## Minnesota Air National Guard unit part of 9/11 history

This Saturday, three large Minnesota events will commemorate the 20th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks with flyovers featuring F-16 fighter aircraft.

Planes from the Minnesota Air National Guard's 148th Fighter Wing are scheduled to make appearances over St. Paul, Duluth, and Minneapolis.

Four F-16s will do a Minnesota Department of Veterans Affairs 9/11 morning flyover of the state capitol. "Our planned flyover time is 9:20 a.m.," said Lt. Col (Ret.) Audra Flanagan, who served as a second lieutenant with the Wing 20 years ago.

Later on Saturday, another four F-16s will take to the skies from the Wing's Duluth base and head to a flyover of the University of Minnesota - Duluth and Minnesota State University- Mankato military appreciation game that has a 6:05 p.m. start.

Finally, aircraft from the 148th Fighter Wing will head to the Twin Cities to complete a 6 p.m. flyover of the Minnesota Twins-Kansas City Royals game at Target Field.

Flanagan also collaborated with her colleagues at the Minnesota National Guard's Joint Force Headquarters - Public Affairs regarding a 9/11 documentary and commemorative social media posts featured on the

148th Wing's Facebook page.

"It was clear 9/11 touched people at a deep level," Flanagan said. She was working at United Health Care in Duluth 20 years ago when hijacked aircraft hit the World Trade

# 9/11: Sept. 11 Commemorative flyovers will feature F-16s

Center Towers in New York City. "I remember being shocked and scared."

Her military position was very similar to working in a human resources office.

"We activated 500 personnel, which was the most the 148th Fighter Wing had ever activated," she said. "We sent personnel to Minneapolis, Langley Air Force Base, and Tyndall Air Force Base to support around the clock combat air patrol missions."

Flanagan said the Sept. 11 attacks, the work of 148th Fighter Wing members and the administrative actions required for that deployment were unprecedented. Her spouse, Senior Master Sgt. Glen Flanagan, worked on F-16 avionics on 9/11.

Immediately after 9/11, the 148th Fighter Wing was placed on 24/7 alert status.

Its F-16s in Duluth and Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida provided around the clock combat air patrols

over major parts of the Southeast and Midwest U.S.

And in months that followed the attacks, the 148th worked from the Minnesota National Guard History Museum and Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport.

The Wing provided aircraft on immediate alert for the North American Aerospace Defense Command to defend against possible direct threats to the Twin Cities, Chicago, Detroit, Kansas City, and St. Louis, flying more than 650 missions.

In December 2001, the 148th was ordered to position eight F-16s, pilots, and support personnel at Langley Air Force Base in Virginia to fly combat air patrols over the White House and the regional around the U.S. Capitol for 90 days.

Flanagan served in the Minnesota National Guard from 1991 to 2015. "I'm so proud of all 148th Wing members and all who served during that time" she said.

## Why we celebrate Labor Day in the United States

**H**ow was your Labor Day weekend, did you enjoy the extra day and do something fun? This year, after freezing some tomatoes I was washing dishes by hand, and thinking back to my mom. She did a lot of canning before we moved to the big city, but when we moved my folks needed more income to support staying there.

So, mom went to work doing what she did before she was married, she went to work in a sewing factory. The first shop she worked in was Munsingwear, making women undergarments. It must have been a tough "sweat shop" to stay in, because she was no wimp and she hated it. After a couple years those jobs went overseas. At the time,

we didn't give it much thought and she immediately found a new job at a smaller shop. That shop made men and women winter coats. Mom worked hard, we knew that, she had some friends there and many she didn't discuss much. We all listened over the dinner table and just figured it was a tough crowd. Mom later elevated to a union steward because they were paid on "piece-work" and often weren't getting the right pay, and other employees weren't happy either. If you aren't familiar with the industry, piece-work is doing a one segment of sewing a garment with your specialized machine, (i.e. a serger machine) and pushing your piece into a box at the end of your table, and the box went to the person who sewed the next step. You had to be fast and keep up because the next gal was also paid by the piece. Bosses were demanding and pushing the pieces through faster and faster-time and pieces were money. That second shop also made

Leisure Suits for the brand "Johnny Carson." Mom was so proud of that brand as Mr. Carson would wear their suits on television. But many fellow employee's didn't even speak English, had no idea who that was, and many/most had numbers tattoo'd to their arm. They were not friendly, and rarely talked-that was how they survived the concentration camps of World War II, sewing clothing and doing what they were told. I attended college in downtown Minneapolis, I walked every day to that shop and sat in their breakroom waiting for a ride home. There I sat, a blonde teenager, going to college, never lived through the hell those women survived. Some would ask me a question in broken English, I was used to that-here up north many folks spoke broken English, but after I would answer they mostly stared at me. My attempts at making conversation with them got one word answers. In 1979, my mom was excited for the release of the movie

Norma Rae, starring Sally Field. It was like the big reveal of their fight over working conditions. Hot, no air conditioning in the summer, only a large fan way up high on the ceiling. No hydrating during work hours, but a run for the break room when the timed break was allowed, no sick days, no paid vacations, no insurance. But by then: children weren't hired, employee's worked only 8 hours and they got breaks. Unions were still fighting a war. The United States did get rules, regulations, laws-and Unions got the benefits, but what I saw happen more and more was these jobs went overseas to Thailand, India, Vietnam, etc. In recent years I have heard of the working conditions in those countries, it sounds real familiar. We celebrate Labor Day because it marked the beginning of improving our working conditions. It was first celebrated on September 5, 1882. President Grover Cleveland made reconciliations with a labor move-

ment and it became a federal holiday in 1894. We have come a long way here in the United States, in fact-during this pandemic many workers were able to continue working-from home. I only dreamed of a day when I could work at home and get paid. Many employees are getting an option of office or home for a more permanent option. It's funny how time changes everything. Hospitals are filling up with the delta variant pandemic patients, and many of those patients are children. Why take a chance on putting family in the hospital, prevent the spread by exercising social distancing when indoors, wear masks, sanitize your hands often and get vaccinated. Then safely enjoy your family and your choice of events.

## September is National Chicken Month



**Food N' Friends**

### OLD-FASHIONED CHICKEN AND DUMPLINGS

- 4 c. cooked chicken, cubed
- 6 c. chicken broth
- 1-1/2 tsp. dry parsley flakes
- 1 c. onions, chopped
- 1 c. celery, chopped
- 6 c. diced potatoes
- 1 c. carrots
- 1 c. peas, optional

### DUMPLINGS

- 2 c. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 4 tsp. baking powder
- 1 egg, beaten
- 2 Tbsp. olive oil
- 2/3 c. milk

Combine all soup ingredients, except peas in slow cooker. Cover. Cook on Low 4-6 hours. Transfer to a large soup kettle with lid. Add peas, if desired. Bring to a boil. Reduce to simmer. Make dumplings: combine flour, salt and baking powder in large bowl. In separate bowl, combine egg, olive oil, and milk until smooth. Add to flour mixture. Drop by large tablespoonsfuls on top of simmering broth until the dumplings cover the surface of the soup. Cover. Simmer without lifting lid for 18 minutes. Serves 8.

### CHICKEN POT PIE SOUP

- Pie crust pastries
- 2 c. all-purpose flour
- 1-1/4 tsp. salt
- 2/3 c. shortening
- 5 to 6 Tbsp. milk

### SOUP

- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 1 c. cubed peeled potatoes
- 1 c. chopped sweet onion
- 2 celery ribs, chopped
- 2 medium carrots, chopped
- 1/2 c. all-purpose flour
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 3 cans (14-1/2 oz. each) chicken broth
- 2 c. shredded cooked chicken
- 1 c. frozen petite peas
- 1 c. frozen corn

In a large bowl, mix flour and salt; cut in shortening until crumbly. Gradually add milk, tossing with a fork until dough holds together when pressed. Shape into a disk; wrap in plastic. Refrigerate for 30 minutes or overnight. On a lightly floured surface, roll dough to 1/8-inch thickness. Using a floured 2-1/2-inch heart-shaped or round cutter, cut out 18 shapes. Place 1-inch apart on ungreased baking sheets. Bake at 425 degrees until golden brown, 8-11 minutes. Cool on a wire rack. **For soup**, heat butter in a Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Add the potatoes, onion, celery, and carrots; cook and stir for 5-7 minutes or until onion is tender. Stir in flour, salt and pepper until blended, gradually whisk in broth. Bring to a boil over medium-high heat, stirring occasionally. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, until potatoes are tender, 8-10 minutes. Stir in remaining ingredients; heat through. Serve with the pastries. Makes six servings. Can use rotisserie chicken or biscuits from a can in place of the pie crust pastries for quick meal.

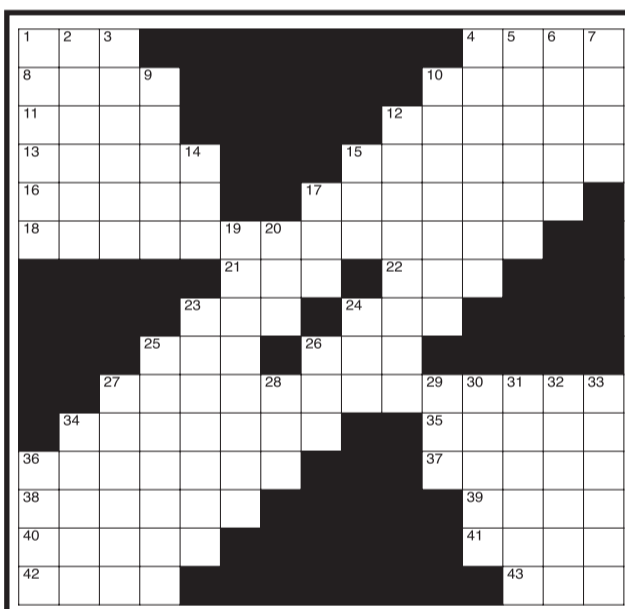
### WILD RICE CHICKEN SALAD

- 2 c. wild rice, prepared as directed and cooled
- 2 c. cooked chicken (chunks)
- 1 can water chestnuts, sliced or chopped
- 1/2 c. celery, chopped into small pieces
- 1 bunch of green onions, sliced thinly
- 1/2 c. slivered almonds
- Seedless red and green grapes, sliced in half

### DRESSING:

- 1-1/2 c. real mayonnaise
- 1/2 c. lemon juice
- 1 tsp. tarragon (optional)
- 1 tsp. season salt
- 1 tsp. pepper

Combine the salad ingredients, except for the grapes and almonds. Combine all the dressing ingredients and mix until smooth. Pour over salad mixture and stir until well coated. Refrigerate. Just before serving add the grapes and almonds. (The nuts can be toasted for a few minutes in the oven or fry pan. They burn easily though.) A store-bought broasted chicken can be used for the cooked chicken. The broasted chicken adds additional flavor.

## Summer visitors of the avian variety head south for winter

As the summer winds down and the summer visitors (the avian kind) begin to return to their southern homes, we find that there is still a lot of activity at our bird feeders. Around the black sunflower seed feeders, the glorious male American Goldfinches continue to brighten the day with their deep yellow

and black feathers (soon to fade to dull green), young Purple Finches and Rose-breasted Grosbeaks are present in large numbers, as are the Red-breasted Nuthatches.

We believe we had a number of successful nests of these little, natty woodland nuthatches this summer, because of the

numbers that are coming to the feeders, many of whom are obviously juveniles. When we sit on our front deck, we are in the flight path from the trees on the west side of the house to the feeders in the front. They zoom inches over our head or past our noses, as though we were permanent patio furniture. We shake our heads and smile every time they do this. We are easily entertained.

Red-breasted Nuthatches are found from east to west across the North American continent, mainly in the northern regions where there are spruce forests. But this habitat is also found in the mountainous west, where their range extends further south than it does in the east. They are residents also of the far northern reaches of Canada, evidenced by their scientific name *Sitta Canadensis*.

These compact, (4.5" from beak to tail. 8" wingspan), hyperactive little birds have orangish sides and a black line

on either side of the eye, with white above and below and a black stripe on top of their heads. The two sexes look very similar, but the male has a black cap, while the female's is dark grey. The female's underside is also a lighter buff color, but these differences are best seen by the bander who holds the bird in their hand.

Like their cousins, the White-breasted Nuthatches, the Red-breasted are able to creep up and down (headfirst) tree trunks and even on the underside of branches. Their stiff, short tail and sharp claws are specially adapted to this kind of foraging behavior as they look for insects and their larvae, on or under the bark. The crevices in the bark serve as a wedge to hold a sunflower seed while they hammer away at it with their sharp pointed beak. They are also known to cache seeds under the bark for later use.

This morning I was standing

by one our tube feeders that has a wire enclosure around it to keep out the bigger birds and a Red-breasted Nuthatch flew in and perched on top. I was no more than two feet away. It looked at me first with one eye and then turning its head, the other. It hopped down to one of the holes in the feeder and proceeded to pick out and toss away at least five sunflower seeds, before it found one to its liking. Then it flew away with the seed in its bill.

In the spring nesting season, Red-breasted Nuthatches are catching more insects and spiders, to feed their young. They provide a better and quicker source of protein. They are adept hunters and can pluck flying insects mid-air. For most of the winter, their food consists of seeds from the cones of the coniferous trees or from people's feeders. Suet is one of their favorite foods in the winter months.

Most of the Red-breasted

Nuthatches that are around our house will probably stay for the winter, but they are known to migrate south if winter food crops fail in the northern boreal forest, which includes spruce, fir, and hemlock.

They will nest in either pure stands of coniferous trees or mixed with deciduous trees, as is the case on our property. Mature forest with lots of old and decaying trees is preferred, because they are the ones most likely to have good nesting cavities.

These little woodland birds will not win any contests for the loveliest voice, since their song is often described as a high pitched and nasally 'ank ank ank' or 'enk enk enk', reminiscent of a tiny tin horn. Still it is a call we like to hear, because we know they will keep us company no matter how hot or cold the weather might be.

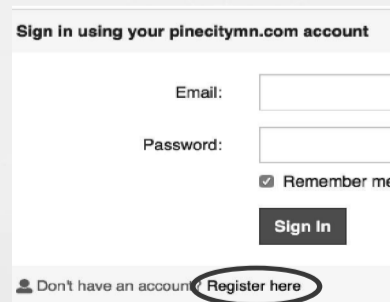
