Clambake and games of skill among full lineup of family festival events

If you are hankering for a traditional New England clambake with steamed mussels, creamy clam “chowdah,” and a plate loaded with coleslaw, buttery sugar corn, and lobsters fresh from the trap, save the date of Friday, June 17.

That’s when the popular **Danvers Clambake** will be back to kickoff the Danvers Family Festival this year.

Held in the picnic area of Endicott Park, 57 Forest St., the clambake will also include oldies — but goodies — tunes from the ‘60s and ‘70s. The event is limited to 300 people at an unbeatable price for a clambake of \$25 per person, but tickets must be purchased in advance.

Danvers Family Festival is about all things Independence Day, and the event will pack plenty of punch.

Besides the clambake, there are 37 separate events. A complete list and schedule of all the events can be found at www.danversfamilyfestival.com. There’s even a mobile app available for download.

“Whether you like partying at the yacht club (**Party on the Veranda**, Danversport Yacht Club, Friday, July 1), listening to local songbirds (**Danvers Idol**, finals at Danvers High, Saturday, June 18), dancing on Maple Street (**Oldies Night** in Danvers Square, Wednesday, June 29) or enjoying the beautiful outdoors (**Endicott Park Day**, Saturday, June 25) Danvers is the place to be this summer,” says the festival’s 2016 co-chairpersons Doug Lewis and Karen Hanson in their introduction.

Back for a second year is **Danvers Field Day**, which will be full of friendly competitions. This event will coincide with the **Scoop-Ahhh-Bowl** ice-cream

smorgasbord. Both events will be held Saturday, July 2 from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m., at Plains Park on Conant Street, adjacent to the Holten Richmond Middle School. There will be an obstacle course, skills competitions and pickleball, among

other things. Preregistration is required for the whiffle ball competition.

Those who like it hot, hot, hot should check out the new Chili Festival at **Endicott Park Day** on June 25. The event runs rain or shine, and it includes a doll

carriage parade, face painting, Shiyanne’s Tea Party and rides for \$5.

Those who want to check out some Salem Village history, and help preserve a historic

landmark tied to the 1692 witch hysteria, should check out the **1912 Gala Day and Bazaar** at the Rebecca Nurse Homestead, 149 Pine St., from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday, June 25. Admission is just 25 cents to turn back the clock with 1912 clothes, refreshments and games. There will also be a limited run of the Nurse Homestead's famous strawberry shortcakes.

Curious kids and adults alike will enjoy **Touch a Truck Day**, which will be held in

the back parking lot of the Liberty Tree Mall, 100 Independence Way, on Saturday, June 18 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Sponsored by the Liberty Tree Mall, the event will feature big trucks and other vehicles

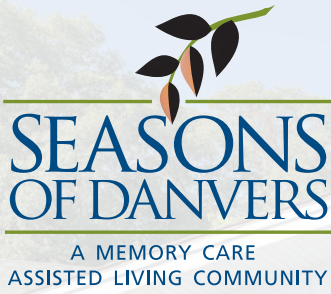

51st festival features arts, food and fireworks

Marblehead has been hosting a summer arts festival for half a century now.

Music, painting and film are just a few of the categories featured at the Marblehead Festival of the Arts, which will begin its next 50 years this

Fourth of July weekend. Festivities will take place Friday, July 1 through Monday, July 4.

Art exhibits will be held starting Friday from 2 to 7 p.m., then Saturday, Sunday and Monday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., at venues all around old Marblehead, starting with paintings, drawings and prints in Abbot Hall.

Mixed media will be featured at St. Michael's Church, and photography at Old Town House, while crafts will also be displayed at Abbot Hall.

King Hooper Mansion will be the site of the popular "Painting the Town" event, in which juried painters work en plein air — French for "in the open air" — at various spots around

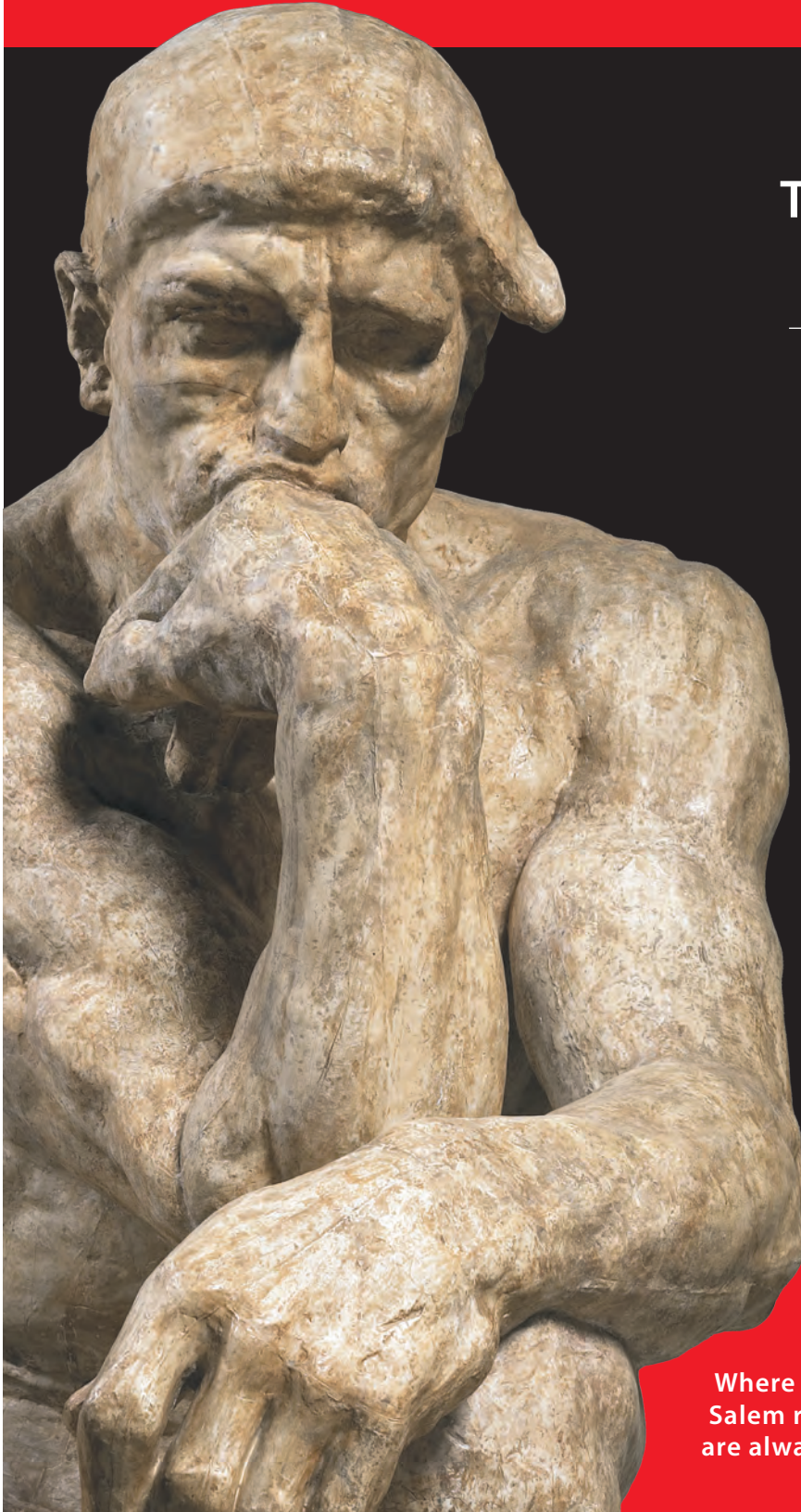
town, then bring their finished work back to the mansion for viewing and judging.

Most of the art is for sale, and buying artwork helps to raise money for both the artist and the festival, which receives a commission. The festival also awards scholarships in the arts

to talented youngsters.

There is also a Writers' World at the Unitarian Universalist Church, with workshops for aspiring poets, fiction writers and journalists, as well as readings by established talents throughout the weekend.

The Artisans' Marketplace is held at Abbot Hall on Saturday and Sunday, and features an arts-and-crafts show with vendors from all over New England selling their unique creations. The artisans have been selected by a panel of judges, and will offer hand-made jewelry, hand-painted furniture, paintings, photographs and more.

There are always festivals within the festival, such as the Children's Festival, with plenty of family friendly art-related activities.

In the street festival, clowns on stilts, magicians and other types of engaging acts visit lower Washington Street and

put on a show. A kite festival on Devereux Beach is usually held, where people can build and fly their own colorful kites.

A model boat event will allow young mariners to try their hand at setting ships out to sea in the safe confines of Redd's Pond.

The Short Film Festival will

be held in Crocker Park on Sunday at 9 p.m. This event usually lasts around 90 minutes and features short films that are just under 10 minutes long, with a few lasting longer.

These films are an eclectic mix of narratives, documentaries and animation, and all share unique visions of the

world.

The stage at Crocker Park, which has amazing views of Marblehead Harbor, will also host the performing arts, Friday through Monday from 6 to 10:30 p.m. Local musicians, as well as talented performers from around the region, will offer songs for a range of tastes, from the Great

Before the bangs, pops, whistles and crackles begin, Marblehead Harbor is illuminated by red flares stationed along its perimeter. Shortly after, fireworks are launched from a barge and ignite the sky for audiences on land and sea.

The 51st annual Beverly Homecoming will feature more than 40 events over 10 days, with plenty of opportunities to enjoy music, food, sports and entertainment in the oceanside community.

This year's Homecoming will start on Friday, July 29, and end with concerts and fireworks on Sunday, Aug. 7.

"Our mission is really renewing Beverly's spirit," says Beverly Homecoming president Estelle Rand. "To me it's an opportunity to show off what's good about

The opening weekend will include the annual city tennis tournament, tours of Hospital Point Lighthouse, lobster boat races, Tiny Tots Day, and a concert and movie at Lynch Park.

Events will continue through the week, highlighted by the Ice Cream Social and Bike Rodeo on Monday; the Lip Sync Extravaganza on Tuesday; the Lobster Festival on Wednesday; Senior Day and the 5K Homecoming Race on Thursday; and the Kids' Carnival on Friday.

A relatively new event called Bev Fit Fest will return for its second year. It's a day of free activities at Dane Street Beach run by Beverly businesses that focus on health and fitness.

The annual Thursday night Concert on the Common, held at Beverly Common, will feature the Los Sugar Kings, a Boston-based Cuban roots, rock and reggae fusion band.

Many of the events will be held at Lynch Park, the city's 16-acre oceanside park. The

downtown will also get its time in the spotlight with a block party on Cabot Street sponsored by Beverly Main Streets.

The last day, Sunday, Aug. 7, will include a full day of concerts at the music shell at Lynch Park. Homecoming ends that night with fireworks, which can be observed not only from Lynch Park but from Dane Street Beach and Independence Park.

For the second year in a row, there will also be a fireworks cruise boat leaving from Glover's Wharf to enable people to watch the fireworks from the harbor.

10th summer of Salem Jazz and Soul Festival

As the weather warms up in Salem, the sounds of jazz start to fill the air.

The Salem Jazz and Soul Festival, now in its 10th year, started off the season on May 14 with its Berklee Summer Series.

The series features four performances by dynamic, young musical talents from Berklee College of Music in Boston, one of the premier schools in the world for jazz musicians.

The main festival, featuring professional jazz and soul musicians from around the region and beyond, will be held at Salem Willows on Saturday, Aug. 20 and Sunday, Aug. 21.

The Berklee Series opened with MIXCLA, featuring Zahili

Gonzalez and Zamora, and continues with Maddie Jay and the pH Collective, which plays acid

jazz, hip hop, pop and funk, on Saturday, June 11.

Bahamian bassist, vocalist

and composer Selah Poitier will appear Saturday, July 9, to be followed on Saturday, Aug. 13 by RickExpress, who plays rhythm and blues, jazz and neo-soul.

The events are free, like everything sponsored by Salem Jazz and Soul, and are held at Derby Square in Salem, or at Koto Restaurant at 90 Washington St. when the weather is bad. Each performance takes place from 5 to 7 p.m.

Louis Armstrong used to play at the Willows, and one of the festival's missions is to reconnect the city with this vibrant musical tradition.

On Aug. 20, the main festival will follow in Armstrong's footsteps when it opens with What Time is it, Mr. Fox?, a group named for a Victorian children's

game. The group plays cabaret, neo-soul and something it calls “acoustic noir.”

The Austin Torpedoes, who are from Boston, will follow with a unique blend of American styles, including blues, jazz, country, western swing and rockabilly.

Brian Thomas/Alex Lee Clark Big Band, also from Boston, will play funk, jazz and big band music. For Saturday’s headliner and a full schedule, fans should visit www.salemjazzsoul.org.

Saxophonist Edmar Noé Colón Gierbolini from Coamo, Puerto Rico, will lead off Sunday’s lineup, to be followed by Boston-born jazz vocalist and keyboard player Jen Kearney.

Tim Gearan from Somerville, a connoisseur of Americana, plays next, to be followed by Louisiana’s Dwayne Dopsie and the Zydeco Hellraisers. Salem’s own DJ Radio Scotvoid will spin both days.

The August event also feature dozens of artisans, a tent where kids can learn about music, and a 21-plus beer and cider garden.

The festival is a grassroots organization run by a volunteer board of directors from the North Shore. It is financed through

merchandise sales, personal donations, grants and corporate sponsorship, as well as ticketed fundraising events.

Since 2007, the festival has raised \$55,000 for music education causes North of Boston, which range from programs for

young children at local libraries, to advanced instruction for students in high school.

The August festival always includes performances by local teens, and this year will feature appearances by the Salem High School Jazz Band and the North

Shore JazzProject All Stars.

Salem Willows is at 167 Fort Avenue, but parking there is challenging. Anyone planning to attend should check www.salem-jazzsoul.org for instructions on parking in Salem and taking a Salem Trolley to the music.

with a Maritime Festival at Derby Wharf, which celebrates the city's connection to the sea.

been invited. Her name is CG36500 and she's a vintage Coast Guard lifeboat that made the famous rescue off Chatham in 1952."

Whether she comes or not, plenty of other sloops, yachts and yawls, runabouts, catboats and courting canoes have visited the festival in the past, and should be here again this summer.

Most of these boats are fashioned from wood — the way nature intended — and

accented with polished brass cleats, chocks, winches and other fixtures.

The festival was started in 1983 by Wells, of the Boston Educational Marine Exchange, in Boston Harbor.

Her purpose was and continues to be bringing the public back to the harbors of Massachusetts as a way to encourage preservation of local maritime heritage, and to promote the need for boating facilities and public landings on the local

coastline.

The festival awards prizes to boat owners in several categories, including Best Sailboat, Best Powerboat, Best Reproduction, Best Hand-Powered Boat and several others.

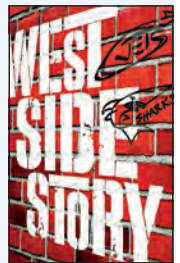


when talkies were taking over the silver screen.

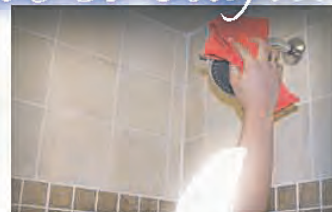

St. Peter's Fiesta 2016

It begins with nine days of prayer.

It culminates with an outdoor Mass, a series of unique sporting events, and a lively and colorful procession through the streets of Gloucester.

St. Peter's Fiesta, Gloucester's annual celebration of the patron saint of all fishermen, combines religious overtones with tributes to the city's storied fishing industry and its Italian-American heritage.

The result is the city's liveliest party of the year, and this year's 89th edition — slated to primarily run from Wednesday, June 22 through Sunday, June 26 — promises to be no exception.

"Fiesta is a party, but it's also a time for families to come together, to celebrate our heritage and to celebrate the city," says Joe Novello, who serves as president of the St. Peter's Fiesta Committee and is Fiesta's chief organizer.

"We want it be a family-oriented event that's for people of all ages — a celebration that really has something for everybody," he adds. "And that's what I think it has become."

Standing at Fiesta's center is the St. Peter's Club's historic, life-sized statue of the patron saint himself, commissioned in 1927 by Italian-American fisherman Salvatore Favazza as a salute to all Gloucester fishermen and the Sicilian community that formed the core of the industry at the time.

Each year, the formal Friday night opening ceremonies feature a short procession with the statue, which is then placed by its guardians on the temporary and colorful main stage, which also serves as the altar for the Sunday morning outdoor Mass.

The St. Peter statue is also the centerpiece of the Sunday procession, which winds from and

back to the Fiesta focal point at Gloucester's St. Peter's Square.

Fiesta actually begins with the nine-day Novena of Prayer to St. Peter, a nightly prayer service at the Capt. Lester S. Wass American Legion Post 3 that will be held this year from Monday, June 13 through Tuesday, June 21.

The next night, the Fiesta celebration begins in earnest, with nightly musical entertainment in the square; a 5K road race cosponsored by the Cape Ann YMCA; a basketball tournament; and a carnival featuring rides, games and food for visitors of all ages.

The weekend then brings the

signature Fiesta sporting events — the seine boat races and the Greasy Pole Walk, in which costumed participants try to make their way along the length of a greased telephone pole to grab the flag at the end before tumbling into the harbor.

"It's about a lot of things," Novello says. "It's about religion, it's about family, it's about

Living history embodied in schooners

The glory of the Age of Sail converges with the 21st century in Gloucester, where the harbor boasts schooners of all ages and various sizes.

Over Labor Day weekend, Sept. 2-4, the nation's oldest seaport will host the 32nd Gloucester Schooner Festival, which draws thousands of visitors each year, as well as dozens of other schooners that come to town to participate in several races.

"Gloucester is perceived as the one of the epicenters of the schooner universe," says Capt. Stefan Edick of the schooner Adventure. "Any traditional sailor, or any tall-ship sailor, acknowledges the importance of Gloucester's maritime heritage in America's maritime history. This is a special port."

Gloucester is home to three schooners of various sizes and histories, all open for business every season. The schooner Adventure — a National Historic Landmark — is the largest and oldest, having been built in nearby Essex in 1926. It fished the Grand Banks of the North Atlantic from Nantucket to Newfoundland until 1954, when it became a windjammer for passenger cruising.

The 65-foot schooner Thomas E. Lannon, with Capt. Heath Ellis now at the helm, has been part of the Gloucester waterfront for nearly 20 years.

The newcomer to the harbor is the 58-foot schooner Ardelle, launched on July 9, 2011, and built by Harold Burnham, part of the 11th generation of the Burnham boat-building family of Essex.

Daisy Nell, a lifelong sailor and chairwoman of the Gloucester Schooner Festival Committee, says the city's heritage resonates deep with both its residents and visitors.

"We can lay claim to something that is really ours on Cape Ann," she says. "These schooners are our history, and we have every reason to be proud of it."

Capt. Edick, who is also executive director of the schooner Adventure, says the experience with Adventure is far-reaching and not just limited to the passenger experience on-board because it has been a major restoration project for the past 27 years.

"The goal was to return her to fully operational status, and that has happened last year," he says. "I had strangers stop me on the street when I was wearing Adventure

gear to tell me how much it meant to them to see her on the harbor on a regular basis. The fact she was sailing quite literally brought tears to the eyes of people who have worked so long to get her to that point. There have been hundreds of volunteers and supporters who have given their heart and soul to make this happen."

The Schooner Adventure is a nonprofit membership organization, which is open to anyone.

"This has been vitally important to the ship's success," says Edick, a professional schooner man for 25 years.

Nell, who is a founding member of the Gloucester Schooner Festival, says she receives a steady stream of feedback from visitors and residents about the festival and the beauty of the sailing vessels.

"It's so heartwarming to me to hear from others how much they love it," Nell says. "It's almost an emotional experience they have. The word that comes to

mind is 'evocative.' It touches people in a way that reminds them of something, and I think local people feel proud of the heritage that we have with this festival and our connection to the sea. It also evokes the world of the fishing industry and the lives that were lost and the sacrifice people have made over the years."

She highlights the fact that the Schooner Festival has activities on land to offer, in particular with Maritime Gloucester's

Heritage Day on Saturday, Sept. 3.

"It's wonderful to see a schooner like the Adventure, 90 years old, out there on a par with the newer ones," Nell says. "It's stunning to see, and they are built with the same tools and the same technology and, in some cases, by the same family."

Nell notes that any waterfront work taking place this summer will not affect the Schooner Festival and its events. Visitors can refer to the website, GloucesterSchoonerFestival.net, for updates.

Burnham, the builder of Ardelle, notes the shared cultural heritage of his native Essex and Gloucester.

"Gloucester was known for its vessels, the Gloucestermen, which refers to both the men and the ships," he says. "Gloucester had the better harbor for fishing, and Essex produced the lion's share of the Gloucester vessels."

Cultural tourism is at the heart of the Ardelle's mission.

"Every day in the summertime feels a lot like a little

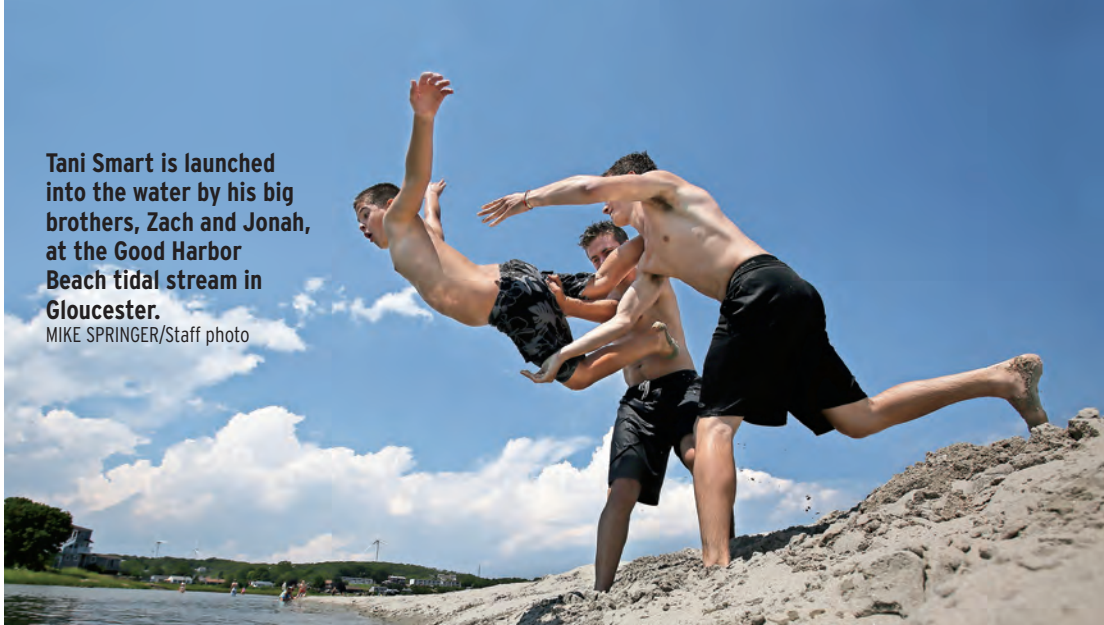
