MCCEF to host Spartan River Races to benefit schools

The Mason County Central Educational Foundation (MCCEF) will be holding it's second Spartan River Races on Saturday, July 13, at Scottville's Riverside Park.

However, instead of just the one race that was held last year, this year's event will have a triathlon and a 12-mile river race. MCCEF President Gary Andersen said the positive feedback from last year's race pushed the foundation to expand the event.

"We all listened to what the community said and decided to start the expansion of the race," Andersen said. "I really wanted to be able to bring back the triathlon. That was a really big event for the city during my childhood."

The three races will be a 12-mile river race from Scottville to Ludington, a 4.7-mile river race from Custer to Scottville, and a triathlon.

Check-in for the 12-mile race will begin at 7 a.m., and flights of three to five racers will start between 7:30 and 8 a.m. The triathlon check-in will start at 7:30 a.m., with the 12-mile bike race starting at 8:30 a.m.

Participants in the triathlon are required to bring their vessels to the Custer Road Bridge prior to the race.

The third race of the day will be the 4.7-mile race from Custer to Scottville, with check-in starting



at 9:30 a.m. and racers going out between 10:30 and 11 a.m.

The Awards Ceremony will take place at approximately 1 p.m. at

Riverside Park. Every event the MCCEF puts on helps the school district in one way or another, and Andersen said that the foundation chose to use the money raised from this event for a project within the high school.

"The proceeds from this year's event are earmarked for the high school library renovation,"

he said. "We asked the teaching staff for some project ideas, and the events will be benefitting most of those projects this year."

Early sign-up is \$25, or \$30 the day of the race. Participants must be age 18 or older to sign up for the races.

Scottville welcomes new businesses

In addition to the return of the Scottville 10 & 31 Celebration, the city of Scottville has also celebrated some economic boosts during the past year.

In early June, during the annual Celebrating Success event, two new businesses were honored by the city's Downtown Development Authority (DDA), opening their doors to the public and giving residents a peak at what they have to offer.

Among the new businesses is Brandi's Hair Salon at 106 Main St., owned and operated by Brandi Rummer.

Rummer moved her salon to Scottville after 18 successful years on James Street in Ludington. She said she made the decision to relocate to downtown Scottville because "it just made sense."

"We live in Custer because our boys go to Scottville (schools)," Rummer said.

She said business has been good so far, and she's happy with the new location.

"(The people in Scottville) are wonderful," Rummer said. "They're so friendly here.

"All my clients from Ludington have followed me and I'm picking up new clients from Scottville and Custer."

Rummer offers haircuts, hair colorings and waxings, and has flexible hours.



"I'm honestly open whenever. Sometimes Monday through Saturday," she said. "I don't really have any set hours."

The indoor and outdoor gardening supply business is co-owned by Andrew Schnitker and his wife, Samantha, who said things are off to a good start.

"It's amazing. Very welcoming and great to be part of the community here," Andrew said. "We're just happy to be here. Open Monday through Saturday from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. to help everyone's needs."

Local high-speed internet, TV and telecommunications company Sync Wave is also in the process of developing a new hub in the city at 499 W. U.S. 10.

The business has been operating for years at its Amber Township location, and hopes to be moved into the new facility soon.

Interim City Manager Steve Brock said it's good news for the city's economic development.

"I'm excited to see Scottville start to bounce back," he said. "There are a lot of potential businesses wanting to expand. There's a good feeling in the air."
