

First the truth. While the Red Sox franchise and its fanbase have an obvious bounce in their collective steps heading into April, there are a few reasons to slow your roll.

Finishing on top, winning a World Series in October, will be harder than hard.

Why?

The N.Y. Yankees, N.Y. Mets, Los Angeles Dodgers, Atlanta Braves and the Philadelphia Phillies – not necessarily in that order – appear to better on paper and, really on the

All are star-studded with strengths and depth that the Red Sox would have to decipher and retaliate.

But the good news is four of those Big Five are in the National League, and by October, if the Red Sox are both healthy and have several of their top guys hit expectations, it "could" happen.

I'm going to take a different tack. While I can't guarantee anything, especially in the tough American League East division, there is a lot to like about this particular Red Sox team and direction it is heading.

Here are 10 reasons to believe this really could be the year:

### 1. Yanks lose Cole for season

The best team in the A.L. lost its best pitcher Gerrit Cole for the year (Tommy John surgery). And they are not replacing him, at least not vet. This brings the Yankees down a peg and leaves them vulnerable at top of A.L. East. The Red Sox match missing components to last year. up well, now, if they come close to

# Bregman, Crochet and Buehler appear made for what this region demands

It is not easy playing baseball in Boston, particularly those that received big money and fanfare to do so.

Over the last two decades, most acquired for a lot cash and/or prospects, these dudes stick out:

Carl Crawford, Pablo Sandoval, Edgar Renteria, David Price, J.D. Drew and John Lackey.

Some had varying success here, but all finished their time here basically taking a Formula One car get out of

The scrutiny is unlike anything. While New York may have more media members and more people rooting their teams on, Boston/New England can be downright nasty when things aren't going their way.

Basically, if you're struggling, the fans around here probably won't be rooting you back to success, like, say, happens in Kansas City.

Which brings us to the matter at hand:

The Red Sox added several new faces to the 2025 squad, adding talent and depth to a franchise that has struggled in both categories.

But let's be honest, there are three new faces that have had more to do with changing the public perception of the 2025 Boston Red

Alex Bregman, Garrett Crochet and Walker Buehler.

This trio has something most other free agents or big trade acquistions didn't have: Championships or All-Star seasons. In the case of Bregman and Buehler,

Bregman's been an elite prospect player since high school. He led LSU, as a shortstop, to two College

the majors with the Astros. he has been to four World Series, winning two.

closer in the White Sox organization, after Tommy John surgery, he made the change to starting pitcher ... and became an all-star.

Buehler's ascension in the game as been more rollercoaster-like, with two Tommy John surgeries. But his competitive

juices, always evident on the mound, showed up in two World Series titles, including him closing out with back-to-back swinging strikeouts in the Dodgers title win in October, in Yankee Stadium.

While all three add value inside the white lines, their presence is equal to the resume.

The trio has a way, each in their own way, of putting fear in the eyes of the competition.

Bregman, who signed a \$40 million per year deal over three years (he can opt out after Year 1 and 2), has been up at the plate in every big moment imaginable.

Crochet, who was acquired in a major December trade for three prospects including high-end catcher Kyle Teel, has a moving, upper-90 mph pitch that is difficult to follow thanks to a huge, high leg kick. And the fastballs keep coming.

Buehler, who signed a one-year, \$21 million deal, has four pitches, including a curve, slider and changeup. And with his swagger on the rubber, he's not afraid to throw it inside.

The only thing issue that could come into play, particularly with the pitchers here, is health.

Both will be on a short leash, but with a strong bullpen behind them -God-willing – the Red Sox should have optimum chance to win two out of every three games this duo pitches.

Bringing in new players usually takes time, maybe a full season, to adjust.

It doesn't feel that way with Bregman, Crochet and Buehler. They appear to be born to play here with a fanbase that will let them know their strong opinions on the matter.

# Red Sox found their leader

# Bregman takes over key role

Kudos to Alex Cora. He knew what Alex Bregman could add to his and New England's favorite ball club.

During the wait to sign him, Cora, without naming names, said there was a player out there who could affect this club like no other.

Yes, there are about 30 home runs in the middle of the lineup, Gold Glove-ish play in the field, and a dude that isn't afraid of the bright Boston lights that our athletes face.

But the Red Sox have been veteran. lacking, inside the white lines and inside the clubhouse, for the guy that will face the music — see a few dozen media members when the going is tough.

The guy who will take the hits on behalf of the other 24 dudes.

Trevor Story tried to take the mantle of "captain," but his injury in early April last year ended that experiment.

The highest paid player and best hitter, Rafael Devers, still uses a translator, even though — wink! wink! — he doesn't always need it.

There is only so much Cora, the manager, can do and sav.

The Red Sox of yestervear, say from 2004 through 2018, when winning was both important and expected had their "team meeting" guys, like Iason Varitek, Mike Lowell, Dustin Pedroia, Xander Bogaerts and, of course, the best of them all, David Ortiz.

The post-COVID Red Sox have been lacking in that

department.

No more.

Bregman has taken the role and, well, run with it.

One signing, an expensive one at \$40 million in 2025, has changed everything.

He has buddied up with Story, who is quietly on a mission to prove his worth as not only an every day, elite shortstop, but as a possible All-Star caliber hitter.

Bregman's one-on-one discussions with the "kids," borders on epic.

One of the top Red Sox prospects, Mikey Romero, was in awe after one discussion with the newest

"I was standing together watching live at-bats and I would ask (Bregman) about what he'd be looking for on a certain pitch," said Romero. "Then at one point, he was predicting what the pitcher was throwing. I swear to God he was 10-for-10. He was right every time.

"I said, 'How do you do that?' He said the pitcher was tipping his pitches," said Romero. "I asked what did he see. He said, 'When his glove is down a little, it's a breaking ball.' I'm like, 'What?! How can you see that?' It's incredible what I'm learning every day. It's exciting."

Then there's a few stories about Bregman's locker stall in the jetBlue clubhouse and the "suits."

He not only asked for his locker to be put next to the Red Sox's top three prospects — Roman Anthony, Marcelo Mayer and Kristian Campbell — in spring training, but he bought the trio each custom-made suits.

It was my first suit," Mayer said. "We got to the field one day and he's like, 'Hey, the suit lady is outside. Go get whatever you want.' Me, Roman and Kristian and some other guys. He took good care of us. It was cool. He's such a great guy. He wants us to feel comfortable here."

Then there was "the bus" story, in which Mayer joked that the stars usually don't join the team on the one to two-hour spring training road trips.

Bregman surprisingly not only signed up to be on the bus to the Red Sox spring "It's the sickest thing ever. training game in Sarasota,

Fla. against the Orioles, but he was the first person on the bus.

"It has been great getting to know all these guys," Bregman said on ESPN. "Kristian and Celo and Roman, we all went out to eat. We talked baseball for a long time. They asked great questions. They're mature beyond their years. I feel like all three of them can help us win baseball games this year."

Bregman's influence is, well, huge.

The veterans have also noticed and welcomed his input.

"He's amazing, the

experiences he's had. We were talking about at-bats and what he's thinking," said another new Red Sox acquisition as a possible closer, Liam Hendriks. "I've learned just from talking to him. He's very intelligent and he's been through a lot."

Most importantly, Bregman's resume fits the bill, too.

They needed someone that's been in the trenches, been to All-Star games, been to and won a World Series. and isn't afraid to talk about it.

While his "numbers" slipped a bit from his peak years in 2018 and 2019

— with an average of .291, 36 HRs and 108 RBI — he has averaged 154 games over his last three seasons.

Which means he's there. Almost every day.

"He's a dog," said Red Sox reliever Greg Weissert. "He's been an incredible addition. It's definitely different with the team before (Bregman was signed), with all of the new guys. But Bregman is special. He's got so much experience and information."

This is a new role for Bregman. He was a cog in an efficient baseball machine in Houston, with elite and outspoken talent all around him.

"We just want him to be himself," said Cora. "Everyone knows what he brings ... which is a lot. He's very similar to Dustin (Pedroia), the baseball rat that he is.

"The thing that caught my eve, in 2017 (with Astros), was I thought I was a baseball rat. And he was above

Bregman, of course, has to deliver on the field for the clubhouse stuff to work and he has produced since his first spring training game, hovering .400 with a few homers and OPS well over the All-Star like 1.000.

As of now, this \$40 million investment may be a bargain.

"Playing in a city that not only loves to win, but expects to win," said Bregman on his first day with the organization. "I like playing in those pressure-packed environments."

The Bregman "vibe" isn't going to matter come April. But one free agent signing, late in the game, has literally changed this season inside the clubhouse and, as importantly, in the six state region that supports it.

### 3. Cora's experience

The Red Sox manager has been on a wild ride as manager here, winning it all fall when games matter in Year 1, then followed by some disappointing seasons and franchise mentality of building for the future. Cora's ability to deal with a clubhouse and his players, on a one-to-one basis, is among his best qualities.

# 4. Buehler's feisty spirit

Walker Buehler was on the mound for last inning and the last out of the last World Series when the Dodgers KOd the Yankees last October. In fact, he didn't allow a run over his last 10 innings. While he is quiet off the mound, he borders on cocky on it.

Basically, he wants the ball and he wants to embarrass the hitter. The Red Sox haven't had that guy, well, for years. If healthy, he adds an ingredient the rest of the staff needs to see. As for his experience, which includes 18 postseason starts, only four that weren't elite, he will be a factor in the early most.

### 5. Story can just play

Trevor Story needs to catch a break and shy away from the horrific injuries that have hit him as the Red Sox shortstop. With the addition of Bregman and the needs to be good. best lineup since 2018, Story doesn't have to be an all-star four or five years ... Rafael here to prove his worth. He just needs to be good. The shoulder injury might have dropped his "ceiling," but his ability to affect the game in every area, including on the bases, is a quiet key for 2025.

### 6. Devers can just hit

Devers' defense. He's a 20-error guy at third base if he plays 150 games. That's twice as many, on average, that Bregman usually has. The fact that Devers won't have to answer the "defense" question and allowing him to focus on his MVP-ish bat "could" be a game-changer. We are waiting for the 40

homer/doubles-machine guy to make that a consistent part of his repertoire. This might help. Really.

### 7. Duran's status grows

With the newbies getting a lot of focus, deservedly so, Jarren Duran may be the best player on the team. And we may get to understand that more with better

### 8. Defense improves

### 9. Depth at elite level

# Breslow came through in clutch

While a few important Patriots coaches were, politely, reminding the thenhead coach he might want to call a timeout, Belichick, alone, stood silently looking at the commotion on the Seahawks sideline.

Fast-forward to Wednesday and Red Sox president of Baseball Operations Craig Breslow.

His team needed, desperately, a proven, veteran right-handed bat. The best available, albeit expensive, was free agent Alex Bregman.

The clock was ticking with pitchers and catchers already starting up in sunny Fort Myers.


Instead of coaches respectfully informing Breslow of the time issue, New Englanders - Red Sox fans and media – weren't so quiet or respectful.

As Bregman's status remained in limbo, with the Cubs and Tigers as possible suitors, the overwhelming cry was "What the hell is he waiting for?"

drop-off from Bregman as a middle-of-the-lineup guy was steep. Cardinal Nolan Arenado, on the 15th hole of his illustrious career, was pretty good. The rest were fill-in guys, a year at best.

The Red Sox weren't going York Yankees. six years for Bregman. And they weren't going four years. I get it: They have too many hot prospects to wait that long.

And they got him.



In addition to marquee signing Alex Bregman, Red Sox chief baseball officer Craig Breslow beefed up the pitching staff and made the team a potentially strong contender in 2025.

The price - \$40 million per year – sounds steep. But that's the going over-pay rate these days.

But the Red Sox got "the" missing piece.

Grading Breslow's work this offseason now changes. In terms of high-end needs he got his ace, Garrett Crochet, another starter Walker Buehler and Bregman.

All affordable, relatively It was a gamble because the speaking, in terms of the Grade A prospects, only catcher Kyle Teel, was sacrificed, and Bregman's big vearly salary.

Breslow, as a reliever, was just that, the ultimate competitor on the 2013 Red Sox.

The three big acquisitions - Crochet, Buehler and Bregman - have something in common. They are dogs, which in baseball is the ultimate attribute.

Buehler and Bregman have competed for championships for most of their careers. Crochet is still a rookie in that sense, but the tell-tale signs, the way he competes with batters, point in a very positive direction.

Forget about the last three disappointing seasons during crunch time in August and September, this was a long offseason.

It took every month, week and day, really down the final minutes, before it met its goal.

Was there luck involved. the fact nobody else jumped in? Sure. Hell. Belichick guessed right, luckily, too.

On paper, the Red Sox are officially competitors for a championship.

There may be some "extra credit" work ahead, as in late Iuly, to fill a hole or two. If the Red Sox are sniffing first place in the A.L. East, the expectation would be that Breslow will finish the job.

Anyway, the discussion for another day. As for now, as April beckons, take a bow, President Breslow. You've earned it.

# Biggest concern in 2025? Health of pitching staff

# Thursday, March 27, 2025 **S10** Depth-laden bullpen, 6-man rotation are options **Bill Burt**

The newest, updated Boston Red Sox pitching staff has credentials. Galore.

World Series rings. Fastballs touching 100 miles per hour. All-Star game appearances. And, best of all, high-end talent.

They also have another common bond: Tommy John surgeries.

Starters in the mix in 2025, Garrett Crochet, Walker Buehler (two surgeries), Lucas Giolito, Brayan Bello, Patrick Sandoval and Kutter Crawford all have come under the knife to repair their ulner collateral ligament (UCL).

Those in the bullpen "mix" have their share too, with Garrett Whitlock, Liam Hendriks, Justin Wilson and Chris Murphy all missing more than year of their careers due to the famed surgery.

What does that all mean?

The Red Sox will be careful when it comes to monitoring most of these welloiled arms (really elbows) when it comes to amount of pitches thrown, amount of innings pitched and, maybe most of all,

Red Sox manager Alex Cora has his work cut out for him, beyond the everyday lineup, which is as good as he has had, even better than 2018.

A year ago, Red Sox starters had one complete game, thrown by Tanner Houck back on April 17, 2024, a 2-0 win over the Cleveland Guardians.

It was an anomaly. The 2024 Red Sox ace only got to the seven innings four times the entire season.

Back to the original question and what this means going forward, well, the Red Sox bullpen had better be good, maybe even very good, to survive the five-inning starts.


It has the makings of being good/very good. There will be a pretty good pitcher or two left off the Opening Day roster.

A few relievers have already made some noise this spring, including Greg Weissert (acquired from Yankees in Alex Verdugo trade), Bernardino, Whitlock and free agent Aroldis Chapman, who is making a bid at the closer position.

But again, Hendriks, Wilson and Murphy will, because of their Tommy John surgery history, have to be managed, probably shying away from back-to-back outings.

Another possible/probable move by the Red Sox would be to protect all of their arms by going to a six-man rotation.

The defending champion L.A. Dodgers have intimated that they will probably go

### **Facts about Tommy John** surgery

- Tommy John surgery, more formally known as ulnar collateral ligament (UCL) reconstruction, is used to repair a torn ulnar collateral ligament inside the elbow.
- A UCL is a ligament on the inner side of your elbow that helps secure your elbow
- Some people, typically athletes who play throwing sports, may experience UCL tears that may need surgical repair.
- A UCL reconstruction surgery involves harvesting a tendon from your own body, or from a donor, and attaching it to act as a new UCL.
- ▶ It may take overhead athletes more than a year or longer to return to their prior level of play after a UCL reconstruction.
- Tommy John didn't invent this procedure—he was a baseball pitcher who was the first to undergo it and successfully return to his sport.

# The surgery, rehab

Tommy John surgery is the reconstruction or repair of the ulnar collateral ligament. It is most commonly performed in high level baseball players, particularly

The ulnar collateral ligament (UCL) has three components — the anterior bundle, posterior bundle and transverse ligaments. The anterior ligament is the strongest and most significant stabilizer to valgus stress. Valgus stress is the stress that occurs when a thrower is cocking back to throw the ball.

Symptoms of a UCL tear may include a pop with medial (inner side elbow) pain, loss of velocity, loss of control and accuracy and occasionally numbness and tingling into small and ring fingers.

There are several tear patterns possible on imaging such as an mri. One example is shown here. Fluid was injected into the elbow to evaluate if the ligament has torn off the bone. In the second image, we see the T sign, in which fluid is seen passing down past where the ligament should be attached, but has torn off the bone.

Treatment options for UCL tear include rest and physical therapy which is the first line treatment in many cases, particularly partial tears. Surgical options include UCL repair with augmentation techniques, or the current gold standard Tommy John reconstruction (UCL reconstruction).

# THE FUTURE IS GETTING CLOSER

Campbell is in, Mayer and Anthony have to wait a bit

In another year, really with another franchise, two or three of the Red Sox top prospects -Marcelo Mayer (SS), Kristian Campbell (2B) and Roman Anthony (OF) — would probably be making their major league debuts as opening day beckons.

But the 2025 Red Sox are in a different place than more than half of the MLB franchises.

They not only need to win now, as in today, but they have enough talent to let the process play out a little bit.

But it should be known, this trio, all have the makings of All-Star-caliber futures according to those in the know.

Anthony is the second ranked prospect by Baseball America. Campbell is ranked third. And Mayer, probably the most talked about prospect the last five years, is at No. 14.


All have shown signs of greatness this spring, but that is not enough, not with the Red Sox as they stand

Roman Anthony (OF)

His advanced swing decisions, quick stroke and growing strength allow him to make more consistent contact and generate higher exit velocities than most players his age. He pulled the ball with more authority than ever in 2024, though he won't fully tap into his plus-plus raw power until he lifts pitches more regularly. He could become a .300 hitter who provides 30 homers and ranks among the league leaders in walks on an annual basis.

Kristian Campbell (2B) He looks like an entirely different hitter than he did in college, trading a bit of contact to do a lot more damage with a more aggressive righthanded stroke that allows him to hit balls harder and launch them in the air more frequently. He controls the strike zone, handling left-handers and right-handers equally well while driving the ball to all fields. There may be even more power to be had if he can continue to reduce his groundball rate, which was still higher than most last year at 43 percent (compared to 56 percent at Georgia Tech).

He has a fluid left-handed stroke and makes decent swing decisions, though he's been more aggressive at the plate and sought more power as he has gotten stronger. He stands out with his bat speed and exit velocities and has improved his ability to drive pitches to his pull side, though a propensity to make ground-ball contact may cap his power output at 20-25 homers per year. He still needs to make adjustments against non-fastballs (1.019 OPS against heaters in 2024.

# Crochet, Sox have history on their side

The Boston Red Sox made a big bet on Dec. 13, 2024.

They traded for a very talented pitcher without a storied resume and gave away a few of their top prospects to do it.

While new Red Sox pitcher Garrett Crochet made the American League All-Star team last July, his final numbers with the Chicago White Sox - 6-12, 3.58 ERA and 146 innings pitched - weren't good enough for consideration for any end-of-season awards.

But his upside is, well, through the roof, particularly the 206 strikeouts.

If recent Red Sox history is an indication, the risk and reward appear to be in their favor in terms of longevity and October baseball.

Look back first to Nov. 18, 1997, when the Sox dealt two of their highest-rated prospects, right-handed pitchers Tony Armas and Carl Pavano, the latter considered one of the top prospects in the game, to Montreal for a 26-year-old right-hander named Pedro Martinez.


While Martinez was flashy, exciting, explosive and coming off a Cv Young Award season with the Expos, there were questions about doing it in the vaunted American League East division.

Well, those questions were answered immediately.

Martinez was exactly that dominant starter they really needed. At one point, he trumped Roger Clemens status as possibly the greatest Red Sox pitcher of all-time, snaring two more Cv Youngs in his second and different stints on the disthird season here.

Best of all, he along with Curt Schilling, helped get the Red Sox their first World there were intermittent arm Series title in 86 seasons in 2004.

In November 2005 the

Red Sox did it again in their search for an ace of aces. They sent more of their top prospects away, including shortstop prospect Hanley Ramirez and pitchers Anibal Sanchez and Jesus Delgado to Florida in a deal that brought back 25-year-old righty Josh Beckett.

The Red Sox also took veteran Mike Lowell, who was Marlins' eves.

Beckett, like Crochet, had some history of problems the season before.

While Beckett had championship pedigree, winning the World Series MVP following his complete game shutout over the Yankees in Game 6, clinching the title at age 23, two years later there were questions about his health.

In 2004, he had three abled list and despite one of his best seasons in 2005 -15-8, 3.38 ERA, 179 IP issues.

Beckett made three All-Star teams with the Red

Sox and, most importantly, was their big gun on the mound during the 2007 World Series run, snaring the ALCS MVP with two masterful wins over C.C. Sabathia.

Enter Crotchet, like Beckett's first appearance with Red Sox, is only 25 years

A reliever for most of his more of a salary dump in the pro career, he wanted to be a starter. The White Sox gave him his wish in 2024.

His success, despite some arm woes, opened his eyes and really the rest of baseball.

"I feel like I just have a better understanding of what I need to do," he said this week at the team's spring training complex. "Last year, I was still trying stuff out from college, trying to add it to my routine, it had been that long since I was in a starting role."

By Week 1, he was hitting 97 miles per hour on the radar gun throwing off the mound inside an empty jet-Blue Park.

Through his first three

starts, all about two innings, he was his healthy, dominant self, striking out 14 batters without giving up a run.

Imagine what happens with 37,000 fans will be like at Fenway Park.

"There's a lot of good things happening right now," manager Alex Cora said of his staff, but mainly Crochet. "You see Garrett and you see the stuff. I was actually up in the stands. The velocity and the stuff plays."

While Crochet's numbers from 2024 don't look attractive, the fact he was on the worst team in the Major League Baseball probably had something to do with it.

Being his first full season as a starter, he apparently learned a lot.

"Now, having a full season under my belt, I feel like I have a great idea of what I need to do each day coming into the ballpark of the full expectation of things," he said.

The first order of business is adding another pitch to his tool bag.

"Really just fine-tuning things. I'm not really trying to overhaul anything," he said. "Last year, I was just kind of a one-pitch guy when I got to camp, just kind of figured out the cutter once spring training got going. I was spending essentially (this) whole offseason working on my sweeper and changeup since I added the cutter."

After being limited to just 146 innings last season he felt kind of cheated when his starts were mostly limited to four innings after the All-Star break.

"Then to kind of have the rug pulled out from under me was tough," he admitted.

Now, he wants to put up the innings and numbers to be an elite starter.

"It's exciting," he said. "Obviously, I want to be a guy that throws 200 innings, everybody wants to but to be that guy."

And he might just be willing to roll the dice on himself instead of signing an extension for security, which could be a challenge for the team.

But that comes down the road. Right now, he'll be a free agent after 2026.

"There's always pros and cons to everything. The long-term security thing is obviously very attractive. As player we like to look out for our family first, but with last year being my first taste of starting I'd like to see what I can do with a full season's workload."

Crochet, like Beckett, comes at a time when Boston needs an ace, the guy you can depend on in a Game 1 or Game 7 in October.

Dealing top prospects, particularly catcher Kyle Teel, expected to a sure thing over the next decade. is certainly risky business.

Based on the rewards and past history in pursuing potential staff aces, it's a gamble the Red Sox needed to take.




