Severe weather hits Pine County





Storms pummeled trees and damaged buildings in the Hinckley area on Monday evening.

A path of severe weather blew through Pine County on Memorial

Power was shut off to over 11,000 residents in the East Central Energy coverage area.

The storm caused damage to trees, homes and businesses throughout the area. Tree services were out immediately after the storm to clear blocked roads and driveways from downed trees.

ECE crews were out all night to restore power with some still out of power the morning of Tuesday, May 31. As of Tuesday at 11 a.m., Andy Olson, ECE vice president COO and incident commander, said that there were still 313 out-

"We currently have 313 outages impacting 3,300 members," said Olson. "At our highest point, around 11,000 members were without power. Our system had at least 22 broken poles and countless trees/limbs on lines. As our crews cycle out for some much-needed sleep, we are thankful for the additional help of Dakota Electric Association, Polk-Burnett Electric and Skyline Utility Construction employees.'

He added that during times of crisis, ECE has the desire and ability to pull together like none other. We want to stress that nothing is more important than working safely. Throughout the restoration process, we ask that employees speak up when fatigued, take time to do each job properly and thoroughly, and remember that your family needs you to come home

safe (if a little tired). Our members are a priority, but safety is THE priority without compromise."

Pine County Sheriff Jeff Nelson noted that though there were a lot of trees down and many structures impacted, the Sheriff's Office did not have any significant injuries reported.

We are just starting the preliminary damage assessment and will be reporting to the state," said Nelson. "We are asking anyone that has building damage to reach out to Denise from our Emergency Management Office. Please send a text to (320) 438-0309 with your name and address. This will help ensure we know about any issues and can document them well." He added that this may also help secure federal or state disaster

"I would be remiss if I didn't mention the outstanding job the county highway department and fire departments did in their response," added Nelson.

The Pine County Highway Department was out until 4 a.m. Tuesday morning clearing trees, much of which was in the Hinckley area. Pine County engineer, Mark LeBrun, said that the highway department couldn't get to all the trees since some of them were downed with power lines. He said most of the time has been spent clearing the roads, but many trees are still in the ditches, and that clean-up will come in the near future. "The public can let us know if there is a tree down ... we don't know unless someone calls us," he added.

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
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



QUICK FETTUCCINE ALFREDO

- 1 stick butter
- 5 garlic cloves, peeled and
- 2 c. heavy cream
- 2 c. grated Parmesan cheese
- Salt and black pepper
- 12 oz. fettuccine, cooked according to package directions and drained.

In a large skillet, melt the butter over medium heat. Add minced garlic and cook, stirring for 2 minutes. Pour in the cream and stir. Let the mixture heat until it bubbles around the edges, about 5 minutes. Add the Parmesan. Stir until completely melted and smooth. Add a pinch of salt and pepper. Stir in the drained pasta and toss until coated with sauce. Garnish with lemon zest and parsley. Serves 4 to 6 people.

CHICKEN MARINADE AND DREDGE

- 2-3 lbs. chicken breasts, boneless
 - Marinade:
- 1 Tbsp. Tabasco sauce Dredge:

1 c. buttermilk


- 1/2 c. all-purpose flour
- 1-1/2 tsp. seasoned salt
- 1-1/2 tsp. black pepper Pinch of cayenne pepper

Trim boneless chicken breasts and slice each breast in half, so that each portion weighs 3-4 oz. Place chicken. Place chicken in a 9x13-inch pan and add marinade. Cover, place in refrigerator, and let sit overnight. Remove from the marinade, shake off excess liquid, and dredge each piece. Pan fry in at least one inch of oil (cast iron skillet is best) or deep fry over medium heat (about 5 minutes per side). Yields about 12 portions, or 4 servings. Can use for fish, shrimp, and vegetables.

SOUR CREAM RHUBARB PIE

- 3 cups of cut-up rhubarb
- 1-9-inch unbaked pie shell
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1 c. sour cream
- 3 eggs 1/8 tsp. salt
- 3/4 c. sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon

Pour 1/2 cup sugar over the rhubarb in the pie shell. Let this sit. Mix together sour cream, eggs, salt sugar and cinnamon. Beat until well blended. Pour over rhubarb and bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes and then 350 degrees for 40 minutes or until firm.



It was the 24th of May when our Ferrier, Jen Johnson, drove up our driveway, behind her truck was a friend driving a second pickup, horse trailer in tow. I was waiting by the barn, this would be the moment where we see if the smaller (350 lbs maybe), mature pony would be compatible with our 1500 pound, draft mix. So here she was-now at our ranch, being guided off the horse trailer, and the lead rope was handed to me. In person now, she looked so small. For 19 years the horses I lead were much bigger-the top of my head barely even with the top of the horses hip. This little mare I had on a rope was below my waist and suddenly I was struck with the fear of how bad this could go. Jen immediately read my mind, and assured me, the mare "knew how to defend herself."

When King spotted the smaller version of a horse he immediately came from across his pasture and right up to the fence where I stood with her. He was trying to fit his big head through the fence to see if she was really a fellow equine, and I noted she did not flinch. Once he got the scent, his head shot up over the top of the fence and his expression was like he couldn't believe his eyes and nose. Well, he held himself

back from looking too anxious, and he waited for me to detach the lead rope. He slowly approached her, his overall stature seemed completely restored, his head held high and he looked bigger than ever next to her. She kicked up her rear legs to give warning she wasn't to be messed with-in response he spun around to face us standing back at the gate and immediately reared up as if to show us all he was delighted.

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



It's not the path Google Maps would take you, but as destiny (or the 5A subsection of the MSHSL) dictates, the road to Brainerd leads through Mora for the Lady Jags softball team each year. On Thursday, the Hinckley-Finlayson varsity softball traveled to Mora for a day of 5A subsection tournament ball that historically was met with scorching heat. This year, the Jags sported their warm-up jackets in preparation to face the 4th seeded East Central Eagles. The Jags (3rd seed) were coming off a loss to Hill City (2nd seed) on Tuesday and therefore were entering this double-elimination tournament with their backs against the wall facing sudden death elimination.

While the Jags ultimately led the whole game, the East Central Eagles played a stiff game. Anna Degerstrom had the most explosive offensive play of the game with a triple. 

of the inning. Shortstop Jacob


Perrotti singled to start the in-

NATURE NOTES

The cold, late spring has made birds more evident for folks with feeders. Trees without highly developed foliage made the birds more visible and the lack of abundant food made hungry birds appear tamer.

I helped birders from Utah find Waldo amid a slew of warblers at a state park. The beauty of the warblers (mostly American redstarts and yellow warblers, but many other warbler species), orchard orioles, indigo buntings and Swainson's thrushes enthralled

In the land of 14,380 Lakes (according to a DNR database), the deepest natural inland lake in Minnesota is Lake Saganaga in Cook County at 240 feet.

Dennis Distad of Albert Lea asked where birds sleep at night. Birds seek spots protected from weather and predators inside dense foliage in trees, shrubs or vines. Others sleep in cavities, birdhouses and niches. Many birds perch close to tree trunks, which might hold some of the sun's warmth and block the wind. Some take advantage of sheltered places like barns, roofs and ledges to roost. Waterfowl sleep floating in the water and wading birds like herons and egrets sleep standing in the water or on land. Birds that live in open fields or shores might hunker down where they are. There are birds, like most owls, that work the night shift and during nesting seasons, birds will sleep in their nests at night to provide eggs and young with warmth and protection.

community. Each attendee went home with a copy of Dan Buettner's latest book, "The Blue Zones Challenge" prior to its release. The book provides a four-week plan for a longer and better life through this unique lifestyle design that has been inspired by the world's longest living people. Before the presentation

started, Pine County Public Health employees enthusiastically greeted guests as they checked in and directed guests to the ballroom for dinner. The dinner consisted of a beautiful spread of a wide variety of food, and every dish, including beverages, were made from the Blue Zones recipes. The favorite among guests at one table was the chicken tamale with a tropical fruit salsa.

As dinner wrapped up, Steve Hallan, Pine County commissioner, took the stage and briefly spoke about what brought this new health mission to Pine County. Every five years the county conducts a community health assessment, and the results are used to create a community health action plan. The assessment was completed and then COVID-19 happened.

The results showed that social connection, mental health and health economic security were top concerns, so when the pandemic occurred, it was more important than ever to find a way to address these concerns. The question presented was, "What will be our recovery story post-COVID?" Blue Zones was the answer.

Twelve years ago, Albert Lea, Minnesota, was the first location for Blue Zones, and since then, life span and community physical activity rocketed up and have been maintained for a full decade.
