

Early voting underway for municipal races Here's what you need to know

Early voting today begins in Columbus County for the 2023 municipal elections.

Election Day is Nov. 7.

This year, voters will head into the polling booths to pick their preferred candidates to represent them at the local level. On the ballot this year are over 40 candidates competing for town council and mayoral seats across nine Columbus County towns.

Some races are uncontested, with the sole candidate almost guaranteed to win in November. Others, however, have five candidates jostling each other for two or three seats up for election.

During the early voting period (from Oct. 19 to Nov. 4), citizens can register and vote at the same time in a "one-stop" process. There will be no one-stop option to register and vote on Election Day, however. The deadline to register to vote on Election Day was Oct. 13.

Here's what you need to know to be prepared to vote this year.

Where and when you can vote early

For the 2023 municipal election this year, only one location is open for the two-week one-stop early voting period: The Columbus County Board of Elections.

The elections office is located at 2586 James B. White Hwy. Building B in Whiteville.

Voters can stop by the elections office during the dates and times listed below to cast their ballots in advance of Election Day.

How to find our precinct location, sample ballot

Not sure who's on the ballot for your town this year? Or where you're supposed to go to vote on Election Day? The North Carolina State Board of Elections has an online portal you can use to find out both.

Go to ncsbe.gov/voting/sample-ballot.

On that page, find and click the "Launch the Voter Search" button. On the following page, fill out your personal information, including your name, date of birth and county of residence for the most accurate results. Once complete, click the "Search" button.

Then, you'll be taken to another page with corresponding search results. Find your full legal name and make sure that your city, state and zip code

correspond with your place of residence.

Click on the hyperlinked name in blue that corresponds with your personal information. A new page will appear.

On this page you can find your designated voting precinct. Search for the "Your voting locations" section, located about halfway down the page. There, you can find your precinct name, the name of the organization hosting the polling as well as its address.

To find your sample ballot, look immediately below the "Your voting locations" section to find the "Your sample ballot" section. Beneath the section header, you should see a column that reads "Election" and beneath that it should list the date of the Nov. 7 municipal election this year. To the right of that date, you should see a column that reads "Your Sample Ballot(s)"

You should see a hyperlinked letter followed by a series of numbers — for instance, V0006. Click the hyperlink to view the same ballot you'll see in the polling booth, complete with each race you can participate in and each of the candidates' names for said races. The state elections board website notes that, "If this section is blank, you do not have any upcoming elections in your jurisdiction for the current year.'

Election Day

If you plan to vote on Election Day, arrive at your

designated polling place on Nov. 7 between 6:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. All polling places open in Columbus County on Election Day are listed as follows:

• Cerro Gordo Precinct: Cerro Gordo Town Hall, located at 84 Cherry St., Cerro Gordo;

 Cherry Bluff Precinct: Fair Bluff Fire and Rescue Department, located at 152 Main St., Fair Bluff;

• Waccamaw Precinct: Lake Waccamaw Fire Department, located at 203 Flemington Dr., Lake Waccamaw;

• Ransom Precinct: Ransom Event Center, located at 2696 General Howe Hwy., Riegelwood;

• South Whiteville Precinct: Abundant Life Church Fellowship Hall, located at 5384 James B. White Hwy., S., Whiteville;

• South Williams Precinct: Tabor City Courthouse, located at 110 W. 4th St., Tabor City;

• Whiteville 1 Precinct: Whiteville Rescue Unit Building, located at 106 Flowers Pridgen Dr., Whiteville; and

• Whiteville 2 Precinct: Vineland Station Depot, located at 701 E. Main St., Whiteville.

If your polling place is not listed here, there is no candidate running in your precinct.

Voter ID

This year, voters will be required to present a valid photo ID before casting their ballots. The state elections board website offers guidance about which forms of ID you can use.

According to the website, any of the following

forms of identification can be used if it is unexpired or has been expired for one year or less:

North Carolina driver's license;

• State ID from the N.C. Department of Motor Vehicles (also called "nonoperator ID"):

• Driver's license or non-driver ID from another state, District of Columbia, or U.S. territory (only if voter registered in North Carolina within 90 days of the election);

• U.S. Passport or U.S. Passport card;

• North Carolina voter photo ID card issued by a county board of elections;

• College or university student ID approved by the state elections board; or

• State or local government or charter school employee ID approved by the state elections board.

Additionally, the state elections board notes, any of the following IDs can be used regardless of whether the ID contains an expiration or issuance date:


• Military or veterans ID card (with photo) issued by the U.S. government;

• Tribal enrollment card (with photo) issued by a tribe recognized by the state or federal government; or

• ID card (with photo) issued by an agency of the U.S. government or the State of North Carolina for a public assistance program.

The state elections board notes that a voter aged 65 years old or older may use an expired form of acceptable ID if the ID was unexpired on their 65th birthday.





Whiteville has aging water and sewer lines that are the original lines that were installed years ago. These lines have more than past their life expectancy. The process of replacing these lines is extremely expensive and finding funds to carry out these projects is a challenge. The city has adopted a study which has identified critical areas. Water and sewer is an issue that affects every citizen and business so it is necessary that it remains near the top of the list. There are numerous other challenges the city faces but these are probably the most pressing.
