



# THE NORTH SHORE'S TOP HOGS ARE READY TO LAY IT OLL THE CONTROLL TO LAY IT OLD THE CO

hey are the unsung heroes of football — the guys who put their bodies on the line, both literally and figuratively, on every snap and almost never get to touch the ball or score a point.

What ignites their passion? What keeps them pushing the sled in practice, hour after hour and day after day?

We gathered senior offensive and defensive linemen of all different shapes and sizes from some of the North Shore's marquee programs — Matt Noonan of Salem (5-foot-9, 200 lbs.), Billy Shaw of Beverly (6-1, 260 lbs.), Michael Lock of Peabody (6-foot, 250 lbs.), Aidan Michaud of Marblehead (6-4, 305 lbs.), Tommy MacDonald of Bishop Fenwick (6-5, 270 lbs.), James Taylor of St. John's Prep (6-1, 315 lbs.), Ron Remotigue of Danvers (5-10, 210 lbs.) and Henry Smith of Hamilton-Wenham (5-10, 190 lbs.) — for a wide ranging conversation about the trials and tribulations of life in the trenches.

### Salem News: What does it mean to be a lineman, knowing that you might never get to touch the ball?

Matt Noonan: No credit is needed. I mean, they need us to score, and that's enough right there.

### SN: Do you feel appreciated by the skills players?

Matt Noonan: Absolutely. Vinnie (Gaskins, Salem's 2017 standout running back), any time he had a really good game or broke a record, he always said he'd never have done any of it without us linemen.

**Henry Smith**: I agree. The running backs know that without the line, they won't be able to do much. We're really what makes the team function well and be able to succeed. Everyone on the team knows that, and that matters more than what fans might know.

### SN: Some of the teams run hurry-up offenses. As a lineman, is it taxing to sprint to the line, then block again?

Aidan Michaud: Of course I'm getting out of breath (in those circumstances), but we train hard all summer. We run every day. We're all used to it. Run blocking, especially in the hurry-up, especially when the other team is gassed, that's when you get your pancake blocks — so even though you're tired, that's the most fun part.

### SN: Mike and Ron have gone against each other in a game (Danvers beat Peabody, 7-0, in 2017). How did you prepare for each other?

Ron Remotique: It was all film. We did our techniques in practice, studied their team. It was a great game, very respectable.

Michael Lock: It was a backand-forth game. I learned a lot of little techniques, used the film to try to get prepared for the game.

### SN: What's the bond of being linemen like? Is it a brotherhood?

Tommy MacDonald: It's part of being a linemen that you Matt Noonan: We all do the

Tommy MacDonald: It depends on the situation. If you're a player you can play, it doesn't matter if you're 5-foot-4 or 6-foot-7. You can't

Aidan Michaud: You can't measure hurt, either. It's really about wanting it more, comparing yourself in practice, film and weight room. It's mental and physical toughness more than size.

Matt Noonan: I'm probably the shortest guy on my line, maybe 5-foot-9. I wasn't supposed to be starting but I wanted it more. By my size, I'm not supposed to be there, but if you work hard you'll get it.

### SN: On the opposite tact, what's the pressure like when you're a younger player trying to go against veterans in practice or in games? Is there a lot of pressure there?

James Taylor: I put pressure on myself (as a freshman) because I wanted to be the guy. I wanted to start, so I worked extra hard in oneon-ones. I'd lose because they had more technique than me, but I'd put up a good fight. I was nervous going in, but I went in and fought that much harder.

## SN: What's your favorite oneon-one drill?

Matt Noonan: Board drill. James Taylor: Circle drill. Michael Lock: Oklahoma.

Salem News: Would you rather have a hard drill and hit and get hit, or do you ever take it easy with a "peace pact" in practice?

Aidan Michaud: You don't win taking it easy.

Matt Noonan: You have to hit each other. In Salem, it's hit-hit-hit.

**Ron Remotique:** There's nothing like when the whole team is standing around the drill cheering and making noise.

# Peabody hopes to end drought by spreading wealth

PEABODY — Ask the five captains of the 2018 Peabody High football team what's one thing that would make their senior season a success and you'll get five different, increasingly ambitious answers.

"To make the playoffs," two-way lineman Abe Kaba said, followed by a chorus of answers that included, "To not lose a game," as well as "To make a Super Bowl," plus "To win the NEC," and finally just, "Be better than

In order to make those goals a reality, head coach Mark Bettencourt knew his Tanners needed changes. Two years of struggles scoring points, and missing the playoffs in 2017, led the sixth-year boss to embrace the zone blocking and threeand four-receiver sets of the spread offense.

"I don't want to be one game over .500; I want to compete for championships," said Bettencourt, "And I didn't think that old smashmouth offense was going to get us there. That's not the personnel we have now."

Senior quarterback Matt Jandrisevits, a transfer from Malden Catholic, will be the trigger man. He's got an excellent feel for the deep ball and a stable of

Though they're going wide and employing the shotgun, the Tanners still expect to be balanced offensively. With junior Angel sturdier after leading the team in rushing as a 10th grader, there's no reason they shouldn't.

defensive end.

The Tanners return three starters on the interior of the line with captain Michael Lock at center and captains Kaba and Chris Glass at guard. Senior Aiden Kelleher is ready to step into a starting role at tackle, and junior Phil Makoci has been dynamite so far at the other tackle spot.

"We've got five guvs that can protect, a back in (captain) Jake Sousa that can help us protect, a good quarterback and a stable of guys who can make plays with the ball in space," said Bettencourt. "The roster is suited to this offense, and it's our job as coaches to scheme it to put them in the best spots to succeed."

Though the Tanners have been solid on defense in recent years, they're revamping that scheme as well with less emphasis on

size in the middle and more on speed on the outside. As a consequence, this year's training camp has been hyper-focused on film work and playbook installation with the players trying to soak it all in.

"It feels like an AP class," said Sousa, who is taking over at middle linebacker as Glass shifts to defensive end. "But this kind of learning pays off a lot more."

In the defensive backfield, senior Carlos Hernandez has enjoyed a strong training camp, as have Jack Woods and Joey Mastromatteo. Joe Casey could contribute at linebacker, while Brandon Caniff should step in right away in a safety

"We're throwing a lot at the players. To be honest, I've lost sleep over it. Is it too much? Are they getting it?," said Bettencourt. "So far in the scrimmages, they are."

Peabody lost four of its first five games last season, costing them a playoff berth even through they rebounded to finish over .500. They also haven't won a season opener since 2014, putting a big bull'seye on September 7 against Somerville.

"There's no better time than now," said Norman, "Legit, that has to be our approach for the whole season."

# Beverly aims to get back on the winning track

There are many times when quality far outshines quantity.


Not necessarily in football — particularly at the high school level — where having a large roster can be to any squad's benefit, whether it's having plenty of depth or a plethora of talented players to plug into the lineup.

For the Beverly High Panthers, they're hoping that's exactly the case.

Welcoming more than 90 players out at the start of tryouts, the Orange-and-Black will be looking to get back to their winning ways this fall under third-year head coach Andrew Morency after suffering just their second losing campaign in the past 13 years.

"The huge turnout and strong preseason has our team enthusiastic and driven," said Morency, the BHS Hall of Famer whose program has two state Super Bowl triumphs (2010 and 2012) on its resume this decade. "I feel like we have a huge 1-2-3 punch on offense; the key for us will be if our defense can improve on our third down efficiency from a year ago."

That three-headed offensive monster Morency speaks of — seniors Ryan Barror at quarterback and captain Clayton McAlpine

Since the last time that occured (1999 and 2000), the Panthers have gone 13-4 against their arch rivals. They'll look to bounce back on the holiday this season at home after dropping the 2017 clash in Salem for the first time in seven seasons.

in the backfield, along with extremely athletic junior wideout Duncan Moreland — should mesh well in the Panthers' multi-look offense and have the team's fans

eager to see how many times they can reach paydirt.

The last time we saw Barror in a live game, he caught three touchdown passes and ran a kickoff back 79

yards for a fourth score in his team's Thanksgiving Day loss at Salem (the most TDs ever scored by a player from the losing team in 'The Game'). He saw limited time under center in 2017 (completing 3 of 4 passes for 94 yards and a TD), but is ready to make the transition to calling signals after serving primarily as a wideout.

McAlpine was Beverly's second-leading rusher a season ago, picking up 448 yards and a half-dozen touchdowns on 80 carries. He also caught nine passes for 78 yards. Moreland didn't get the rock often as a sophomore — but made the most of his chances when he did, scoring via the ground (4 carries for 44 yards) and once as a pass catcher (3 receptions for 77 vards). Touches won't be a problem for him this fall.

Another big weapon for the Panthers will be tight end Bobby Adams, another senior captain. A big (6-foot-4, 230 lbs.) target with soft

hands who runs smart routes and is excellent in pass protection, he'll rarely leave the field when the Garden City boys have the ball.

The team's third captain is Patrick Parsons, a shifty senior receiver who will likely operate on the opposite side of Moreland, giving Barror a pair of gluefingered wideouts.

Defensively is where the Panthers must clamp down to improve their overall stock. They gave up 271 points last fall (their most in 15 years) and couldn't get off the field in those aforementioned key third down scenarios. But there is good news to report, with veterans back in starting roles or teammates with experience ready to step in and fill a need in the team's 3-3 stack.

Adams and McAlpine can alternate between defensive end and outside linebacker; with his nose for the ball and brute strength to bring down opponents, McAlpine could easily wind up being one of the top tacklers on the North Shore.

Billy Shaw, a senior, is back at nose guard while classmate Caeden Hale will line up next to him at defensive tackle. Sophomores Jonus Pavia and Billy time on the D-line. Junior Braeden Pratt, another athletic specimen, and senior Paul Mulumba will serve

as inside linebackers, with fellow 12th graders Foster Smallman and Andrew Avila on the outside. Sophomore Huriel Calice should also find himself in the ILB mix.

Parsons, Moreland, Barror, senior Mikey Andersen and sophomores Jaichaun Stanton-Jones and Danny Morency will patrol the defensive secondary. Morency is also a quarterback who could see time at the position should the Panthers choose to utilize Barror as a receiver in certain formations.

Getting out to a strong start could do wonders for Beverly, but that's easier said than done. Three of its first four games, however - Lynn English, Gloucester and Marblehead — are Adams can also expect to see against clubs that won their respective NEC Tiers a vear ago, although all three games will be played at grand old Hurd Stadium.

# Danvers hoping success breeds success in 2018

Statistically speaking, there has never been a better time to be a varsity football player for the Danvers High Falcons.

The Oniontowners come into the 2018 season riding the wave of five straight winning seasons, the first time in the program's 117year history that has ever happened. They've won five playoff games and captured a divisional playoff crown in the last half-decade while winning 36 games and producing a .643 winning percentage, the school's bestever for a five-year span.

To that, this year's Falcons say that's great. Now we want to go out and do even better.

"We expect to be able to compete with everyone on the schedule and will be defined by the players' work from last year's club, the ethic, toughness and charac- Falcons are experienced ter, which is the team's main and athletic. Their linemen strength," said second year head coach Ryan Nolan.

Do the Falcons have enough to dethrone the fivetime Northeastern Conference Tier 1 champions from Marblehead? That will play out on the gridiron over the next seven weeks, but the title could be decided when the two clubs meet in Danvers on Friday, Oct. 19, the week before the playoffs begin.

"We've got a tremendously hard working and committed core group of players," added Nolan, "with leaders in every grade."

Having lost few seniors are also much larger, having committed to the weight room in the offseason.

one of the team captains, is among the leaders up front who starts on both sides of the ball. So does senior two-way starter Lance Ledesma, fellow senior Ron Remotigue (who can play the line or at tight end), senior tight end Almany Vargas and sophomore

Andrew Chronis. Senior Rob Murphy, junior Jacob Stone and sophomore Ben Wilichoski are others who figure to be matched up in plenty of 1-on-1 battles in the trenches.

"The O-line is very much improved and has experienced a lot of varsity game action," admitted Nolan. "The coaches feel very Tom Walfield, a junior and confident that eight-plus players can play up at the varsity level."

Matt McCarthy, a senior captain and excellent student, leads the skill position players. A shifty running back who ran for 457 yards and five scores a year ago while also catching 16 passes for an additional 381

yards and two touchdowns, he has the speed to beat defenders to the outside and is savvy enough to follow his blockers between the tackles for big gains.

Athletic juniors Ezra Lombardi, Richie Canova and J.P. Kelter join McCarthy in the backfield to give the Falcons balance and depth. Junior fullbacks John Strangie, Russ Canova and Mike Morrill have plenty of talent and physicality to move the chains as well via the ground.

Brendan Treacy, who saw some time at quarterback a year ago, will be the No. 1 signal caller this time around. Out of both the Falcons' I-formation and

spread packages, he'll have the option of throwing it to a bevy of receivers, including seniors Justin DiTomaso and Kyle Little and junior Jeremy Hilton.

"Brendan has worked very hard, and we expect big things from him as an athletic QB," said Nolan. "Matt McCarthy leads our group of skill position players, but Ezra, J.P. Kyle and Justin, among others, are all primed for breakout seasons offensively after seeing great success on defense last year."

Defensively, Danvers will run multiple seven-man fronts. A versatile and deep set of linebackers include Mike Shannon, Remotigue, Vargas, Russ Canova, Richie Canova, Strangie, Morrill and Wilichoski, with Walfield, Ledesma, Chronis, Murphy and Stone the main cogs in the defensive line. The secondary will be led by McCarthy, DiTomaso, Lombardi, Kelter, Hilton and

In addition, state champion wrestler Max Leete, a sophomore, will assume the Falcons' kicking duties and, according to Nolan, shows great promise.

# Marblehead looks to continue winning tradition

Expectations surrounding the five-time defending Northeastern Conference champion Marblehead High football squad are lofty once again — and understandably so.

The Magicians went 10-1 a year ago, earning a spot in the Division 4 North title game for the third straight season. They reached the state Super Bowl at Gillette Stadium in Foxborough two seasons ago, and have more playoff wins (10) and games (15) over the last five years than any other North Shore

During that same time period Marblehead has been nearly unstoppable at home (the Magicians sport a ridiculous 29-2 mark at Piper Field during that time) and has proven itself as a dynamite defensive group that seems to find a way to grind out games even when the offense isn't clicking.

So the question is: can this year's roster continue Marblehead's recent run of gridiron excellence?

"Unfortunately for us, we're at a stage in our program where there will always be high expectations," said head coach Jim Rudloff. "This team will take that as a challenge and try to meet that.

Guys like captain Aidan Michaud, a 6-foot-4, 305 pound force, as well as Kyle Wheeler, Jack Herman (6-foot-3, 291 pounds), Cal Leveroni and Sam Worster

— all senior lineman on both sides of the ball — are poised for big curtain call seasons in the trenches. If the line can do its job for Marblehead, things will be much easier for the rest of the team.

Cronin, Eric Faia, Derek Testa and Tamelle Platt all provide speedy options out of the backfield while Mason Poisson (slot receiver/linebacker) and 6-foot-4 Declan Rudloff (OT/DE) will be leaned on much more this year if the Magicians expect to reach their goals.

# Witches eager to continue winning ways

"One of the things that's been really good as we're getting started this season is that we have some very talented kids," said Bouchard, who's team is

Among those lost to graduation was star running back Vinnie Gaskins, who led the North Shore in rushing touchdowns (21), rushing yards (1,682) and total touchdowns (24) a season ago while also setting Salem's single-game individual rushing (305) and touchdown (5) marks. Production like that will certainly be difficult to replace, but Bouchard is confident his new offensive weapons will be up to the challenge.

There's junior receivers Devin Tolbert and Frederick Koffi, both of whom have, according to Bouchard, looked exceptional through the preseason. There's fellow junior Wayne Holloway,

who saw time at various offensive positions last year and looks to be a solid quarterback option this fall.

There's also a slew of big bodies up front such as center and team co-captain Matt Noonan as well as bruising guard Malcolm Batista, both of whom are poised to manhandle the trenches. Irvin Tineo is another guy who looks to be an integral piece to the offensive line after sitting out due to injury last year.

"Our offensive and defensive lines are probably one of our biggest strengths," said Bouchard. "I think we're building on things we worked on really hard last year. Some of the people who were maybe on the roster but kind of out of the limelight will have to


be on the smaller side, but he's strong, fast and a hard hitter."
