The program is robust with dozens out between varsity and junior varsity, and it's something that coach Larry Brown is encouraged by.



We find matches for girls and move them down and play some (junior varsity). We're fortunate that we've had 40 girls sign up for high school tennis. We'll be down to about 34, I think, when it's all said and done."

Brown is trying to get each of the players some time on the court.

Coming back from that state-qualifying team are Sarah Gibson and Emilie Phillips who played in doubles and Hannah Glanville from singles play. Mia Pung played at No. 1 doubles, but lost her partner in Lillian Kolb. Grace Higley was another doubles player returning, and she, too, lost her partner to graduation in Morgan Sanocki. Sophia Sarto is a third doubles player returning but without her partner as Meg Ruba graduated.

"We've got Hannah back again," Brown said. "We've got Jennah Skiba, who played (junior varsity). She did spend the summer with me down at Lincoln (Hills) and got better."

Brown said Claire Shoup is also expected to make an impact.

Brown said the increase in the number of girls playing is from a variety of things. One factor is that he's been coach of the program for five seasons, reaching the state tournament a year ago, the parents' support of the program and simply the number of kids participating in tennis at a young age all play a role.

"I think a combination of all those things," he said.

"There's a certain group of the kids want to get out there and have fun. They want to get out there and play and connect. There's some socialization factors on that," he said. "The numbers as far as competitiveness, I think the number is going to breed

more talent."

Beyond the graduations, the Orioles lost their No. 1 player in Emma McKinley, too, as she chose to play soccer. Brown said the team took the news fairly tough early, but the girls are resilient and are focusing on this season.

Pung is going to move back to singles play this season after playing singles at the JV level before last season, Brown said. For doubles play, Sarto and Higley will team up.


"They've improved immensely," Brown said.



Ludington boys golf Young Orioles ready to make mark

Ludington's golf team is short on varsity experience this spring, but second-year coach Sebastian Alvarado is encouraged by the work his young team put in to get ready for the 2023 season.

The Orioles graduated leaders Ben Zwick, Justin Plamondon and Ed Gamble from last season, wiping out three-fifths of the consistent play from a year ago. Ludington, though, brings back senior Trey Forfinski and junior Reece Ward that saw extensive play at the varsity level, including the regional hosted by Ludington at Lincoln Hills. Luke Hackert was another golfer that played quite a bit between both varsity and junior varsity.

They weren't the only ones, though, to get some competitive play, Alvarado said.

"We lost to graduation all of our experience. The positive thing though is that assistant coach (Jason) Burns scrambled week in and week out to get our (junior varsity) kids a bunch of matches. Down the home stretch in May, they played a ton of competitive golf. The difference between most of those underclassmen from a year ago and now, it's like night and day.




