## Volunteers on the right track

The train chugs down the track through Sturgeon Lake, Willow River, Groningen and others, then through Hinckley and Pine City as it continues towards the Twin Cities. Another train zips past Nickerson, the Askov water tower, the track over the quarry in Sandstone and continues to head south.

The Great Northern and Northern Pacific train lines not only ran through Pine County, they were huge competitors, said Spencer Stone, a volunteer in the Train Room at the Pine County Historical Society Museum in Askov. Stone, 77, lives in Sturgeon Lake and joins two other volunteers Tuesday mornings to look over the 18'X30' HO scale model railroad representing Pine County in the mid 20th century. The trains were making the change from running on steam to running on diesel fuel during that time, Stone explained. Many volunteers over the years painstakingly created miniature towns, including a replica of downtown Askov in the 1950s. Another scene shows a parade marching down main street

in Pine City. The hand painted background featuring the different seasons of Minnesota was done by the art club.

Rolly Johnson, 92, worked for the railroad for 42 years. The Bruno resident said he

began working as a telegraph operator in 1949 at the Moose Lake depot.

"I went to train school in Minneapolis to learn how to telegraph," Johnson said. He also sold tickets and per-

formed other office duties as needed. He said he saw an advertisement for the Pine County Railroad Club

The mild fall weather beckons people to meander towards the small corner business in downtown Sandstone Friday, Oct. 8. They gravitate towards the fenced-in patio behind the building, complete with a flower garden, an assortment of tables and an entertainment stage in the corner.

SandRocks opened their doors in mid July. Owners Rachel Hansen and Charlie Gustafson worked hard to decorate the inside and revamp the back parking lot into a spacious patio area that can accommodate about 50 people, both inside and out.

"Sandstone needed an upscale adult place to go," said Hansen. They offer an assortment of sandwiches, cheese plates and of course, beer.

She said they also feature local talent several weekends a month. The

## The ending of an era: Another Minnesota dairy farm closes its doors

The one-hundred-year-old red barn in Windemere Township sits empty for the first time since 1921. The sounds of cows waiting to be milked are now silenced, leaving only the twittering of birds who fly through the open windows. In the last century, two families owned the property, several kids were raised on the property and a few hundred cattle came and went over the years.

Al Overland's parents purchased the property in 1944, complete with a herd of Guernsey dairy cows from the original homesteaders. The Nylands homesteaded the property in 1889, said Al. Al grew up working on the farm until he left for college. He started milking again twice daily in 1976 after his dad had back surgery and needed help.

Al met his future wife at college and married in 1982. He was on many boards and committees in the area over the years, including youth

pastor, church council and dairy co-op.

Al said milking and feeding the cattle took about 35 hours per week. Additional farm work included making hay, cleaning the barn area and repairing fences and buildings and as many farmers know, much more.

"You put in a lot of time," Al said. "You need to be a jack of all trades." His dad was a welder during the war and taught him how to weld. He made a special little milking stool, which Al used every day when he milked the cows for the last 33 years.

He added that a few advances in technology helped make life easier, such as a milk pipeline. The pipeline transported the milk from the cows directly to the holding tank. He said the addition of a manure pit also made a huge difference. He no longer needed to haul the manure out of the barn

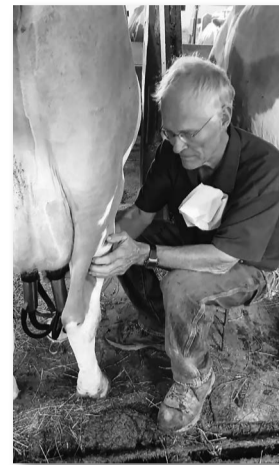
Even though the couple kept busy, they made time to travel and go on vacations.

### KID'S FAVORITE CHILI

- 1 lb. ground turkey
- 1/2 c. chopped onion
- 1 can (15-3/4 oz.) pork and beans
- 1 can (14-1/2 oz.) diced tomatoes, undrained
- 1 can (10-3/4 oz.) condensed tomato soup, undiluted
- 1 Tbsp. brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp. chili powder

In a large saucepan, cook turkey and onion over medium heat until meat is no longer pink; drain. Stir in the remaining ingredients. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer until heat through, 15-20 minutes. Serve with oyster crackers. Serves 4.

### MY COUSIN'S AWARD-WINNING WHITE CHILI

PAM THIEDE'S RECIPE WON 2020 AND 2021 CHILI COOK-OFF CONTEST

- 1/2 the meat from rotisserie chicken
- 1 Tbsp. olive oil
- 4 minced garlic cloves
- 1 c. chopped onion
- 1 can (19 oz.) cannellini beans, undrained
- 1 can (15 oz.) great white northern beans, undrained
- 2 cans (4 oz. each) mild diced green chilis, undrained (1 might be ok—it's even a little too much for some Norwegians)
- 2 tsp. (plus) ground cumin
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. garlic powder
- 2 Tbsp. rice vinegar, divided
- 1 chicken bouillon cube
- Lemon zest or juice
- 1 can (12 oz.) evaporated milk
- Toppings:
- 2 Tbsp. cilantro snipped
- Shredded cheese
- Tortillas chips or crusty bread

The chicken can be from 1/2 rotisserie chicken, or 1 cooked chicken breast and thigh. The whole chicken can be roasted (skin on) on an upright stand or on an open can of pop or beer. Remove the bones and skin from chicken and cut or tear into bite sized chunks. Sauté the garlic and onions in the olive oil until soft. Add 1 tablespoon rice vinegar. Combine beans, chilis, spices, bouillon cube, rice vinegar and lemon juice or zest. Mix with the onions and garlic. Add evaporated milk and stir. Heat through. To serve: Top each bowl with chopped cilantro and shredded cheese. Serve with tortilla chips or warm crusty bread.

### Helpful Tip From Mary Ellen:

With the size of food products shrinking, so the price doesn't have to go up, old recipes are failing because the quantity is incorrect. In an old recipe, the can size of evaporated milk was 14.5. Now that same can is only 12 oz. To accommodate for this, wash out a used can of chicken broth that is 14.5 oz. and save it. When it's time to make that old recipe again, use enough evaporated milk to fill the broth can and your recipe will be a success. This is also true for baking chips. A salted nut roll bar recipe will not hold together without the proper amount of baking chips.

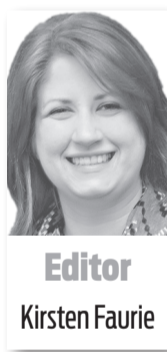

# “Work hard, have fun, and expect to win”

The Braham Bombers kicked off to Owen Loew to start the football game on Friday, October 8, against the Moose Lake Willow River Rebels at the Frank Magdziarz Field in Willow River. Groundskeeper Daryl Herzog had the field maintained, manicured, and lush ready for the gridiron game. His granddaughter, Ellie, told him, “Grandpa, it looks like an NFL football field.” The chain gang, Guyal Nelson, Ted Shaw, Clayton Ohlin and Scott Danelski had the down markers ready. The Rebels mini-cheerleaders and proud parents were ready for their half-time performance. The younger junior high football players were down on the sidelines with the veteran players.

According to the Quality Results Formula (QRF), the Rebels (5-0) are ranked first in Minnesota Class AA out of the 54 teams with 66.2 points. MLWR’s devastating defense brand of football was prepared to hold the opponents scoreless and they did. Opposing offenses are averaging only 50 yards per game.

On the first Rebel offensive play, Logan Orvedahl hauled the pigskin 53-yards for the first of seven Rebel touchdowns. The clock had run down only 48 seconds into the game. All seven of Sam Kenezivich’s points after

touchdown kicks were good to make the final score 49-0 Rebels.

Orvedahl got a second touchdown with 5:57 p.m. left in the first quarter. Then sophomore quarterback Adam Neumann threw a 28-yard touchdown pass to Kaden Robbins to end the first quarter, 21-0 Rebels.

The second quarter started out with a score, when Landin Kurhajetz caught a punt from the Bombers and scampered 52-yards, waiting for his blockers, for another six. With 6:07 left until half-time, running back Henry Ribich broke tackles scoring on a 57-yard run to make the score 35-0. The Rebels got the ball back on their own 15-yard line. Jackson Thompson grabbed the ball from Neumann and ran 85-yards to make the half-time score 42-0.

In the second half, the clock was set at running time, Alex Watrin, Duane Broughton forced a loss of yards for the Bombers. Braham punted to the 43-yard line. Ethan Burton took the ball, then Jackson Thompson followed his blockers for the final score, 49-0. The snap was low, but Kenezivich’s kick was good.

Luke Dewey took over under center, with three keepers. Running backs Jaxsyn Schmidt, Dawson Mortensen, Levi Mikrot, Duane Broughton, Kaden Robbins, and Owen Loew finished out the drive to end the game.

Defensively, Thompson and

Broughton had seven assists, but 24 other Rebels were in on tackles. There were no fumbles or interceptions.

Rebels’ Homecoming game against the Hinckley-Finlayson Jaguars (4-2) will be Thursday, October 14, at Frank Magdziarz Field in Willow River at 7 p.m. for a Section 7AA match-up.

With this win, Coach Dave Louzek not only collected his 200th win, but also ties long-time Laker/Rebel football Coach Bob Youso for the most wins in school history. They both are now tied as the 57th winningest football coaches in Minnesota high school history.

Louzek has been head coach for the MLWR teams for 23 years, since 1999, and has an unprecedented run of success. He was an assistant for four years before taking over the helm.

The players like playing for him. After the game, he said “It is a two-way street, he likes the players.” He likes making it as fun as possible, and do things that have nothing to do with football, such as a trip to a waterpark or golfing.

Any person that wants to be a part of the MLWR football program, Louzek finds a way to get them involved.

The teams under Louzek’s helm, have won 13 Section 7AA Championships in 14 years from 2006-2019. The Rebels have had three trips to the State Class AA state title game. His teams have aver-

# Family, friends of Ashley reach out as search continues

As the search for Ashley Lynn Miller (Carlson) enters its third week, family and friends of the missing woman are reaching out to help find information that could bring Ashley home.

## MISSING WOMAN

On Sept. 27, the Pine County Sheriff's Office and the Minnesota Bureau of Criminal

Apprehension issued a state-wide missing person alert for Ashley Lynn Miller (Carlson), age 33. Her last know location was east of Hinckley on Friday, Sept. 24.

According to the sheriff's office, it is unknown what Carlson was last wearing or her direction and means of travel. She does not have her personal belongings with her.

Carlson is approximately five feet nine inches tall and weighs about 217 pounds. She

has brown/auburn hair and her eye color is hazel.

## REACHING OUT

A prayer vigil was held in Frederic, Wisconsin on Friday, Oct. 8. FOX9 news reports that more than a hundred people showed up in Frederic, which is near Ashley's hometown, to show their support for the missing mother of four.

And "Ashley Miller Carlson - missing/endangered" Facebook page (<https://www.facebook.com/groups/381467310311521>) was set up by Ashley's aunt in order to share information and keep up awareness of Carlson's status.
