

The biggest returning player is Morgen Ahlfeld. Ahlfeld was honorable mention All-State two seasons ago while also earning All-West Michigan Conference

honors as well as all-district said. honors. Ahlfeld is a standout pitcher, and she's joined by returning players Braylen Green, Reagan Wiese and Allie Mast.

The team has several newcomers, and they're largely freshmen and sophomores, Blake said.

"(The) great news is that they are all very athletic, have been working hard this offseason and will be contributing, not just playing," Blake

Blake said he expects his team to be able to compete with every single team it matches up against this spring.

"With a pitcher and leader in the circle like we have this year, (Ahlfeld) alone will keep us in most games so as long as we limit our errors and hit the way I know we can. We should win more than we lose," he said.

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Tyron leading Spartans girls in her senior season

SCOTTVILLE — Mason County Central's JUNIORS: Amya Battice and Jaden Petersen girls track team has a handful of athletes back from two seasons ago as coach Ben Nelson starts his 27th year guiding the Spartans girls track program.

Seniors Nyah Tyron and Mackenzie Singleton return as does Junior Amaya Battice. Tyron ran as a part of a state runner-up 1,600-meter relay team two seasons ago. She also was third in the state two years ago in the 300-meter hurdles and she was fourth in the 100-meter hurdles.

Both Battice and Singleton compete in the throwing events. Battice was third in the West Michigan Conference in the

The Spartans will add two standouts, Nelson said, with Jaden Petersen and Jayden Baker. Petersen is expected to run in the 1,600, 800 and some relays, and Nelson noted she was an excellent cross country runner. Baker is expected to run in the 200 and 400, and he said Baker has a great attitude and is a hard worker.

Central doesn't have a lot of numbers, so Nelson doesn't think his team will fare well in the duals, but could do well in larger meets and invitationals.

"Hart and Montague (are) frontrunners. Whitehall will have the numbers though," Nelson said.

Overall, Nelson said he expects the season to be interesting.

"All of the teams are in the same boat as far as having the 2020 season off," he said. "I get the chance to coach with my son Patrick and continue to work with my longtime assistant/co-coach Maria Holbrook."



Girls coach Calvin Ackley said one unfortunate side effect of the precautions is fewer of the big meets. This year, track meets are limited to eight schools, or 16 if only boys or girls compete.

"We really look forward to the big invitationals to see how we stack up against a variety of talent across the state," Ackley said. "Unfortunately, it will be much more difficult to pool a lot of talent at one meet. This is very disappointing."

In the meantime, while Hart's strong veteran performances are sure to lead to points, Kimes hopes the development of some sity Pirates who are back from young athletes leads to even big-


