I. STATUTORY DIRECTIVE

The Joint Committee on Judiciary and Public Policy is authorized under IC 2-5-1.3-14. The Committee is required under IC 2-5-1.3-14 to study issues assigned by the Legislative Council within the appropriate subject matter of the Committee.

II. INTRODUCTION AND REASONS FOR STUDY

The Committee was charged with the following:

- (A) Studying a repeal of the laws that require a person to obtain a license to carry a handgun in Indiana. This topic includes the following issues:
 - (i) The fiscal impact of a repeal of Indiana's handgun licensure laws.
 - (ii) The issuance and use of reciprocity licenses.
 - (iii) Any persons who should be prohibited from possessing or carrying a handgun.
 - (iv) The rate in which handguns are used in suicides in Indiana.
 - (v) The rate in which handguns are used in criminal acts in Indiana.

- (B) The following topics:
 - (i) Reduction of firearms violence in Indiana, including requiring background checks to be conducted by all gun show vendors at gun shows in Indiana.
 - (ii) Increasing the number of law enforcement officers employed by local units of government in Indiana.

III.SUMMARY OF WORK PROGRAM

IV. COMMITTEE FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Findings:

The Committee made the following findings:

Indiana does not require handgun owners to be licensed or to register individual handguns. Indiana only requires a license if an individual desires to carry a handgun in public.

The current system for obtaining a license to carry a handgun requires an online application, fingerprinting, local law enforcement agency processing, and paying state and local fees.

Indiana is a "shall" issue state which means that so long as an individual is not statutorily prohibited from possessing a handgun, an individual will be issued a license to carry a handgun in public if the proper application steps are followed.

Both state and federal law specify those individuals who are prohibited from possessing a handgun. For example, in Indiana serious violent felons and convicted domestic batterers are prohibited from possessing a handgun. However, the lists of prohibited persons in state and federal law are not identical.

The collected state and local fees help cover the costs associated with processing applications and help pay for additional law enforcement related activities, such as officer training.

At least 30 states currently recognize Indiana's license to carry a handgun for reciprocity purposes.

Indiana's license to carry a handgun provides law enforcement with a tool that helps identify those who are legally allowed to carry a handgun in public, and prosecute those individuals who are prohibited from carrying a handgun in public.

Recommendations:

The General Assembly should provide law enforcement with better tools that utilize technology to help identify individuals who are statutorily prohibited from possessing handguns. These tools should include ways to identify mental health issues without infringing on Hoosiers' State and Federal Constitutional rights.

Indiana's list of those individuals who are statutorily prohibited from possessing a handgun should be aligned with the federal list of individuals who are statutorily prohibited from possessing a handgun including, all persons convicted of felonies and also including persons with domestic battery and stalking convictions.

The General Assembly should remove hurdles that restrict the ability of law abiding Hoosiers to exercise their State and Federal Constitutional Rights to bear arms and defend themselves.

The General Assembly should maintain the current licensing system for individuals who desire to obtain a license for reciprocity purposes. Further, the General Assembly should consider creating an additional license to carry a handgun that would allow reciprocity in additional states.

The General Assembly should work with state and local officials to find ways to make up for any decline in revenue that may occur as a result of enacting these recommendations.

The General Assembly should continue to identify ways to reduce gun violence in Indiana by:

- (A) working to prevent the diversion of firearms from authorized routes of sale and transfer;
- (B) improving access to and availability of mental health resources; and
- (C) providing law enforcement officials with the means to identify and prosecute prohibited persons in possession of a firearm.
