# OPTION A--KEEP 2/16/21 RETURN DATE

- Elementary returns to the buildings and secondary remain virtual until start of GP4.
- 1947 students across the 12 elementary schools, based on January survey. 21 to 45% of students.
- 29 medically certified teachers would be covered through paras/co-teaching.
- Students would remain with their assigned teachers.
- All elementary teachers who are not medically certified would report to buildings and have a mixture of in-person and virtual students.
- Teachers would report a week in advance to prepare on 2/8/21.
- Families who did not indicate they would return to in-person will continue with eLearning for the remainder of the school year.
- ACC/Special Education/Safe Spaces will continue to operate as they have been.
- Level 1.0-2.5 secondary LDP students would be invited to the ACC.

# OPTION A, 2/16 RETURN--BENEFITS

- Begin to address some of the glaring needs of our student population.
- Academic Needs-20,539 Needs Improvements issued Semester 1 K-5.
- Attendance Needs-93% Attendance Rate K-5 Extra 108 kids absent each day.
- Behavior Needs-Begin the process of re-acclimating students to school structure.
- Social-Emotional Learning Needs-Kids have lacked the opportunity for social development/friends.
- Nutritional Needs-We know that not every child's needs are met in this area.
- Safety & Security Needs-Our schools are safe-havens for kids.
- We continue the process of transitioning to in-person instruction district-wide.
- Consistent with the opportunities from most surrounding districts and parochial schools.
- Puts burden of child's formal education back with the trained professionals.

# OPTION A, 2/16 RETURN--CHALLENGES

- COVID Related Concerns
  - Lack of vaccine availability for staff
    - Mutating virus strands
  - Teacher Concerns
    - Managing in-person and virtual learners
    - Substitute teachers
    - Kids not following expectations
    - Lack of PPE/Cleaning Supplies
    - Breakfast in the classroom
    - Sick kids coming to school
    - Specials and Recess challenges
    - Keeping their kids vs. rescheduling kids
    - Moving/Packing classrooms
    - Room Ventilation/Fresh air

# OPTION B--PUSH RETURN DATE TO 4/6/21 (TUESDAY AFTER SPRING BREAK)

- Extend full-time eLearning until the end of GP3, with a new start date of April 6, 2021.
- Board will choose to keep the updated start date or extend at one of the March Board Meetings.
- •Allow all parents the option to continue with eLearning for the remainder of the school year, regardless of the return date.
- •ACC/Special Education/Safe Spaces will continue to operate as they have been.
- Level 1.0-2.5 LDP students and DLI students would be invited back to the buildings.

# OPTION B, 4/6 RETURN--BENEFITS

- Potential for teachers to receive the COVID Vaccine.
- Little chance for schools to be a source of COVID transmission.
- Teachers do not have to contend with the challenge of in-person and virtual learners.
- No significant issues with substitutes.
- No issues surrounding the scheduling of students.
- Additional time for preparation to return.

# OPTION B, 4/6 RETURN--CHALLENGES

- Further delays the school's opportunity to have meaningful interventions in academics, attendance, behavior, social-emotional support, nutritional, safety-security.
- Continues to place a heavy burden on families to be the primary facilitator of their child's academic success, especially in elementary grades.
- Potential to disenfranchise families from sending kids to SCH.

## FURTHER CONSIDERATIONS

- Public perception is mixed. Passionate views abound.
