38th County Fair starts Tuesday

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair will kick off Tuesday, Oct. 10 with a 3:30 p.m. parade through downtown Whiteville. Fairgrounds will open to the public at 5 p.m. and Old MacDonald's Farm in the livestock building will be open.

Stage events get underway at 6 p.m. with the hat and pumpkin contests and the Columbus County Sheriff's Office Honor Guards will conduct a flag-raising ceremony at 6:25 p.m. A spelling bee for grades 3, 4 and 5 will begin at 6:30 p.m.

Outstanding entertainers are lined up to entertain nightly, some on stage and some on the midway. They include The Magic of Bob Bohm, Stardust Circus, Flimsy the Clown and lots of local entertainment.

Tuesday Parade

This will be the 38th year of the County Fair, but the 30th annual County Fair Parade. The parade officially opens the fair to the public. There will be a variety of farm and fair related units in addition to the traditional school, civic and political units, queens and princesses, tractors, unusual vehicles and much more at 3:30 p.m.

Units will be judged and the County Fair will pay \$50 for the first place units in four categories: best livestock unit, best row crop unit, best "other" unit and best dressed farm animal.

Gates open at the fairgrounds on Prison Camp Road at 5 p.m. A bounty of entertainment is planned throughout the week. Dreamland Amusements will provide carnival attractions and thrilling rides on the midway each night and Flimsy the Clown, who has been entertaining at the Columbus County Fair for many years, will be back to perform nightly, on stage and on the midway.

Three exhibit halls will have a variety of interesting and educational booths and a grand display of exhibits ranging from art and photography to canned goods, sewing, crafts and many other interesting displays.

Wednesday will be Special Friends Day for groups of mentally and physically challenged. They will have lunch and refreshments, ride some of the midway rides and enjoy Flimsy the Clown and other stage entertainment at 11 a.m.

Senior Day activities, including games and performances, will be held on the main stage beginning at 1 p.m.

County Fair Parade Marshal is Col. Gary Bass

The 38th production of the Columbus County Agriculture Fair kicks off Tuesday with the fair's 30th annual parade. It will begin at 3:30 p.m. after lining up on South Lee Street, turning left on Madison Street, proceeding through the downtown area, turning left on College Street and disassembling at Whiteville High School.

Fairground gates open at 5 p.m. and at 6:25 p.m. a flag ceremony on the fairgrounds will be conducted by Columbus County Sheriff's Office Honor Guards to officially open the fair.

One of the fair's own, Col. Gary Bass, has been chosen as parade marshal. He was on board with the fair from the very beginning, when the fairgrounds were still woods with big trees growing on it. The Columbus County Law Enforcement Officers Association had

talked about taking on a community project and State Trooper Harold Lee came up with the idea of having a fair. Having lived in Robeson County, he had been involved in the fair in that county and thought it would be a good project.

Ironically, that was the 50th anniversary of Columbus County's last County Fair. As the officers looked over the woods in March and talked about having the fair in August, one naysayer me-noted that it might take another year to pull that off. That's when Chief Dep-

uty Stuart Sasser crawled up on a large piece of heavy equipment and started clearing new ground. Come August, there was a fair going on and in spite of rainy weather, attendance was good. There were no solid buildings on the grounds but there were giant tents that sheltered everything that needed cover, and a pretty good crowd attended.

The land that Sasser made sure got cleared in time was near the Department of Transportation on Prison Camp Road and it belonged to the state. Stuart's brother Rhone Sasser was a close friend of Gov. Jim Hunt, as they had attended N.C. State University together, so Rhone was able to help work out a deal with the governor to transfer the land to Columbus County.

38th annual County Fair opens Tuesday

The 38th annual Columbus County Fair will be held Tuesday through Sunday, Oct. 10-15 at the fairgrounds on Prison Camp Road south of Whiteville.

The first Columbus County Fair to be held in 50 years was held in 1980, an effort of the Columbus County Law Enforcement Association. Land owned by the state became available through the efforts of local bank executive Rhone Sasser and Gov. Jim Hunt, who became friends while attending N.C. State University. It was property at the N.C. Department of Transportation office on Prison Camp Road that was not being used, so an effort to acquire it to be used as fairgrounds was successful.

Shortly into 1980, members of the Law Enforcement Association gathered on the wooded property to talk about the pending County Fair. The plans were to have the fair in

Commissioner of Agriculture Jim Graham was invited to serve as the grand marshal for the fair's first parade, and he accepted. His choice "vehicle" was a farm wagon pulled by a mule team, which Sam "Mule Man" Claridy provided and was supposed to chauffeur the commissioner. However, Commissioner Graham would have none of

told Claridy to wave to the spectators while he drove the mule team.

Years later Commissioner Graham was still bragging about keeping that wagon tongue straight on the centerline of the streets in downtown Whiteville.

Graham and Claridy are both now deceased.

It was one of the best years for the fair, according to state competition. It won first place in its category.



Fair licensed, rides inspected

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair is approved and licensed by the N.C. Department of Agriculture and is a member of the N.C. Association of Agriculture Fairs and International Association of Fairs and Expositions.

Midway rides, provided by Dreamland Amusements, are inspected by the N.C. Department of Labor.

The Columbus County Agriculture Fair began in 1980, 50 years after the last County Fair had been held in Columbus County. It was a project of the Columbus County Law Enforcement Officers Association. The first fair was completely dependent upon big circus tents, but as time passed nice buildings were built to house the commercial and educational booths, livestock barn and food stand. In more recent years an old building was remodeled to serve as the fair's office building.

Early on, the fair board asked the public to help give the fair a suitable motto, and a contest was held. The fair board liked "It's A Family A-Fair," so that became the motto.

Several years ago the fair called on the public again to choose a name for the fair's mascot, a gigantic fiberglass rooster who stood sentinel on the fairgrounds. "Fearless Fair-ley" was the name chosen by the fair board.





Demo derby Friday, Saturday nights



One of the most popular and exciting events at the County Fair is the Demolition Derby, held annually on Friday and Saturday nights, beginning at 7 p.m.

Registration will be from 4 to 6:30 p.m. at the track, and there are no registration fees. There are four classes of vehicles, 4-cylinder class (small car), 6-cylinder class (up to 3500 lbs.), 8-cylinder class (3501 lbs. & up) and pro class (any cylinder).

4-cylinder class, 6-cylinder class and 8-cylinder class

- 1. Any stock hard top automobile or station wagon is allowed.
- 2. Safety belts and safety helmets with goggles or shield are required.
- 3. All glass must be removed except windshield. If windshield is removed a center bar is required.

- 4. All decorative chrome must be removed, door handles may be left on.
- 5. Gas tanks are to be inside of car, six gallon tanks (plastic or metal). Tanks must be properly secured and covered.

Original tanks must have holes punched in them and flushed clear of gas, or be removed from car.

- 6. No special bumpers, trailer hitches, reinforcements or added weight are allowed on any part of the not to open during heat. vehicle. *Bumpers shocks bumper welded*.

Demo Derby Pro Class Rules

- 1. Any stock hard top automobile or station wagon is allowed.
- Safety belts and safety helmets with goggles or shield are required.
- 3. All glass must be removed except windshield. If windshield is removed a center bar is required.
- 4. All decorative chrome, must be removed, door handles may be left on.
- 5. Gas tanks are to be inside of car, six gallon tanks (plastic or metal). Tanks must be properly secured and covered

Original tanks must have holes punched in them and flushed clear of gas, or be removed from car.

- No trailer hitches, **bumpers can be removed and the bumper welded**.
- Doors should be welded or chained, if welded must be in 4" welds.
- 8. Trunks should be chained shut or welded by 4" welds. Hoods can use 5/8 inch bolt or chained.

Tailgates of wagons should be chained or welded

so as not to open during heat.

- 9. All sun visors, windshield blades, and headliners must be removed.

- 16. Any car catching fire that stops the event is automatically disqualified for that heat.

- 18. All hoods & trunks must have a 12" in diameter hole cut for safety.
- 19. No larger than ¾ treaded bolts for chassis & body bolts

Exhibitor's Rules and Agreement

- 1. Exhibitor's entries will be accepted for registration at the Exhibit Building on Friday, Oct. 6 from noon 4 p.m. and on Saturday, Oct. 7 from 10 a.m. 4 p.m. No other entries will be accepted after 4 p.m. Saturday. Judging will be done Monday. Cakes will be accepted Monday, Oct. 10 at 9 a.m.
- 2. All articles must have been prepared, made or grown by the exhibitor within the last 12 months.
- 3. All entries must be registered with the clerks in charge of registration at the Exhibit Building. All exhibits on display must remain in the Exhibit Building throughout the fair week. Articles

may be reclaimed by the owner (ticket holder) following the Fair on Monday, Oct. 16. Any article removed from the Exhibit Building before Sunday will forfeit any cash prize awarded to said article.

- 4. Exhibits will not be accepted by mail or public transportation.
- 5. Exhibitors must see to the proper delivery of any article or livestock on the grounds and the proper care to the latter, as no charge for transportation of drayage will be paid by the Fair.
- 6. All entries will be numbered and recorded in the book of entry of the proper department. Entry tags will be issued, bearing entry number and exhibit number tag to be attached to the exhibit and the stub retained by the exhibitor and presented on Monday when the exhibit is called for. These claim checks are your proof that you have entered all your exhibits as required. There will be one

set of categories in which there may be a youth and adult entry. The designation "Y" will be added to the letter category for youth.

- 7. Any and all articles judged by the registrar to be obnoxious or repulsive in character will be forbidden entry, or, if entered without being fully known, shall be removed at once.
- 8. The right is reserved to place an exhibit in its proper class if it has been incorrectly entered.
- 9. All entries should be for the first premium of the premium number, under which they are entered, but failing to take the first shall compete for the second, if second is offered, but shall not be awarded more than

one premium under the same number.

10. No article or animal will be entitled to space until the proper entry has been made. Space is limited. (All entries will be accepted in order of receipt until all available space is filled. In any case all en-

tries must be received by the date specified under each department and when all space is filled, the management reserves the right to refuse entries, even if received before the specified date.






The prize is worth working for. The first place winner gets





It's a homemade straw broom, made of straw gathered from ditch banks or other places on the farm, and it won a blue ribbon and cash prize at an earlier County Fair.










Lumber River Old Iron may be in parade



No automobiles or other vehicles will be allowed to service a booth, eating stands, shows or concessions after 2 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday and after 11 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. No exhibitors' or workers' vehicle will be allowed inside the fair grounds after the gates open to the public. 




