Nine of 11 starters back on offense for Ludington football

They're still talking about last year's heart-breaking 28-21 playoff loss to Big Rapids in the locker room.

Every day since practice started, and ever since the game ended.

It still stings.

But the Ludington football players are using it as motivation as they gear up for the 2025 season, and putting together another winning record.

After breezing through the month of July with all the 7-on-7s and camps they do, the Orioles are ready to get to work.

Ludington has won seven games in two of the last three years, including last year, and appear to be a good bet to do it again.

Especially with Cameron Gunsell, coach Charlie Gunsell's son, returning for his senior season at quarterback.

"He's done a lot of work. He's kind of changed his body in the off-season," coach Gunsell said. "We're excited to have him back.

"It's his third year starting for us, and we expect big things out of Cam. But, more than anybody Cam expects big things out of himself. I think he's done what he needed to do to get ready."

Now that he's a senior, the highly competitive Cam Gunsell is demanding more out of the younger players to compete at a higher level, his coach says.

They're all responding,

"Our attendance in the weight room and at zero hour, and at camps and 7-on-7s has been phenomenal, the best we've ever had here," coach Gunsell said.

"It's an exciting time."

Overall, the Orioles return nine out of 11 starters on offense, which gives rise to high expectations.

Even more, six players are back who started at least one game on the offensive line.

It starts with Taj Williams, a slot receiver who caught nine touchdown passes last year as a sophomore.

"We expect another big year out of him," said coach Gunsell.

"We're probably going to include him a little bit more in our running game.

"He's a very good athlete for us, and is a standout on the basketball court as well as on the football field."

Wide receiver Zac Gra-

ham is also back after hauling in seven TD passes last year, and has been working hard to get ready for the season.

Messiah Himes was a sophomore last year and might have been overshadowed by the other two according to coach Gunsell, who thinks he's just as talented.

"Messiah is going to be more involved, especially in our run game," coach Gunsells said. "He catches the ball well."

Incoming freshman Mikey Himes is thought to be a major contributor, able to do a variety of things ... play wide receiver, running back and even some quarterback at times.

A fifth projected skill player is Kyle Himes, an incoming sophomore who coach Gunsell says is a really good route runner

"All those guys are go-

ing to get touches," coach Gunsell added. "That doesn't include newcomers like J.T. Keith and Cooper Holmes.

"So, we are blessed with some depth at the skill positions."

The Orioles return their entire offensive line, led by 6-foot-3, 290-pound right tackle Walt Autrey who has a couple of collegiate offers.

Right guard Donavan Salazar started last year on the varsity as a freshman, and coach Gunsell said he has gotten stronger.

Colin Shelton, the Orioles' center, is the smallest guy up front at 6-2 and 210. But he is also one of the smartest lineman, coach Gunsell said and makes all of the calls from the center spot.

Left guard Blake Nelson, 6-1 and 245, started last year as a sophomore and has virtually lived in

the weight room, and it shows.

At left tackle is Luis Salazar, 6-3 and 310 has successfully rehabbed from a torn ACL and MCL suffered in the Montague game last year and is expected to be ready to go by the start of the season.

Ludington has some work to do on defense, graduating its entire defensive line and is in the rebuild mode there.

Connor Chaney will play a lot of defensive tackle according to coach Gunsell.

Logan Sloan, who saw some action on varsity at the end of last year, has added 20 good pounds and coach Gunsell expects to use him at one defensive end.

A sophomore and a couple of juniors are battling to nab the other defensive end position.

The Orioles do return leading tackler from last

year Cooper Holmes at linebacker, and the entire secondary is back intact.

Messiah Himes and Cam Gunsell are at the safeties, Graham and Mikey Himes at the corners.

Brody Jones and Michael Wilson will also be a part of that secondary.

"We have a lot of work to do on defense because of graduation, but we're happy with the kids we have to work with," said coach Gunsell.

"That will be an emphasis early in camp."

Oriole quarterback Cam Gunsell primed for another big season

The memory of last year's narrow 28-21 loss to Big Rapids in the opening round of the MHSAA playoffs is driving the Ludington Oriole football team, and senior quarterback Cam Gunsell.

Gunsell had a breakout season a year ago, completing 105 of 147 pass attempts with 17 touchdowns to just four interceptions for 1,176 yards ... an average of 168 passing yards per game.

A solid 6-foot-2, 180 pounds Gunsell can beat you with his legs as well as his arm, as he proved last year as a junior.

In fact, he was the Orioles' leading rusher, carrying the ball 151 times for 995 yards, an impressive 6.6-yards a try, and 16 touchdowns for 35 touchdowns overall.

"He's a good player. He's done a lot of work," his dad, Orioles head coach Charlie Gunsell said. "He's kind of changed his body in the off-season.

"We're excited to have him back. We expected good things out of Cam,

but more than anybody Cam expects big things out of himself.

"I think he's done what

he needed to do to get ready."

Cam Gunsell admits that sometimes it's scary

playing quarterback, but he likes having the spotlight on him.

"I like making plays. If

you lose it's on you, but then again if you win, you're a big part of it," he said.

"It's super exciting. I love it."

The coach/dad thinks the game has slowed down considerably for Cam, and feels he's improved the most in his accuracy in the passing game.

He went from a 56 percent passing completion rate two years ago to 70 percent last year.

"He just takes his training so much more seriously now," coach Gunsell said before practice. "Diet and everything. He's doing everything he needs to do to be the best player he can be.

"So, I just think natural maturity has occurred. He competes at a really high level.

"I think now, as a senior, he's demanding maybe more out of the other guys to compete at a higher level."

Cam Gunsell has mixed emotions as he prepares for his final season under center for the Orioles.

"It's sad, but it's also super exciting. We've got a good group coming back," Cam replied. "So, I'm really excited for this year.

"We were all crushed (after the season-ending loss to Big Rapids), but we also knew we had a big group coming back (nine of 11 starters return), so we had a lot to prove this season."

Other than working out in the weight room three days as week, and participating in 7-on-7s, Cam Gunsell said he would often get together with some of his teammates and throw the ball around when they are "bored."

The quarterback says he's improved his arm angle the most since he first took a snap from center on varsity.

"My arm angle was coming too high, so I had to lower it down," he explained.

"And just reading defenses, not throwing bad balls, (being) smarter," Gunsell added.

"I feel I'm a smarter football player, too."

With most of the running backs and receivers coming back from last year, Cam Gunsell be-

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Mariners defense a work in progress

MANISTEE - Although the record wasn't as good as it had been the past couple of years, the competition on the schedule helped get the Manistee High School football team into the playoffs for a fifth straight year in 2024.

The Mariners, who won seven and eight games in each of the last two years. respectively, finished just 5-4 last season but still made the post-season.

But, they were in, and that was the only thing that mattered for the Mariners as they extended their string of post-season appearances.

In fact, the Mariners have made the playoffs six out of the last seven years, and their fans have come to expect it.

As with every season, Manistee is experiencing some transition as they need to replace departed seniors who were major contributors.

Of course, the biggest name on the list of graduated seniors is the school's all-time leading scorer Kaden Kott, who rushed for over 1,000 yards a second straight vear.

"Those kind of players don't come along all the time," head coach Alvin Rischel said. "Certainly, it wasn't just about Kaden Kott last year. There was also several other seniors that contributed, and some underclassmen as

"Football is the ultimate team game, and Kaden would be the first one to tell you that it wasn't just all about him, and he couldn't have accomplished what he accomplished without the help of so many others.'

Rischel, entering his

second season at the helm, isn't necessarily looking for anyone to fill Kott's shoes, but rather blaze their own path and stamp their own mark on the program.

Hoping to make their marks are a talented, but slightly untested in terms of playing time, group of juniors and seniors who need to step up to fill the open vacancies. The key returner is third-year quarterback Dayvion Neal-Berry, who started as a freshman and has consistently improved each

"Luckily for him, Dayvion had a really talented senior class surrounding him, and really took him under their wing as a freshman," Rischel said.

"I thought our offensive

coaching staff in 2023 did a good job of allowing Dayvion to learn and progress, but still minimizing and simplifying things for him."

Rischel is excited about the offensive backfield that is returning with Neal-Berry, including burners Josh Weiss and Wyatt Protasiewicz.

Both showed they have the speed to get to the outside, and are fast enough to run away from the defense. Landin Sowa is also back. A strong. physical fullback, Sowa is more of a straight ahead bruiser.

"He's got a lot of athletic ability, and is a smart kid. He understands the game. You can teach him things,' Rischel said. "And he's a natural leader, too. ometimes, you want things to be player-led type motivation, and he's the one that always steps up.'

Up front there's experience with fourth-year center Jacob Lee and Kiedis Underwood, who was First Team All-Region last year.

"Kiedis and Jacob have both been living in the weight room, and their numbers - just like a lot of the kids on this team - are starting to get really, really good," added Rischel.

Ean Guenthardt played some tight end for the Mariners last year, but Rischel says he'll probably fill different roles on the line this year.

The defense is more of a work in progress, as the coaching staff trying to see where the best fit is for the players.

"Schematically, we like to keep things consistent. I've always been a big fan of building your players around the program, rather than the other way around," Rischel said.

"But, you also have to be smart enough to role play kids when you notice that you have a kid that can do things from one year to the next.

"When you recognize that, you have to design your scheme a little bit to allow them to play the game."

Kott played a major role on defense as well last year, coming away with several interceptions, and running a couple back for scores.

'I make better decisions,' Manistee quarterback Dayvion Neal-Berry

MANISTEE – It wasn't the way he would have preferred to get the starting quarterback job, but freshman Dayvion Neal-Berry was the Manistee High football team's only other option at the time.

So, when the original starter went down with a season-ending injury, then coach Troy Bytwork turned to the untried youngster to take over.

As you might imagine, Neal-Berry could barely feel his feet under him as he trotted unsteadily out to the huddle.

Looking at the faces of his teammates as he prepared to call the signals, Neal-Berry knew they were all older than him, and had been in difficult situations before.

"I was a little scared," Neal-Berry admitted before practice as he prepared for his third season under center. "I was scared to get hurt.

"But, now I make smarter decisions. Sometimes, I was scared to keep the ball, even though it might have been a better decision.

"Now that I know I can do it, I'll keep the ball myself if I need to."

Alvin Rischel was an assistant and the defensive coordinator when Neal-Berry was a freshman, but he remembers how Bytwork handled the situation.

Instead of adding even more pressure on the young signal caller, Bytwork brought him along slowly, letting him adjust to the speed of the varsity game.

"His freshman year, I thought we tried not to put a lot of the focus on him, and just let him manage a lot of things," Rischel said. "Not put too much on him, and let him learn and grow as a fresh-

man. Last year, I think he kind of stepped out a little bit, and had multiple games where he threw multiple touchdown passes."

Neal-Berry says he loves to throw the ball, even if in the Mariners don't throw it a ton n the Wing T offense.

But, he also likes leading the team, and being the one ... other than the center ... who starts everything in motion.

"That's one thing I really like about quarter-back," Neal-Berry said. ?I feel (that) I'm one of the fastest guys on the team right now.

"I depend on my speed a lot, actually."

Neal-Berry isn't worried about the offense with Kott gone.

"Now that Kaden's gone, we have a lot more pressure on ourselves," he said. "We could really depend on Kaden. But, now we have a lot of guys that have to step up, and I think they're ready for it."

Rischel knows that Neal-Berry is ready.

"He's going to continue to grow, and as he continues to learn and grow, we're going to continue to expand what he can do," Rischel said.

"We'll give him more opportunities to showcase his talents, because we think the sky is the limit for him."

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Spartans have six starters returning on offense, defense

SCOTTVILLE – It wasn't the finish they wanted, or expected, but it was still the best season for the Mason County Central football team since the Spartans won seven games in 2015.

The Spartans shocked the world last year, going 9-1, including a six-game winning streak at the end of the season.

One of the highlights of their season for the Spartans was a wild 50-43 win over county rival Ludington in the second week.

Although their twogame winning streak was snapped with a 36-20 loss to perennial West Michigan Conference Rivers Division power North Muskegon, it didn't slow the Spartans down.

They didn't lose again until Standish-Sterling ended their season with a 50-32 win in the district playoffs.

"We struggled a little bit in the playoff game. That's just a learning process that goes along with building a program," Spartans head coach David Smith said.

Duplicating that performance is going to be hard to do, especially at a small school that struggles with numbers.

A numbers problem translates into the difficulty having adequate depth at all the positions.

The Spartans have six starters returning on both offense and defense, which can certainly help.

Especially with the experienced players providing mentorship for the

younger and less experienced guys.

Key returner on offense is quarterback Pierce Bladzik, set to begin his third season as the starter.

"We had a big senior class, but we had a lot of underclassmen playing," Smith said.

"We actually have five linemen coming back," Smith added.

"One just started basically half the season,

and we lost one lineman (to graduation) but the others are coming back. That's a big plus."

Two running backs who were out most of last year with injuries are back and fully healthy.

Both are seniors, and have played some big minutes.

"I think we're going to have a more complete offense," Smith added. "We know we should be able to run the ball. "We're losing a big piece of our back field, but I think we have capable guys to step in. We're just going to be versatile.

"I think we're going to throw the ball more."

The Spartans have a senior receiver, the coach's son Eli Smith, who is finally beginning to understand the scheme.

His dad says it took Eli a little longer to mature in size, but he is expected to be pretty tough on the

"I feel that our team


and it was just great to see, from the off-season on, through the course of the season," Bladzik added.

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
