Experience equals wins at MCE?

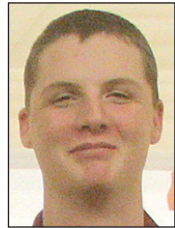

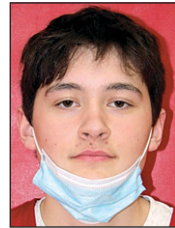

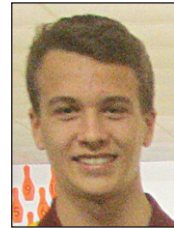

MCE gaining experience as it goes in 2021

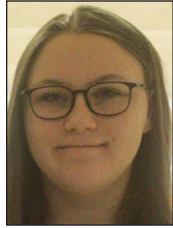

CUSTER — Mason County Eastern's softball team has a quartet of players that played from two springs ago, and those are the girls that coach Jacob Smith is depending upon with the program.

Last season was supposed to be Smith's first coaching the Cardinals, but COVID-19 wiped out last spring.

Still, the Cardinals have three returning players in Jessica Smith, Hillary Howe and Skylar Harry.

Jessica Smith was second-team all-Western Michigan D League in 2019. Jacob Smith,

her dad, said the senior will mostly play at first base and will pitch some. Fellow senior Emily Robinson is slated to be at third base and outfield.

Junior Hillary Howe is expected to play at shortstop and catcher, and she will

pitch some. Skylar Harry, a junior, is an utility player and will pitch.

"We have a lot of young players who haven't played any competitive softball, even rec ball, in over two years," Jacob Smith said. "We will have to allow them to make their mistakes on the field and try to learn from them on the fly."

The team will have more potential pitchers with sophomores Deanna Codman and Janessa Alvesteffer along with freshman Taylor Campbell. Codman is expected to play some at shortstop, and Alvesteffer is slotted for the outfield. Campbell will be an utility player.

Sophomore C.J. Matlock and freshman Kennedy Tyler each are figured to be

in the outfield, and Tyler is slotted for second base. Freshman Alexis Brummett figures to play at catcher.

The team also will see five of its players participate in track as well. Howe, Alvesteffer, Codman, Matlock and Tyler all participate in that sport, too.

"That is a huge commitment for them to try to manage two sports along with school," Jacob Smith said.

Smith expects Marion and Mesick to be in the hunt for the Western Michigan D League with Brethren and Pentwater close behind them.

He thought Walkerville,

Manistee Catholic, Bear Lake and Eastern should fight for the middle of the league race.

Smith sees the 2021 season to be a bit of a blend of expectations.

"This will be a year of learning to compete at a high level. Our underclassmen will have to step into some huge roles for us and need to adapt quickly to the competitiveness of a varsity sport," he said. "Every game that the team gets to play this year will be a great advantage for them in the future as they continue their future years of softball at Mason County Eastern."

Pentwater softball

Even with year off, Falcons load up with lots of experience

There is some irony in the fact that in a year where almost all spring sports teams are essentially starting over, Pentwater's softball program boasts as much experience on the roster as it's ever had.

Falcons' coach Steve Rossiter said that this is the most seasoned team he's had yet in six seasons, with eight players back - six of them juniors.

"This is the first time in

my career having varsity-age athletes dominating my team," Rossiter said.

Those juniors are Haidyn Adams, Crysta Cluchey, Bailie Hasil, Mikaylyn Kenney, Emma Oliphant and Haley Powers. Sophomore Marissa Sayles, who played in 2019 as an eighth-grader, is also back. Freshman Mackenna Hasil will be making her varsity debut, but should be a contributor.

Kenney, who pitched most of the Falcons' games last season, will again be the driving force of the team.

"She has grown so much over the years and her pitching is dialed in, making her an intimidating force on the mound," Rossiter said.

Adams is back at third base, and Hasil is at first. Both provide good defense, and Rossiter said Adams plays her position fearlessly.

Powers is back in the outfield (though Rossiter said she could play some infield too), and has improved immensely since first taking the field. Sayles and Mackenna Hasil both fill utility roles, with Hasil focusing on catching, a position she'll share with Crysta Cluchey.

"All of these girls have been working very hard to improve the offensive side of their game which really

shows at practice, so I am very thrilled to see the improvements to this part of our game," Rossiter said.

The Falcons, so young in the past, will still have their share of youth on this season's roster as well. Freshman Samantha Schaefer will make her debut this season, and three eighth-graders - Addison Bringedahl, Mandi Sayles and Natalie Payne - will see some action as well.

The Falcons will take aim at some of the better teams in the West Michigan D League this year. Two seasons ago, Rossiter said, his team played one of its best-ever games in a 4-3 defeat against Mesick. With many players on that team back and two years older, he's interested to see what happens this time in that matchup. Marion, too, will provide that sort of challenge.

Pentwater track Pentwater returns 10, including 3 state qualifiers

Pentwater brings back 10 athletes from the 2019 track teams, which should lead to a good deal of success.

Three of the returnees are state qualifiers. Khole Hofmann qualified in both hurdles events and in the 800-meter relay team, which returning teammate Jordan Bales was also on. On the girls' side, Jocelyn Richison is also a returning state qualifier, having made it in the 300 hurdles.

"In addition to the 10 returnees we have, there are nine others who are new

to us, either as freshmen or brand new to the sport," Falcons' coach Erika Fatura said.

Season prep has been limited due to other sports and COVID-19 precautions, but Fatura did see several of her Falcons during cross-country season as well.

Pentwater's season was disrupted before conference action even began, as the school called a seven-day pause in activity due to a rise in coronavirus cases. It was an early reminder of the challenges this season presents.

"From week to week, it is just a challenge to plan and

even know what the meet line up will look like," Fatura said. "For this reason, my emphasis is going to be more on individual goals and personal records."

"I am just hoping we are able to compete and get through the majority of our season. This last year has taught us a lot and one of the biggest lessons is to be grateful for opportunities... Our kids need to feel the joys of meeting goals, the heartbreak of not meeting them, the value of camaraderie, importance of teamwork and most of all the opportunity to push themselves to be better."

Manistee Catholic baseball Sabers mix vets, youth

MANISTEE — Five players return from the 2019 season for the Manistee Catholic baseball team, including four seniors who will be expected to provide invaluable leadership for the group of youngsters on the squad in 2021.

Those youngsters include sophomore Lee Pizana, freshmen Luke Niedzielski, Nathan Oleniczak and Ian Madsen as well as eighth grader Tyler Hallead.

Pizana was on the team as an eighth grader two years ago, but coach Dillon Rankin isn't certain if he or any of the others played much summer ball so they might show a little rust early in the season.

"We do have that experience on the team, which I think will help," said Rankin, who begins his second season at the helm. "They kind of know how things are run, and how I coach and they'll be able to help the younger guys."

Rankin is looking at using seniors Mateo Barnett, Adam Pierce and Blake Johnson in the pitching rotation, but will mix in some other guys, too, including Pizana, the only lefthanded thrower on the team.

But with a packed schedule because of the late start and shortened season, Rankin is going to need to have some of the other guys to step up and provide the Sabers with an inning or two along the way.

"We have a good group of guys, and I think they'll be able to rise to the occasion and give us a couple innings when we need them," Rankin remarked.

Rankin thinks the Sabers' infield will be pretty solid, although he's going to mix in some younger guys, such as Niedzielski at second base. Niedzielski will also play some outfield according to Rankin.

McLinden is a solid first baseman and gets the starting nod at that position. Filling out the rest of the infield will be Barnett, Pierce and Johnson.

Rankin likes the looks of his outfield as well, especially with senior Austin Taylor having seen some time out there two years ago.

Pizana also saw some time in the outfield as an eighth grader, and is expected to do a good job. Barnett and Pierce should see some time in centerfield.

"Nobody is going to have a specific position," Rankin allowed. "There'll be guys flip flopping around for sure. But, I think we'll be pretty solid. We work on cuts and relays religiously."

Hitting is a little more uncertain.

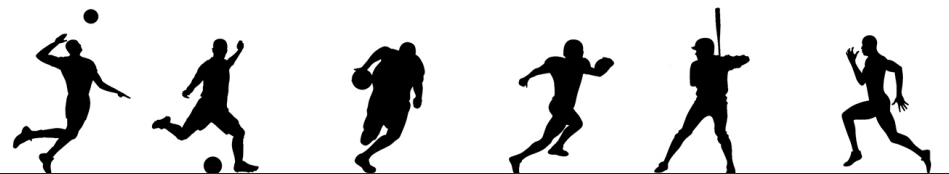
"It's tough to tell," Rankin said. "These guys play a lot of different sports. Only a couple of them might have played summer baseball, so it's been quite awhile since they've had a bat in their hands."

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Manistee Catholic softball Heck takes reins of Sabers softball program

MANISTEE — Kaytlin Heck returns to her alma mater as the new girls softball coach at Manistee Catholic, and she has 15 girls on the roster, which is more than when she played for the Sabers.

The higher number of athletes gives Heck more flexibility to mix and match, and use a longer bench to keep all of her players fresh and strong.

Heck added that more than half of the team has played before, and that ex-

perience will come in handy when the Sabers hit the meaty part of their schedule in the Western Michigan D League.

"They've got a good background," Heck says. "I see a lot of potential."

Kaya Watkins and Camryn Sutcliffe are the only seniors on the team. Watkins usually is situated behind the plate as the catcher, and when she's not she'll be at third base. Sutcliffe patrols the outfield and moves over to first on occasion.

"Catcher is the only one who can see the whole field,"

Heck remarked. "You've really got to be on top of it for your team back there and tell everyone what's going on."

"She does a good job of that. When she's at third she's good, too. She has a really nice arm to get the ball over to first base with a good, hard throw. I can't wait to see what she does."

Heck admits she doesn't know about Sutcliffe, but has been impressed with what she's seen from her in the few practices the Sabers have had.

The Sabers also five juniors and four sophomores,

and all of them have played softball. Both of the pitchers Heck will be throwing are sophomores.

Kaylyn Johnson and Emily Miller are the two pitchers. Johnson actually catches for Miller when she's pitching, and the two have developed a solid relationship on the field.

"They are a dynamic duo," Heck said. "They work well together. They know each other's pace, and they click very well, which is really important between pitcher and catcher."

Heck has also been im-

pressed by what she's seen from the play on the infield, especially the strong throws and how well the fielders can scoop up the ground balls and snag line drives.

Freshman shortstop Grace Kidd is quick, and that speed gives her the range needed at the position. Heck is excited to see how she'll perform in a game.

"I think we have a lot to work with if need be, to switch players around," Heck said. "We're still narrowing the outfield down to one or two girls who can play each position well."

With the late start, and spring break, the Sabers haven't done much work on their hitting. But the couple times they've taken batting practice Heck has been pleased with what she's seen.

As far as the Western Michigan D League goes, Heck doesn't have much of a scouting report and is hoping to know more after a couple of weeks.

Heck is just wants to have the Sabers gain some confidence and put together some wins before the districts roll around.

Barnett to lead Lipa-guided Sabers

MANISTEE — With a couple athletes quarantining because of COVID-19, and a couple more on the fence about coming out, the Manistee Catholic track and field program, boys and girls, still has just under 20 rostered athletes to start the 2021 season.

The major returning athlete on the boys team this year is Mateo Barnett, a senior who qualified for state two years ago and who'll be splitting time with the baseball team.

Barnett competed at state in the 100- and 200-yard

sprints, and first-year Sabers' coach John Lipa — who'll be assisted by former head man Gabe Wise — is understandably looking for big things from him again in 2021.

Keeton Capling, a junior, is a strong sprinter as well and should press Barnett to retain his top role on the squad in that category according to Lipa.

"He was part of the Mason County Eastern cross country team that qualified for the state meet," Lipa said. "I think he'll be a strong distance runner this year."

On the girls' side, Kaitlyn Duke, Elena Pizana, Leah Stickney and Josie Ziehm are

the returners from 2019 and actually are the team going into the season.

Lipa said he has a handful of others who signed up for the team, but they are under quarantine because of COVID-19 and have yet to practice.

"We have some newcomers on the boys' side, and I think we can have a strong relay team," Lipa remarked. "Like the sprint relays, and even the mile relay.

"Keeton and Mateo put us in a good spot for the conference (Western Michigan D League), and even beyond," Lipa stated.

Lee Pizana, who is also playing baseball this spring, Nick Sturgeon, Adam Pierce (another athlete dividing time with baseball) and Dean Sturgeon who are all sprinters. Ryker Capling, a fresh-

man, gives the Sabers another sprinter.

Henry Hybza's younger brother Peter Hybza will be running with the distance crew with Jamie Riley, while David Kosla is going to be the Sabers' thrower in the shot put and discus.

"It's hard to tell how everything is going to pan out with COVID and everything else," Lipa said. "Kosla needs to work on his technique and get stronger. I think he's capable of doing well in the conference.

"We're already a week behind because of the delay to start the season, but it's just good to have the kids get out

and compete again. They need some sense of normalcy."

Although the Sabers lack depth, individually Lipa is confident they can do quite well. He's particularly enthused about having some league champions in the sprints, and qualifying a number for state.

Because of the pandemic, invitational meets are limited to eight schools so there isn't the opportunity to get involved with bigger meets to prepare for the regional.

Lipa is focusing on teaching the athletes perseverance and how to roll with the punches.

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
