TOUGH-MINDED: New group of Lady Cougars look to take it to the competition

South Fremont's season ended in disappointing fashion last year when they lost twice to Teton in the district tournament. This season, South Fremont has a new coach and a mostly new cast of characters in their rotation.

Karlee Thueson is one starter who is returning and looks to use her sweet stroke from downtown to lead the Lady Cougars in scoring.

"Karlee Thueson was second team all-conference last year and she's a great scorer, and I expect her to lead our team," said South Fremont head coach Ryan Campbell.

Kinley Geisler is another returner after providing a bit of a scoring spark for South Fremont last season as a sophomore.

"She's still feeling some nerves, but I think by the end of the year she'll score a lot of points for us," Campbell said. Tyleigh Hill and Malorie Tucker are

also seniors returning to the rotation. "Tyleigh and Karlee are our captains," Campbell said after the team's opening

game against Firth. "Tyleigh will do a lot for us. She's a post that can play some wing, and she's kind of learning how to play post for us because we're just not big. She got some big rebounds for us yesterday, she hit a couple of big threes, which was kind of a nice surprise. She'll just do a lot of hard work for us. We need girls who will go get offensive boards and defend."

Other than those four, the team is all new to varsity.

Rylie Neville has looked good scoring the ball for the Lady Cougars throughout the summer, and in the season so far, after playing on a freshman team last season.

" (Neville's) just kind of a stud," Campbell said. "Varsity ball's a little bit faster. She's kind of getting used to that.

In summer, she had 20-plus points in some of our games."

Campbell hopes to have a rotation of about 10 girls, but could play as many as 13 girls to help apply a pressure-style defense. Offensively, he thinks any girl on his team could put up 10 points on a given night."

"Karlee's a really good player and we have some others who I think, in our conference, will do really well," Campbell said. "I just think we're going to be pretty balanced and be able to get scoring from a lot of different places. It's kind of a nice luxury."

Much of South Fremont's focus will be on playing defense and getting rebounds.

"We're not a big team," Campbell

said. "We want to play really aggressively both defensively and offensively."

The mantra South Fremont players chose this year is 'earn it.'

"Putting in the work to earn their success."

The Lady Cougar's goal is to make it to the state tournament

"We have a tough conference," Campbell said. "Teton returns a lot of girls. Sugar's a state championship team. It'll be a tough year, but that's our goal."

South Fremont might not be big, but they are tough.

"It was kind of something I knew before I came to South. Now, I'm just seeing it first hand," Campbell said. "Our girls are just tough. Tough-minded. We got down early and it was rough

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'LUNCH MONEY:' South Fremont aims to steal a state title

Last season, South Fremont's wrestling team took fourth place in the state wrestling tournament. With many of their best wrestlers back, South Fremont plans to win it all this season.

Tristan Olson returns as a senior to defend his title, and Sawyer Hobbs returns as a senior to defend his third title.

"I think they're going to do well," said South Fremont head coach Jed Clark. "They're hard workers offseason wise. They're confident. We put a lot of faith in them. We move them around where we need to so they get tough matches all throughout the season."

Hobbs plans to primarily wrestle at 195 after wrestling at 182 for most of last season, and Olson will likely primarily wrestle at 160 again.

Cesar Tavares placed third at state last season at 145 and is slated to wrestle at 152 as a senior this season.

"He's strong," Clark said. "He had a good offseason as well and a good summer. He's going to do well."

Bo Hackworth placed third at 126 last season and will likely wrestle at

138 as a senior this season.

"He's a little bigger but he's strong where he's at," Clark said. "He'll do well."

Gustavo Carranza also returns after placing sixth in the state tournament at



106 last season. Right now, he is slated to wrestle 120.

"He's got a lot of confidence in himself," Clark said. "He had a good summer camp and a good football season. He'll be in one of those lighter weights."

River Eddins also went to state last year but narrowly missed placing by one match. This season he's also slated to wrestle 152.

"He didn't place but he was one match away from placing," Clark said. "He'll be between Cesar and Tristan. He's a kid that works hard too. I'm excited to have him there too."

Jackson Coverley also went to state last season. He'll wrestle 145 this season.

Bryan Popocatl returns to the varsity lineup as a junior after going to state

last season. He'll wrestle either heavy weight or 220. Titus Leavitt is another who will vie for a varsity spot at 220.

The remainder of the team will be filled in with experienced freshmen and sophomores and seniors who are pretty new to wrestling.

"We have some new seniors," Clark said. "I like that kids are willing to try something. I feel like we have a team that kids want to be a part of. The seniors that have been there, they're good students they've put in their time."

South Fremont has 18 freshmen that have certified to wrestle this season.

"For most teams having a lot of freshmen, you'd think it was kind of a rebuilding year, and it kind of is for us," Clark said. "We lost some tough kids last year. Easton Banta, Jordan Dodge and Daylin Duncan and others."

"We have some tough, tough freshmen," Clark said. "They are freshmen but they're going to do well. We have See **WRESTLING**, page 6

South Fremont boys reloaded and ready to compete

South Fremont boys' basketball team's 2018-19 season concluded when they lost to Marsh Valley 48-46 in the game that would have sent them to the state tournament. Their 2019-2020 season begins with optimism as they return a few key pieces from last year and have added some depth.

Post Tag Bair dominated in stretches for South Fremont last season and it looks like he's only gotten better.

"Tag had a good offseason," said South Fremont head coach Ryon Pope. "He's worked hard. He has a great love for basketball. He has a lot of natural ability plus he's just a gym rat. He loves getting in the gym and putting in time. I've never known him to miss an open gym or a practice or anything like that. He's always wanting to get somewhere to shoot a ball. We expect him to have a good year this year and we're excited to have him back."

Not only is Bair better, but he's also bigger.

"He's between 6'5" and 6'6" and I think he might be really close to 6'6" now," Pope said. "He's stronger and he's worked on his game, so I'm excited for the possibilities that he has for this upcoming year."

Senior post Jace Neville was also a big part of South Fremont's offense last season and looks to take on a bigger role this year.

"Jace finished last season playing really good basketball," Pope said. "He was really tough to handle down on the block and we would post him against guys and he would almost always get a nice look at the basket. He drew a lot of fouls and he was a big **BOYS BASKETBALL**

The Cougars moved, then-freshmen, Kaimen Peebles up from JV near the end of last season, and he had a few good stretches scoring the ball.

"He gave us a really good spark," Pope said. "He's a year older and I expect him to have a really good year."

Dallin Orme is another player returning to the South Fremont varsity rotation.

quite a few in those lower weights that are going to be pretty solid all the way through."

South Fremont should be a little deeper than they were last season with a wrestler at each position and two wrestlers at most positions.

Clark attributes his freshmen's skills to the coaching staff of South Fremont's feeder program, the Upper Valley Aces including Rhett and Brock Banta.

"There's a lot of offseason stuff that's been put together for this team," Clark said. "It's not just me. They've developed these kids that are coming in to be successful as freshmen. They are freshmen but they're going to win a lot of matches."

Clark said he is just one part of the machine that is South Fremont

wrestling.

"I guess what I want to say is, it's not me that's built this team, it's the whole wrestling community. There's a lot of guys who've put in a lot of time and effort into building South Fremont wrestling. I'm just ecstatic to be a part of it and to be able to be in the kids' corners and just be a small part of it."

One slogan South Fremont players are considering this year is 'lunch money.'

"The premise behind it is, we're going to be the top dogs this year," team captain Tristan Olson said. "We're going to take everybody else's lunch money. We're not going to let anybody stomp on us."

South Fremont only has one goal this season.

"We want to win it (all) this year," Clark said. "We have a good shot."

"He was a really nice point guard, a really good on-ball defender and good at attacking the basket," Pope said.

Talon Maupin is also coming back for his senior year and his third year as a regular contributor for the varsity team.

"He had knee surgery in the fall and couldn't play football, but he is back and just about 100 percent and should have a good senior season," Pope said.

The rest of South Fremont's team is new. Brock Hunter played JV last season and will be a solid player coming off of the bench.

"We graduated a large senior class last year but we do have some really good players in our senior class."

Bridger Poulsen and Bridger Erickson will play guard and are good athletes who've played big roles on the football and baseball teams. Ryker Hurt is junior post.

"He's grown a lot," Pope said. "He's about 6'4" he's very athletic and he's starting to develop the skills that will really help to have a good junior year."

Carson Draper is another junior who should play.

"He can go inside and outside," Pope said. "He's a great offensive rebounder and a good defender. He just never stops working hard."

South Fremont should be much deeper this season.

"We have 10 on varsity and we expect all 10 of them to play," Pope said.

South Fremont will likely also switch up the way they play defensively with more man defense than they played last season.

"We should be more athletic, a little quicker than last year," Pope said. "I think we'll be able to get up and down the floor a little bit more and maybe fill in some high-pressure defense occasionally. We do have a strong athletic group. Plus, we do still have some good size. We have several kids who can play inside or out. I think we have more depth than

last year. And definitely a little more defense, a little more rebounding, a little more offensive firepower."

South's slogan this year is "all in."

"We are just working to get all of us totally committed to what we're doing," Pope said. "Everybody getting on the same page and working hard and sharing a common goal."

Pope doesn't want to set a specific goal about how many games they'll win or how far they'll go in end-ofseason tournaments.

"I don't want to do anything that might limit us," Pope said. "It's literally we are going to just focus every day at practice, pushing ourselves to get to the next level every day."

Pope thinks those who come out to watch his team will get their money's worth.

"We have a very fun team to watch," Pope said. "We had a good summer and I hope that people will come out and support these guys. They're going to be entertaining to watch. We'll be able to really have some great nights out on the hard court."

Fans of 3A district VI should see some competitive games this year.

"We have a very tough conference," Pope said. "I don't know that there is a favorite. That's for real. Sugar and South and Teton are, I think, probably, the most evenly matched we've been in quite some time. It's going to be a very entertaining season and especially the district tournament is going to be very exciting."

Madison wrestling welcomes new coach

Aaron Peterson was hired to lead the Bobcats wrestling team after former head coach, Jake Lords, accepted an assistant college coaching job. Peterson is no stranger to Madison wrestling as he has been involved with the youth wrestling programs. He also wrestled for Madison, placing in the state tournament three times before moving on to wrestle for Ricks College.

"I have been interested in the success of Madison wrestling since I was in high school," Peterson said. "My philosophy is to develop kids to be good people as well as good wrestlers. We do that by stressing doing good things from the inside out."

Peterson will be inheriting a nucleus of a good team with three returning state-placers, five state-qualifiers and six seniors. Jaden Smith placed third at state with Tyson Clark taking fourth and Josh Bensen placing sixth last season.

"We are missing wrestlers to fill the upper weights," Peterson said. "It would be nice if we could get some of those talented kids out to help us fill them."

Last year Nathan Sanders at 220 and Jorge Diaz at 285 both took second in district and qualified for state, but right now the Madison squad does not have anyone on the roster over 195 pounds. Also gone are two district champions, Crit Wilcox (120) and Tre Clark (195).

The Bobcats' strength will come from the middle and light weights with Noah Ingram, Diego Vergara, Ethan Burbidge, Jarom Ricks, Colby Wadsworth, Ikaika and Kekoa Jenson along with Smith, Clark and Benson.

"I really think David Wheeler and Orion Stokes will surprise a lot of people," said Peterson. "We also have a great group of freshmen coming in."

Notable freshmen wrestling for the

"Our team goals are to place in the top two teams at district and in the top 10 at state," commented Peterson. "Highland will be really tough again this year, as they have been for several years, but we should be just behind them."

With the expansion of the athletic facilities, Madison's wrestling room was tripled in size which will allow the 30 to 35 wrestlers plenty of room to develop their skills. Peterson will build his program by working on takedowns about half of the time while splitting the other half between bottom and top moves. He will be assisted by Lucas Ingram, Mike Wilder, Ryan Spencer and Jake Lords (not related to the former coach).

Madison will open their season at home in a quad with Hillcrest, Bonneville and Rigby on December 4.

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Five new starters look to lead Madison to state

Last season, Madison's basketball team came within 12 points of winning the state title, but this year's team will look far different than last year's.

Every player in Madison's starting lineup last season graduated.

"We are a completely different team this year," to be honest, said Madison head coach Travis Schwab. "I started five seniors last year and my first guy off of the bench was a senior as well. We were very senior-heavy."

This season, Madison returns three players to their varsity team: Carson Downey, Dawson Wills and Mark Williams.

"We're inexperienced as far as floor time and that kind of thing, and when I start five guys on the fifth of December in our first game, we'll probably start five guys that have (almost) never started a varsity game before."

Downey will likely start at point guard for the Bobcats.

"Carson is our captain and he's our point guard and is the floor general," Schwab. "We expect a lot from him."

Wills scored seven points in the state title game last year and Schwab expects him to pick up right where he left off.

"Dawson is kind of the big man down low and he'll play post for us again," Schwab said. He got some good time and his last game was phenomenal. He played against Borah in that state championship and played really well. So we're excited to have him back."

Mark Williams is the final returner for the Bobcats.

"Mark is a defensive stopper and

we expect big things from Mark as well with those three kind of being that core that comes back for another year," Schwab said.

Taden King and Wesley Jensen played well together on the junior varsity team last year. Jensen is a senior and King is a junior.

"Those two were an unstoppable force last year on JV," Schwab said. "Granted, it was JV but they played really well together on JV."

Braxton Pierce, Tyson Lerwill, Joey Williams and star quarterback Easton Cordero will all vie for spots in the varsity rotation.

"It'll be fun to have Easton and his athleticism on the team as well," Schwab said.

Schwab isn't sure exactly what his scoring attack will look like this season.

be out primary scorers as far as most minutes played. I feel like we're pretty deep as far as how far I can go down into the bench and get some points from there."

Madison is quite long this year with Downey playing point at 6'6," Wills and Jensen at 6'5," King at 6'4" and Williams at 6'2." But Schwab said the team will have to pick up their intensity defensively if they want to be like last year's defensive squad that was replete with quick guards.

"This group of kids has not shown the love for defense like the team did last year," Schwab said. "That's one of the question marks that I have, in all honesty, is how good are we defensively. Last year, I knew every single game stepping on the floor that we were the best team defensively. I mean we gave up 44 points a game defensively. This team, they have all sorts of talent and ability and potential, but defensively, we've got to get better."

Madison's shooting shirts say 'family,' based on the shooting shirts that players wore in the NCAA tournament last season. Madison's team is pretty new to varsity but Schwab hopes they really want to get back to the state title.

"I think the goal for every team is to make it to the state tournament and then see what happens," Schwab said. "I would love to say that our goal is a state championship. 
North Fremont's mantra will once again be, 'team.'






Summer basketball has helped the Diggers adjust their offense on the fly.


