Hart boys basketball leaning on comradery in 2025-26 season

LUDINGTON — Last season, the Hart boys varsity basketball team was on the rise.

The Pirates look to continue that success in 2025-26 under third-year head coach Nick Bronsema.

Bronsema, 52-21 in three years at the helm, knows his team isn't where he wants them to be when the postseason rolls around. However, his team is full of kids willing to push past their comfort zone.

"We notice that our guys are unafraid to be coached," coach Bronsema said. "And at the same time we know we aren't near the finished product. We seek discomfort in practice so that we can operate comfortably on game night."

Hart returns four starters from last season, when it went 16-8 - 6-foot-5 senior guard Caleb Ackley, 5-foot-11 senior guard Jagger Lenon, 5-foot-11 senior guard Miguel Escamilla and 6-foot-3 senior guard Kolton Rockwell.

During the 2024-25 season, the Pirates picked up a 56-55 win over Big Rapids in the Michigan High School Athletic Association Division 2 District 35 semifinals. However, their season ended in the district finals against Ludington, 64-49.

With the majority of his starting lineup back in the Red and White, coach Bronsema has pushed his players to focus on improving.

"We have been working on getting just a little better each day ever since we came up short in our district final game," coach Bronsema said. "Our guys have made a pact to give their best effort while displaying an unbreakable spirit in order to get better as a team every day. In

order to get to our best, we know every moment matters.

"We are here right now!"
The Pirates finished second in the West Michigan Conference-Rivers Division race with a 9-3 conference record. They were second behind North Muskegon, who posted a 12-0 conference record.

While Hart brings a level of confidence to the court with four returning starters, coach Bronsema is excited to see how his class of newcomers impact the season.

The Pirates will have seven new players on the roster entering 2025-26 - senior guard Bryce Vanderkodde, junior 6-foot-6 guard Luke Vanderwilk, sophomore guard Grant Ackley,

sophomore guard Trevor Vanderkodde, sophomore guard Lorenzo Furlan, junior guard Allen Alcala and junior guard Mason Guikema.

Although Hart is looking at running smaller lineups, it is leaning on the relationships between its players to help propel the Pirates past last season's success.

"This group of guys really love to be around each other," coach Bronsema said. "They are cohesive and are willing to play their role to the best of their abilities. Everybody is willing to play for the person next to them. Every player has value, and they feel valued by their coaches, teammates, and community."

The Pirates open their season with a road game against Montague on Dec. 2. They have 11 total road games in 2025-26, including three-consecutive road games to end the season. From Feb. 13 to Feb. 19, they head to North Muskegon, Oakridge and Mason County Central.

Hart opens its home slate on Dec. 4 against Oakridge. From Dec. 15 to Jan. 8, 2026, it has three consecutive home games.

The Pirates have one more three-game homestand, starting on Jan. 16 against North Muskegon. They open WMC-Rivers action on Dec. 5 on the road against Hesperia.

Hart last won the WMC-Rivers Division during the 2022-23 season. It posted a 23-1 overall record while going 12-0 in WMC action.

The Pirates last district title came during the 2018-19 season, in a 60-31 win over Hesperia.



Hart girls basketball looks to continue success under new head coach

HART — Last season was one to remember for the Hart girls varsity basketball team.

The Pirates rattled off 20-consecutive wins, secured a West Michigan Conference-Rivers Division crown with a perfect 12-0 record and locked up a Michigan High School Athletic Association Division 3 District 72 title.

However, things can change in a year.

Entering the 2025-26 season, Hart has a new head coach at the helm – Ron Williamson. However, he's very familiar with the talent he has inherited having been around the program for over a decade.

"We're going to play hard," coach Williamson said. "We're playing a tough non-conference schedule this year... We will be a competitive team."

Hart has a stout non-conference slate ahead of them as they face off with Newaygo and Evart in January.

It also squares off with Kent City, Coopersville and Lowell in out of conference contests.

Coming off a 23-2 record last season, the stakes are high for the Pirates.

However, coach Williamson has talent across the board including multiple players from last year's WMC-Rivers title team

"All together, there will be six returning players," coach Williamson said.

Two of those returners will be key for the Pirates as the season unfolds – juniors Rilynn Porter and Reese Smith, Both Smith

and Porter were West Michigan Conference-Rivers first team All-Conference selections as sophomores.

"They're both two-year starters, coming back as juniors," coach Williamson said.

Porter, Hart's all-time assist leader, averaged over 10 points and four assists last season.

Outside of that, the Pirates only have two seniors on their roster.

"We're a young team," coach Williamson said.

Hart's roster will also feature Ava Johnson, Addison Schiller, Zoily Sarabia, Aurora Virtanen, Leah Walker, Caydence Bateson, Natalie Rosema, Joselyn Flores and Macy Riley.

Flores is on varsity as a sophomore and coach Williamson believes her quickness will allow her to contribute during the season. That will come in handy as the conference race tightens up.

After winning the 2024-25 WMC-Rivers title, the Pirates are looking to repeat this season. However, coach Williamson is aware that Shelby will be aiming to unseat them. It went 10-2 in WMC-Rivers action in 2024-25.

"I think Shelby, on paper, might be favored," coach Williamson said. "With everything they have coming back, they're a young team. They're hungry."

Last season, Hart went 3-0 over the Tigers – including a 41-27 win in the MHSAA D3 District 72 championship game.

Last season Ravenna (3rd; 7-5), Mason County Central (4th; 6-6), Holton (5th; 4-8), North Muskegon (6th; 3-9) and Hesperia (7th; 0-12) rounded out the WMC-Rivers race. Entering 2025-26, they will all look to challenge the Pirates dominance as well.

Hart opens on the road against Shelby on Dec. 11 at 7 p.m.

The Pirates continue their conference slate with a home clash with Holton (Dec. 16) and a road trip to Hesperia (Jan. 6, 2026).

They will play a total of six conference home games with the final one coming on Feb. 20, 2026 as the Pirates welcome Mason County Central to town at 7 p.m.

Hart has five WMC road games this season, the final of which is on Feb. 24, 2026 in Holton.

The Pirates close their regular season slate with three consecutive road games.

"And then we traveled back to Brazil and the U.S. for vacation," Ruhstorfer said.

"We stayed about two years in Brazil when my sister was born and then three years before we came to the U.S." Ruhstorfer said.

His sister is Rokhaya Ruhstorfer, who participates in cross country, wrestling this year and track for the Panthers.

She has also participated in quiz bowl.

About how he likes having her sister in school with him, Ruhstorfer says that she's a good sister.

On November 18, Ruhstorfer won an advanced placement class award. scoring five out of five in the AP seminar.

It is an AP in English.

HESPERIA — With a girls basketball squad combining youth, experience, and desire, Hesperia's head coach said he expects to compete at a high level, grow during the season and make a jump up in the 2025 West Michigan Conference race

According to Panthers Girls Head Coach Ty Elenbaas, the experience will come from key players Sarissa Conkle and Olivia Gerard.

"This will be their third year in the varsity program for both of them, which means they've seen just about everything they're going to see at this level," Elenbaas said.

And Elenbass also said, "They've had opportunities to learn in a lot of different ways, and this is the year where we really expect all those reps and all that experience to pay off."

Youth will be served, Elenbaas said, by several

"Yasmine brought great character and leadership; she was a loved presence in our locker room and set the tone for how to be a great teammate." Elenbaas said.

"Kaley was our point guard and a strong ball handler who provided steadiness on the floor," Elenbaas said. "We'll miss them, but their graduation also opens doors for new players to step up and grow."

In order to be more successful this season, Elenbaas said he'll be emphasizing defense, to take pride in this team's ability to match up with teams, forcing those teams into taking the kind of shot they want to give up instead of the ones the other team wants.

"Offensively, we're going to be intentional about hunting opportuni-

ties for our best playmakers to make plays, both for themselves and their teammates," Elenbaas said.

Elenbaas also said, "These areas will help us take significant steps forward."

About this season's conference race, Elenbaas said that his team is no longer there to participate, but to make their mark.

"With the combination of experienced returners and talented newcomers, we believe we can take a significant jump in the league standings," Elenbaas said. "Our defense, work ethic and commitment to growth will help us compete every night."

"Shelby and Hart are still the teams to beat," Elenbaas said.

"Shelby has a strong young core that continues to improve and Hart is consistently tough and well-prepared.

Elenbaas also said that Hart and Shelby set a high standard for intensity and execution.

Ruhstorfer said he hasn't been back to Senegal in around eight years.

Warsaw had another story about Nate.

Warsaw said, "He had an outing for band in Chicago so he missed practice, an excuse, right?"

Orioles looking to build on recent success in 25-26

LUDINGTON — The Ludington boys varsity basketball team has become accustomed to success, reaching the Michigan High School Athletic Association Division 2 regional finals each of the past two seasons.

While that seems like a high bar to reach, the 2025-26 version of the Orioles may be the team to surpass their predecessors.

Entering the season, Ludington returns all five of its starters from last season – junior point guard Taj Williams, senior forward Cam Gunsell, junior shooting guard Messiah Himes, junior forward Steele Stowe

and senior small forward Micah Spunar.

"We're returning all five

starters from last year," Orioles 23-year head coach Thad Shank said. "We were a super young basketball team last year. We were excited about the success we had with such a young team. Hopefully, we can take another step in the right direction this year. I thought at the end of the year, we kind of turned things around. We played pretty darn good basketball down the stretch

"We return a couple kids that played meaningful minutes off the bench and we had a solid JV squad that we're bringing a couple of kids from, so we're in good shape."

Gunsell and Williams were D2 honorable mention All-State BCAM selections last season. Both were also selected to the WMC-Lakes All-Conference first team.

The Orioles also have an infusion of youth headed their way as coach Shank has moved sophomore Kyle Himes Jr. and freshman Mikey Himes onto the varsity squad full time. Kyle Himes Jr. played meaningful minutes for the varsity team last season as a freshman. Both were large contributors to the Oriole's undefeated regular season in football.

Ludington's roster also features senior Zac Graham, junior Landon Ruboyianes, junior Jonathan Keith, junior Ethan Sweet, junior Keldan Moser and senior Xaine Smith.

Although the Orioles

are a younger team, it has the ability to overwhelm opponents with speed.

"We basically play with five guards every night," coach Shank said. "We don't have a lot of size."

However, with all the talent in the world, there is only one basketball player and coach Shank knows they'll have to be unselfish to succeed this season.

"We have a lot of talented perimeter players," coach Shank said. "That's a positive. But there's only one ball for five players. We have to be able to trust each other. We have to be able to make the extra pass. Basketball is a game where when you get good shots, you have a chance to be successful.

"It allows you to set

your defense and we have to be a team that's very unselfish and shares the basketball. If we do, we have enough weapons that we can be really hard to guard."

Coach Shank attributes the continued success of the Orioles basketball program to the groundwork of their youth program

"It all starts with your feeder program," coach Shank said. "We've made a big emphasis in Ludington, since we're not in the big city, that we try to provide programs that get kids playing at an early age. The other thing about it is, Ludington takes a lot of pride in

Ludington girls basketball looking to continue success on the hardwood

LUDINGTON — The Orioles have been a force to be reckoned with in terms of women's basketball recently, racking up a Michigan High School Athletic Association Division 2 state semifinals appearance and two regional titles since 2020.

In the 2025-26 season, the Ludington girls varsity basketball team is looking to make sure that run of success continues.

"We've had some good success," Orioles sixth-year head coach Warren Stowe said. "We've been lucky to have some good players.

Ludington's last regional crown was during the 2023-24 season. Last season, it reached the district semifinals but lost to Big Rapids, 38-46, in overtime. The Orioles posted a 17-6 overall record and were 10-2 in West Michigan Conference-Lakes action.

"The girls talked about (expectations) the other day," coach Stowe said. "They've got quite a big list, which is

good. But at a program like Ludington, these girls have worked really hard in the summer, in the offseason on their game. They want to compete for conference titles and district titles."

The biggest challenge Ludington faces in WMC-Lakes play is Fremont, who hasn't lost a conference game in two seasons. The Packers are 24-0 in conference play during that span.

"You just have to prepare and try to play your best game," coach Stowe said. "Fremont is very, very talented, but I don't think they're an unbeatable team. If you aren't playing your best game, they're fast paced, they trap a lot. They're very similar to us in that way. And if you don't take care of the ball, bad things are going to happen."

In terms of the league race, coach Stowe knows the competition will be stiff.

"I think the league as a collective whole is getting better," coach Stowe said. "Whitehall, Manistee and Montague are all continually getting better. Montague graduated a huge se-

nior class, so they may be down a bit. ... Collectively, the league from top-to-bottom is better and I'd like to think we're in the top half of that. Obviously, you have to go play the games. The girls are preparing this season to try and win a league championship."

In the past four games against the Packers, that's been the issue that has plagued the Orioles.

Ludington features three returning seniors - Madelyn Kenyon, Jaelyn Laird and Jacee Cole - that coach Stowe is leaning on to lead this otherwise young team. All three players have played significant minutes for the Orioles.

The roster also features junior Dalayna Slater, sophomore Leeahna Veeneman, senior Camille Brahm, sophomore Eloise Kwietniewski, sophomore Claire Keith, sophomore Grace Forfinski and sophomore Hestyn Stowe

That will help after losing multiple key pieces to graduation.

"We lost a group that had been on varsity since they were sophomores," coach Stowe said. "We lost a lot of girls that had spent a lot of time in the program. You're not going to replace them, but trying to fill in those gaps is part of it. But, we've got girls that are up to the task."

On top of the senior leadership, coach Stowe is expecting big things out of junior Raevyn Thomas, who played varsity all last season.

While coach Stowe is looking to his upperclassmen for leadership, he's excited to see how the group of sophomores develops at the varsity level.

"We've got five sophomores up on varsity," coach Stowe said. "Eloise Kwietniewski and Grace Forfinski both came up as freshmen halfway through the season last year. They have some limited minutes on varsity and I expect them to build on what they did last year.

"This year it's full-go with those two."

With some many underclassmen on the roster, coach Stowe has had to focus on getting them up to speed. But, he believes they're up for the task.

"That whole sophomore group, I think they're hungry and eager to have success," coach Stowe said. "They're very willing to learn. They're hard workers, just like the rest of the group is. ... It's been fun to have all that youth in there and really get to teach. It's been fun as a coach"

Although coaching will help bridge the gap between JV and varsity play, coach Stowe has been thankful for his upperclassmen.

"It's a rite of passage, as girls come up in the program, in the best possible way, they kind of get their butts kicked by the upperclassmen," coach Stowe said. "Madelyn Kenyon, Jacee Cole and Jaelyn Laird, they're competing against those young girls just like they competed against Hailey Stowe and Abi Bandstra and those that came before them.

"I think that helps, we really do try to get after it in practice and compete."

their basketball. So you have a lot of parents that make that extra effort to get their kids opportunities."

That focus on building a youth program has paid off, as the Orioles looked poised to dominate the conference race.

Whitehall has reigned supreme in the West Michigan Conference-Lakes Division in recent history. It finished 11-1 in the conference last season while going 17-6 on the whole. The Orioles were second at 9-3 in WMC-Lakes action with a 16-9 overall record.

While the Vikings are expected to take a step back, coach Shank knows the competition for the conference title will be stiff again this season.

"Whitehall has had a couple of very good years and they've won the last two conference titles," coach Shank said. "The

conference championship goes through them. They're rebuilding a little bit this year after losing their all-state kid, Camden Thompson. Whitehall will definitely be a team to think about. Manistee is a much improved team over the past couple of years. I think they'll be very solid within the conference this year.

"It was a fairly young conference last year, other than Whitehall and Oakridge. I think it will be a very competitive conference. But, we feel, if we play our best basketball, it's a conference that we can win."

Oakridge finished the WMC-Lakes race in third with a record of 8-4. It was 17-8 overall.

After reaching the Michigan High School Athletic Association Division 2 Regional 9 finale against Kingsford last season, coach Shank has made an effort to improve his team's defense.

"We've put a lot of focus on building a defensive mentality," coach Shank said. "I think when we got the regional final against Kingsford last year, we weren't on a high enough level defensively to get the stops we needed. And that's not unusual for a group that was as young as we were.

"We're really focused on having a great halfcourt defense and being able to mix things up with a little bit of trapping to keep people off balance.

The Orioles open their season with a road trip to

Reed City on Dec. 2. They open their home slate on Dec. 4 against Spring Lake in Hawley Gymnasium.

This group has grown accustomed to seeing Zimmerman out in front with the ball in his hands.

Bialik feels that from that perspective it makes Zimmerman's teammates also more comfortable having him direct the offense.

Sowa was on the varsity as a sophomore, and had an immediate impact, earning All-Conference Honorable Mention, and was named to the First Team All-Conference last year.

"I think Landin is one of the top five players in the conference, and everybody's going to key on Landin, and try to keep the ball out of Landin's hands," Bialik said. "But, there's a lot of other people who can take some attention away from him.

"That's what I love about the summer, because you kind of get to learn what you're missing ... and you can talk until you're blue in the face about what we're going to miss about Kaden, because there were so many good things that he did on the basketball floor for us.

"But, Braylen is very similar to Kaden. They're both quick, they both handle the ball very well. We only turned the ball over 10 times a game last year, and in high school basketball that's not very many."

Many teams refrained from pressing the Mar-

iners last year because of how much speed they have with Neal-Berry, Zimmerman, Scharp, Davis, et al.

Filling out the roster are seniors Keegan Shannon, who sat out last year, and Ayden Miller, who hasn't played since his freshman year as well as juniors Adam Olson, Wyatt Protasiewicz, Aiden Luomala and Brennan Bajtka.

With more experience to open the season, the Mariners are hoping to get off to a much better start.

Last year, the Mariners were more of a slow it down and it kind of grind it out in a lot of close games

Bialik says this could be different

"I think we'll have more variety in scorers each game," the coach said. "I think you'll see different leading scorers every night.

"Obviously, Landin is always going to be up there near the top. But, I think that second third (or) fourth guy could change every night.

"From that perspective, it makes us a tough team to play against because outside of Landin, there are a lot of guys that can beat you."

"She's come a long way. She's very good at her layup, she has a good floater. And she's even stepping outside and hitting some 3-pointers now."

Coach Knoll opined that Davis is turning a knock down shooter and expects her to have a pretty big season.

The Falcons have three girls who can forward, and all are strong rebounders, which bodes well for the transition game.

E m m a W o r k - man-Grondsma returns for her sophomore season, after coming close to breaking the freshman single game rebounding mark last year.

Emelie Barter might be only a sophomore, but she's already proven to be a force inside with her rebounding and scoring.

"We practice rebounding every day, and that's with our guards, too," coach Knoll said. "So, I'm really hoping we're going to be a good rebounding team.

"That's the goal at least."

Riley Swanger is an eighth grader who coach Knoll feels has a lot of promise, and could be the Falcons' fourth guard.

Pentwater has another eighth grader who's been practicing with the varsity, but coach Knoll believes she isn't there yet.

"Just from what I saw on film, there's a ton of room for growth," coach Knoll said.

"It seemed like they

played pretty well together as a team last year.

"They kind of hurt themselves with turnovers and fouls. If we can tone that back, we can be a really good team.

"I love pressing. Our team is going to press a lot. With our team working on that, it's going to put us in high stress situations in practice.

"We're working on down shifting to get into our offense."

Other than pressing on defense, coach Knoll wants the Falcons to focus on closing out on shooters, hands up and communication then finishing it by rebounding the ball.

The Falcons are going to push a lot of pick and roll on offense.

"I really want our bigs onto the blocks, because I think they have a lot of talent," coach Knoll said. "So, in a perfect world, our three bigs can score some points on the blocks, and open it up for us to get some 3's.

"So, I kind of like to go inside, and then to kick it out."

Bear Lake and Big Rapids Crossroads Academy shared the West Michigan D League title last year with matching 13-1 conference records, and Pentwater was third at 9-5.

Coach Knoll expects the Lakers to be solid again returning several players, including key starters.

He really came into his own last year, leading the Mariners in scoring and rebounding, and was rewarded by being selected to the First Team All-Conference.

"I really think Landin is one of the top five players in the conference," Mariners head coach Zach Bialik said. "Everybody is going to key on Landin, and try to keep the ball out of his hands.

"But, there's lot of other people who can take some attention off of him, too. It's bound to leave somebody open."

Still, there's no denying the Mariners offense

will run through Sowa ... which was the same thing on the football field this year.

Kott was the school's all-time leading scorers\, supplanting the late Donald "Doc" Cederholm, who set the record back in 1960, by finishing his career with 48 touchdowns.

This year, Sowa became the focal point of the Mariners offense and while he led the team in rushing, Manistee won only two games.

Now, he's being counted on to take on an even big-

ger role on the basketball team.

"Football is a running sport ... you're constantly running, constantly moving, blocking other guys, hitting other guys with pads on," Sowa said. "That keeps your cardiovascular up for the other sports you play.

"I would say my main strength in basketball is my shooting. I try to shoot a lot, that's my favorite thing to work on."

Although he's not the tallest player on the Mariners ... who are vertically

challenged as a whole ... Sowa has always shown an aggressive nature getting inside the paint.

Even against taller opponents, Sowa is not shy about banging against those bigger bodies and crash the boards with abandon.

"It's also fun to get inside," agreed Sowa. "Basketball, although it doesn't seem like it, is a very physical sport.

"That's one of the best parts about it, it's physicality. Going down there and bumping with the big guys is always fun."

How does he manage to overcome his lack of height to get position on the taller players, and succeed in snaring those rebounds?

Especially on the offensive glass, and get those second chance baskets?

"Like you say, I'm not that tall, and we have guys on our team that are short, but they have all the heart," Sowa said.

"So, size doesn't matter when it comes to sports, in my opinion. Going against taller teams all the time, considering we're so undersized, you get used to it after a while.

"You figure out ways to get around (the taller players), and find ways to position yourself to score."

A strong interior defensive presence, Sowa says the biggest asset is intensity.

"If you're into the game, and you're constantly talking and communicating with your teammates', it makes defense that much easier." Sowa said.

One of the top moments of Sowa's career to this point was knocking off eventual conference champion Whitehall on the Vikings home court last year.

"You beat a great basketball team, great basketball program at their court when they hadn't lost a conference game ... it was a great feeling," Sowa said.

"I mean, we worked for it, and it showed in the game. You play those teams throughout the year, and they're all great teams, and you use those games (to get better)."

Manistee started the season 1-7 last year, but

everything finally clicked and the Mariners made it to the district final and ended up 14-11.

Sowa admits the poor start was frustrating, but the team never doubted itself.

"We knew that wasn't us," Sowa said. "We put in the work every day in practice, and then everything started to fall (into place).

"Everything started meshing together, and we started playing like a team, and ended up with a winning record."

With more experience to start the season, Sowa is confident the Mariners can have an even more successful season this year.

He likes the talent of some of the newcomers as well.

"They're great workers, hard workers," Sowa added. "I feel that we'll play with a lot of chemistry this year.

"You kind of work with them. As a leader, a veteran, they kind of look at you and are inspired by the work you do.

"If you work hard, they'll work hard. They all have great mindsets as it is, they'll work to get to where they need to be."

Sowa says it's important for everyone to play as friends, more so than as teammates.

"I feel I just need to do my role," Sowa said. "On defense, play my position well, guard my guy well.

"Offense, when it's my turn to score, score. If I have to pass, pass. Whatever I have to do. Hopefully, that results in some wins."

It's clear that Sowa is, first and foremost, a team player.
