportation of drayage will be paid by the fair.
- 7. All entries will be numbered and recorded in the book of entry of the proper department. Entry tags will be issued, bearing entry number and exhibit number - tag to be attached to the exhibit and the stub

and presented on Monday when the exhibit is called for. These claim checks are your proof that you have entered all your exhibits as required. There will be categories in which there may be a youth and adult entry. The designation "Y" will be added to the letter category for youth.

- 8. Any and all articles judged by the registrar to be obnoxious or repulsive in character will be forbidden entry, or, if entered without being fully known. shall be removed at once.
- 9. The right is reserved to place an exhibit in its proper class if it has been incorrectly entered.
- 10. All entries should be for the first premium of the premium number. under which they are entered. Failing to take the first, entries shall compete for the second, if second

awarded more than one premium under the same number.

11. No article or animal will be entitled to space until the proper entry has been made. Space is limited. (All entries will be accepted in order of receipt until all available space is filled. In any case all entries must be received by the date specified under each department and when all space is filled, the management reserves the right to refuse entries, even if received before the specified date.

12. The management reserves the right to withhold premiums in any case in which it shall appear to them that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud has been practiced. Anyone wanting to enter a complaint should do so in writing, no later


than noon Tuesday.

- 13. Should any person misrepresent his/her exhibit and a premium be awarded upon it, such premium will be withheld by the management.
- 14. Payment of premiums awarded: Premiums will be paid by check at the end of the fair week. All checks are void after Nov. 15. Individuals assume the responsibility of claiming their checks at the exhibit building between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday when exhibits are picked up.

15. All articles shall have been grown, made or prepared by the exhibitor unless otherwise specified in the rules.

16. All articles which are the product of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer. Those showing handiwork or skill must be entered in the name of the one whose





skill they represent. Such may be individuals, firms or factories. Failure to comply with this rule will bar violators from competing for any premiums whatsoever and render him/her and his/her exhibits liable for expulsion from the grounds.

17. When an individual exhibit made from a farm wins first premium, an exhibit of the same kind from the same farm cannot win the second or third premium. Example: a farm is awarded first prize for corn. That same farm cannot win second or third prizes for corn (even if in a different name).

18. Exhibitors may make only one entry in each class, No exceptions.

19. No person will be allowed to see the entries or to have access to the entry book until after the awards have been made.

20. Notice - The fair assumes no responsibility in cases of loss or damage to stock or other exhibits from any cause, and upon this condition only are all entries received.

21. A sweepstakes prize of \$100 will be awarded to the winner of

the most blue ribbons, \$75 for second place, \$50 for third place and \$25 for fourth place.

22. No exhibitors will be permitted inside the Exhibit Building during the judging and until the judging is completed.

23. The standard system of awarding will be used with blue, red and white ribbons presented in each department.

24. Entries will be accepted of articles not listed in the premium list when, in the opinion of the registering official, such articles represent distinct classes suitable for exhibit within one of the departments of the fair. The fair reserves the right to reject any entry not considered suitable, whether of a class or not.

25. If available, space will be allotted for the exhibition of articles other than those listed and if considered worthy for exhibition. All general rules apply. Ribbons may be awarded where merited, but these ribbons will not be considered in competition for "Most Blue Ribbons Won" in Adult or Youth Division.







# Blast from the past: County Fair reviving pageant

Participating in pageants across the county "opened up a lot of doors for me" and "helped me pay for college," said Jan Walters Hardee of Whiteville. And it all started when she competed for the title of Miss Columbus County Agriculture Fair in October 1986.

Now Hardee wants to provide that same opportunity for girls and young women ages 2–21 by reviving the pageant at this year's fair. Five contestants will receive crowns and trophies Saturday, Oct. 12, after a program on the fairgrounds' main stage at 6 p.m., she said.

Since there was no Columbus County fair queen chosen last year, Hardee has invited reigning N.C. Rhododendron Queen Andi Creech to crown

this year's winners, Hardee said. The oldest of the five will also receive a \$500 scholarship, provided by the fair committee, at the end of her reign.

There's no entry fee, and the pageant doesn't include a talent competition. "A lot of girls have talents on a playing field," or in some other pursuit that's "harder to display on a stage," Hardee said. We hope those girls will come be a part of it."

#### Not about the crown

Hardee was a high school senior when she placed as first runner-up at the Columbus County Agriculture Fair. A month later she won the title of Miss Whiteville High School.

Those experiences "kind of started my love for competing and meeting people," she said. "I fell in love."

Hardee stayed active in pageantry at local, state and national levels into her early 20s. She won the crown of Fair Bluff Watermelon Festival queen in 1990 and went on to become N.C. Watermelon queen in 1991. She was second runner-up in the national watermelon pageant in 1992.

Nearly four decades later, she said she has "friends from here to Arizona" because of the pageants and the travel she undertook to represent her constituents back home.

"You've got to go in

knowing that it's not about the shiny crown," she said. The real reward is "what you gain from it in friendship and what you learn about yourself through the process. You're not in competition with anyone but yourself."

#### Passing along the vision

Since her own pageantry days, Hardee has coached many girls to prepare for competitions, helped direct pageants and served as a mistress of ceremonies or as a judge "all over North Carolina," she said.

Hardee believes pageant participation can be "a huge benefit for young ladies." For example, it hones their public speaking skills, preparing them for scholarship or college interviews and eventually the work world. In exchange for the opportunities they

receive, she said, winners accept a "huge" responsibility for community service. "You travel quite a bit" to promote the town, school, agricultural product or festival associated with the contest. When she was state watermelon queen, Hardee attended "festivals all over the state. You go into those communities and introduce yourself," she said. "You ride in parades, and you get people interested in visiting your community."

Recent North Carolina watermelon queens have made appearances at grocery store openings or spread goodwill by delivering watermelon to the N.C. State University football team at practice, Hardee said. She hopes this year's Miss Columbus County Fair "will give some visibility not only to the fair but to Columbus County."

#### **Contestants**

Contestants in the fair pageant must reside in Columbus County. Hardee's advice to those who are uncertain about entering is "Do it for the fun of it. This should be something enjoyable and a chance to meet friends from all over."

The youngest division in this year's pageant is tiny miss, for contestants ages 2-4 years. They will be expected to wear agricultural or fair attire. The little miss contestants, ages 5-8, and junior miss contestants, ages 9-12, will compete in agricultural/fair attire and also in party dresses.

Contestants in the teen miss division, ages 13-16, will undergo five-minute personal interviews and will compete in casual wear and evening gowns. Contestants in the Miss Columbus County Fair division, ages 17-21, will undergo seven-minute personal interviews and appear in casual wear and evening gowns. Ages are as of Oct. 8, 2024.

The entry deadline was Sept. 18. Contestants will rehearse on the fairgrounds' main stage at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Oct. 12.

Each contestant is required to purchase one Columbus County Fair Contestant T-shirt for \$25, which she will wear in the fair parade. She will receive free fair admission all week when wearing the shirt. An additional shirt will be provided for the pageant's opening number, the applica-

# 'Columbus County gold'

Replica curing barn commemorates tobacco's role in local agricultural history

Fair board members opened a full-size cypress wood educational tobacco curing barn just in time for the 2023 fair.

Only a handful of families grow tobacco in Columbus County these days. But when the crop was in its heyday, 4,500 individuals in the county farmed the crop or had allotments to grow it. With four tobacco markets and 20 warehouses, Columbus was in the top five counties for tobacco workload in the U.S.

"Simply put, tobacco touched almost every aspect of the lives of Columbus County,"

said farmer, fair board member and District 5 County Commissioner Brent Watts during the 2023 unveiling of the barn. "In the fall, everyone wore their Sunday best to the markets on the opening day. Downtown merchants, who operated for almost a year on handshakes and trust, saw accounts paid


