# Multi-sport athletes join team

The good news for the Ludington Orioles boys track and field team is that it has a large turnout of 40 athletes this spring. But the not-so-good news is that only 12 of that number are upperclassmen and just five of those 12 are returnees from last season.

But the news that might save the day is that coach Mark Willis, now in his sixth season as the leader of the Orioles thinclads, will welcome a solid infusion of basketball and football athletes who have chosen to compete in track and field this spring.

"We have a lot of new kids this spring," said Willis. "We will be headed in a new direction."







"All that young talent is still undeveloped, and is usually going to have some ups and downs. It'll be interesting to see if they can smooth things out quickly and make some noise.


"But, the nice thing about it is we have big numbers, and with a load of freshmen and sophomores, the future certainly looks very bright."
