In their first days on the job, Columbus new Schools County Superintendent Deanne Meadows and Whiteville City Schools Superintendent Marc Whichard both expressed a desire to become well acquainted with their school systems' teachprincipals and board members so they can collaborate achieve quality education for students. In a short interview while moving in at his new office, Whichard named filling teaching vacancies as his top priority during his first weeks in Whiteville. Whichard hoped to obtain "high quality talent" to complement Whiteville City Schools' already "strong instructional staff," he said.

"The earlier in the summer months you can fill vacancies," he said, "typically, the higher quality candidates we're able to find."

Meanwhile, he said he would be making himself "as visible as possible" in the area, "introducing myself and listening, hearing what the community has to job, he said, "It's a commu-

of Education introduced Whichard as their unanimous choice for superintendent at a public meeting and reception June 3.

Whichard left a position as associate superintendent and athletic director of Edgecombe County Schools to lead Whiteville's 2,215 students in five schools.

During his nearly 21 years in education, Whichard has taught English and history and for a time was Edgecombe County's lead principal, providing assistance to less experienced administrators. The Tarboro-based Edgecombe County system has 5,853 students in 14 schools, including four high schools. (All student number statistics are from the N.C. Department of Public Instruction website, ncreportcards.ondemand.sas.com.)

Whiteville's small-town warmth and tradition of academic and athletic achievement were factors that attracted Whichard to the WCS

found that atmosphere "very inspiring."

Whichard said he looked forward to getting to know Meadows and other county

educators, and generally "becoming part of the fabric" of the community.

The Columbus County Board of Education voted unanimouslv June 10 to make Meadows head of the 5,598-student school system. She previously served as assistant superintendent of Brunswick County Schools and taught

> high school math. In her early teaching years, she coached girls' basketball.

Community members met the new superintendent during well-attended reception at the county schools' central offices.

Meadows took a couple of minutes during the event to speak with The News Reporter about

her new duties.

"Student performance has to be most important," Meadows said when asked about her highest immediate priorities.

Before school begins, said Meadows, she plans to confer with county principals to set mutual goals for continued improvement, and she wants to build relationships with other community members to provide a strong, supportive environment for all students.

"We really want to have a great start to the school year," she said.

She praised the collaborative spirit she had observed already. "So far everybody that I've met is just excellent," said Meadows. "They just have a desire to have excellent schools in Columbus County...I haven't met a person yet who didn't want that to happen."

She said she looks forward to becoming acquainted with Whichard as soon as their busy schedules allow: "He and I both probably are a little swamped right now, just trying to get to know everybody within our own school systems," she said, "but we will absolutely get together and get to know each other."







CITY STUDENTS DRESS CODE

The Whiteville City Board of Education believes a safe and disciplined learning environment is the first requirement of a high performing school. The implementation of school uniforms will help minimize disruptive behavior, promote respect for oneself and others, build school/community spirit, and, more significantly, help to maintain high academic standards by enhancing the instructional program. The wearing of uniforms will promote the quick identification of intruders on campus. Uniforms will also allow students to focus more acutely on learning by eliminating the distractions of fashion and style. School administration will enforce the policy to ensure the safety of the students and compliance with the dress code policy set forth by the Whiteville City Schools Board of Education.

A. IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS

Students will be required to start wearing uniforms at the beginning of the 2009-10 school year.

B. INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

School officials will communicate information concerning the uniform policy to students, parents, teachers, and the community. This information will include general guidelines for implementation and will be achieved by using one or more of the following: newsletters, parent forums, PTA meetings, School Improvement Team meetings, TV and radio announcements, newspaper, Whiteville City Schools social media, phone, flyers, and posters.

C. GENERAL STUDENT APPEARANCE

In addition to being required to wear school uniforms, all students are to be groomed and dressed appropriately for school and school activities. A student's dress and/or appearance shall:

- 1. Support, not disrupt, the learning environment;
- 2. Constitute no threat to health or safety;

3. Be tasteful and unable to be construed as provocative or obscene:

4. Reflect practices of good hygiene and cleanliness.

D. RELIGIOUS BELIEFS -MEDICAL REASONS

Reasonable consideration shall be made for those students who, because of a sincerely held religious belief or medical reason, request a waiver of a particular guideline for dress or appearance. The waiver request shall be made in writing from the parent or guardian and approved by the principal. In considering a waiver request, the principal may request additional documentation from medical officials and/or religious leaders.

E. SPECIAL ACTIVITY ACCOMMODATIONS

Reasonable accommodation shall be made by the principal for students involved in special duties, activities, or projects approved by the school. This may include, but is not limited to athletics, career and technical education, physical education classes, special events, or any other activities that require non-conforming dress on a school campus during a school-sponsored event. In the case of athletics, this includes "spirit-wear" (e.g., Wolfpack t-shirts or athletic team shirts) which shall be worn over regulation uniform shirts/blouses.

F. FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Parents and/or guardians who have concerns about the affordability of a school uniform should contact the principal. The principal and/or school social worker will assist the family with identifying community resources that may be able to help procure the required school uniforms. The school system will not be re-

sponsible for funding uniforms for any students.

G. SCHOOL UNIFORM

The principal will implement the school uniform and appearance policy in a manner that is age and developmentally appropriate. Good judgment in considering issues such as age, developmental stages, and body type are expected of all students, parents, and guardians in the selection of school attire and appearance. The manner of a student's wear of the school uniform shall be neat, clean, properly fitted, ageappropriate and suitable for the learning environment.

- d. Shirts must be appropriately sized.
- e. Shirts shall be long enough to cover the midriff when sitting or standing. Shirts must cover the chest and back so the chest and the back of the body are not exposed.
- f. Undergarments may not be visible at any time. However, students may wear plain white or school color T-shirts under shirts which may be visible at the neckline of the collar.

g. See-through or mesh tops that will reveal the body or will reveal undergarments are prohibited.

h. Clothing shall be worn appropriately (not inside-out or backwards; no rolled up pant legs, etc.) at all times.

2. LIGHT-

WEIGHT JACK-ETS/COATS/OVER-COATS

permitted, but hoods may not be worn in the building as this is considered headgear.

3. DRESS PANTS, SHORTS, SKORTS, JUMPERS, CAPRI LENGTH PANTS, DRESSES

- a. Solid khaki, dark navy, or black are the only permissible colors for these uniform items.
- b. No denim material or rivets allowed on pants.
- c. Must be free of graphics and embroidery. With the exception of small labels, they may not have insignias, logos,

words, or pictures.

Policy Code: 4316

- d. Shorts, skirts, skorts and jumpers shall be modest and of sufficient length of no more than four (4) inches above the knee.
- e. No pants or shorts with enlarged pockets. Pockets must not be of the "cargo" type and must not include zippers, buttons, Velcro closures, straps, or snaps. Pants are limited to no more than two front and two rear pockets. Watch pockets are not considered a pocket.
- f. Clothing must be appropriately sized. No baggy or sagging pants or shorts are allowed. No "low rise" clothing is allowed. Pants must not be worn with the waistband below the hipbone. Joggers are not permitted as uniform attire.
- g. Garments cannot have frays and must be hemmed and not dragging the floor.
- h. Garments that do not fit properly will not be tolerated, including oversized, undersized, and skintight garments. Form-fitting spandex material, nylon, denim, corduroy, and sweat pants are prohibited (including leggings and "jeggings").
- 1. Pants must have zippers, buttons or snaps with the exception of Pre-K through Grade 2 students.
- J. Skirts are limited to no more than four pockets.
- k. Garments may not have more than two slits and the slits cannot exceed four inches above the knee.
- I. Capri pants are allowed but cannot be hip huggers, cannot be skin tight, and the manufactured slit at the bottom of the Capri pant cannot be above the knee.
- m. Pants may not have a slit that exceeds four inches from the bottom of the pant leg.
- n. Pants may not be rolled up in a cuff to simulate Capri pants or shorts.
- o. One-piece jump suits are not allowed.

4. BELTS

- a. Students in grades 3 through 12 must wear belts if the garment was manufactured with belt loops. Belts must be with a plain belt buckle that is not over two inches. All belts must be appropriately buckled.
- b. Pre-K through Grade 5 students are not required to wear
- c. Graphics, metal decorations (spikes and studs), or labels are unacceptable on all belts and belt buckles.
- d. Belts must be an appropriate length and not hang below the straddle.

5. SHOES

- a. Shoes shall be worn at all times. As needed, shoes shall conform to special class requirements such as P.E. classes, JROTC, science labs, and any other classes as deemed necessary by the teacher and the principal.
- b. Shoes and boots that have laces shall be laced and tied.
- c. No bedroom shoes shall be allowed.
- d. "Flip-flop" style shoes or "athletic slides" are not allowed. Sandals with a back are permitted in Grades K-2. Sandals in Grades 3- I 2 are at administrative discretion.
- e. Shoes may not be altered in any way from the manufactured design, style, or functionality.
- f. Shoelaces must match, and any straps must be secured.
- g. Knee-high boots that lace up over the pant leg are prohibited.
- h. Shoes with spiked heels are prohibited.

6. SOCKS

- a. Both socks must match.
- b. Socks must be worn in a manner that does not undermine the integrity of the uniform.
- c. Socks must be one solid
- d. Socks may not be worn over pant legs.
- e. Students may wear solid colored panty hose, tights, or knee-high stockings.

7. JEWELRY

a. Students may not wear large pendants or medallions. Jewelry designed to be worn around the neck must be

worn beneath the shirt/blouse of the uniform at all times.

- b. No adornment is allowed that reasonably could be perceived as, or used as, a weapon. This includes, but is not limited to chains, spikes, and certain belt buckles.
- c. Only school activity buttons, approved by the principal are permitted to be worn on a student's school uniform, purse, book bag, or any other article of clothing or personal article.
- d. Heavy chains, spiked accessories, excessively large earrings or other heavy jewelry are not allowed.

8. HATS/SUNGLASSES/ **HEADGEAR**

- a. Neither headwear nor sunglasses shall be worn inside school buildings. Head sweatbands are considered headwear for purposes of this school uniform policy.
- b. No bandanas shall be allowed as an article of clothing and shall not be in the possession of any student. Bandanas will be confiscated and may be submitted to law enforcement officials as possible evidence of gang-related activity. School officials will not return bandanas or other items that may be determined to have gang-related purposes upon confiscation.
- c. Hats, do-rags, skull caps, scarves, sweat bands, head bands or other items that may be seen as a disruption to the school setting are prohibited in school during the regular school day.

9. OTHER CLOTHING ITEMS OR ACCESSORIES

- a. No gang-related clothing. accessories, symbols or intimidating manner of dress, as identified by local law enforcement agencies, are allowed.
- b. Clothing shall not promote alcohol, tobacco, or drug use.

10. OTHER UNIFORM RE-**QUIREMENTS**

- a. Students are expected to be dressed in compliance with the standards for uniforms as established by this policy at all times while school is in ses
 - b. Students who are taking

classes that require a special dress code (such as JROTC or career and technical education internships) may wear that uniform to other classes.

c. Students who are issued uniforms by the school which are used to represent the school in athletic contests approved by the Principal or other school sponsored activities may be allowed to wear team uniforms

as directed by coaches.

11. PERSONAL **APPEARANCE**

a. Combs and other hair grooming items cannot be visi-

ble in the hair.

- b. Piercings cannot present a health hazard or cause a disruption to the school environment.
- c. No visible tattoos.

12. MISCEL-**LANEOUS**

a. Any item that is worn to school must not undermine the integrity of the Uniform Policy, serve as disruption to the educational process, or present a health hazard to an individual or his/her peers.

H. EN-FORCE-MENT

The Principal shall that ensure the policy is enforced in consistent а manner and require the student and the student's parent or guardian to take appropriate action to remedy situdeterations

mined to be in conflict with this policy. Disciplinary action shall be taken for violation of the School Uniform Policy in accordance with the Violations & Consequence section of the Whiteville City Schools Parent/Student Information Guide. Appropriate disciplinary actions for violations shall include the following:

First Offense:

A first offense shall be considered a Level I violation of the Parent/Student Information Guide. Students shall be informed that they have violated the policy. They shall be given the opportunity to change into acceptable clothing by using available clothes at school or by calling a parent/guardian to bring clothes. Parents must be informed in writing of the violation.

Second Offense:

A second infraction of the policy shall be considered a Level II violation of the Parent/Student Information Guide and consequences shall be within the scope of that document. These may include up to assignment to the Re-Direct Center. Parents must be informed in writing of the violation.

Third (and additional) Offenses:

A third infraction of the uniform policy shall be considered a Level III violation of the Parent/Student Information Guide and consequences shall be within the scope of that document. These may include up to referral to the Alternative Learning Program. Parents must be informed in writing of the violation.

Disciplinary action may vary when a student has a record of other student conduct violations during the current school year. Students who do not comply with the School Uniform Policy also may be excluded from participating in certain school programs, including graduation ceremonies. Copies of the School Uniform Policy shall be made available to students and parents.

Students new to Whiteville City Schools shall be given a two-week grace period from the date of enrollment to obtain and wear the proper school uniforms.

I. ANNUAL REVIEW

This policy may be reviewed annually and revised as necessary by the Board of Education.



Below are 2 aerial photos showing the car students and bus students drop offs and pickups at each school. This will change as the construction progresses. We will keep you informed.



BEMC accepting applications for 2019 Bright Ideas Grants

Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation (BEMC) is now accepting applications for the 2019 Bright Ideas education grant program, marking 25 years of funding innovative classroom projects.

Twenty-five years ago a BEMC employee encountered a school teacher purchasing school supplies for her students with her own money. This encounter sparked the idea for Bright Ideas and over time, 26 electric cooperatives across the state of North Carolina adopted the annual grant program.

"The program has evolved over time with an emphasis placed on innovation, but even today we find teachers applying for grants to cover additional school supplies for their students," said Josh Winslow, CEO and general manager of BEMC. "We're pleased to be able to help fund the educational needs of area students through a wide array of projects."

North Carolina's electric cooperatives have funded education projects to the tune of more than \$12.2 million in grant funding across the state. Locally, BEMC has provided 426 grants totaling more than \$617,000 to K-12 classrooms across Brunswick and Columbus counties

Grant funds have been used to purchase items such as basic school supplies, Chrome-

books, materials for robotics programs and band instruments. Some of the most unique grants provided in the past include a Vietnam Veteran's history project and a batterypowered electric go-kart project.

Fred Mason, a teacher at Columbus Career and College Academy, has received several Bright Ideas grants in past years for his masonry program. He has purchased professional quality levels to help his students compete at the state level and has incorporated technology into his curriculum with the help of Bright Ideas grants.

"The computers we applied for were to help our students get OSHA certified and this year, every student in the program received OSHA certification. We have also won several competitions using the levels we purchased with our Bright Ideas grant," said Mason. "Bright Ideas elevated our program and I would urge everyone to apply for a grant."

The deadline to apply for a 2019 BEMC Bright Ideas grant is Sept. 23. However, teachers who submit an application by Aug. 15 will be entered into the Early Bird drawing for a \$100 Visa gift card. To learn more about this program or to apply for a grant, visit ncbrightideas.com.





COUNTY STUDENTS DRESS CODE

1. Shirts:

Colors: White and the two other colors designated for the particular school by the School Uniform Committee

- Shirts must have buttons only.
- Shirts must be collared (turtlenecks are permitted).
- Shirts must be of a solid color.
- Shirts must have sleeves they may be long-sleeved, short-sleeved or ¾ sleeved.
- Shirts must be free of labels, graphics or insignias of any kind except for the school insignia.
- Shirts must be worn tucked in.
- Midriffs and undergarments cannot be visible and visible cleavage should be minimized. However, students may wear plain white or school color Tshirts under shirts which may be visible at the neckline of the collar.
- Form-fitting spandex material, nylon, denim and seethrough or mesh tops are prohibited.

2. Pants/Capris

Colors: Solid Khaki or Solid Navy Blue or Solid Black

- Pants must have no more than 4 pockets (no cargo pants).
- No over-sized, under-sized or tight-fitting pants.
- Pants must be worn above the hips at all times (no sagging).
- Pants cannot have frays and must be hemmed and not dragging the floor.
- Undergarments cannot be visible
- Form-fitting spandex material, nylon, denim, blue jeans and sweat pants are prohibited.
- Pants must be free of labels, graphics or insignias of any kind.
- Pants cannot be rolled up to simulate capri pants.
- Pants cannot have a slit that exceeds four inches from the bottom of the pant leg.
- Capri pants cannot have a slit that goes above the knee.

3. Skirts/Jumpers/Dresses/Shorts/Skorts

Colors: Solid Khaki, Solid Navy Blue, or Solid Black

- Must be no shorter than four inches above the knee.
- Form fitting spandex material, nylon, and denim are prohibited.
- Must be free of labels, graphics or insignias of any kind.
 - · No more than four pockets.
- Garments cannot have more than two slits and the slits cannot exceed four inches above the knee.
- Undergarments must not be visible.
- One piece jumpsuits are not allowed.

4. Belts

- Student must wear belts if the garment was manufactured with belt loops; belts must be worn within the belt loops.
- Belts must be black or brown
- Graphic belts with metal decorations (grommets and studs) are prohibited.
- Belts must be an appropriate length and not hang below the belt loops.

5. Socks

- Both socks must match.
- Socks must be worn in a manner that does not undermine the integrity of the uniform.
- Socks must be white, black, brown, khaki or navy.
- Socks may not be worn over the pant legs.

6. Shoes/Footwear

- Shoes/footwear must be worn at all times.
- Shoe laces, if any, must be tied at all times and must be not dragging on the floor.
- Shoe laces, if any, must be white, black or match the color of the shoes.
- Both shoe laces must match and only one lace per shoe.
- Bedroom shoes, slippers, flip flops, shower shoes and spike heels are prohibited.
- Boots may not be worn over the pant leg.
- Sandals (except flip flops) and shoes with velcro are acceptable shoes.

7. Hats, Sunglasses, Headgear, Hoods, Outerwear

- Kerchiefs, skull caps, sweatbands, do-rags or other items that may be seen as a disruption to the school setting are prohibited.
- No bandanas shall be allowed as an article of clothing and shall not be in the possession of any student. Bandanas will be confiscated and may be submitted to law enforcement officials as possible evidence of gang-related activity.
- No hoods may be worn in buildings.
- Only school color/affiliated sweat shirts and pullovers are permissible.
- Overcoats (heavy weight coats) must be removed when entering the building and are not allowed to be worn inside.

8. Jewelry

• No jewelry or any other article affixed to a student's nose, tongue, lips, cheek,

eyebrow, or any other visible part of the body, with the exception of the ears is permissible.

- No articles promoting alcoholic beverages, tobacco, or the use of controlled substances, depict violence, or be of a sexual or disruptive nature are permissible.
- All body art (tattoos) must be covered.
- No large pendants or medallions are permissible.
- No adornment is allowed that reasonably could be perceived as, or used as, a weapon, including, but not limited to chains, spikes and large belt buckles (wider than the belt).

9. Other Uniform Dress Requirements

- No gang-related clothing, accessories, symbols or intimidating manner of dress, as identified by local law enforcement agencies, are allowed.
- No layering of shirts or pants (undergarments and one shirt/pant is allowed).
- Students are expected to be dressed in compliance with the standards for uniforms as established by this policy at all times school is in session.
- Students who are issued uniforms by the school which

- are used to represent the school in athletic contests approved by the principal or other school sponsored activities may be allowed to wear such uniforms at the discretion of the principal.
- Reasonable accommodations shall be made by the principal for students involved in special duties, activities, or projects approved by the school. This may include, but is not limited to athletics, career and technical education, physical education classes, JROTC, special events, or any other activities that require non-conforming dress on a school campus during a school-sponsored event.

10. School Spirit day

School spirit T-Shirt day left to the discretion of the principal.

- Garments cannot have more than two slits and the slits cannot exceed four inches above the knee.
- Undergarments must not be visible.
- One piece jumpsuits are not allowed.

Statewide school safety anonymous reporting system launches

N.C. State Superintendent Mark Johnson announced in May that the state education agency has contracted with Sandy Hook Promise (SHP) to provide a statewide Say Something Anonymous Reporting System in the 2019-20 school year. The Say Something program, including an anonymous mobile tip app, is a school safety program designed to change and save lives by teaching students, educators, and administrators how to recognize the signs and signals of those who may be at risk of hurting themselves or others and to anonymously report

this information through the mobile tip app, the website or the telephone crisis hotline.

"Students play a critical role in helping to keep schools safe," Johnson said. "They may see and hear concerns that adults need to know about but may be reluctant to report it. With the Say Something program, middle and high school students will better understand what warning signs to look for and when and how to report important tips through an app. Making this app available will be an important part of our efforts to make schools safer." "We are proud and eager to work with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruc-

tion to train students across the state to 'know the signs' of potential violence and report them to a trusted adult via the Say Something Anonymous Reporting System," said Nicole Hockley, co-founder and managing director of Sandy Hook Promise, and mother of Dylan, who was killed in the Sandy Hook Elementary School tragedy. "With these comprehensive

violence prevention systems in place, North Carolina schools will be safer, protecting millions of lives and empowering youth to be upstanders in their communities."

Through the Say Something program, students, parents, educators and others can download the app and share school safety concerns with school administrators and school resource officers at schools, who will respond appropriately. More than 5,100 schools nationwide are currently using San-

dy Hook Promise's anon-

five school districts in 2015 and 2016. In that pilot, the center received tips related to bullying (39 percent), danger (25 percent), drugs (24 percent), weapons (5 percent), fighting (5 percent); and underage drinking (2 percent). In 2018, the North Carolina General Assembly included development of a statewide app in the 2018-19 budget bill. Tips can be sent in via web, a phone hotline, or through the

p o r t i n g system. North Carolina will be the second statewide partnership for Sandy Hook Promise, with implementation of an anonymous reporting system that will encourage student participation in protecting themselves and their peers. (Pennsylvania began using the anonymous reporting platform in January.)

The North Carolina Center for Safer Schools, part of the Department of Public Instruction, piloted an app in

ing photos videos. A crisis center staffed 24/7 by trained counselors will triage, categorize and deliver tip information. Tips will be categorized as either "life safety" or "non-life safety" based on the incident and information the school-based teams provide. The Crisis Center will notify school-based representatives after hours when tips are life threatening and, in cases of imminent threat, contact local 911 dispatch. Johnson said he believes that Sandy Hook Promise's strong emphasis on training is key to a successful program. Say Something trains students, teachers and school administrators how to recognize warning signs and signals of individuals who may be a threat to themselves or others and to "say something" to a trusted adult or use the anonymous reporting system.

Training will be provided not only for educators, but also for law enforcement

agencies. The Sandy Hook
