

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'Where I'm at, I love' — Meares-Howard is the 2022 WCS Teacher of the Year

At its Back to School Breakfast on Aug. 24, 2022, then Superintendent Marc Whichard announced Amber Meares-Howard as the Whiteville City Schools Teacher of the Year.

In an interview after the event with *The News Reporter*, Meares-Howard said that it was nice not only for her but for her school to be recognized. Students at North Whiteville Academy, where she teaches high school English, are "often labeled 'the bad kids," she said, "but my kids aren't bad; my kids just need us."

It is essential, Meares-Howard said, to "make those connections, build those relationships" in order to have the greatest impact possible on her students.

"A lot of those kids just need to know somebody cares about them," she said.

In a statement read at the breakfast by Whichard, Principal April Corbett wrote that Meares-Howard "has worked tirelessly ever since [she came to NWA] to promote student success both in and outside of the classroom."

In addition to teaching her students to be "creative thinkers and writers," Meares-Howard "not only nurtures the development of her students but recognizes the importance of students having the proper resources to be successful," Corbett wrote.

To that end, over the past three years, Meares-Howard has applied for and received over \$1,000 in grants for school supplies for her coworkers and pupils.

Out of her eight years of teaching experience, six and a half of those were at North Whiteville Academy. And her dedication to the school shows. In fact, she half-jokingly mentioned that when she got married, she told

her husband she was unwilling to move away from Whiteville, where her students are. "Where I'm at, I love," Meares-Howard said. "I love those kids so much."

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CITY STUDENTS DRESS CODE

The Whiteville City Board of Education believes a safe and disciplined learning environment is the first requirement of a high performing school. The implementation of school uniforms will help minimize disruptive behavior, promote respect for oneself and others, build school/community spirit, and, more significantly, help to maintain high academic standards by enhancing the instructional program. The wearing of uniforms will promote the quick identification of intruders on campus. Uniforms will also allow students to focus more acutely on learning by eliminating the distractions of fashion and style. School administration will enforce the policy to ensure the safety of the students and compliance with the dress code policy set forth by the Whiteville City Schools Board of Education.

A. IMPLEMENTATION **PROCESS**

Students are required to wear uniforms, which began with the 2009-10 school year.

B. INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

School officials will communicate information concerning the uniform policy to students, parents, teachers, and the community. This information will include general guidelines for implementation and will be achieved by using one or more of the following: newsletters, parent forums, PTA meetings, School Improvement Team meetings, TV and radio announcements, newspaper, Whiteville City Schools social media, phone, flyers, and post-

C. GENERAL STUDENT **APPEARANCE**

In addition to being required to wear school uniforms, all students are to be groomed and dressed appropriately for school and school activities. A student's dress and/or appearance shall:

- 1. Support, not disrupt, the learning environment;
- 2. Constitute no threat to health or safety;
- 3. Be tasteful and unable to

be construed as provocative or obscene:

4. Reflect practices of good hygiene and cleanliness.

D. RELIGIOUS BELIEFS -MEDICAL REASONS

Reasonable consideration shall be made for those students who, because of a sincerely held religious belief or medical reason, request a waiver of a particular guideline for dress or appearance. The waiver request shall be made in writing from the parent or guardian and approved by the principal. In considering a waiver request, the principal may request additional documentation from medical officials and/or religious lead-

E. SPECIAL ACTIVITY **ACCOMMODATIONS**

Reasonable accommodation shall be made by the principal for students involved in special duties, activities, or projects approved by the This school. may include, but is not limited to athletics, career and technical education, physical education classes, special events, or any other activities that require non-conforming dress on a school campus during a school-sponsored event. In the case of athletics, this includes "spirit-wear" (e.g., Wolfpack t-shirts or athletic team shirts) which shall be worn over regulation uniform shirts/blouses.

F. FINANCIAL **CONSIDERATIONS**

Parents and/or guardians who have concerns about the affordability of a school uniform should contact the principal. The principal and/or school social worker will assist the family with identifying community resources that may be able to help procure the required school uniforms. The school system will not be responsible for funding uniforms for any students.

ment the school uniform and appearance policy in a manner that is age and developmentally appropriate. Good judgment in considering issues such as age, developmental stages, and body type are expected of all students, parents, and guardians in the selection of school attire and appearance. The manner of a student's wear of the school uniform shall be neat, clean, properly fitted, ageappropriate and suitable for the learning environment.

1. SHIRTS/BLOUSES

a. Interim Superinten-

b. Students must wear plain long or short-sleeved golf/polo or woven shirts with a collar. Long-sleeved, button-up shirts will not be worn over the approved uniform shirts.

- c. With the exception of school-approved logos, shirts may have no insignias, logos, labels, words or pictures.
- d. Shirts must be appropriately sized.

e. Shirts shall be long enough to cover the midriff when sitting or standing. Shirts must cover the chest and back so the chest and the back of

the body are not exposed.

Under-

garments may not be visible at any time. However, students may wear plain white or school color T-shirts under shirts which may be visible at the neckline of the collar.

> See-through or mesh tops that will reveal the body or will reveal undergarments are prohibited.

h. Clothing shall be worn appropriately (not inside-out or

backwards; no rolled up pant legs, etc.) at all times.

2. LIGHTWEIGHT JACK-ETS/COATS/OVERCOATS

Students may wear sweaters, vests, light jackets, or sweatshirts over school uniforms when appropriate as determined by the school administration. Hooded jackets are permitted, but hoods may not be worn in the building as this is considered headgear.

Policy Code: 4316

3. DRESS PANTS, SHORTS, SKORTS, JUMPERS, CAPRI LENGTH PANTS, DRESSES

- a. Solid khaki, dark navy, or black are the only permissible colors for these uniform items.
- b. No denim material or rivets allowed on pants.
- c. Must be free of graphics and embroidery. With the exception of small labels, they may not have insignias, logos, words, or pictures.
- d. Shorts, skirts, skorts and jumpers shall be modest and of sufficient length of no more than four (4) inches above the knee.
- e. No pants or shorts with enlarged pockets. Pockets must not be of the "cargo" type and must not include zippers, buttons, Velcro closures, straps, or snaps. Pants are limited to no more than two front and two rear pockets. Watch pockets are not considered a pocket.
- f. Clothing must be appropriately sized. No baggy or sagging pants or shorts are allowed. No "low rise" clothing is allowed. Pants must not be worn with the waistband below the hipbone. Joggers are not permitted as uniform at-
- g. Garments cannot have frays and must be hemmed and not dragging the floor.
- h. Garments that do not fit properly will not be tolerated, including oversized, undersized, and skintight garments. Form-fitting spandex material, nylon, denim, corduroy, and sweat pants are prohibited (including leggings and "jeggings").
- i. Pants must have zippers, buttons or snaps with the exception of Pre-K through Grade 2 students.
- J. Skirts are limited to no more than four pockets.
- k. Garments may not have more than two slits and the slits cannot exceed four inches above the knee.
- l. Capri pants are allowed but cannot be hip huggers, cannot

be skin tight, and the manufactured slit at the bottom of the Capri pant cannot be above the

- m. Pants may not have a slit that exceeds four inches from the bottom of the pant leg.
- n. Pants may not be rolled up in a cuff to simulate Capri pants or shorts.
- o. One-piece jump suits are not allowed.

4. BELTS

- a. Students in grades 3 through 12 must wear belts if the garment was manufactured with belt loops. Belts must be with a plain belt buckle that is not over two inches. All belts must be appropriately buckled.
- b. Pre-K through Grade 5 students are not required to wear
- c. Graphics, metal decorations (spikes and studs), or labels are unacceptable on all belts and belt buckles.
- d. Belts must be an appropriate length and not hang below the straddle.

5. SHOES

- a. Shoes shall be worn at all times. As needed, shoes shall conform to special class requirements such as P.E. classes, JROTC, science labs, and any other classes as deemed necessary by the teacher and the principal.
- b. Shoes and boots that have laces shall be laced and tied.
- c. No bedroom shoes shall be allowed.
- d. "Flip-flop" style shoes or "athletic slides" are not allowed. Sandals with a back are permitted in Grades K-2. Sandals in Grades 3- I 2 are at administrative discretion.
- e. Shoes may not be altered in any way from the manufactured design, style, or function-
- f. Shoelaces must match, and any straps must be secured.
- g. Knee-high boots that lace up over the pant leg are prohib-
- h. Shoes with spiked heels are prohibited.

6. SOCKS

- a. Both socks must match.
- b. Socks must be worn in a manner that does not undermine the integrity of the uni-

form.

- c. Socks must be one solid color.
- d. Socks may not be worn over pant legs.
- e. Students may wear solid colored panty hose, tights, or knee-high stockings.

7. JEWELRY

a. Students may not wear large pendants or medallions. Jewelry designed to be worn around the neck must be worn beneath the shirt/

blouse of the uniform at all times.

- b. No adornment is allowed that reasonably could be perceived as, or used as, a weapon. This includes, but is not limited to chains, spikes, and certain belt buckles.
- c. Only school activity buttons, approved by the principal are permitted to be worn on a student's school uniform, purse, book bag, or any other article of clothing or personal article.
- d. Heavy chains, accessories, spiked excessively large earrings or other heavy jewelry are not allowed.

8. HATS/SUN-GLASSES/HEAD-**GEAR**

- a. Neither headwear nor sunglasses shall be worn inside school buildings. Head sweatbands are considered headwear for purposes of this school uniform policy.
- b. No bandanas shall be allowed as an article of clothing and shall not be in the possession of any student. Bandanas will be confiscated and may be submitted to law enforcement officials as possible evidence of
- gang-related activity. School officials will not return bandanas or other items that may be determined to have gang-related purposes upon confiscation.
- c. Hats, do-rags, skull caps, scarves, sweat bands, head bands or other items that may be seen as a disruption to the school setting are prohibited

in school during the regular school day.

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9. OTHER CLOTHING **ITEMS OR ACCESSORIES**

- a. No gang-related clothing. accessories, symbols or intimidating manner of dress, as identified by local law enforcement agencies, are allowed.
- b. Clothing shall not promote alcohol, tobacco, or drug use.

10. OTHER UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS



- a. Students are expected to be dressed in compliance with the standards for uniforms as established by this policy at all times while school is in ses-
- b. Students who are taking classes that require a special dress code (such as JROTC or career and technical education

internships) may wear that include the following: uniform to other classes.

- c. Students who are issued uniforms by the school which are used to represent the school in athletic contests approved by the Principal or other school sponsored activities may be allowed to wear team uniforms as directed by coaches.
- d. Students who take a class at another school must wear the uniform shirt/blouse/top of their home school.
 - e. Clothing designed for school athletic events (i.e. cheerleader outfits. etc.) that does not meet above guidelines shall not be worn during the instructional day unless appropriate additional garments are worn with the outfit.
 - f. Attire for special school-related events must be prior-approved by school-based administration as presented by the event coordinator/ coach/advisor.

11. PERSONAL **APPEARANCE**

- a. Combs and other hair grooming items cannot be visible in the hair.
- b. Piercings cannot present a health hazard or cause a disruption to the school environment.
- c. No visible tattoos.

12. MISCELLANEOUS

a. Any item that is worn to school must not undermine the integrity of the Uniform Policy, serve as a disruption to the educational process, or present a health hazard to an individual or his/her peers.

H. ENFORCEMENT

The Principal shall ensure that the policy is enforced in a consistent manner and require the student and the student's parent or guardian to take appropriate action to remedy situations de-

termined to be in conflict with this policy. Disciplinary action shall be taken for violation of the School Uniform Policy in accordance with the Violations & Consequence section of the Whiteville City Schools Parent/Student Information Guide. Appropriate disciplinary actions for violations shall

First Offense:

A first offense shall be considered a Level I violation of the Parent/Student Information Guide. Students shall be informed that they have violated the policy. They shall be given the opportunity to change into acceptable clothing by using available clothes at school or by calling a parent/guardian to bring clothes. Parents must be informed in writing of the violation.

Second Offense:

A second infraction of the policy shall be considered a Level II violation of the Parent/Student Information Guide and consequences shall be within the scope of that document. These may include up to assignment to the Re-Direct Center. Parents must be informed in writing of the violation.

Third (and additional) Offenses:

A third infraction of the uniform policy shall be considered a Level III violation of the Parent/Student Information Guide and consequences shall be within the scope of that document. These may include up to referral to the Alternative Learning Program. Parents must be informed in writing of the violation.

Disciplinary action may vary when a student has a record of other student conduct violations during the current school year. Students who do not comply with the School Uniform Policy also may be excluded from participating in certain school programs, including graduation ceremonies. Copies of the School Uniform Policy shall be made available to students and parents.

Students new to Whiteville City Schools shall be given a two-week grace period from the date of enrollment to obtain and wear the proper school uniforms.

I. ANNUAL REVIEW

This policy may be reviewed annually and revised as necessary by the Board of Education.

We are very excited to see students return on the 28th.



Each June, after the last student has graduated and the buses roll for the final time, the task for those of us in education is to reflect on our

efforts during the previous school year and determine what should be our focus in the upcoming school year.

Near the end of 22-23, we gave surveys to students and parents enquiring about their experience with the district, schools, and teachers. Over 1,700 students took the survey and close to 1,000 parents responded. Looking at the data, we saw many positives. But we also saw a strong need to engage more students in the classroom and more parents in our schools.

I spent two days over the summer with every principal, assistant principal, and instructional leader in the district. We had meaningful discussions about the importance of engagement. We determined that increasing engagement with all stakeholders will be a primary focus during the upcoming school year. The focus on engagement will start with the classroom, where teachers will be given tools to ensure that students are not just passively learning, but are actively learning the material through dynamic lessons that are rigorous and interesting to students. This process began last year with the full implementation of blended learning, but we have plans to increase the interest levels and curricular alignment across all classes. Our goal is to have every student interested in school and grow as learners. We don't plan to stop our quest to improve engagement until every student wakes up every morning looking forward to the school day.

We will make efforts to engage parents and caretakers as well; one important step that we have taken to help parents more easily engage with schools is to change the structure of some of our teacher workday/conference days. On Oct. 13 and Feb. 16, schools will close so that teachers can hold conferences from noon-7 p.m. We want to make it easier for parents to come to our schools, and we want them to feel connected and welcomed. We want them to understand what their child is learning and help support our schools by having discussions and asking questions of their child. Our goal is to also have more opportunities for parents to visit the school and engage with staff.

Ultimately, our job is to empower students to responsibly engage in learning, maximize their potential, and become prepared for success. The world is changing so fast. The recent developments in areas of Artificial Intelligence show us that we are preparing students for a world where success may look very different than it does today. Many of the skills of the past generation may no longer be in demand five or ten years from now. The only skills that will never go out of style are those that are used during rigorous, engaging classroom activities- the ability to think flexibly, creatively, and critically, and the ability to cooperate and communicate. We believe those skills to be "future-proof," and our students can only master them by being engaged in the learning process. We hope that you, as stakeholders, will further engage with our district and schools as we work together to maximize the potential of every student every day.

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COUNTY STUDENTS DRESS CODE

The board believes that the dress and personal appearance of students greatly affect their academic performance and their interaction with other students. The board requests that parents outfit their children in clothing that will be conducive to learning. Generally, dress and grooming standards as determined by the student and his or her parents will be deemed acceptable. However, the board requires that appearance and clothing comply with the following board standards.

- 1. For sanitary and safety reasons and in accordance with State health regulations, all students are required to wear shoes/footwear to school. Specific footwear may be required for certain courses/classes. Slippers or bedroom shoes are prohibited.
- 2. Dress for special school sponsored activities that occur outside the regular school

day may be determined and regulated at the discretion of the principal.

3. Sunglasses, hats, hoods, and other headgear including kerchiefs, bandanas, and rags may not be worn inside

Jewelry and visible tattooing must not promote illegal drug, alcohol tobacco or be use provocative. obscene or substantially disruptive. Jewelry cannot include any



as a weapon like spikes and

items that can be used

on like spikes and chains attaching piercings.

5. Cloth-

ing which

promotes illegal drug, alcohol or tobacco use or is provocative, obscene or substantially disruptive is prohibited (for information on gang-related attire, see policy 4328, Gang-Related Activity).

6. Clothing that is torn, cut, sliced or shredded from the

Policy Code: 4316

neck to four inches above the knee is prohibited.

7. Garments for the lower body section must fall to at least four inches above the kneecap when the student is standing erect. These garments include dresses, skirts, shorts and any other appropriate apparel. These garments must fit snugly around the waist to eliminate sagging.

8. Garments for the upper body section must cover the upper torso. These garments include shirts, blouses and any other appropriate apparel. The bottom of any top must cover the waistband of the lower body garment so no skin is showing. Tank tops and sleeveless shirts must reach the edge of the shoulder and top of the arm.

9. All undergarments must

be covered at all times.

Before receiving disciplinary consequences, a student who is not in compliance with this policy or a school dress code will be given a reasonable period of time to make adjustments so that he or she will be in compliance. Disciplinary consequences for a student who fails to comply after being offered this opportunity shall be consistent with Section D of policy 4300, Student Behavior Policies. The superintendent or designee shall list in the Code of Student Conduct the specific range of consequences that may be imposed on a student for violation of the dress

Columbus County Schools has recognized Stephanie Hammond of West Columbus High School with the Everlene Davis Teacher of the Year Award for 2023–2024.

Jamie Faulk of East Columbus Jr.-Sr. High School was given the CCS Principal of the Year Award. Both selections were revealed during a dinner for about 50 people at the school system's central office Tuesday, June 13.

An advocate

"I will make you proud," Hammond said after accepting the award in front of the school board, fellow nominees, family members and administrators. She described herself as feeling "so humbled, and so honored"

Hammond teaches honors chemistry and physical science at WCHS and has also taught middle school language arts. She has taught in Columbus County since 2018 and was employed at Southeastern Community College before that. One thing Hammond appreciates about her work is that, "Columbus County Schools supports me in being an advocate for my students," she told *The News Reporter*. "As an advocate, I am committed to equipping my students with the knowledge and skills that will assist them in developing strong and authentic personal voices."

Speaking from experience

Faulk describes the job of a teacher in similar terms. 
"I'm honored and privileged to represent Columbus County Schools as principal of the year," Faulk said.
