Survey Details

 Bellwether Research conducted a survey of 800 registered voters in Indiana.

Dates: Oct 29, 30 and Nov 1, 2025


Mode: 51% phone, 49% text to online survey

Would you say things in Indiana are heading in the right direction or off on the wrong track?






A majority disapprove of Gov. Braun's performance.


Voters are divided on political leaders.





Instead of calling a special session of the legislature to focus on redrawing congressional maps, state legislators should be spending their time focused on what actually makes our lives better - bringing down property taxes, reducing energy bills, and making our communities safe.

Politicians should be accountable to the people, not the other way around. DC politicians are trying to redraw Indiana's maps so they can decide who wins, not us, and that's wrong.

When Indiana congressional maps were finished in 2021, state legislative leaders emphasized that they were fair and balanced. There is no reason to redo them again now except for purely political reasons, which is the opposite of fair.

Hoosiers believe in fairness, not cheating. Right now, DC insiders are trying to cheat and rig the elections to ensure voters can never hold them accountable.

Voters in CD1 do not like the idea of being redistricted.

We conducted an oversample (totaling 224 interviews) among voters in Lake and Porter counties to look at separately. Here is what we found:

- Lake County voters oppose redrawing congressional maps by a 59%-32% margin.
- Porter County voters oppose redrawing congressional maps by a 52%-36% margin.
- 60% of Porter County voters oppose having their county split between CDs.
- And 57% of Lake County voters oppose combining their county with rural counties.

What are voters in CD1 saying about redistricting now?

"It's strictly a political move. It has nothing to do with the general populace or trying to get better representation for the general populace. It would then separate the people that live on the lake. We don't have the same issues as somebody down Southern Indiana or Central Indiana when they don't have an integrated steel mill or oil refinery or lake in the backyard.

"Leave that shit alone. They got more bigger problems than drawing the damn map. Like complaining about what to eat in two days.

"So are we supposed to do whatever Trump wants and not continue the old standard.

"The redistricting is an obvious power grab by the Republican party.,
