"The best part of the day was actually getting married," said Meshele. "The weather was

gorgeous and my groom showed up. I couldn't have asked for more."

"We kept things very simple. Our wedding was laid back and inexpensive. We had each other. We found a cheap place to get married and put the rest of the pieces together after that," said Meshele.

Meshele credited a low-key approach to minimizing the stress of the day.

"We had very little expectations for the day, so if there were hiccups, we just moved on. As long as we were married at the end of the day, the rest really didn't matter," said Meshele.

The wedding ceremony went smoothly, apart from the 3 year at (802) 558-0409

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old ring bearer falling into the pond in the middle of the vow exchange. The young boy was reaching for a stick in the water, even though his mother--a bridesmaid-had expressly told him to leave the stick alone. The boy was pulled from the 6 inch deep water, wet and startled, but safe. The vows were successfully completed.

The reception was held at the Church of the Messiah Parish House on Glen Street, in Downtown Glens Falls.


"A lot of our guests left very early into the reception, so when we made our grand exit, a lot of people had already left. If I had realized this would happen, we would have combined our grand entrance and exit--a walk in and a walk out--so we could do our official 'finale' before everyone was gone," said Meshele.

The wedding took place in 2008, a time before the everydayness of cell phone cameras had taken over mainstream culture.

"We were a bit disappointed with our professional photos. We got much better pictures from family. If I could go back and do it over again, I would provide disposable cameras for all of our guests to take pictures," said Meshele.

"Sign up for all of the drawings and giveaways. You can get parts of your wedding done completely free," said Meshele.

Time Bowling Alley, Meshele has gone on to get her Master's in Nursing Education, and is a college nursing professor. Mike is finishing his Master's of Art in teaching, and is a high school math teacher in Albany. They live in Lake Luzerne with their 3 young children.




#### **Stay disciplined**
