RV campground gone to the dogs

Tall trees sway gently in the breeze as campers leisurely clean up after breakfast on a perfect summer morning. A lone woman and her large brown dog amble to the fenced in dog park. A large mural of a variety of dogs welcomes visitors at the far end of the dog area. About 100 RV's are parked on updated sites throughout the peaceful wooded 45 acres in Finlayson. It was not always this way.

The Banning RV Park & Campground located on Highway 23 is under new ownership. Tim and Sue Davis purchased the abandoned campground in 2016 and spent a year cleaning it up and putting it back together.

He said the original owner, Donna Haglund, owned it in the late 1960s and early 1970s. She sold it several times on contract for deed, but kept getting the property back, Davis explained. He said it eventually became a trailer park, but was abandoned about 15 years before he purchased the property. He said the property was used as a dumping ground for garbage for many years.

"I bought it in the winter when everything was covered with snow," Davis said. "I way underestimated my clean up budget." He found everything from household garbage, to televisions and tires.

He said the original home is still on the property and is cleaned up and remodeled also.

Once the campground opened, several potential customers called and asked if the Davis' allowed pets. Judy Loney was one of those callers. Desperate for income, they said yes. Davis added a fenced in dog park for campers to exercise their dogs. He also set up a few simple agility pieces for the dogs to run on or through for added

exercise. Those additions were the deciding factor for Loney and her husband. The Maple Plains couple wanted a park that had a space for their nine year old Black Mouth Cur, Jazz, to exercise off leash.

Jazz was brought as a rescue from Texas to the Humane Society of Golden Valley, Minnesota several years ago.

"She adopted me, I didn't adopt her," said Loney fondly. She admitted Jazz is a little spoiled.

They moved their RV to the park on Memorial Day weekend and spend most of their summer there. Loney said everyone she has met is very friendly and the kids at the park are very respectful. She noted there is a new basketball court and a play area for kids.

Davis commissioned long time Ogilvie High School art teacher, Lee Ann Falen, to design and paint the large mural on a metal

Fun, food and music bring communities together

National Night Out is a collaboration between communities and law enforcement to help improve the relationship between the two. The evening allows residents the opportunity to get to know each other in a relaxed, fun atmosphere.

"I think it is a good event to bring law enforcement and communities together as originally designed," said Pine County Sheriff Jeff Nelson. He said members of the sheriff's department will try to stop by as many events as possible Tuesday evening.

NNO was introduced in August of 1984, according to the natw.org website. The first NNO included 2.5 million neighbors across 400 communities in 23 states. The event took off and became an annual event in many cities and towns across the nation. Some neighborhoods hosted block parties, while others were centrally located and hosted by the city or local law enforcement and included demonstrations, games for kids, booths and more.

The event has grown to include 16,000 communities over the last 38 years, including 204 cities in Minnesota, from Askov to Zumbrota. NNO takes place Tuesday, Aug. 3 this year.

LOCAL EVENTS

Askov and surrounding area: The event will be held 4-7 p.m. at the Askov fairgrounds. Hot dogs, brats and baked beans are on the menu. A beverage and dessert is also included. The meal will be served by members of the Askov Fire Department.

There will be children's games and prizes as well as a climbing wall, courtesy of the Minnesota National Guard. Other appearances include members of the Pine County Sheriff's office, Life Life Link III Air Transport, Minnesota DNR and Smokey the Bear, North Memorial Air Care and Essentia Ambulance.

Sandstone: The event will be held 6-8 p.m. at the train park. The event will feature free food, live music by Rob McGown, comedy, a bouncy house and special guest speakers from various entities. The food is provided by the city and will be cooked and served by the American Legion. The Quarry Lions will serve the dessert. Hot dogs, chips, fruit, cake and a beverage are on the menu.

There will be a variety of booths set up, including the Sandstone Flower and Garden Club, Pine County Veterans Service, Tree House, Everyone's Table and more.

Hinckley: The event begins its sixth year 5:30-8 p.m. at West Side Park, with food/refreshments provided by the City of Hinckley employees and city council members. The mayor and city staff will serve the burgers, brats, chips, dessert and beverage. The Riverside Swing Band plays music from the 1940s-1980s beginning at 6:30 p.m. Residents should bring their own lawn chairs or blankets to relax and enjoy the music, or they can dance the night away to their heart's content.

Pine County Fair returns with extra day of fun

After a year off due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Pine County Fair is back in business in 2021. And to mark the occasion, the Fair kicks off a day early – on Tuesday, Aug. 3.

"We're opening at 5 p.m. on Tuesday, and we'll have entertainment in the Bandshell and the Event Center," said Fair Board President Pete Leibel. 'We're excited to have a fair this year – and the extra day, hopefully to spread things out a little bit.'

Leibel said that the Fair Board member spent the past year making changes and upgrades to the property. He noted that they put in fencing for the cattle, fixed a leaking roof and put insulation in the ceiling of the exhibition building to try to keep that building cooler. There's also all-new lighting in two of the exhibit buildings and in the horse barn as well.

"We've done a lot of improvements around the fairgrounds," Leibel said. "The year off, we were able to get

some things done."

Music starts on Tuesday evening at both the Bandshell and the Event Center, with a range of rock tunes, country songs and polka favorites that will continue for all six days of the Fair. Teenage up-and-comer Maddy Braun will travel up from Nashville back to her home state of Minnesota, and make her Fair debut on Tuesday, Aug. 3 at 7 p.m., with a repeat performance on Friday, Aug. 6 at 8:30 p.m.

As usual, the Fair Grandstand will welcome visitors to the truck pull on Wednesday night, the tractor pull on Thursday night, and the demolition derby (including the Chrysler Imperial championship event) on Friday and Saturday nights. All events start at 7 p.m.

Starting at noon on Sunday will be a "Sunday Funday" full of events especially for the kids, including balloon animal and yo-yo performers, money scramble, pedal pull, power wheels derby and much more.

"It's going to be great," Leibel said. "We have just a huge amount of community support for that. We just can't thank the businesses and the community enough who have donated.'

The only two Fair favorites which will still be on hold this year are the 4-H breakfast stand and – possibly – the bingo

Leibel said that they are still hoping that a group will come forward in time to take over the bingo operation.

"We're not going to stop pursuing bingo there," Leibel said. "A lot of people come out just for the bingo – it's a great place to sit, play a few hands and let the kids ride on the rides.

'A lot of organizations have some older folks that take care of some of that stuff, and I can understand that some of those are a little bit leery to come out and be around all of those people," he said. "I totally get that.'

Leibel noted that the Fair has taken some extra measures including hand sanitizer and handwashing stations – to help keep things clean in the face of rising COVID numbers.

"We understand that people may still have anxiety about

the COVID situation," he said. "We are open 100%, just like normal years at the Fair. We would ask that people that aren't comfortable with that, maybe the Fair's not the best place for them. We just want people to use common sense.

"We're excited to see the smiling faces of the kids," he said. "That's why the Fair Board members are on the Fair Board – because it's all about the kids for us. I think this year it's going to be a great turnout. People are ready to let loose a little bit and come out. We're super excited to have the Fair."

The 2021 Pine County Fair will be held from Tuesday April 3 through Sunday, Aug. 8. As always, the Pine County Fair is both a free gate and free parking event. For more information visit the Pine County Fair Facebook page or www. pinecountyfair.com.

GRANDMA'S HOT DOG

- 6 wieners
- 1/2 c. beef broth
- 1 large onion, thinly sliced
- 1 serrano chili pepper, seeded, chopped
- 1 Tbsp. butter
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 6 hot dog buns
- 3 Tbsp. mayonnaise

Heat oven to 400 degrees. Add wieners to broth in medium skillet; bring to boil. Cook 5 minutes or until the wieners are heated through. Remove wieners; set aside. Stir vegetables into remaining broth; cook on medium-high heat until broth evaporates. Add butter and sugar; cook 5 minutes or until onions are browned, stirring occasionally. Spread cut sides of buns with mayonnaise; place cut-sides up, on baking sheet. Bake 3 minutes or until lightly browned. Fill with wieners and onion mixture. 6 serv-

- 4 bun-length beef franks
- 3 pretzel hot dog buns, split, toasted
- 1/4 c. Thousand Island dressing
- 4 Havarti cheese slices, cut diagonally in half
- 1/2 c. sauerkraut, well drained

Heat the grill to medium heat. Grill ranks 5 to 7 minutes, turning occasionally. Spread the buns with dressing: fill with franks and cheese. Top with sauerkraut. Serves



SIMPLE DOGS-CHOPS-BEANS CASSEROLE


- 8 pork chops
- 1 lb. hot dogs, diced
- Salt and pepper
- Garlic powder
- 1 can (3 lb.) can pork and beans
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 medium green bell pepper, chopped
- 1/4-1/3 c. barbecue sauce
- 3/4 c. ketchup
- 1/4 c. brown sugar
- 1 pinch cayenne

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brown the chops in a frying pan on both sides with salt, pepper and garlic powder. Fry up the hot dog pieces. Grease a Dutch oven or an oven-proof casserole dish (large enough to hold all the ingredients). In a bowl mix together the pork and beans, chopped onion, chopped green pepper, BBQ sauce, ketchup, brown sugar, and cayenne pepper. Layer half of the bean mixture on the bottom of a Dutch oven. Lay the pork chops and hot dogs on top of the bean mixture Top with remaining bean mixture. Bake covered or uncovered for about 1 hour and 15 minutes, or until the chops are tender (if a thicker sauce is preferred then bake covered half of the time and finish baking uncovered). Serves 6-8.

GYRO HOT DOG

- 4 beef hot dogs
- 1/2 c. cucumber Ranch dressing
- 2 tsp. chopped fresh dill
- 2 pita breads, cut in half, warmed 12 thin cucumber slices (about 1/2 cup)
- 2 small plum tomatoes, each cut into
- 1/4 c. crumbled Feta cheese

Grill hot dogs 5 to 7 minutes or until heated through, turning occasionally, Remove from grill. Mix dressing and dill until blended. Pull pita pockets open; fill with franks, cucumbers, tomatoes and cheese. Drizzle with dressing mixture. Serves 4.

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

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
