
2016 LEGISLATIVE VOTE ANALYSIS





A Solid, if Not Spectacular, Legislative Session

The number one priority for the Indiana Chamber and its business members was enhanced funding for roads and transportation infrastructure. A total of \$1.1 billion, when counting money for local governments, is a strong start. What's even more important is the commitment legislators made to address longer-term needs in the 2017 budget-writing session. All four

legislative caucuses and the governor's office offered plans and spent considerable time working toward solutions. That is an excellent sign of even better things to come.

In the education arena, the disastrous ISTEP test implementation in recent years led to several needed pieces of legislation.

Teachers and schools will not be negatively impacted by the 2014-2015 test results, but all-important accountability remains in place and a summer panel – with the business community at the table – will determine a more suitable testing future for our state's students.

Other positive legislative results included funding the third Regional Cities program, scholarships for prospective top-of-their-class teachers, a long-sought solution to the unregulated lawsuit lending industry and saving hundreds of millions of dollars with more appropriate property tax assessments of large retail facilities (aka "big box" stores).

Unfortunately, there were also two significant missed opportunities. Indiana must be seen as a welcoming place for all in order to retain and recruit top talent, new business investment and tourism. Failing to pass civil rights legislation doesn't put Indiana in the strong position it could have been, or arguably needs to be. While this proved a bridge too far for legislators to cross in this election year, all of our state leaders must find a way going forward to work together to craft a solution.

Despite bipartisan support, implementing a work share program barely even got out of the starting gate. Work share would benefit employees, employers and communities when the next economic downturn occurs. At the request of the Indiana Department of Workforce Development (DWD), the Indiana Chamber partnered with them to commission an independent study of why a work share program is needed. The Chamber also took the extra step of identifying viable funding options for the program's administration. However, DWD still was unable to get on board. Until they do, this policy will, unfortunately, face an uphill climb.

The Chamber will be back at it next year – pushing these policies and others that support making Indiana a more prosperous place for employers and their employees.

As for 2016, did your legislator help make Indiana a better place to work and live? The answer can be found in this annual Legislative Vote Analysis.

Developing the Business Agenda

The Indiana Chamber provides more information on important pro-jobs, pro-economy issues to legislators and businesspersons than any other organization in the state. In preparation for each legislative session, the Chamber's numerous policy committees study the various public policy issues impacting businesses and their employees and formulate positions on these issues.

Following review and adoption by the Chamber's board of directors, a publication titled *Legislative Business Issues* is sent to all legislators, Chamber members, local chambers of commerce and coalition members. This publication outlines the Chamber's position on important public policy issues and provides invaluable analysis.

During the legislative sessions, lawmakers are kept advised on key business issues through various editions of the *Legislative Agenda* report and other communications that detail the Chamber's position on every bill that has a pro-jobs, pro-economy impact. There were 121 such bills as the 2016 legislative session began.

The 2016 Legislative Vote Analysis then measures the voting performance of individual legislators on bills that best reflect the Chamber's policy positions.

Bill Descriptions

The Chamber supported each of the following bills/votes included in this report, unless otherwise indicated.

House

HB 1001

Road Funding

Rep. Soliday, Sen. Kenley. Allocates state money for roads and highways, including mechanisms (increased taxes on fuel and cigarettes) for longer-term sustainability. **Amended version signed by Governor.**

HB 1001 (Conference Committee Report) Road Funding

<u>Rep. Soliday, Sen. Kenley.</u> Allocates state money for roads and highways in the short term. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1002

Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship

Rep. Bosma, Sen. Mishler. Establishes a scholarship program of up to \$7,500 per year for top students going into the education field who will teach in Indiana for five years post-graduation.

Signed by Governor.

HB 1003

Teacher Evaluations

Rep. Behning, Sen. Mishler. Decouples the 2014-2015 ISTEP scores from teacher evaluations due to significant issues related to that year's test. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1004

School Health and Pension Plans

Rep. Behning, Sen. Kruse. Allows flexibility for administrators to provide their teachers with a defined contribution plan as an alternative retirement benefit, provides reciprocity to teachers moving to Indiana from out-of-state, and gives school districts flexibility to provide supplemental pay for teachers for hard-to-fill positions. **Died.**

HB 1004 Amendments Opposed by the Chamber

- 2nd Reading Amendment #6 by Rep. Delaney. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have removed the supplemental pay provision. **Amendment defeated.**
- 2nd Reading Amendment #7 by Rep. Austin. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have allowed for the supplemental pay to be provided only through the collective bargaining process. **Amendment defeated.**

HB 1005

Various Education Matters

Rep. DeVon, Sen. Kruse. Provides for a second application date during the second semester for choice scholarship students. Establishes the career pathways and mentorship program to provide supplemental pay for classroom teachers who take on mentorship and advanced roles to help alleviate the teacher shortage issue in the state. Creates the dual credit teacher stipend matching grant program. Also includes language to protect students from predatory teachers in schools. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1005 Amendments Opposed by the Chamber

- 2nd Reading Amendment #2 by Rep. Austin. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have allowed for the discussion for supplemental pay for career pathways and mentorship to include participation by the teacher's exclusive representative. Amendment defeated.
- 2nd Reading Amendment #3 by Rep. V. Smith. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have would make differentiated pay collectively bargained. Amendment defeated.

HB 1047

Court Motion Clerk Pilot Program

<u>Rep. Washburne, Sen. Bray.</u> Creates the circuit and superior court motion clerk pilot program to provide assistance to courts with preparing orders for complex motions. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1053

Regulation of Packaging Materials

Rep. Bacon, Sen. Steele. Prohibits a local government from restricting the use of certain packaging materials. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1127

Civil Proceeding Advance Payment Under UCCC (aka "Lawsuit Lending")

Rep. Lehman, Sen. Head. Reforms the practice known as lawsuit lending, including setting interest rate caps. Specifies that provisions in the Uniform Consumer Credit Code (UCCC) concerning the regular schedule of payments and maximum loan term that otherwise apply to supervised loans do not apply to these transactions. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1157

Methamphetamine Matters

Rep. Frizzell, Sen. Young. Requires the division of state court administration to report certain methamphetamine-related felonies to the National Precursor Log Exchange (NPLEx) so that NPLEx can generate a stop sale alert to prevent individuals convicted of those felonies from purchasing ephedrine or pseudoephedrine. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1169

Business Personal Property Tax Exemption

<u>Rep. Saunders, Sen. Hershman.</u> Removes the notarization requirement attached to last year's "de minimus" personal property tax exemption. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1263

Prescriptions and Telemedicine

Rep. Kirchhofer, Sen. Crider. Sets forth requirements that must be met before a physician, a physician assistant or an advanced practice nurse, granted prescriptive authority, may issue a prescription to a patient receiving telemedicine services. Provides that certain drugs may not be prescribed through the use of telemedicine. **Signed by Governor.**

Vote Selection Criteria and Scoring

The Indiana Chamber has well-established criteria for selecting votes to be included in the *Legislative Vote Analysis* (LVA). Bills included meet the following four criteria:

- Votes on all subject matter used in LVA are based on and best reflect the Chamber's legislative policy as determined by the Chamber's board of directors and expressed in Legislative Business Issues, Legislative Agenda or other Chamber communications to legislators.
- 2. Each member of the Indiana General Assembly is informed of all bills the Chamber is following, including the Chamber's position on each, the reasons for the position and the name and contact information of the specific Chamber issue expert to contact for more information.
- 3. Each member of the Indiana General Assembly is informed of the Chamber's position on the issue and bill prior to the vote. This notification was provided in editions of the Legislative Agenda or other communications with legislators.
- 4. Only floor votes for which there is a public record are used.

Base scores for each legislator are calculated as a percentage of votes cast in agreement with the Chamber's position on the bills included in LVA. Select pro-economy, pro-jobs legislation has been double-weighted to reflect its importance. A modest adjustment factor (positive or negative) has been added to the LVA scoring model to factor in very important legislative activities outside of floor votes on bills the Chamber has taken a position on, including whether a legislator sponsored/authored these bills and whether committee chairs held hearings or killed these bills. This adjustment factor is applied as a net positive or negative number of additional scored votes and is capped at +/- 10 votes.

HB 1290

Various Tax Matters

Rep. T. Brown, Sen. Hershman. Calls for various tax provisions. Includes repealing the "big box" legislation of last year and replacing it with an entirely different, more appropriate approach to the assessment of these limited purpose commercial properties. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1300

Environmental Management Matters

Rep. Wolkins, Sen. Bassler. Corrects or resolves various issues related to the Indiana Department of Environmental Management. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1330

Education Matters

Rep. Behning, Sen. Kruse. Provides that the Department of Education shall make timely application for any federal funds made available for schools and school corporations, and to direct the allocation and apportionment of the federal funds received fairly, equitably and in a timely manner. Also changes the composition of the Indiana Education Employment Relations Board. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1344

Unemployment Insurance

Rep. Leonard, Sen. Boots. Abolishes the Indiana Unemployment Compensation Board and transfers those duties to the Department of Workforce Development (DWD) effective April 2016. Also, DWD is to submit an annual report concerning the status of the unemployment insurance compensation system and make recommendations for maintaining its solvency. **Signed by Governor.**

HB 1395 ISTEP Matters

Rep. Behning, Sen. Kruse. Sunsets the ISTEP assessment as of July 1, 2017 and creates a 23-person panel to discuss the future of assessments given the recent passage of the federal Every Student Succeeds Act. **Signed by Governor.**

Teacher Salary and Supplemental Payments

SB 10 Amendments Opposed by the Chamber

• 2nd Reading Amendment #1 by Rep. Kersey. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have allowed for the supplemental pay to be collectively bargained.

Amendment defeated.

- 2nd Reading Amendment #4 by Rep. V. Smith. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have prohibited the discussion of supplemental pay to take place in executive session. Amendment defeated.
- 2nd Reading Amendment #6 by Amendment proposed by Rep. V. Smith. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have removed math, reading or literacy as subject items for a master's degree. **Amendment defeated.**
- 2nd Reading Amendment #7 proposed by Rep. DeLaney. The Chamber opposed this amendment because it would have deleted provisions related to having supplemental pay in addition to a teacher's base salary.

<u>Sen. Kruse, Rep. Behning.</u> Decouples A-F grades for schools and school corporations from the 2014-2015 ISTEP testing year for a one-year period. **Signed by Governor.**

SB 255

Underground Petroleum Storage Tanks

<u>Sen. Charbonneau, Rep Wolkins.</u> Protects the current Excess Liability Trust Fund so that it may fund the cleanup of tanks and following a state funded actuarial study, promote and allow the cleanup of the many "orphan tanks" around the state. **Signed by Governor.**

SB 256

Legitimate Use of Solid Waste

<u>Sen. Charbonneau</u>, <u>Rep Wolkins</u>. Promotes a more effective and efficient use of solid waste materials as a "feedstock" for another industry. **Signed by Governor**.
