Even with the help of a favorable national poll, Rockefeller's forces are battling uphill to hold the line against a Nixon surge in the final ballot.

Hall conceded that he has no firm commitments from either Romney or Rhodes whose delegations will poll a total of 120 votes.

He said the Rockefeller forces are counting on the support of the 120 votes to be cast when the nominating convention gets down to its main business next Wednesday.

But the Rockefeller forces are not so sure that they can hold out against a Nixon surge in the final ballot.

95 Aboard Liner In Italian Smashup

MILAN, Italy (UPI) — An

Alitalia DC-8 jetliner flying from Rome to Montreal crashed and burned today during a violent thunderstorm in the Apennines.

The 25-year-old Jordanian immigrant spoke last 10 words during a 25-minute hearing, denying his guilt and approving a trial date later this month.

The plane crashed in a wooded area as it was approaching the modern international airport of this Italian industrial capital.

The control tower reported a last radio contact with the sleek, swept-wing plane at 4:08 p.m. Searchers minutes later the plane was reported crashed and burning in a field north of the airport, which lies 30 miles northwest of Milan.

It was the first commercial airline crash in Italy since a Trans World Airlines jet crashed taking off from the Rome airport on Nov. 21, 1966, with a loss of 11 lives.
