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ANTIQUES Treasures await in SoCho district

Ipswich was settled in 1633 and incorporated in 1634: by American standards, it is very old. So it only makes sense that people with a taste for aged furnishings, ceramics and decorations would congregate in this town. That is what has happened in SoCho, which stands for South of Choate Bridge and designates a flourishing district of shops, with an emphasis on antiques dealers. Choate Bridge itself is an antique, which dates from 1764 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, making it the perfect spot for this growing group

of businesses.

"The town has picked up," says Ann Orcutt of AnnTiques, one of the newest members of the neighborhood.

Orcutt has another antiques store in Essex, but has 10 times more space in Ipswich, where AnnTiques had its grand opening last December.

"Because it is 8,000 square feet here, I get to display furniture in room-like settings," she says.

Orcutt and the other businesses in SoCho, where Fiske and Freeman and Olde Newbury Antiques and Restorations are also found, meet at AnnTiques on Tuesday mornings to discuss business issues. High Street Antiques, and Olde Ipswich Shop and Gallery, are nearby neighbors.

Orcutt describes her approach to the antiques business as "trying to find wonderful examples of whatever object" she is looking for, whether that is a type of chair, or jewelry, or Native American woven goods.

"I want it to be something uncommon that strikes the imagination," she says.

The merchants in SoCho are creating a map of their district that will soon be available at their shops as well as at the Ipswich Visitor Center in the Hall-Haskell House.

"We hope to have this area seen as a destination," Orcutt says. "It's becoming that now."



Ipswich is a great place to eat. The town has an established restaurant scene, with strong presences like Ithaki Mediterranean Cuisine, Salt Kitchen and Rum Bar, and the Choate Bridge Pub, to name a few.

That setting forces any new establishment to think long and hard about how its menu fits in.

Just ask Myles Eason, the general manager and chef at Ipswich

Ale Brewer's Table, which opened nearly five months ago inside Ipswich Ale Brewery.

"Everything that's here is very, very good, and they've all been around a long time," Eason says.

There's nothing new about Ipswich Ale Brewery, which owns the pub, and is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.

But the restaurant only became a reality after the company moved its brewing operations downtown two years ago. "We serve an elevated brew pub menu," Eason says. "There are burgers, and fish and chips. We also do quail — jerk quail — and a seared duck breast dish.

"I have a Bolognese made with bison and boar."

Clearly, this is pub fare of a different order.

"I have a great bratwurst plate," he says. "I have a trio of shepherd's pies. The way I differentiate myself is, you get three small pies instead of one."

One of these pies is made with Yukon gold potatoes and beef, another features orange sweet potato with turkey and peas, and the third has purple potatoes with lamb and carrots.

One element of Brewer's Table that is unique is its view that looks at the tanks of the company's brewing operation, which wraps around the pub.

"You're looking out on the whole brewing process," Eason says. "You can sign up for tours while

> having lunch." Another original element is the lineup of beverages Brewer's Table serves, which are exclusive to diners in the restaurant.

These include Ipswich iBelge, a light-bodied, Belgian-inspired ale; Ipswich Smoked Helles, a lightly smoked pale lager; Ipswich Route 1A Double IPA, which features "bready, biscuity malts"; and three more, including Ipswich Dry Irish Stout, Ipswich Barleywine and Ipswich Pilsner.

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HISTORY Take a tour back to the First Period

Anyone who wants to see the beauty of Ipswich, while also exploring the town's history, should pick up a self-guided audio tour at the Ipswich Visitor Center inside the Hall-Haskell House.

The Hall-Haskell House at 36 South Main St. embodies a lot of Ipswich history in its own structure, which dates back through a series of incarnations and owners to 1691.

That makes it a great point of departure for visiting First Period homes, which were built between 1626 and 1725. There are 60 of these in Ipswich — more than any other town in the country — many of which are clustered downtown.

They include the Lummus House at 41 High St., which was originally built in 1686 before being rebuilt in the 18th century. It was recently restored and includes many First Period features.

The Waldo Caldwell House at 33 High St. was originally the address of Simon Bradstreet, whose wife, Anne Bradstreet, was America's first poet.

They were a power couple; at 47 Jeffrey's Neck Road

Simon eventually served as Massachusetts Bay Colony's governor, and Ann was the daughter of Thomas Dudley, another governor of Massachusetts.

The house that stands there now was built sometime before 1652 by Cornelius Waldo, who sold it to John Caldwell two years later.

The Kingsbury House at 52 High St. features an impressive, broad facade and several chimneys, and was built around 1660 by Henry Kingsbury. It was purchased in 1669 by Robert Lord Jr., a member of the family for whom Lord Square in Ipswich is named.

The Thomas Lord House at 17 High St. was built in 1658, and stayed in the family for many generations.

Ipswich Museum's Whipple House was originally built as a townhouse, near the center of town, by Capt. John Whipple, with the oldest part of the home dating to 1677. The house is filled with 17th- and 18th-century furnishings and decorative arts.

Not all the First Period homes in Ipswich are downtown. For those visiting by car, the Paine-Dodge House at 47 Jeffrey's Neck Road

dates from 1694, while the Shatswell Cottage at 52 Jeffrey's Neck Road dates to 1650.

History didn't end in 1725, of course, and houses continued to be built in Ipswich, including the Treadwell-Hale House at 52 North Main St., which dates from the 18th century.

The beautiful Capt. Israel Pulcifer House at 6 Meetinghouse Green, originally built during the Federal Period, had a mansard roof added in 1870.

The 1800 Heard House, another one of Ipswich Museum's properties, was built by John Heard toward the end of his successful career as a merchant, distillery owner and politician. The home is filled with original architectural detail, furnishings and artifacts.

Ipswich boasts sprawling, wooded water views

Visitors looking to get outdoors in Ipswich may want to try the waters at Crane Beach, or watch birds at the Hamlin Reservation. two Trustees of Reservations properties.

Crane Beach is also the spot for hiking trails, which pass through pine groves on their way to the Essex River. The beach can also be used by equestrians and dog walkers from October through March, with permits required for both activities.

Above Crane Beach, on Castle Hill, there are a number of trails to walk. Tours of the Crane

Estate's Great House, which

includes rooftop views of the ocean and nearby islands, and

a tree-lined "allee" that sweeps

The Salem down to the sea, are available

through the end of October. There are other Trustees properties in Ipswich with hiking trails, including Greenwood Farm and Appleton Farms.

Greenwood Farm features 2.5 miles of easy walking trails, with views of the historic First Period Paine House, and the broad estuary of the Ipswich River extending beyond.

There are beautiful trails that reach an overlook at Appleton Farms, where visitors can also admire the dairy herd and a store where they can buy dairy products made on the farm. Easy walking trails can be found on the 6 miles of footpaths, bridle paths and farm roads that crisscross the farm

Willowdale State Forest off Linebrook Road offers 40 miles of trails, as well as fishing and boating on the 100-acre Hood Pond. The eastern block of the forest abuts Bradley Palmer State Park and the Ipswich River.

Boating and kayaking are popular in Ipswich, in both the bay and on Ipswich River.


Foote Brothers Canoe and Kavak Rentals rents canoes and kayaks for trips on the Ipswich River, which winds through the Willowdale State Forest.

Find something for every occasion

Shopping in Ipswich is easy, with many stores located within a short radius around Market Square. It's also rewarding, with plenty of unique shops to visit, a number of which are new.

They include Gifts 4 Soul on Market Street, where Lisa Meninno sells clothing lines that are made with all-natural materials, using sustainable methods.

"I have a new (line) called Salaam, it's a company out of Vermont," Meninno says. "So the clothing is made in the USA, and it seems to be very well received, with skirts, dresses, tops, you name it."

Another line, Farm2Fashion, is also made in the United States and uses recycled cotton in ponchos and wraps that "everybody has been going crazy over."

Meninno is a veteran presence in Ipswich, which could also describe the shops Green Elephant toys,

Rainbow Jewelers, and Zenobia Emporium.

But Meninno is also excited to see new stores moving into town, like AnnTiques, and Cellar Door, which has been open for a year.

"We're a culinary shop," says Beatrice Tiberii, who runs Cellar Door with partner Bruce Flynn. "We try to have ingredients for people who love to cook."

They also make a point of stocking items that you can't find everywhere, with a focus on local, all-natural products.

"We also have an olive oil and vinegar bar," Tiberii says.

They have tastings for the 10 types of vinegars and 10 types of oils they sell, which include flavors such as balsamic vinegar infused with fig, raspberry or coconut.

They also have a baked goods section featuring King Arthur Flour, and Flynn makes his own rubs.

"He makes rubs for fish, meat and veggies," Tiberii says. "A lot of the customers who buy rubs are looking for a different way to prepare their meal. Then there's a barbecue section, with (bulk wood) chips by the pound."

Cellar Door also sells cutting boards made by an artisan in New Hampshire. The shop recently got a craft beer license and will be adding those beverages to its offerings.

"A lot of our customers are looking for different products they don't see everywhere," Tiberii says. Moving into their location at 1 N. Main St. on the

Choate Bridge was a no-brainer for the partners.

Their neighbors include several new antique stores as well as The Meatery, Salt Kitchen and Rum Bar, and "a new, kind of nostalgic place" called Nostos, a pop-culture boutique.

"We fell in love with the spot here," Tiberii says. "There's a lot of new businesses coming in. There's a lot of great little restaurants and shops to walk around and visit."

The Trustees of Reservations celebrates 125 years

The Trustees of Reservations is celebrating its 125th anniversary this year, and everyone is invited.

A concert will be held with the Boston Pops Orchestra at Castle Hill on the Crane Estate in Ipswich on Saturday, Aug. 6. Ten thousand tickets for the event went on sale April 4.

"The Boston Pops Esplanade Orchestra at Castle Hill will be one of the largest events The Trustees have ever held," says Katie Marshall, a public relations specialist with the Trustees.

The concert will feature singer Megan Hilty, who plays Ivy Lynn on "Smash," a musical drama on NBC, and has starred in "Wicked" and "9 to 5: The Musical" on Broadway, in addition to singing with several major orchestras.

"Guests can bring blankets, folding chairs and picnics — though no structured tables or alcoholic beverages can be brought," Marshall says.

Gates will open at 4 p.m. and the concert will be held from 8 to 10 p.m., at 290 Argilla Road in Ipswich. Tickets are \$60 for Trustees members and \$75 for nonmembers at www.thetrustees.org. Each adult ticket admits one child, age 12 or under, for free, and each additional child is \$25.

In addition to the concert, events are being held throughout the summer in Edgartown, Stockbridge and Nantucket. An exhibit that opened on April 2, "From the Sea to the Mountains: The Trustees' 125th Anniversary," will be at the Boston Public Library until Aug. 26. The idea for The Trustees

of Reservations was first promoted by Charles Eliot, who wanted to make parks and other natural spaces available for everyone's benefit, in the same way that a public library shares books and information.

On May 21, 1891, then Massachusetts Gov. William E. Russell signed into law Chapter 352 of the Acts of 1891, which established the Trustees as the nation's first private statewide conservation and preservation organization.

The first property to be donated to the Trustees, in 1891, was the 20-acre Virginia Wood in Stoneham.

Eliot was a landscape architect and a partner of Frederick Law Olmsted, who created the series of

parks in Boston known as the Emerald Necklace, and Central Park in New York. Eliot saw that as cities

expanded in Massachusetts,

many of the beautiful, natural settings were disappearing and needed to be preserved.


"It is important to the

education, health and happiness of crowded populations that they should not be deprived of opportunities of beholding beautiful natural scenery," Eliot wrote in 1890. Today, the Trustees manages 114 separate properties across the state, some of which include Halibut Point Reservation in Rockport, Mount Ann Park in Gloucester and Agassiz Rock in Manchester-by-the-Sea, as well as Long Hill in Beverly and Crowninshield Island in Marblehead.

Many of these properties include beautiful old buildings that the Trustees also works to preserve, which is consistent with Eliot's original vision.

In addition to Castle Hill, the Trustees' properties in Ipswich include Crane Beach and Crane Wildlife Refuge, both on the Crane Estate, Greenwood Farm, Hamlin Reservation and Appleton Farms. For more information, visit www.thetrustees.org.
