A proposal to regionalize school districts in the Wildwoods came to an abrupt halt Tuesday, with voters in three Five Mile Beach municipalities overwhelmingly rejecting the

measure.
Residents in North Wildwood, Wildwood Crest and West Wildwood rejected a proposal to form a single school district for youths in kindergarten through 12th

grade.
The proposal was approved by Wildwood.

The proposal, put before Five Mile Beach residents Tuesday in Mile Beach residents Tuesday in the form of a referendum ques-tion, needed to be approved by voters in all four of the Wild-woods for regionalization to oc-

The final result left a major regionalization proponent charging the vote was an attack on wildwood's school system, and; a major regionalization opponent hoping the issue is "dead."

Regionalization proponents who met at the Wildwood Board of Education offices Tuesday expected the measure to fail. but were stunned, and a little angered, by the final vote totals.

"The whole thing was an atlack on Wildwood." said Wildwood Board of Education member Enest Truinan, one of the organizers of the regionalization movement.
