Reeths-Puffer building on '22 success

The 2022 season was a banner debut for Reeths-Puffer coach Cody Kater. A main theme of his was to close the gap on the Muskegon County power programs, and the Rockets did that — they played Muskegon and Mona Shores far closer than in the recent past, and they made the playoffs, going 6-4.

There's plenty of reason for optimism for the Rockets entering this year, too. Despite losing Central Michigan signee Tayte Vanderleest and starting quarterback Brady Ross to graduation, R-P returns a lot of talent.

On the offensive side, Ross was an all-conference player at quarterback, but the Rockets are excited about the potential senior Antrel Jones brings to the position. Jones brings a different dimension, blessed with more height, bulk and a bigger arm than his predecessor.

Grasping the nuances of the position will come with experience, and early returns seem positive on that front; in a July 7-on-7 at Montague, Kater could be heard several times praising Jones for making the right decision on a play. At the same time, Jones can take deep shots and keep opposing second-

On defense, the Rockets bring back top tackler Caiden Bolduc, a hard-hitting and athletic middle linebacker. He's the centerpiece of the Rocket defense. Kater noted Bolduc has added some bulk this year, getting from the 180-pound range to closer to 200, and credited him with increased leadership compared to a year ago.

"He's one of those players that are 85 percent mental," Kater said. "He is always on. He watches more film than maybe some of our coaches on staff. He's someone that knows where his eyes were supposed to be. Now he's bringing others along, where last year, maybe he wasn't doing that.'

Other key defensive Rockets, all in the back seven, include Bryce Ross, Kameron Coleman and Sage Secrest, all returning varsity contributors. Kater expects each to be even better this year.

"Those guys played a lot of football last year and now they're back, and they're in spots where they feel a little bit more comfortable," Kater said. Now they're bringing others along with them. I think that's the piece that we're really excited

Every week the statistics came in from Reeths-Puffer games last fall, it seemed like one name recurred at the top of the tackles list: Caiden Bolduc.


That leadership is helpful off the field, of course, but it may be especially im-

"(We're trying to) continue to close, continue to chop," Bolduc said. "We're still trying to hang on to that kind of underdog persona. It's a lot easier to come from behind. We're just still grinding.'



When folks talk about expectations, Gunsell says, "We don't let our kids talk about expectations unless they are willing to make a commitment. We can't have expectations without commitment, so we ask the kids to make a commitment first.'

Ludington opens on Thursday at home against Petoskey and then follows up the next week with another home game against Shelby on the Thursday before Labor Day.

Along with taking in the start of the 2023 football season, anyone at the game will be able to see the new artificial turf installed on the football field over the summer.

"We love the turf," said Gunsell.

"Artificial turf has evolved," he continued. "You are talking trainer, our staff never felt like about a surface that plays like grass. This is as good as it gets. What you are eliminating now is all of the divots and tears and the things that were causing twisted and or broken ankles. You are eliminating the slipping and the sliding where kids are falling and getting caught off guard."

The district believes the new artificial turf will assist with the safety of its students.

"Having artificial turf installed will make Oriole Field safer for our student athletes. It will have the most advanced cushion system to prevent concussions and will have consistent traction that is difficult to maintain with a natural field. especially during the winter season," Corlett said.

"I know there are concerns

Gunsell's hope and goal was to be able to work out on the field at least 8 to 10 times before their first game against Petoskey scheduled for Thursday. The first boys soccer game — first varsity event on the artificial turf — was on Aug. 16.

Anderson said that by adding the turf it will change the way the game is played for his team.

"It is a faster surface, there is no doubt about it," he said.

Anderson and Gunsell both agree that the field will be consistent, saving that everytime you play on it you know what the surface will be.


MANISTEE — Can they four-peat? That's the guestion everyone is asking as the Manistee Mariners begin preparations for the 2023 football season.

Manistee rebrands after generations as Chippewas

MANISTEE — It became official the moment Manistee's golf team concluded its season at the state finals. Going forward, the athletes will be competing under a new mascot.

Back in 1930, students voted for the logo "Chippewas" in a newspaper contest and has stood for over 90 years, "before we understood the offenive and detrimental nature of the use of Native American imagery," the school wrote.





The Hart football team is coming off its first winning season since 1997. Despite a 6-3 record, the Pirates did not qualify for the MHSAA state playoffs.


That is something that is still on the back of the team's mind.




The Hesperia football team is a young bunch this season, but that hasn't stopped them from dreaming big.



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

Offensively, the Sabers should be dangerous with quarterback Tyler Hallead coming back after a stellar sophomore season when he grew and matured.


He says he's more comfortable now directing the offense, and just wants to with him at quarterback, but lead the team back to the playoffs after the Sabers fell short last year.

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How to make the MHSAA playoffs

11-player

11-player football are divided in eight equal divisions before the season.

Victories against other schools earn points based on what division the opponent is in. Those points are:

- · 60 points for defeating a Division 1 team;
- · 55 points for defeating a Division 2 team;
- · 50 points for defeating a Division 3 team;
- · 45 points for defeating a Division 4 team:
- · 40 points for defeating a Division 5 team;
- · 35 points for defeating a Division 6 team;
- · 30 points for defeating a Division 7 team:
- · 25 points for defeating a Division 8 team;

Bonus points are also earned based on the size of the team

Those bonus points are 6 points for Division 1 and 2 schools. All of the schools sponsoring 5 points for Division 3 and 4 schools, 4 points for Division 5 and 6 schools, and 3 points for Division 7 and 8 schools.

To determine the playoff points, the sum of the playoff points is divided by the number games played plus the number of bonus points of the opposing team divided by the number games played by the opponent. Then add those two amounts.

Out-of-state opponents are classified on the basis of Michigan classification.

The top 32 teams in each division based on playoff points will qualify for the football season. There are no automatic qualifiers. Those teams that qualified will be announced on "Selection Sunday.'

8-player

The points for 8-player is the day.'

and the number of games played. same as Division 8 as each school earns 25 points for each victory.

> Bonus points, though, are determined:

- · 8 points of each game an opponent you defeated wins;
- · 4 points of each game an opponent you defeated ties;
- · 4 points of each game an opponent you tied wins;
- · 1 point of each game an opponent you tied, ties;
- · 1 point of each game an opponent that defeated you wins.

Add the playoff points as a fraction with the sum of the points divided by the number of games played. Do the same with the bonus points. Add those totals for the playoff points.

The 8-player playoffs is in two divisions, and similar to 11-player, the top 32 teams in each division with the highest playoff point average will qualify for the playoffs.

The teams in the playoffs will be announced on "Selection Sun-
