I have to consider whether the development partner is a good fit for our community.

While I wholeheartedly support the 1<sup>st</sup> amendment, my faith is an integral part of who I am. It is no secret that it also influences why I have accepted one of the biggest challenges of my professional life and how I govern. While attracting development to this city has been a herculean task, we have experienced successes and anticipate many more. For these reasons, I believe it is wholly appropriate to pass on the opportunity to partner with GEO and pursue other relationships that will be more suitable for the city and consistent with our collective values.
