'Nutcracker! Magical Christmas Ballet' returns to Sioux City with a cutting-edge show

For Dan Talmi, it's beginning to feel a lot like Christmas.

Since he is the executive producer of the "Nutcracker! Magical Christmas Ballet," the holiday season is pretty much a year-round endeavor for Talmi.

"To be honest, it feels like Christmas even in the middle of summer," he admitted with a chuckle.

That's because The "Nutcracker! Magical Christmas" is gearing up for a two-month tour of North America, with shows taking place from the East Coast to the West Coast and everywhere in between.

The acclaimed live production of Pyotr Il'yich Tchaikovsky's legendary ballet will be returning to the Orpheum Theatre, 528 Pierce St., for a 6 p.m. Sunday performance with the Sioux City Symphony Orchestra.

This marks the 31st year that Talmi has presented this holiday classic, which brings together some of the ballet virtuosos from around the world.

Many members of the cast are from Ukraine, which has been hard-hit by a war with Russia. As a result, the company had to reach out to artists from other countries like Japan, Italy and Turkey,

"Kyiv is the birthplace of classical ballet," Talmi said. "This is why we've always gotten so many cast members from Ukraine."

Despite the ongoing conflict, this year's cast will include Ukrainian gold medalist Karyna Shatkovskaya and the country's "honored artist" Elena Pechenyuk in principal roles.

Also new to this year's production will be a character called The Herald. Representing the spirit of the forest, The Herald plays a vital role of announcing the arrival of the ballet's heroes and leading the joyous celebration of Clara, the beloved heroine.

Clara will also encounter 10-foot-tall puppets and elegantly dancing couples who symbolize the five great heritages of the world.

"The Nutcracker" is the one of the best-known ballets in the world," Talmi said. "It is also flexible. I've seen 'The Nutcracker' in Florida, where they've incorporated lobsters into the story. I've seen it done in Louisville, Kentucky, complete with Kentucky Derby jockeys.

"Yet when we've added characters to the show, it is keeping with the show's historic timeframe," he maintained.

One innovation that Talmi is especially proud of is incorporating young local dancers.

"In Sioux City, we are partnering with the nonprofit Flux Dance Company, giving aspiring ballet

students a chance to perform with professional dancers on a wonderful stage like the Orpheum," he said.

Indeed, Talmi is ecstatic to be working at the Orpheum with the Sioux City Symphony Orchestra, under the direction of Ryan Haskins.

"We've worked with the your symphony in the past and it is always a pleasure," he said.

No matter how many times Talmi see "The Nutcracker," he still gets chills.

"The first few minutes of the score are so magnificent," he explained. "You can tell why Tchaikovsky's music has withstood the test of time."

The same can be said of the legendary 131-year-old ballet.

"People know the story and they love it," Talmi said. "We try to keep it fresh."

Specifically, "Nutcracker! Magical Christmas Ballet" does that by blending classical ballet with cutting-edge circus techniques.

"It is not uncommon to see three or four generations of a family at one of our shows," Talmi said. "Indeed,

'The Nutcracker' is, often, the first ballet a child ever sees."

Talmi takes it as a challenge to make sure a person's first ballet leaves a good impression.

"Nutcracker! Magic Christmas Ballet" conveys a message of peace and understanding through the universal language of dance," he said. "We need more of that in the world,"

Is this normal in a marriage?

Dear Annie: My husband and I have been together six years this December, married four. We grew closer when I had a miscarriage after only a few months of dating. He stood by my side and asked my dad for my hand. He knew then he wanted to stand with me and by me.

A year into our marriage, I discovered he was cheating on me with one of his exes. He claims it was only emotional and never physical. I chose to believe him and forgive. This took a long while.

After our second child, I went through treatment for postpartum depression. I realized six months in that it was not helping. In fact, it was making my mental state worse. So I went off the meds. I've been off of them for about four months now.

Lately, though, I'm finding myself not wanting to be physical with my husband. I do find him attractive, and I love him. He's my best friend and rock, but when it comes to his touch, it's unwelcome and very uncomfortable. I feel it's not fair to him to not have a partner he deserves. I do my wifely duties, but I don't enjoy sex anymore. I used to enjoy sex, almost to an unhealthy level. Is this normal in a marriage? Is it normal to not have anything your husband does physically, do anything for you? — **Lost Wife**

Dear Lost Wife: It sounds like you are not done healing yet — and that is OK. Healing takes time, often a far longer time than we want it to. You went through multiple traumatic experiences with your

husband, and it has only been 10 months since your diagnosis of postpartum depression.

Your first course of treatment was clearly not the right path for you, but that doesn't mean that you should leave your depression untreated. Consult your doctor on all of your other options. You should also attend couples counseling with your husband to make sure you are continuing on in a safe, trusting, communicative marriage.

Dear Annie: In response to "Not a Family Holiday," the reader who was stressed about the prospect of dividing her time among family members during the holidays, I solved this problem for myself years ago. When I married, my husband had two small children from his first marriage. Sharing holidays was a requirement of the custody agreement. This always meant that we missed the holidays with the children every other year.

So, we created alternative holidays. We simply choose a different day to celebrate. As my husband and I added two more children to our family and they all added spouses and grandchildren, this model continues to work, allowing us to celebrate together without negotiating with in-laws. — **Always Happy on Alternative Holidays**

To her credit she has never talked down about my father or told me any unsavory stories about him. This has caused me to just assume that I would never hear from him again, so I kind of mentally moved on years ago.

I'm so stunned that I don't know what to do. I like the jacket but I'm not sure if I'm comfortable wearing it. I also don't know if I want to write him back or not about this. Since I'm uncomfortable, do you think I should just pack the jacket up and ship it back to him? — **Beyond Surprised, via email**

BEYOND SURPRISED: I suggest that you hold onto the jacket and give yourself some time to think things over. When you last saw your father, you were just a little girl, not the woman you are now.

Therefore, it's best to not rush to make any decision at all. You do not know where your father has been and what his life has been like. At some point you might wish to at least hear what he has to say for himself.

In the meantime, I feel it's not a good idea to return the jacket as that would be making a statement to him and I don't see you as being ready to make any such decision yet after being caught so off guard.

Discuss this issue at length with your

mother as you may find her guidance quite helpful, especially since she has exhibited a mature and civilized tone when discussing him in the past.

Finally, since it is fall now and wintertime is looming, I suggest that you do wear the jacket. You can decide later if you wish to keep it or not and there is no harm in using it now when it is in season. Your father wanted you to have it so you certainly should try it out no matter where things go between you and him.

This is likely your best path toward raising the funds you wish to acquire. If you are successful with this strategy, remember to "walk the walk" by following through with your savings plan. This habit will be a very good one for you to develop at your age.
