# Concrete reefs broaden beach

### But Sea Isle still doesn't know how much sand can be saved

SEA ISLE CITY - Two experimental reefs designed to control each erosion have widened a nearby beach by as much, as 76 eet, but exactly how much sand can be saved with the mammade reakwaters won't be known for another nine to 11 months,

preakwaters won't be known for another nine to 11 months, officials say.

"The shortline has been increasing and the elevation-has increased also in the area behind the reefs," said Richard Creter, co-inventor of the concrete reess, and president of Breakwaters International, the of-Flemington—"That has not happened-in the area north and south of the reef."

Creter on Wednesday unwelled interin results of a study in which research teams from Lehigh and Drewel Universities, led by Dr. Robert M. Sorensen of Lehigh's limit Hydraulics Laboratory, measured profiles of the 8th Street Beach at wading depth, by boat and from the air.

The two concrete reefs, which weigh 16,800 pounds each, were placed 450 feet offibore in July under a grant from the New Jersey Shore Foundation wo that the reefs, which are valued at \$65,000, have kindered 800 feet of beach at 6th Street eff Landis Avenue et leveled the sand six to 12 inches higher than the surrounding beaches.
