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
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
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
A Destination for Generations BOOK CHRONICLES BASS LAKE HISTORY

Local history enthusiasts and those who appreciate stories of a simpler time will enjoy a new Michigan book called This Is Bass Lake: A Destination for Generations. Through historical storytelling, the book details Bass Lake's 140-year legacy as a summer retreat located in southern Mason County.

The book's cover shows an early 1930s oil painting of Bass Lake. The artist is Neva J. Gilbert Chapman, whose family first came to Bass Lake in the 1890s. She painted her son, Ted, standing on the family dock. Generations later, her family continues to enjoy the Bass Lake community.



roduced by the Bass Lake Property Owners Association (BLPOA), the book's collection of narratives and photos tell how the Bass Lake community evolved. Once stripped of its majestic pine forests by the 1800s logging industry, the Bass Lake area was reimagined in the 1880s by prominent Pentwater residents as a tranquil lakeside haven. Since then, it has remained a cherished seasonal destination for generations of families and friends.

While focused on Bass Lake, the book's themes are the same for many inland lake communities across Michigan, sharing similar stories of logging-era origins, generational cottages, and the enduring pull of summer traditions.

"This Is Bass Lake: A Destination for Generations is the culmination of a four-year endeavor by the BLPOA to tell our lake's story. The six history committee members compiled personal accounts from Bass Lake families, memoirs, photos, articles, and memorabilia from sources spanning six generations," said Dan James, BLPOA president. "The result is a comprehensive look into Bass Lake's storied past, and a book that eloquently captures the rich history of this remarkable west Michigan 'hidden gem.' Our hope is that people will enjoy reading about the beautiful surroundings and long-standing traditions of Bass Lake."

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
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

Time and time again, artist Cheri Petri turned "the moment" into a masterpiece, her intricate paintings becoming playful, artful expressions of youth.

"I was always drawing (as a young girl), all the time," said the Pentwater resident, business owner and artist. "I always liked to draw people. Well, I naturally got into painting children – I like that – I enjoy their innocence, especially when they're at the beach where they're so engaged in what they're doing.

"When I did that – which I don't do any more – I would take hundreds of photos to catch 'the moment,' the right moment, and now the children that I painted are having children of their own."

Owner of Petri Gallery in Pentwater, Cheri no longer paints children, or any other people, because she said she can no longer "do it to my standards." Rather, she concentrates her brush and easel efforts on other types of art

With longtime friend and fellow artist Cedar Kindy also working in the gallery, Cheri said she enjoys talking with other

up and coming artists - young and old and learning about what inspires them.

Cheri and her husband, Hugh Larsen, have made Pentwater their home for years and he, too, shares her love for art. Her first husband, Bert Petri, who passed away about 16 years ago, also shared her love for art and he, too, was an accomplished artist.

"When we lived out in the country, I always said if we do a gallery, I want it felt like home, and it still does - I love it," she said. "It's just a wonderful little town, with wonderful people."

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Happy memory rekindled in most unexpected way

A silver-haired couple, bent and cautious with their steps, walked slowly out of the restaurant.

"Have a good day," one of the servers yelled as they left, a friendly salutation that workers there shout out whenever someone leaves their dining area.

"Happy Trails," the silver-haired fella' with a pencil mustache shouted without looking back, instead focusing his attention on holding the frail arm of his companion, and protecting her balance.

"Happy trails!" I hadn't heard that gentle greeting in I don't know how long - a lifetime, for sure.

- he was gentle and kind and the reflection of all that is good about life - opened the door to their car and then steadied his wife as she slid into her seat, I knew, I just knew, that all is well in our "Happy Trails" world, even if the current climate doesn't seem like it.

A few minutes later, when my friends showed up to share breakfast with me - we do that once a week - I told them about what the old fella' had said: "Happy trails."

Bob smiled. Stan smiled and nodded his head. Ted laughed and said, " ... ah-hh, Roy Rogers." Oh yeah, just as it is for the kindly, silver-haired man, the four of us are of that generation, too.

For those who don't know, Roy Rogers - co-founder of the Sons of the Pioneers and long hailed as The King of the Cowboys - was an American singer, actor, television host and rodeo performer of another generation - my generation and his legendary 1951-57 TV show that bore his name featured such sidekicks as Pat Brady, Andy Devine, George "Gabby" Hayes and Smiley Burnette.

As one of the original singing cowboys of the mid 20th century, Rogers twice was inducted into the Country Music Hall of Fame and his signature song that he sang with his wife, Dale Evans - "Happy Trails" - became a massive hit that is still remembered today as the kindly man at the restaurant weighed testament to.

Rogers, by the way, has been honored with not one, not two, but three stars on the Hollywood Walk of Fame: one for Motion Pictures at 1752 Vine Street, a second for Television at 1620 Vine Street, and third for Radio at 1733 Vine Street.

But as I sit here, a few weeks after watching the silver-haired couple walk arm-in-arm from the restaurant, I can't get The King of the Cowboys tune out of As I watched them leave the gentle man my head - it just keeps churning inside me over and over and over.

I even dreamed about "Happy Trails" last night and recently, as I sat at the beach watching the gulls stretch their wings, I hummed "Happy Trails." And as I write this column about living through an age of "Happy Trails," I appreciate my childhood, all the more.

I appreciate the life I've lived, a life carved out with "Happy Trails" more often than not being blockaded with ruts and disappointments, though I've had my share of the latter.

And I'm thankful for having crossed paths with the silver-haired couple not so long ago - I had never seen them before, and I haven't seen them since - if we ever cross paths again (trails, really), I want to approach them and tell the fella' how I'll forever remember what he said that morning: "Happy Trails."

But I gotta' be honest, I'm also hoping that between now and then - if "then" ever happens - I'm hoping that tune will fade from my memory.

Until then, may I share it with you: "Happy trails to you, until we meet again; happy trails to you, keep smilin' until then; who cares about the clouds when we're together; just sing a song and bring the sunny weather."

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THE MONARCH WILL SOON TAKE FLIGHT

From caterpillar to butterfly, the Monarchy once again reigned supreme all across the Lake Michigan shoreline the past several months, from peaceful hamlets such as Pentwater, to neighboring communities like Ludington, Manistee, Shelby and so many more. Colorful, delicate and always fun to photograph, these wonders of nature will soon leave the area and return to their winter home in Mexico, a daytime-only flight that will take them several weeks. The final generation of monarchs born in this region - known as the "Methuselah generation" - hatches right about this time of the year and this will be the generation that will keep future generations coming back, springtime after springtime. Many monarchs follow the Lake Michigan shoreline south, a natural corridor that provides both direction and access to nectar-rich habitats. Monarchs rely heavily on these energy sources to build up fat reserves before beginning their long journey. Native fall-blooming plants - such as swamp milkweed, butterfly weed, black-eyed Susan, New England aster, and wild bergamot - are key nectar sources for the butterflies during this critical period.



PENTWATER — The Pentwater Lake Association (PLA) is crediting community action for recent gains in water quality monitoring, shoreline restoration, and channel maintenance — with multiple projects continuing into the fall and slated for 2026.

In the organization's August newsletter, PLA President Patrick Hooyman said the association's long-standing volunteer water testing program played a direct role in prompting state action this summer. The Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) conducted a five-week E. coli study in the lake's tributaries after years of elevated readings in the Village Creek and the North and South branches of the Pentwater River.

The PLA's Water Quality Committee

also expanded its own testing to include four additional upstream locations near the wastewater treatment plant. Volunteers also gathered dissolved oxygen and temperature profiles twice a month at the lake's deepest point — data that guided responses to seasonal low-oxygen conditions, which contributed to a sheepshead fish die-off in late July and early August.

Shoreline and Habitat Work

The Pentwater Lake Improvement Board (PLIB) advanced two shoreline improvement projects this summer with support from the Village Council — one at the Village Boat Launch and another at the 4th Street road end.

At the Village Boat Launch, the Junior Sailing Program partnered with the PLIB

to remove an unsafe deck, relocate it farther north onto the grass where it will not impede parking, and naturalize the shoreline. Renovations are being funded by the PLIB and the Junior Sailing Program, with the Village Department of Public Works providing an in-kind contribution of labor and equipment.

At the 4th Street road end, the PLIB plans to move existing shoreline rocks into the water to form a natural buffer in front of the concrete seawall. The vacated areas will be transformed into rain gardens, and benches may be added in the future to make the site more inviting. The project's goals are to improve the shoreline's ecological health and enhance the appearance of an underused public space. Spinnaker Condominiums has pledged \$15,000 to cover the costs.

Invasive species control continued

through late summer, with mechanical harvesting of starry stonewort and curly leaf pondweed. A map of targeted areas was posted on the PLIB website, and riparian owners were encouraged to either move boats for harvester access or borrow PLA-owned tools to remove invasive plants within 100 feet of shore.

The PLIB is also promoting the addition of large wood structures to the lake — an ecosystem feature largely absent in Pentwater Lake — to enhance aquatic habitat, reduce wave energy, and improve shoreline health. The Shoreline Manager will handle permitting, with installations expected to begin in 2026.

Harbor Maintenance and 2026 Dredge

A long-term push to maintain the channel between Pentwater Lake and Lake Michigan secured a major federal investment earlier this year. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will allocate \$2.2 million in 2026 for dredg-

ing, operations, and maintenance — the largest funding commitment for the harbor in years.

While dredging did not occur in 2025 due to permit delays, mid-July soundings reported a 9-foot depth on the south side of the channel entrance, allowing safe passage for boaters this season. The Protect Pentwater Harbor Committee, working with the Township and Village, is developing a long-term plan to ensure navigation even in years when federal funding is not available.


Community Recognition

The PLA joined the Pentwater Service Club in honoring the late Bart Zachrich as the 2025 Citizen of the Year. Zachrich, who died in January, was recognized for his leadership and volunteerism in the Service Club, Centenary United Methodist Church, and Pentwater Historical Society. His family will participate in October's special Yacht Club dinner honoring his contributions.

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
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
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
