County Fair time in promises a good time for all age groups

It's County Fair time, and the Columbus County Agriculture Fair will open Tuesday, Oct. 9 with a parade through downtown Whiteville, beginning at 3:30 p.m.

Fairgrounds will open at 5 p.m., with Throwback Tuesday offering a special admission price of only \$2. Plus, children younger than 5 years old and veterans with proper identification will be admitted free on opening day.

The annual hat and pumpkin competitions will be held on the main stage at 6 p.m., with prizes to be awarded to the winners. Hats should be decorated in a farm theme, so gather up some vegetables, pecans, peanuts, flowers or other enticing items to put on your hats. Prizes will be awarded to the winners.

Get creative with your pumpkin entries, as the competition is fierce for this event. Carve it, paint it or come up with original and special ways to impress the judges, as they'll award prizes to the winners.

The Columbus County Sheriff's Office Honor Guard will be in charge of the flag raising ceremony will be at 6:25 p.m., followed by spelling bees for third, fourth and fifth graders.

The midway, with exciting rides provided by Dreamland Amusements, will light up early every evening to provide exciting rides, games and other events. Nightly entertainment will include Bob Bohm Magic, comedy, Farmily Feud, Anastasini, Flimsey the Clown, Disney Princess and local entertainment.

Wednesday

Gates will open Wednesday at 11 a.m. for Special Friends Day, beginning at 11 a.m., followed by Senior Citizens Day at 1 p.m., both stage events with special entertainment and participation by Special Friends and Seniors. Gates will open to the public at 5 p.m. Farmily Feud will be held on Stage 2 at 5 p.m.

The exciting Children's Tractor Pull will be held on Stage 1 at 5:15 p.m. This is a week-long event, with nightly winners competing to determine who the real champions are on closing day. Another

special event, the Diaper Derby, will be held on Stage 1, with registration scheduled for 5:45 p.m., followed by the Derby itself at 6 p.m.

Flimsey the Clown, a County Fair favorite for many years, will be back again this year and will entertain at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday. Spelling bees for grades 6, 7 and 8 will begin at 6:45 p.m. and the local Honey Don't Band will perform on Stage 1 at 8:30 p.m.



Half Price Thursday

Gates open at 3 p.m. Thursday for the general public, but Kindergarten Day will be Thursday. Students will come in on school buses and they will have the fairgrounds to themselves for awhile. This was an idea contributed by the late Jimmy Ferguson, and it has proven to be one of the most popular events. The little people have been able to get up close and personal with cows and have even squeezed a few drops of milk from them, a special treat for kids who didn't grow up on the farm. The kindergarteners also enjoy going through the livestock barn to see horses, pigs, chickens, ducks and other animals.

Thursday is also half price night, sponsored by Brunswick Electric Membership Corp, with a discounted admission charge of only \$4, and armbands for rides only \$14. Dancing with a Princess will take place on Stage 2 at 5 p.m., Shades of Gray at 6 p.m., Flimsey the Clown at 6:45 p.m. and Shades of Gray again at 7 p.m.

The famous beach music Band of Oz will perform at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, and nightly entertainment will continue, including Dreamland Amusements on the midway, Bob Bohm Magic, comedy, Farmily Feud, Anastasini, Flimsey the Clown, Disney Princess and local entertainment finishing out the evening.

Gates open Friday at 3 p.m. with entertainment on Stage 1 from 5 p.m. until 7 p.m. when the local talent competition for Division 1 will be held for ages 6 and younger, and ages 7 to 12 for Division 2. Entertain-



ment to be announced will be held on Stage 1 at 8:30 p.m. and will close out with nightly entertainment including Dreamland Amusements, Bob Bohm Magic, comedy, Farmly Feud, Anastasini, Flimsey the Clown, Disney Princess and local entertainment.

Saturday

Gates open Saturday at 3 p.m. The children's tractor pull registration will be held on Stage 1 at 3 p.m., with the tractor pull to follow. A Columbus County Schools performing arts program will be held on Stage 2 at 3:30 p.m. and children's arts and crafts

will be displayed in the Evelyn Rabon Exhibit Hall. Flimsey the Clown will perform on Stage 1 at 4 p.m. and at 8:15 p.m. The talent competition will continue on Stage 1 at 5:30 p.m. for ages 13-15 and ages 16 and older.

Southern Just Us will perform on Stage 1 at 7:30 p.m. and Flimsy the Clown will take the stage at 8:15 p.m. The usual late night entertainment will close out the evening.

Carload Sunday

Sunday was not the best day for the County Fair several years ago, but someone came up with an idea that has brought a lot more people to the fair on Sunday afternoons. Carload Sunday has been good for the fair and good for those attending. Each carload, packed with as many people as the car will hold, gets in the gate for \$30, including armbands. 

Fair licensed, rides inspected

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair is approved and licensed by the N.C. Department of Agriculture and is a member of the N.C. Association of Agriculture Fairs and International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

Midway rides, provided by Dreamland Amusements, are inspected by the N.C. Department of Labor.

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair began in 1980, 50 years after the last County Fair had been held in Columbus County. It was a project of the Columbus County Law Enforcement Officers Association. The first fair was completely dependent upon big circus tents, but as time passed nice buildings were built to house the commercial and educational booths, livestock barn and food stand. In more recent years an old building was remodeled to serve as the fair's office building.

Early on, the fair board asked the public to help give the fair a suitable motto, and a contest was held. The fair board liked "It's A Family A-Fair," so that became the motto.

Several years ago the fair called on the public again to choose a name for the fair's mascot, a gigantic fiberglass rooster who stood sentinel on the fairgrounds. "Fearless Fair-ley" was the name chosen by the fair board.





Dreamland provides rides that winter in the county





The Columbus County Agriculture Fair board has dedicated its 2018 fair book to William Sibbett, who recently retired after working with the Columbus County Sheriff's Office for 45 years.

Co-workers described him as Mr. Law Enforcement, stating that he probably knew more about the workings of the Sheriff's Office than anyone. He began working at what was then the County Police Department in 1973 through the CETA (Comprehensiive Employment and Training Act), a federal program started in 1973 to train workers in public service. With service under Chief Jesse Barker of the County Police, he has worked under seven sheriffs — Clayton Norton, Bill Rhodes, Henry Rowan, Harold Raines, Jimmy Ferguson, Chris Batten and current

Sheriff Lewis Hatcher.

William contracted polio when he was six months old. He was scheduled for a polio vaccine on a Monday, and came down with the malady that affected so many of his generation during the previous weekend. However, he adjusted to this adverse condition and it never interfered with his ability to work hard, always with a pleasant demeanor. He not only adapted to the condition that required him to use crutches. but he excelled and was the "go to" man when his co-workers needed an answer to their questions.


"I always loved my job and I enjoyed meeting and helping people and discussing papers with the officers," he said. "I've never let my handicap slow me down."

William has played a big role

in the County Fair, always part of a tem of dedicated volunteers who tirelessly to help assure that the County Fair was going to be a success. He has greeted generations of families at the ticket booth with a hello and a smile.

William is the proud husband of wife Tina and their three children, Bonnie Jean, Jason and Shawn. They reside in the Sellerstown community where he is enjoying retirement in his wood-working shop and traveling.

Demo derby Friday, Saturday nights



One of the most popular and exciting events at the County Fair is the Demolition Derby, held annually on Friday and Saturday nights, beginning at 7 p.m.

Registration will be from 4 to 6:30 p.m. at the track, and there are no registration fees. There are four classes of vehicles, 4-cylinder class (small car), 6-cylinder class (up to 3500 lbs.), 8-cylinder class (3501 lbs. & up) and pro class (any cylinder).

4-cylinder class, 6-cylinder class and 8-cylinder class

- 1. Any stock hard top automobile or station wagon is allowed.
- 2. Safety belts and safety helmets with goggles or shield are required.
- 3. All glass must be removed except windshield. If windshield is removed a center bar is required.

- 4. All decorative chrome must be removed, door handles may be left on.
- 5. Gas tanks are to be inside of car, six gallon tanks (plastic or metal). Tanks must be properly secured and covered.

Original tanks must have holes punched in them and flushed clear of gas, or be removed from car.

- 6. No special bumpers, trailer hitches, reinforcements or added weight are allowed on any part of the vehicle. *Bumpers shocks can be removed and the bumper welded*.
- 7. Doors should be welded or chained. If welded, must be in 4-inch welds.
- 8. Trunks should be chained shut or welded by 4-inch welds. Hoods can use 5/8-inch bolt or chained. Tailgates of wagons should be chained or welded so as

not to open during heat.

- 9. All sun visors, windshield blades and headliners must be removed.
- 10. Fenders may be cut for wheel clearance only.
- 11. Batteries should be secured inside vehicle and covered with tarp or heavy material to prevent explo-
- 12. No solid white cars accepted!! Cars may be deco-

rated in any manner as long as it is in good taste.

"only" Driver's door should be painted "white" for derby number to be applied at registration. Numbers issued on first come first serve basis.

- 13. Tires filled with air "only".
- 14. Radiators must remain in their original position.
- 15. Drivers, "DO NOT"

leave vehicle unless instructed to do so by derby flagman!

Leaving vehicle is disqualification. "Stay with car until it has been removed from the track."

16. Any car catching fire that stops the event is automatically disqualified for that heat.

Demo Derby Pro Class Rules

- 1. Any stock hard top automobile or station wagon is allowed.
- 2. Safety belts and safety helmets with goggles or shield are required.
- 3. All glass must be removed except windshield. If windshield is removed a center bar is required.
- 4. All decorative chrome, must be removed, door handles may be left on.
- 5. Gas tanks are to be inside of car, six gallon tanks (plastic or metal). Tanks must be properly secured and covered.

Original tanks must have holes punched in them and flushed clear of gas, or be removed from car.

- 6. No trailer hitches, **bumpers can be removed and the bumper welded**.
- 7. Doors should be welded or chained, if welded must be in 4" welds.
- 8. Trunks should be chained shut or welded by 4" welds. Hoods can use 5/8 inch bolt or chained.

Tailgates of wagons should be chained or welded

so as not to open during heat.

- 9. All sun visors, windshield blades, and headliners must be removed.
- 10. Fenders may be cut for wheel clearance only. Height of vehicle must not be over (24 inches) from bottom of bumper to ground.
- 11. Batteries should be secured inside vehicle and covered with tarp or heavy material to prevent explosion.
- 12. No solid white cars accepted!! Cars may be decorated in any manner as long as it is in good taste.

Drivers door "only" should be painted "white" for derby number to be applied at registration.

Numbers on first come first serve basis.

- 13. Any size tires, four point role cage / bars are acceptable. No hump plates or kickers!!
- 14. Radiators must remain in their original position.
- 15. Drivers "DO NOT" leave vehicle unless instructed to do so by derby flagman!!

Leaving vehicle is disqualification "stay with car until it has been removed from the track".

- 16. Any car catching fire that stops the event is automatically disqualified for that heat
- 17. All cars must immediately stop at the sound of horn / light / or flagman.
- 18. All hoods & trunks must have a 12" in diameter hole cut for safety.
- 19. No larger than ¾ treaded bolts for chassis & body



Hat, pumpkin contests Tuesday

The first event of the Columbus County Agriculture Fair is the parade on Tuesday, at 3:30 p.m. but the first stage competition takes place on Tuesday night. That's when kids will take their hats decorated in agricultural themes and carved and decorated pumpkins will be judged.

Hats must be delivered to the main stage by 5:30 p.m. Tuesday to be eligible to compete, and they must be worn by the contestants in the competition parade. Go early, because entry forms must be filled out.

He was the board member who came up with the idea of having Kindergarten Day, allowing the students and their teachers to come to the fair on Tuesday morning before the crowds arrived in the afternoon. There was always a cow on the premises, and the students had an opportunity to get up close and personal with the cows. Some even got to squeeze a few drops of milk from the cow.


That was a special event for a lot of the students, as some had never seen a cow, much less get to milk one.

Ferguson also came up with the idea of choosing a "Pick of the Litter" baby from the Diaper Derby contestants. The choice had nothing to do with how well the babies performed on the "race track." The Pick of the Litter was chosen on how cute they were and/or how cute their clothing and actions were

Unfortunately, Ferguson died a few years ago, and in an emotional tribute to a fallen comrade, the Fair Board dedicated the Jimmy P. Ferguson Building at its annual appreciation dinner for volunteers in 2011. Fair Board President Danny Benton said Ferguson was a mentor for him, and had told him one day he would be president of the fair board.

"When Jimmy mentioned having Kindergarten Day, a lot of us thought he had lost his mind," said Bill Gore, a fair board member. "How could you get that many children from point A to Point B, to point C and D, feed them and get them on the bus back to school in time to go home?"

But Ferguson had his way, and Kindergarten Day has worked out for years. Ferguson has not been there but his presence was felt as children played, squealed with joy on the hay rides as well as the midway rides, and their eyes grow wide as they watched the "old timers" milk a cow. It was all Ferguson's dream and he was able to live with that dream, to witness and enjoy that experience with the kids for several years.









How to enter exhibits at the Columbus County Agriculture Fair

Exhibitor's Rules and Agreement

1. Exhibitor's entries will be accepted for registration at the Exhibit Building on Friday, Oct. 6 from noon – 4 p.m. and on Saturday, Oct. 7 from 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. No other entries will be accepted after 4 p.m. Saturday, Judging will be done Monday, Cakes will be accepted Monday, Oct. 10 at 9 a.m.

2. All articles must have been prepared, made or grown by the exhibitor within the last 12 months.

3. All entries must be registered with the clerks in charge of registration at the Exhibit Building. All exhibits on display must remain in the Exhibit Building throughout the fair week. Articles may be reclaimed by the owner (ticket holder) following the Fair on Monday, Oct. 16. Any article removed from the Exhibit Building before Sunday will forfeit any cash prize awarded to said article.

4. Exhibits will not be accepted by mail or public transportation.

5. Exhibitors must see to

the proper delivery of any article or livestock on the grounds and the proper care to the latter, as no charge for transportation of drayage will be paid by the Fair.

6. All entries will be numbered and recorded in the book of entry of the proper department. Entry tags will be issued, bearing entry number and exhibit number - tag to be attached to the exhibit and the stub retained by the

exhibitor and presented on Monday when the exhibit is called for. These claim checks are your proof that you have entered all your exhibits as required. There will be one set of categories in which there may be a youth and adult entry. The designation "Y" will be added to the letter category for youth.

7. Any and all articles judged by the registrar to be obnoxious or repulsive in

character will be forbidden entry, or, if entered without being fully known, shall be removed at once.

8. The right is reserved to place an exhibit in its proper class if it has been incorrectly entered.

9. All entries should be for the first premium of the premium number, under which they are entered, but failing to take the first shall compete for the second, if second

> is offered, but shall not be awarded more than one premium under the same number.

10. No article or animal will be entitled to space until the proper entry has been made. Space is limited. (All entries will be accepted in order of re-

ceipt until all available space is filled. In any case all entries must be received by the date specified under each department and when all space is filled, the management reserves the right to refuse entries, even if received before the specified date.

11. The management reserves the right to withhold premiums in any case in which it shall appear to them that the regulations have not been complied with, or that fraud has been practiced and anyone wanting to enter a complaint should do so in writing, not later than noon Tuesday.

12. Should any person misrepresent his/her exhibit and a premium be awarded upon it, such premium will be withheld by the management.

13. Payment of premiums awarded: Premiums will be paid by check at the end if the fair week. All checks are void after Nov. 15 Individuals assume the responsibility of claiming their checks at the exhibit building between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Monday, when exhibits are picked up.



It's a homemade straw broom, made of straw gathered from ditch banks or other places on the farm, and it won a blue ribbon and cash prize at an earlier County Fair.



Items such as the homemade straw broom are often seen at the County Fair, rekindling memories of years gone by for the older generations and teaching younger people what it was like in the old days.




The County Fair revives memories of yesteryear when people exhibit such things as a cornshuck mop, above. Grandparents should explain the old-timey items to their grandchildren.







1. The gates will open at 5 pm Tuesday through Wednesday; 3 p.m. Thursday through Saturday; and 1 p.m. Sunday

2. No automobiles or other vehicles will be allowed to service a booth, eating stands, shows or concessions after 2 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and after 11 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. No exhibitors' or workers' vehicle will be allowed inside the fair grounds after the gates open to the public. Any vehicle within the fair grounds after the opening of the gates to the public will be towed at the owner's expense.

- 3. All persons are requested to stay out of designated danger areas, as the fair will not be responsible for any accidents in these areas.
- 4. Vehicles of any type obstructing any passage or roadway on the fairgrounds shall be removed at the owner's expense. Any person or persons obstructing any passage or roadway on the fairgrounds will be asked to leave
