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








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arblehead is often referred to as the "Yachting Capital of the World," and its harbor boasts one of the finest displays of sailing craft anywhere, according to town leaders.

Over the years, the harbor has been both the starting and finishing port for international races, including competitions between Marblehead and Kiel, Germany; San Sebastian, Spain; and Bermuda, as well as other top events.

The highlight of the summer schedule is Marblehead Race Week, which dates to 1889 and attracts yachtsmen from around the world. Held the last full week of July, it incorporates Junior Race Week and the Helly Hansen Sailing World Regatta Series, formally the Helly Hansen NOOD Regatta, and attracts upward of 200 boats. 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
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Festival of Arts returns for celebration

looking across the harbor and out to sea, it isn't hard to imagine the pirate ships that threatened the town in its earliest days.

An imaginative visitor might also think of the USS Constitution, "Old Ironsides," slipping under the fort's protective guns on April 3, 1814, with two British frigates in pursuit.

It's also easy to think of family of the sailors in Marblehead's fishing fleet, much of which was destroyed by a storm in 1846, who stood at this spot wondering if their loved ones would return.

The fort, which contains bunkers and underground rooms once used to detain prisoners, reopened last year to the public following a \$1.5 million restoration project.

After hitting Devereux Beach for sand, surf and snacks, visitors can follow Ocean Avenue out to Chandler Hovey Park, where Marblehead Light stands, a metal framework around a central column that was erected in 1895 and is unique in New England. This stark structure replaced the first brick and wood lighthouse on that spot, built in 1835.

Noted for its contributions to the American Revolution and Civil War, Marblehead is also known for its narrow, crooked streets lined with more than 200 privately owned, Colonialperiod homes and buildings.

Those streets lead to a bevy of landmarks, including Abbot Hall and the Jeremiah Lee Mansion on Washington Street. In addition to being a town hall and historical museum, Abbot Hall displays the original "Spirit of '76" painting by Archibald MacNeal Willard,


the deed to Marblehead from the Nanapeshemet tribe of Native Americans (dated 1684) and a number of other artifacts. And the 1768 Lee Mansion is a Colonial Georgian home that was built by an American craftsman who at the time was the wealthiest merchant and shipowner in Massachusetts. The house has been preserved in its nearly original state.

There's more to explore at Mass Audubon's Marblehead Neck Wildlife Sanctuary, a haven for migratory birds, especially warblers, during the spring and fall. The trails starting from the end of Risley Road are open every day from dawn to dusk.

Hungry? Some shops in town offer the Joe Frogger,

Marblehead's famous and cherished cookie. The molasses cookies, which date to Colonial times, were originally baked by a man known as Old Black Joe Brown and an Aunt Crese, who

maintained a tavern on Gingerbread Hill. Because the cookies would keep for long periods of time, fishermen would take barrels of Joe Froggers on their long voyages at sea.





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A seaside city full of historic features

great place to start a summer visit to Salem is Pickering Wharf, a popular harborside attraction designed to embody the authentic feel of a New England village.

There is much to do sprinkled in between history and landmarks. Visitors can browse through more than 20 shops and boutiques, and even do some antiquing.


Options for waterfront dining abound, with many top-rated restaurants to choose from. Or grab a coffee and ice cream, and watch the boats pass by.

was crafted in the South River shipyard of Enos Briggs for the Salem mercantile firm Waite and Peirce.

Launched in 1797, Friendship made 15 voyages during its career — to Batavia, India, China, South America, the Caribbean, England, Germany, the Mediterranean and Russia. It ended its activities as an American merchant vessel when it was captured as a prize of war by the British sloop of war HMS Rosamond in September 1812.

The replica ship has been among the most popular attractions at the Salem Maritime National Historic Site on Derby Street since its debut.

In a typical year, Pickering and Derby wharves are filled with revelers for the city's annual Fourth of July extravaganza, which makes a fanfarefilled comeback this year. The Salem Celebrates the 4th event — on Saturday, July 2, this summer — features the 42-piece Hillyer Festival Orchestra performing a Pops concert on Derby Wharf at the Salem Maritime National Historic Site, a Kid Space play area, and fireworks launched over Salem Harbor. Jul 2

Salem Heritage Days returns Aug. 1 to 7. Plans are still being worked out for the celebration, but will include a classic car show. Keep an eye on the city's website at www. salem.com for updates, as well as Destination Salem at www. salem.org.

Meanwhile, more seaside fun can be found at nearby Salem Willows, named for the white willow trees planted there in 1801 to create shaded walkways for patients convalescing at a local smallpox hospital. The 35-acre park, which opened in 1858, offers beaches, athletic courts, walking trails, arcades, a historic carousel, food stands and more.

The North Shore Concert Band will perform its annual summer series of free outdoor concerts Tuesdays at 7 p.m. from July 5 through Aug. 9 at the park's Robert Hayes Bandshell.

On the way to the Willows, you may want to stop and stroll the half-mile Salem Harbor Connector Path, which features stately sculptures created by regional artists.

And, of course, Salem is equally known for its place in the 1692 Witch Trials as for its role in maritime history. The city is home to a number of witch museums and landmarks, including Salem Witch Village and Salem Witch Museum, which is celebrating its 50th year.

Or check out the renowned Peabody Essex Museum, home to works of art and culture from around the world, and The House of the Seven Gables, made famous by American author Nathaniel Hawthorne's novel. The circa-1668 Colonial is considered to be the oldest-surviving 17th-century wooden mansion in New England.

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

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Beverly Homecoming back in full swing

Lynch Park is home once again this summer to Beverly Homecoming, where five fantastic days of family fun await you from Aug. 3 to 7.

What's up? Everything from the opening day Lobsterfest to a string of live music concerts, a bicycle rodeo, ice cream tasting to a spectacular fireworks finale.

"We're planning for about 30 to 40 events, some old ones and some new ones," said Medley Long, president of Beverly Homecoming. "It's nice to be getting back to normal."

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, 2020's events were all canceled and replaced with a PorchFest Weekend to honor local heroes on the front lines of the pandemic. In 2021, organizers kept the same number of events as in years past, but ran them over five days instead of 10.

Embracing the more festival-like atmosphere of the 5-day festival, Beverly Homecoming kicks off with Lobsterfest. The signature spectacular typically draws hundreds of people to enjoy a day of music along with their crustaceans at the park, which has panoramic sea views. For the children, there will be a kids lobster costume contest.

the 5K Beverly Yankee Homecoming Road Race, both on Aug. 4. The annual road race, which is part of YMCA of the North Shore's 20-race series, often finds hundreds of community members lining the streets to cheer on the runners.

On Aug. 5, the Beverly Police Department and Kiwanis Club host a bike rodeo, and state Rep. Jerry Parisella hosts the ice cream social.

The final day of Homecoming will feature a new event, Polar Plunge for Wimps, sponsored by city Recreation Department. Other favorites include Senior Day and For \$20, those who dive in the chilly

Atlantic in August will get a certification and pride in being a plunger. Registration is available at https://www.bevrec.com/ classesevents.

Homecoming's last day will also feature a lineup of concerts, capped at 8:30 p.m., by fireworks launched from Mackerel Cove.


Of all the events hosted during Beverly Homecoming, which began in 1966, only the LobsterFest and the fireworks are actually run by the nonprofit Beverly Homecoming Committee. The others are put on by the city or other organizations, such as Senior Day by the Beverly Council on

Long said the nonprofit committee, a group of volunteers, sets a goal of \$70,000 per year to run the event, with the fireworks which are largely supported by proceeds from the Lobsterfest — by far the biggest

"We are not funded by the city of Beverly, we completely rely on corporate sponsorships and donations," said Long, adding that revenue from LobsterFest also is used.

the city, it is the former site of the vast summer home of Robert and Marie Antoinette Evans, who transformed it into one of the North Shore's finest estates.

In the summers of 1909 and 1910, President William Howard Taft leased the property's Stetson Cottage as his seasonal White House, hosting leaders and dignitaries from around the world.

Taft is said to have signed the "Treaty of Beverly" here, which laid the foundation for future U.S. tariff policies.

An elaborate Italianate garden with a tea house, adorned with rare plants and shrubs imported from around the world, now stands where Stetson Cottage - which was cut in half then floated to and reassembled on Peaches Point in Marblehead, once stood.

The 16-acre park, part of the Essex National Heritage Area, also boasts a Carriage House, which is available for private rental, along with greens, two beaches, a children's play structure, a splash pad and more.

"The Falconer" on its white marble base stands guard between the rose garden and the seawall. Inspired by the original "Falconer" in New York;s



Central Park, it depicts a largerthan-life-sized youth in Elizabethan dress striding forward while releasing a falcon from his outstretched left hand.

Interestingly, Daniel S. Lynch, for whom the park is named, never experienced the property.

He bequeathed \$400,000 upon his death in 1942 to create a public park in his native Beverly to make sure everyone would have a scenic place to go and enjoy the outdoors. He was inspired after encountering a private park in London that denied the public access to its natural splendor.

The Lynch Park Board of Trustees used Lynch's gift to purchase the land from Beverly Hospital in 1943.

The park is open from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. Memorial Day to Labor Day. Parking for

nonresidents is \$15 on week-days and \$25 on weekends, cash only.

More garden magic can be found at Long Hill on Essex Street. This former family retreat once owned by the editor of The Atlantic Monthly has been renowned for its collection of trees, shrubs and distinctive perennial plants for more than a century. Stroll the grounds for free any day between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

There's much more to explore in Beverly, too, including several other beaches, a downtown filled with independent shops and restaurants, and historic properties that include three long-running theaters. The Cabot, Larcom Theatre and North Shore Music Theatre, all offering full slates of movies, music and theatricals.

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Manchester-by-the-Sea

A serene seaside community that 'sings'



fishing village and summer colony where sailing and swimming have long been the order of the day, Manchester-by-the-Sea is known as a pristine and perfectly preserved slice of prosperous New England seaside life.

Its coves and islands have been the subjects of many a painter, most notably master portraitist Charles Hopkinson. It also was one of the centers of furniture making in America in the mid 19th century. You'll get a sense of that history and more at the Trask House, home today to the Manchester Historical Museum. It was built in 1823 by businesswoman Abigail Hooper, who ran a thriving general store and millinery shop on the premises, the same year she married Capt. Richard Trask, a prosperous merchant sea captain who co-owned and skippered the St. Petersburg, the largest ship ever built in Massachusetts at the time.

The town became known as a summer spot for the wealthy during the Gilded Age, and sprawling oceanfront mansions Beachgoers enjoy the warm weather at Singing Beach.

By 1845, Boston's elite, led by the socially influential poet Richard Dana, starting flocking here for summer pleasures and to socialize on the town's

seven beaches. Of those, Singing Beach, a half-mile crescent fabled for its "whispering" white sands, became the spot for sea bathing.

There are impressive views

whether driving down a street filled with historic buildings or taking in the oceanscapes — from the harbor at Masconomo Park to the shores of Singing Beach.

Many visitors come to Manchester by car, often taking Route 127 to experience the various neighborhoods on Cape Ann. Many others come by commuter rail. The downtown area boasts restaurants and shops to entice them.

If a trip to Singing Beach is on your agenda, you should know that parking in the lots is mainly for residents with a valid beach parking sticker. From June 20 to Labor Day, nonresidents can pay \$30 to park on weekdays only, holidays excepted, and only if space is available. On weekends, the Boy Scouts sell parking spaces by the train station for \$25 per vehicle.

Also, all beachgoers are subject to a \$10 beach walk-on fee, charged daily to people ages 12 to 64 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. when staff are on duty. Season passes are available for \$35 at Town Hall or online at manchester.ma.us.

For sheer natural wonder, there's no better free way to experience the town than with a visit to Coolidge Reservation, a Trustees of Reservations site. Perched on its own peninsula, its 66 acres are dense with field, forest, stream and sea, rocky outcrops, woodlands, wetlands, wildlife, sea coves, and sandy beaches, as well as — from its spectacular Ocean Lawn — some of the most

Four days of Fourth fun and a festival

Nothing's more American than the Fourth of July, and it's hard to imagine small town America celebrating it quite as authentically and joyously as Manchester-by-the-Sea.

The stirring music, precision marching bands, imaginative homemade floats and breathtaking fireworks are back this summer 2022 to once again show off the town's patriotic spirit in old New England style.

This year's July Fourth Committee has organized four fantastic days, July 2 to 5, loaded with festivities, beginning Saturday, July 2, with Manchester-Essex Rotary's Red, White and Blue Pancake breakfast from 7:30 to 11:30 a.m. at Tuck's Point. Tickets are \$12 in advance, \$15 at the door, and kids younger than 8 eat free.


On July 3, settle down on Singing Beach, 119 Beach St., for a concert from 7 to 9 p.m. with fireworks at 9 p.m.

The Fourth of July Parade steps off Monday, July 4, at 10 a.m., from Lincoln Street, winds through downtown, and ends at Coach Ed Field Playground. And on July 5, from 6 to 8 p.m., Masconomo Park hosts a harborside concert with Cape Ann Big Band playing all-time favorites.

Another beloved tradition, Festival by the Sea, will be back again to celebrate all things synonymous with Cape Ann in the summertime: art, live music and food. Booths will be spread throughout downtown on Saturday, Aug. 6, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

breathtaking views of Massachusetts Bay, the North Shore and the shimmering skyline of Boston.

By the way, the "by-the-Sea" extension of Manchester is actually part of the town's name. In 1989, a group of residents who believed that every mention of Manchester was associated with the much larger New Hampshire city of the same name campaigned to change the name of the town to Manchester-by-the-Sea. It was approved by a close margin at Town Meeting.



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








Escape to a quintessential New England village

n Essex, the main drag is anything but a drag.

Route 133 cuts through the self-proclaimed birth-place of the fried clam and America's antiques capital, and is home to some of the best clam "shacks" and antiques shops around. In fact, there are more than 20 antiques shops in a 1-mile stretch.

Essex is also a small town with a big history of shipbuilding. Shipwright Harold Burnham, whose family has been building ships for generations, still sends schooners freshly crafted at H.A. Burnham Boatyard, off Route 133, sailing down the Essex River toward Gloucester. Next door is the Essex Shipbuilding Museum, home to tools that are still hand-crafting vessels, such as the schooners Ardelle and Thomas E. Lannon, which sail Gloucester Harbor.

On Choate Island, part of the Crane Wildlife Refuge, time seems to have stood still since the days of the Agawam tribe. A paradise for birds and bird-watchers alike, the water here is as clear and pure as any you'll find anywhere.

No visit to Essex is complete without a trip down the river. So hop aboard a cruise,

jump into a kayak or step onto a paddleboard, and drift beside rocky farmland and salt marsh, while working up an appetite.

Back on Route 133, with more than 20 eateries, you're good for anything from a classic hot dog at a roadside stand to a four-course meal at an upscale restaurant. The Village and Woodman's have been frying, steaming and serving up seafood for more than 60 and

100 years, respectively, while the 26-year-old Essex Seafood is newly rebuilt and serving up fisherman's platters after a devastating 2020 fire.

But there is more to Essex than ships and seafood. The home at Cogswell's Grant, a 165-acre property on Spring Street (off Route 133) houses a premier collection of folk art. The Cox Reservation — headquarters of Essex





County Greenbelt, also on Route 133 — is a fine place to see shorebirds, herons and ospreys. From June 10 to 11, Greenbelt will host its 33rd annual Art in the Barn event, featuring paintings, photographs, sculpture, ceramics

and jewelry. There'll also be music, beer, and artists demonstrations. More information can be found at https://ecga.org/artinthebarn.

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An awe-inspiring beach and a grand estate

ith 4 miles of shore offering stunning ocean vistas, Crane Beach tops many a list as a favorite summer outdoor recreation area.

Part of on the Crane Estate on Argilla Road, the pristine sandy beach features easy entry into the water, ample open space for sunbathing and walking, and all kinds of seaside play.

The beach is managed by the

nonprofit The Trustees of Reservations, which oversees more than 100 properties — nearly 25,000 acres — all around Massachusetts. It is open year-round, from 8 a.m. to sunset daily.

Crane Beach is among the world's most important nesting sites for piping plovers, a threatened bird that was nearly hunted to extinction in the 19th century for its eggs and feathers. The Trustees of Reservations'

efforts to protect the shorebirds have been nationally recognized.

There are 5.5 miles of trails, which track the beachfront on the Ipswich Bay and Essex River Estuary sides of the Castle Neck peninsula. These are considered moderate hiking.

During the summer, there are lifeguards and rangers, a bike rack, bathhouses with restrooms and changing area, outside showers, picnic tables, a store


Olde Ipswich Days back in style

Olde Ipswich Days is poised to take over the South Village Green once more for the last weekend of July.

The three-day event, July 29, 30 and 31, is a gathering of scores of local artisans and fine craftsmen who show and sell their work on the green. Arts and crafts include paintings, watercolors, woodworking, glass, pottery, jewelry, children's toys, fabric crafts, hand-knits, folk art, photography, pen and ink prints, carved gourds, decorated furniture, and more.

The celebration — which dates to 1970 — is scheduled to run Friday, July 29, and Saturday, July 30, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, July 31, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The heart of the event is the exhibit area in front of the Capt. John Whipple House at 1 South Green on Route 1A.

with refreshments and merchandise, an information kiosk, and transportation for mobilitychallenged visitors.

To prevent overcrowding, visitors to Crane Beach must sign up for a specific time slot in advance. {span}As of May 1, 2022, advance purchased passes are required for weekends only. {/span}

Through Sept. 11, for nonmembers of The Trustees day passes during the week are \$40 per car, \$10 for motorcycles and \$5 for bikes. Any additional car passengers over six cost \$5 per person. On weekends, the car rate is \$45, and the other fees are the same.

Trustees members who do not have a year-round parking sticker pay a discounted rate.

Although advance passes are suggested, they are not required for visiting the neighboring Castle Hill on the Crane Estate, 290 Argilla Road, which is open daily from

9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission to the grounds is \$10 for adults, \$5 for children ages 6 to 14 and free for children 5 and younger.

Set against the backdrop of a 165-acre scenic countryside, the property offers a glimpse into the past of one of the nation's wealthiest families.

The land, which Richard T. Crane Jr. bought in 1910, encompasses a farm and estate buildings, designed grounds and gardens, and diverse habitats. The Great House — the centerpiece on top of the hill — is a 59-room, Stuart-style mansion.

Designed by architect David Adler and built in 1928, it is furnished with period antiques.

The property is home to quite all manner of wildlife, including deer, foxes, nesting great horned owls, red-tailed hawks, turkey vultures and the occasional bald eagle.

Events this summer include a variety of tours and hikes, as well as a series of picnic concerts.

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

The nation's oldest fishing port, Gloucester's waterfront boasts working fishing vessels along with memorials dedicated to fishermen and their families.


Gloucester Harbor, with its panoramic views, can be taken in while walking along the waterfront via Stacy Boulevard. One section reopened in 2017 after a \$7 million seawall reconstruction project. That section is home to the Fishermen's Wives statue, which depicts a woman looking out to sea, carrying one child in her arms and holding the hand of another.



Heading toward the city center, after crossing over the Blynman Canal drawbridge, also called the Cut Bridge, visitors will come across the famed Fisherman's Memorial, consisting of the Fishermen's Monument, also known as the Man at the Wheel statue sculpted by Leonard Craske for Gloucester's tricentennial in 1923, and cenotaphs listing Gloucestermen lost at sea.

The nonprofit Generous Gardeners' volunteers in conjunction with the city Department of Public Works keep the flower beds along the boulevard planted with thousands of blooming plants three seasons of the year.

remains one of the city's biggest draws. HarborWalk — a 2 ½-mile, self-guided, interactive, audiovisual walking tour — introduces visitors to the city's history, legends and lore.

There are more than 40 granite posts in all, each a "touchstone" where, for example, you may learn more about the city's illustrious fishing history or meet its literary lions, among them T.S. Eliot and Rudyard Kipling, who wrote "Captains Courageous" about Gloucester fishermen. Each marker highlights an aspect of Gloucester's

history as a seaport, its culture and people, and how it has evolved in response to a modern, sustainable fishing industry.

Learn all about the city's schooner fishing glory days at Maritime Gloucester on Harbor Loop, then visit the Essexbuilt schooner Adventure at the dock. Next, step aboard the schooners Lannon or Ardelle for a harbor sail, or spend an afternoon watching whales.

Since 1920, more than two dozen movies have been filmed in Gloucester and Cape Ann.



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

Fireworks, tunes and boats set for spectacular return

For the first time since 2019, Novena, held at 7 p.m. June St. Peter's Fiesta is scheduled to take place in St. Peter's Square, starting with a kids' carnival and entertainment on Wednesday, June 22, through to the closing procession on Sunday, June 26.

You'll be able to take in the slip-slide along the Greasy Pole and the seine boat races, lace up your sneakers for the Fiesta 5K Road Race, or soak up the atmosphere in St. Peter's Square. The 95-year-old Gloucester tradition has drawn tens of thousands of visitors. including many families who plan their summer vacations around Fiesta, which began in 1927.

Fiesta's nine-member committee plans to hold a slate of events similar to 2019's — before the COVID-19 pandemic forced the cancellation of the seaport's signature event that pays homage to Gloucester's rich fishing history.

Leading up to St. Peter's Fiesta will be a nine-day 13 to 21 at the Lester S. Wass American Legion Post 3 Hall at 8 Washington St. Organizers of the Novenas held them virtually during the pandemic.

Fiesta will have the same entertainment as the 2019 event, as these entertainers had already been lined up for 2020 but then were put on hold when the pandemic hit.

On July 3, the Fishtown Horribles Parade, a hometown tradition preceding the city's holiday fireworks show, is also coming back this summer. Longtime announcer Al Kipp will again be on the job. The parade will step off from Gloucester High School at 6 p.m., wind through downtown and return to the school.

The Gloucester Fireworks Committee is again putting together its annual July 3 show over the harbor, set for 9:30 p.m. Prime viewing spots along Stacy Boulevard and Pavilion Beach are usually packed with people, and this summer, as the pandemic seems closer to its end, people are anxious to celebrate.

Another regular event making a return is the free summer concert series at the Antonio Gentile Bandstand at Stage Fort Park. The series features concerts every Sunday from July 10 to Aug. 28 at 7 p.m. Rain dates for the Sunday concerts are the following Wednesday at 7 p.m. The Cape Ann Community Band will also perform Aug. 20 at 7 p.m. at the bandstand. Rain date is Aug. 26.

Parking is free and handicap accessible restrooms are available. Attendees should bring a chair or a blanket.

"Fantastic music overlooking the outer harbor, glorious sunsets, schooners sailing by, it doesn't get any better than this in Gloucester!" says organizer David Benjamin.

The Stage Fort Park Trolley is scheduled to start running on Saturday, June 18. The trolley will run the normal route

 including stops downtown, at Good Harbor Beach and on Rocky Neck — weekends and holidays, with the first trip at 10 a.m. and the last trip at 5 p.m. One-way fares are \$150 cents for seniors and those with disabilities, and an all-day pass is \$3. Children younger than 5 ride for free.


And then there's the Gloucester Schooner Festival. sailing in for its 38th year. The festival, which has become a traditional capstone to summer in Gloucester, is set for Labor Day weekend, Sept. 1 through

The weekend is typically jam-packed with events and opportunities to get up close and personal with schooners that travel from all over to come to Gloucester to race and show off their beauty and grace.

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In 2000, Warner Bros. released "The Perfect Storm," filmed in the city with an all-star cast, including George Clooney and Mark Wahlberg as Capt. Billy Tyne and Bobby Shatford — two of the real-life fishermen who were lost at sea.

More recently, "CODA," about a fictional fishing family and primarily filmed in Gloucester, won Best Picture at the 94th Academy Awards, as well Best Adapted Screenplay for resident Sian Heder and Best Supporting Actor for Tony Kotsur. The Angela + Rose, the fishing boat used in the film, can be sometimes be seen docked at Rose Marine off Main Street.

Then there's "Wicked Tuna," National Geographic's popular reality television show, featuring local boats and captains. You may see helicopters overhead as the boats are filmed leaving or returning to the harbor. Several are docked at Cape Ann Marina's Resort off Essex Avenue, and offer charters when not chasing bluefin.

The reality TV show "Ghost Hunters" has also come to the city, with Hammond Castle

proving to be the most active of the 400 properties that the crew had visited. The show documented 11 entities at the oceanfront medieval-style castle built by inventor John Hays Hammond Jr. in the 1920s to house his collection of Roman, medieval and Renaissance artifacts.

Now a museum offering tours and various events, the castle was also home to Hammond Research Corp., under which Hammond had more than 400 patents — second in number only to Thomas Edison.

In addition to the castle, be sure to check out the Cape Ann

Museum, with a collection capturing the legacy of a city whose coastal vistas have long drawn some of America's greatest artists, and the romantic, turreted Beauport, the Sleeper-McCann House, which sits surrounded by the sea on Eastern Point.

Headed to the beach? New this year, beach goers can book a parking space up 10 days in advance and obtain a digital pass. The city planned to have the new nonresident reservation system operational by May 18, in time for the crush of Memorial Day weekend, May 28 to 30. The reservation site will be

available on the city website, gloucester-ma.gov, and the Gloucester Beaches Facebook page.

Those who want to chance arriving to win a space will pay a daily rate of \$30 per vehicle on weekdays and \$35 on weekends and holidays at Good Harbor and Wingaersheek. Stage Fort Park (home to Half Moon and Cressy's beaches) is \$15 on weekdays and \$20 on weekends and holidays.

ike many stops along New England's coast, Plum Island is endowed with natural treasures.

But unlike nearby arcadeand tavern-strewn beach haunts, public space, refuge land and eggshell-brown beach sand combine to make this 11-mile-long barrier straddling Newburyport and Newbury an open window to relaxation, leisurely bike rides or drives, summer reading, bird-watching and a tranquil surf.

The island's namesake, the noble beach plum, or prunis maritima, ripens in late summer. There are also cranberry bogs.

Northern Plum Island Beach can be entered from several points along Northern Boulevard. Paid parking lots provide the best access, the largest being at the northern end of the island, in Newburyport.

Also at the northern tip is the conical Newburyport Harbor Light, also known as Plum Island Light. Made of wood with that traditional tall lighthouse look, it's the kind we see in our mind's eye or in paintings such as those by American artist Edward Hopper.

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



Located along the Atlantic flyway is the 4,700-acre Parker River Wildlife Refuge, a vital stopover point for more than 300 species of waterfowl, shorebirds and songbirds. Administrated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the refuge was established in 1941 to provide feeding, resting and nesting habitat for migratory birds.

None of the species is more in need of protection than the piping plover. For much of the summer, most of the refuge beach is off limits to provide undisturbed nesting and feeding habitat for the small white and gray birds. Typically, all sections of the refuge are reopened by mid- to late August.

An entrance fee of \$5 per car or \$2 per walker or biker is in effect year-round at the refuge. An annual pass can be purchased for \$20. Pets are not allowed.

Driving or biking through the refuge will bring you to Sandy Point State Reservation, 77 acres at the southern tip of Plum Island. The park is one of the state's most beautiful



coastal beaches — just be prepared during greenhead season.

Across from the refuge entrance is Mass Audubon's Joppa Flats Education Center, which overlooks the Merrimack River and offers opportunities to explore wildlife-rich habitats.

On your way to or from the island, stop to watch the planes

take flight at Plum Island Airport. There's a museum there that chronicles the airport's history, including W. Starling Burgess' landmark 1910 flights.

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Picturesque waterfront village beckons

ockport's seacoast is home to singular seafood and the only twin lighthouses in New England. Hotels, motels, inns and breezy little bed-and-breakfasts with big porches welcome you to discover this old fishing town.

The streets look like a quaint road map of early American history, but the shops are filled with treasures of today and the beaches are made for sunning, swimming and surfing.

Skygazing, too, is a Rockport must. Halibut Point State Park, one natural wonder of serene

tidal pools and golden granite cliffs that were once the Babson Farm Ouarry, is the darkest spot on the North Shore for viewing bright night skies. By day, you can see clearly to the shores of New Hampshire and Maine.

The 12-acre park is particularly regarded today for its birding opportunities, with its low coastal shelf overlooking the surf proving to be an attractive habitat.

Both the park and the adjacent 56-acre reservation, which was acquired in 1981, are managed cooperatively by The

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Come smell the wild bayberry and greenbrier along the Atlantic Trail, where hikers can explore 2 ^{1/2} miles of craggy coastline carved in stone during the last ice age.

Long a fine arts colony, Rockport's seascape, ocean

light, craggy coves and iconic harbor led to it being a magnet in the early decades of the 20th century for a cast of colorful artists who made it their summer salon.

Out in the busy bazaar of charming shops on Bearskin Neck — a peninsula named after an actual bear attack and built out into the harbor on







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
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Arts and music highlight summer 2022

granite boulders - you can get just about anything you want, from seafood to fine silver jewelry, to a kayak for rent, to a great spot to paint (or snap) a picture.

The neck is also home to Rockport's famed Motif No. 1, which is, hands down, the most picturesque fishing shack on either coast of America.

If you look up at the tower of First Congregational Church of Rockport, you can see a "cannonball" that was fired during the War of 1812. On Sept. 8, 1814, the British frigate Nymph invaded Sandy Bay. When one of her barges was spotted entering the harbor, the church bell sounded the alarm and the crew fired a cannonball to silence the bell. But it hit the steeple. The church still has the cannonball. A wooden replica remains in the steeple, added in a later renovation.


No visit to Rockport is complete without a sampling of Finnish nisu bread. It's one of the many living vestiges of a town settled by generations of Finnish immigrants, who wove their customs, colors, architecture, culinary culture and Old World celebrations into the fabric of the community.

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
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

The thriving city center bustles with activity. When visitors want to meander, the downtown offers art galleries, small shops, and an abundance of dining and takeout options.



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



While you're near the waterfront, be sure to check out Somerby's Landing Sculpture Park. Located on the Merrimack River at the west end of the Newburyport boardwalk, it boasts large sculptures by New England artists.

The 1.1-mile Clipper City Rail Trail at the edge of downtown brings visitors from the MBTA commuter rail station



at Parker Street to the waterfront, where travelers on foot can venture downtown or continue over the Gillis Bridge into Salisbury, where they can connect with the Old Eastern Marsh Trail and continue on their way.

The days of trolleys delivering tourists to the Hampton Beach Casino, stunt planes flying high above the water and the bathing censor who would keep an eye on the scandalous swimsuits of the 1920s may be long gone, but thousands upon thousands of fun and sun seekers are still drawn seasonally to the beach


A large portion of the beach, controlled by the Department of Conservation and Recreation, is bordered by private properties of summer homes and rental cottages.

ROCKPORT

- 5. Front Beach: Off Main Street. There is limited metered parking available for up to five hours. Beachgoers, however, are encouraged to park at the free Blue Gate Meadows lot off Main Street and take the low-cost shuttle trolley. A lifeguard is present on weekends. Restrooms are available.
- 6. Back Beach: Off Beach Street. There is limited metered parking available for up to five hours. A trolley, however, will take beachgoers from the beach to the free Blue Gate Meadows lot off Main Street. No lifequard on duty. Restrooms are available.
- 7. Cape Hedge Beach: On South Street. There is a resident-only lot, and limited street parking for nonresidents. No lifeguard on duty. No restrooms available.
- 8. Long Beach: Off Long Beach Road. There is a lot for resident sticker parking. Stickers are available for purchase at the Rockport Department of Public Works. A separate lot for nonresidents is also available. A lifeguard is on duty during the weekends. No restrooms available.
- 9. Old Garden Beach: Off Old Garden Road. There is a small resident-only parking lot; there is limited street parking available for nonresidents.
- 10. Pebble Beach: Off Penzance Road. There is limited street parking available to the public. No lifeguard on duty. No restrooms available.

MANCHESTER-**BY-THE-SEA**

- 11. Black and White Beaches: On Ocean Street, off Route 127. Resident parking only. No lifeguards or restrooms.
- 12. Singing Beach: At the end of Beach Street. Nonresidents can park Mondays through Fridays for \$30 when an attendant is on duty and space allows. Cash and checks are accepted. - 15. Pavilion Beach: Small rocky beach at the end of Jeffreys Neck Road. Limited free parking on weekdays; residents only on weekends and holidays. No lifeguards. No bathhouse or restrooms. Beware of greenheads in July and August. Dogs prohibited Memorial Day to Labor Day.

- 16. Dane Street Beach: Lothrop Street, off Route 127. Small lot and limited onstreet parking, all free. Lifeguard on duty 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., starting late June. Kids' play area and seasonal bathhouse. Dogs on leashes allowed before 7:30 a.m. and after 7:30 p.m., between Memorial Day and Labor Day.
- 17. Independence Park: Lothrop Street just south of Dane Street Beach. Limited on-street parking. No lifeguards. Dogs on leashes allowed on beach before 7:30 a.m. and after 7:30 p.m., between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Dogs can visit the park area at all times.

- 25. Collins Cove Beach: Collins Street, Onstreet parking. No lifeguard.


