DANVERS HIGH SCHOOL [NORTHEASTERN CONFERENCE DUNN DIVISION] Falcons ready to spread the ball around

DANVERS - For the second time in as many seasons, the Danvers High football team is switching up its offense. Though the formation may change from a Wing-T to a spread look, many of the concepts are the same and, with the balance the team showed last season, the Falcons expect it to be a smooth transition. "Ever since Travis (Voisine) has been our quarterback there's been spread elements. We've been about 50/50, not a run-the-rock heavy team," senior captain Aris Xerras said of Voisine, the squad's junior signal caller who was pressed into action as a freshman in the 2021 Fall 2 season and will begin his third season as em quarterback this fall with more Sal than 200 passes under his belt. "The vibe has been very good in practices. Things

are starting to click and we're all excited." Head coach Ryan Nolan, entering his sixth season, brought in veteran assistant touchdowns and projects Bryan Ibbiston (last seen in Andover) and Neil Weidman (who won a bevy of Cape Ann League crowns at Lynnfield) to work with the offense. So far, the results

all our QB's, to have someone like Neil going through film with them, working on sprint outs, delivery, all that stuff," Nolan said. Dynamic Owen

Gasinowski had more than 700 yards from scrimmage last year with nine as an uber-dangerous slot receiver for Voisine, who threw for 1,147 yards and 9 TDs in last year's 5-6 campaign. Mike Kasprzak projects as another solid receiver and Xerras, the 6-foot-2, 235-pound tight end, will be a versatile weapon both run blocking

and catching passes.

"This is a really fun offense for a tight end." Xerras said. "Where else can you pancake a guy on one play and catch a touchdown pass on the next one?"

In the backfield Joey Baker and Reagan Little will vie for carries, with senior captain Steve Reardon expected to miss the first few weeks with an injury. Once he returns, he'll add a punishing running style to the Falcons' attack that will no doubt keep opposing defenses on their toes. "I'm feeling good so far.

once we see the doctors," said Reardon, a three-year starter on defense who loves carrying the football. "I think we have some great players for running the spread, so it should be good for us."

Senior Colin Mugaga ("he's had an outstanding summer," Nolan said) heads up the offense line with juniors Kevin Burke, Noah Wade and Adam Guzofski looking good alongside sophomore Aidan Perry.

Defensively, Danvers is always one of the stingier teams in the Northeastern Conference. There's a lot to like about the second and third levels of that unit with Gasinowski, Reardon and Little leading the way.

"Reagan's honestly one of the smartest players we've

ever had," Nolan said. "He's come a long way, and we have a lot of confidence that he's going to have a great vear at safety."

Tewksbury, Reading and Haverhill will give the Falcons tough tests before they open Northeastern Conference play, and the DHS 57-man crew had scrimmages against Woburn, Bishop Feehan and Bishop Fenwick to prepare. Their goal is a ninth straight MIAA playoff berth — and of course to challenge for the conference crown.

"It was such a great vibe when we won the NEC as freshmen. We'd love to have the chance to capture that again," Xerras said. "We've got to get better every week to get to that point."

BEVERLY HIGH SCHOOL [NORTHEASTERN CONFERENCE DUNN DIVISION] Panthers eager to return to their winning ways

BEVERLY — This isn't an athlete, or a team, that can't benefit from some added motivation.

So as they get set to embark on the 2022 high school football season, there's this bit of incentive for the Beverly Panthers: to break the program's streak of three consecutive losing seasons and get back on the right side of the win-loss ledger.

"Devon (Smalls) and I were talking about this just the other day," senior wideout and linebacker Matt Sopp said after a recent BHS practice. "We've never had a winning season since we've been in high school and want to change that this en't had four consecutive vear.

"I remember being at the last playoff football game at Hurd Stadium that Beverly played in (beating Somerville in 2016) when I was younger," Sopp added. "We'd love to be the team that brings a playoff game back home."

Sopp and Smalls, a wingback/cornerback, are the team's two senior captains and make up half of the Panthers' returning starters for second-year head coach Jeff Hutton, joining linemen Paul Belmonte and Jackson Champlain.

As a team Beverly was

a game under .500 last fall (5-6) despite scoring 50 or more points three times. They were also one game away from a winning season in both the truncated 2020 season (3-4) and the 2019 campaign before that (5-6). The Orange-and-Black havlosing seasons since experiencing five straight 7-loss seasons from 2000-04.

"These guys know they have something to prove," said Hutton, a Panther assistant coach on the team's Super Bowl championship squads of 2010 and 2012. "The benefit is that they've been together all winter, all spring and the entire summer working to get ready for this season."

Running primarily a Pistol reverses, jet sweeps, and offense last year, Beverly will run more offset this time around out of the I-formation. Senior Marcelo Pinto will be the fullback

who gets the bulk of the carries and will be asked to churn out tough yards between the tackles. Smalls figures to be the potential home run hitter in running being vital to the Panthers' sprint passing attack, where he can intermediate, flood and short routes and turn them into big gainers.

"I like to be relied on," said Smalls, a 5-foot-10, 170pound speedster who also stars for the BHS track and field program. "That's a good thing for me, knowing the team is counting on me to produce big plays. Whatever I can do to help, I'll do it."

Sopp, a 6-foot-1, 200 pounder, will line up wide

on one side with junior Danny Conant on the other. Another junior, athletic Brendan McCarron, will be the tight end.

There are two players battling for the quarterback job who may ultimately end up rotating at the position, bringing different skill sets to it. Senior Logan Petrosino has a strong arm and a gunslinger's mentality to make big plays, with junior Brian Kessel bringing more of tactical approach.

They'll be protected by an all-senior line that includes 6-foot-4, 265-pound Anthony Dixon at strong tackle ("we need him to be a steamroller" assistant coach John McMillan said), Drew Sadoski at strong guard, Belmonte at center, Lucas Tremblay at quick guard, and Connor Day at quick tackle.

Junior Colin Burns and seniors Rowan Morneau and Champlain make up the defensive line in Beverly's 3-4 alignment. Sopp and junior Kevin Hubbard will be the outside backers who can also serve as edge rushers, with Tremblay and Sadoski on the inside. Smalls and Petrosino will be the corners, with Pinto and McCarron the safeties.

"Like coach says, the little things add up," said Sopp. "We keep going those little things right and put a bunch good practices together, that will lead to a great season.

BOXFORD — Few things are harder to prepare for PREVIEW than football players who do a lot of different things and do them all very well. With that in mind, opponents are going to have a tough time preparing for FOOTBA Masconomet Regional this fall. Start with senior tight

doing damage carrying the ball as a runner. Captains Will Shannon and Will Mitchell? More versatility, since both can play linebacker against run heavy teams or a safety/rover coverage style against spread offenses.

The same goes for captain Owen Barrett, one of the North Shore's best deep threats at receiver who can also play linebacker or corner. Two-way lineman Dan Bandar rounds out the leadership group that has

the Chieftains' excited for what's to come in '22.

"We have a good core group of guys and now we're all seniors," Mitchell noted. "Now its just about getting the intensity up at practice and getting ready." Coming off a Division 3

Elite Eight appearance and a 7-3 season, Masconomet has been among the Northeastern Conference's toughest outs the last two seasons. Sure, they've lost to Marblehead four times, but they're 9-3 against everybody else the last 18 months as head coach Gavin Monagle begins his sixth season looking for yet another playoff berth for his Barrett added. "We want to squad.

Though lead rusher Mat Nadworny graduated, his younger brother Sam looks poised to share the backfield load with Shannon: that duo and Richardson combined for 12 TDs a year ago. Passing wise, all nine of Richardson's TD tosses return to the fold this fall. with favorite targets Barrett (2 TDs), McMahon (5) and Sam Nadworny (2).

"We've worked on our routes a lot this summer and I think we'll be in more of an attack mode offensively," said Richardson. "A lot of our skills players were juniors last year, and we hope we can take advantage of that experience.

"We're having a blast," go out there and do what we do best."

Up front Masconomet did lose the majority of its offensive line, but has plenty of candidates ready to step in. Senior Robert Becker has been playing well at center, while senior Ben Trolander's had a great summer. Junior Jacob Miller is vying for a spot, as is

junior Chase Caron.

"Getting a new line ready takes a lot of hitting, a lot of training and a lot of reps, both mental and physical," said Bandar. "Once we start scrimmaging we'll see who shines, who wants to hit and who wants to play."

Senior defensive end Luke Maczynski's another strong, physical player who had a great summer. Split end Max Connolly and versatile back Chris McCarty could also make an impact for a program with 78 total players, including the freshmen.

"The anticipation of the season, getting to hit other teams and getting back out on the field, is only making us work harder," Shannon noted.

The Chieftains open up with former Cape Ann

MARBLEHEAD HIGH SCHOOL [NORTHEASTERN CONFERENCE DUNN DIVISION] Defending state champion would love to run it back again

Two years ago, Nick Whitaker never could have seen himself as a captain for the Marblehead football team.

But he was determined to make something of himself as a player, so he made it his mission to change his physical appearance in the weight room, getting after it both in the gym and on the field, and trying to be a leader for the undefeated defending Division 3 Super Bowl champions whenever he could.

When his teammates selected this year's captains, the 5-foot-10, 195-pound lineman and linebacker was laurels they want to rest on. as Marblehead looks to chosen along with fellow seniors Sam Annese, Zander Danforth and Connor Cronin, as well as junior lineman Christian Pacheco.

"It's constantly working towards what you want to get," said Whitaker. "I was able to earn more playing time in 7-on-7's this summer, League college options, is understanding the coverages and my assignments and reading plays at the line. The hard work paid off."

Being winners of a statebest 20 consecutive games, eight of the last nine Northeastern Conference North (now Dunn) titles and the aforementioned Super Bowl crown a year ago are all nice 11 more trips to the end feathers in Marblehead's cap — but certainly not

"Yeah, we won the Bowl last year, but right now who cares?," asked Annese. "It's a new season, new guys and that's what our focus has to be. But the goals are the same."

Cronin, who is still weighing his Division 1 and Ivy one of the unquestioned best players in the Commonwealth coming into his senior season. He averaged nearly 6.8 yards per carry a year ago while rushing for 591 yards and a half-dozen scores, and was a beast catching passes out of the backfield with 71 grabs, 1,049 receiving yards and zone. Expect to see Cronin in a lot of two-back sets

keep defenses constantly guessing.

Extremely fast and physically powerful, the 6-foot-2, 190-pound Cronin can hit like a train both carrying the football and bringing down opponents in the defensive backfield at safety.

"We've got a great group of guys on this team, guys who know they need to step up to fill in for all those great players we lost from last season," he said. "But I think we have the right guys to do it."

Seniors Eddie Johns and Aidan Tardie will also see work out of the Magicians' backfield, as will juniors Andy Palmer and Pluss in a by-committee approach. Danforth, who caught 11

balls for 122 yards and two scores in the 2021 championship season despite missing nearly half the season with an injury, will play a much bigger role in the passing game split out wide on one side. He'll be joined by classmate Aven Dembow (who was injured in Week 2 last year and missed the rest of the season), juniors Chris Dewitt and Brooks Keefe, and senior tight end Shane Keough (11 catches, 82 vards, 2 TDs as a junior).

Taking over under center is junior Miles O'Neill. A strong-armed 6-foot-5, 215pound signal caller with with fleet feet and smarts, he perfected his craft as the Magicians' understudy to defending Northeastern Conference MVP and Salem News Player of the Year Josh Robertson last fall. "I've grown up playing

with Miles: he's a good friend and a great player," said Pacheco. "He's always had a big arm. I think he'll do a great job; I'm expecting big things from him."

"He's a talented kid with a really good feel for the pocket," added Annese. "I know he's got untapped potential.'

Annese and Pacheco were starters up front a year ago while Whitaker saw plenty of time in the trenches. They'll serve as leaders of a group that will include seniors Jack Aneshansley and Finn Maniaci, as well as junior Scott Campbell.

Anashansley, Campbell and Maniaci also figure to work on the defensive line in front of a rotating crop of linebackers that include Annese, Pacheco, Whitaker, Keough, Pluss, Dewitt, Tardie and O'Neill. The secondary is very athletic, too, with Cronin, Danforth, Palmer, Keefe, Denbow, and Palmer all capable of making key stops or picking off passes to give their team possession.

Marblehead has added a pair of ex-Magician greats, Aidan Gillis and Jaason Lopez, to its coaching staff this season as well. Contact Phil Stacey @PhilStacev SN

Between the lines, the Big Blue will look to seniors Jason Codispoti (a returning two-way starter who will shift from wide receiver to running back this fall) and Chris Ferragamo. The latter showed great promise early last season before suffering a broken leg and subsequently missing the remaincoach Bob Serino won't have der of the year. Having him back should make things either player to the field this easier for whomever lines up under center.

As it stands, Serino has a serious quarterback battle going on between senior Zack Ryan and freshman Jack Spear, the latter of whom has impressed in his first reps with the varsity squad.

Left guard Ethan Gee, a senior who played a big role in Swampscott's Super Bowl run last season, provides experience and strength in the trenches.

"It's funny because there's sort of a role reversal for more lineman than we have skill," said Serino. "A lot of our skill players are back, but we'll have a new quarterback and new running back. A lot of our offensive lineman return, so that will

On the defensive end, Codispoti will once again serve as a lockdown corner alongside Ferragamo. Serino also expects big things from Gee at middle linebacker, as well as senior Nick Paradise. The speedy Paradise will play safety and special teams while serving as another option in the passing game on the other end.

"Nick's a fast kid,

super skilled, and really led our specials last year, which in our eyes we dominate specials every game and he was a big part of that," Serino noted. "We're excited to have him playing receiver and safety this year, too."

Outside linebacker Jack Hazell, a junior who will also see time at slot receiver, is another name to keep an eye on.

In total, the Big Blue are rostering 42 players after graduating 15 seniors and have a "very light" junior class, as Serino put it.

Early scrimmages have been encouraging, particularly against an experienced and physical Bedford team. "They had a kid that was 370 (pounds) on the line; just a huge line in general," said Serino. "They had a great linebacker and a coach (Tom Tone) that coached with us previously, and he's done a fantastic job with that program. It's exactly what we needed; we got a slap in the mouth and have had some great practices since."

Swampscott will look to continue to iron some things out before its season opener against Auburn Friday.

It's no secret that the Salem High football squad made significant strides last fall.

The Witches flipped the script after going winless during the truncated 2020 'Fall 2' campaign, finishing with a 6-5 mark last fall. With much of their core returning for another season, all signs point to head coach Matt Bouchard and Co. continuing that upward trajectory.

"We lost four critical players from last year's team but have a lot of returning guys. The commitment I've seen in the offseason is similar to what I saw last year, and we have a great group of leaders pointing us in the right direction,' said Bouchard. "Typically most coaches can get a vibe team, and right now that culture is really good."

If Salem is going to continue its winning ways, junior quarterback Corey Grimes will be a huge reason why. Standing an athletic and sturdy 6-foot-3 and 235 pounds, Grimes has the ability to impact the game whether he's heaving a deep ball down the sidelines, zipping a screen pass for a chunk gain, or finding the open field with his legs.
