



REED all about it

Symphony oboist to bring jazzy improvisation to new concerto

nown for its clear, penetrating, reedy sound, the oboe is considered one of the most difficult woodwind instruments to master.

Due to it having a uniquely varied tone, the oboe is often overlooked when it comes to concerto music.

That is until musical director Ryan Haskins approached Sioux City Symphony Orchestra's chief oboist Jeffrey Paul with a proposal last season.

"Ryan said he schedule to do a concerto which focused on the oboe and asked if I had any suggestions on music that should be played," Paul recalled. "Instead of relying on a well-known piece of work, I told him that I was willing to compose a piece written by myself."

"When Jeff said he was willing to write the piece, I was ecstatic," Haskins explained. "I knew the work big part of my life seemed like an would be unique that we were in very good hands."

Paul's "Concerto for an Oboe" will have its world premiere at the Sioux City Symphony Orchestra (SCSO) concert, at 7:30 p.m. Saturday at the Orpheum Theatre, 528 Pierce St.

In addition to Paul's threemovement piece, the symphony orchestra is slated to perform Samuel Coleridge-Taylor's "Overture to tie Song of Hiawatha" as well as the First Symphony by Edward Elgar, the British composer whose work is full of grandeur, intimacy and intensely personal.

Paul's own work can also be described as deeply personal. After all, the Southern California native has began playing music at age four, became an aspiring concert pianist

by the age of 10 and began playing in youth, college and professional symphonies as a teenager.

He also branched in acting and singing in multiple community theater performances, parlayed his talents in rock, jazz and folk bands while excelling as a pianist, oboist or any musical instrument he could get his hands on.

"To say music represented a understatement," Paul said. "At times, it was my life."

This was especially true when Paul attended the acclaimed Eastman School of Music as well as the University of Southern California.

It was after graduation that her decided to move to the Midwest.

"I was working as a freelance musician in Los Angeles but I was also starting a family," Paul said. "I needed a steady paycheck and the Sioux Falls Symphony Orchestra offered me a job as their principal

Based in Sioux Falls for more than 20 years, he also plays oboe for the Sioux City Symphony Orchestra and performs on piano and saxophone in various small jazz groups as well as big bands.



Yet Paul's love of performing and itself. composing is deeply rooted in the realm of ethnic folk music.

"You'd be surprised by how many classical composers were inspired by the rustic sounds of ethnic music," he explained. "Even Beethoven had an affection for Celtic music."

Paul surmised that this is because composers are attracted to certain sounds. Whether it is the sound the winds makes in a grove of trees or the high-pitched wail of bagpipe, music becomes a language unto

"I think that's why I've always been attracted to folk music from around the world," he said. "You don't need to speak the language to understand the music."

In fact, this is Paul's philosophy when it comes to playing music and in composing it.

"As a composer, I am almost never at a loss for ideas," he said. "But it must come from a point of passion."

The passion may come from a

unique sound an oboe can make that ingenuity that emulates in nature or it can come in piece which finds inspiration in the "peasant music" that Paul loves to write.

Yet Paul's most distinctive trait comes from his training in the jazz

"Classical music isn't known for improvisation the way that jazz is," he said. "Why not bring the spontaneity of jazz, incorporate it into classical music?"

This was exactly the spork of

Haskins wanted from Paul. It is something he wants to rub off on some of the other musicians.

"While our musicians come from all walks of life, few of them have the versality that Jeff has," he said. "I think Jeff's energy can excite the other symphony orchestra members."

Paul has a similar hope for

audience members. "Symphonic music should tell a story while still challenging audience expectations," he said. "That is what keeps the form fresh."

Going for TV's top honor

Ex-Spencer radio announcer wins Emmy Award for voiceover work

Jon Armond knows exactly how Susan Lucci felt.

Just like the longtime star of TV's "All My Children," he had plenty of Emmy nominations – and losses – next to his name.

However, Armond – similar to the woman who made Erica Kane a television icon – eventually emerged victorious.

After nine nominations, the former Northwest Iowa broadcaster won an Emmy for his narration in CBS's "One Jets Drive," a series which chronicled the NFL season of the New York Jets.

"The people who say that is an honor just to be nominated don't know what they're talking about," Armond said a few weeks following the Jan. 16 ceremony. "Winning is definitely more fun." represented on markets in the people landed a never leave it." Because of t sending audition

The road hadn't always easy for Armond, a native southern Californian who worked as a staff announcer at Spencer, Iowa's KICD-A.M. Radio from 1996 to 2010.

"I was interested in a career in radio but Los Angeles was not a good place to break into the

business," Armond explained. "L.A. represented one of the largest radio markets in the country and, once, people landed a good gig, they'd never leave it."

Because of that, he began sending audition tapes to small radio stations across the country.

"The folks over at KICD heard my tape and took a chance on me," Armond recalled. "Before I knew it, I was on a plane to Iowa."

Unfortunately, he landed during a historic cold snap in January.

"When I left San Diego, it was

81 degrees," Armond remembered. "When I arrived in Spencer, the temp was 27 below. Here I was in a leather jacket – the heaviest piece of clothing that I owned – thinking this was either the greatest adventure or the biggest mistake in my life."

Luckily, he was able to adjust to both Iowa weather as well as the state's slower pace.

"Growing up, I was so used to being closer to everything," Armond said. "That wasn't the case in Spencer. If we wanted to go shopping, it meant an all-day trip, either to Sioux City or Sioux Falls."

"When Spencer finally got its own Super Walmart, it was a big deal," he said, chuckling at the memory. "It seriously cut down on my driving time."

Yet Armond was charmed by his new life.

"Two of my three kids were born in Iowa," he said. "It was great place to raise a family."

Eventually, Armond left Spencer to host a morning radio show in Portland, Maine before moving back to the West Coast.

"Despite having plenty of onair experience, Los Angeles was a tough radio market for me," he said. "Instead, I devoted my energy to voiceover work."

This has proven to be a good career choice for Armond, whose voice can be heard advertising everything from Toyotas to Target to Dunkin Donuts.

"The nice thing about voiceovers is that, in most cases, you don't need to do it in a professional studio," he said. "Voiceovers, nowadays, can be done at home and at the convenience of the artist."

That is how Armond voice-tracked his Emmy Award-winning work on "One Jets Drive," which he has been doing for the past few seasons.

Is is also how he provided the narration for upcoming documentaries produced as part of The History Channel' ongoing "That Built" series.

"The shows that worked on involved entertainers who've made a significant influence in America," Armond said.

Looking back at his career, Armond is pleased with the start he got in Northwest Iowa.

In fact, he credited his KICD experience as his first big break.

Now, Armond has an Emmy to add to his shelf at home.

"Well, what's better than winning one Emmy? Winning two Emmys, of course," he said with a laugh. "Now, I want to have a pair."

'Comedy of Errors' coming to Dordt

SIOUX CENTER, Iowa – William Shakespeare's "The Comedy of Errors" will be presented by the Dordt University's Theatre Arts Department at 7:30 p.m. Feb. 21 - 24, with a 2 p.m. Sunday night.

The show is under the direction of faculty member Laurel Koerner.

Drawing inspiration from the

silent film era for both the look and acting style of the show, The Comedy of Errors follows Antipholus and his servant Dromio as they arrive in Ephesus after traveling from

his father's home in Syracuse. The men are searching for their longlost brothers after being tragically separated at birth. Syracuse natives aren't allowed in Ephesus, but their desire to go undetected is quickly thwarted when everyone they meet seems to already know who they are. Hilarity ensues, as the twin brothers of both Antipholus and Dromio are in the same city and are continually mistaken for the brothers they've never met.

Koerner says that Comedy of Errors is a good point of entry to Shakespeare. "My hope is that people who think they don't like Shakespeare's plays or don't 'get' them will find themselves pleasantly surprised by our rendition," she says.

Inspired by physical comedy in the vein of Charlie Chaplin and Buster Keaton, Koerner and her team added a twist of vintage circus to the 1920s aesthetic to amplify the story's confusions and illusions as well as to develop the characters' eccentricities in lively and colorful ways. The story takes place in a port city where the gears of business are always turning—an important plot point, says Koerner, so they sought to capture the Mediterranean feel in the architecture to set the scene.

"There is, of course, a lot of comedy in the word play, turns of phrases, and double meanings, which is typical of Shakespeare's comedies," adds Koerner. "We've worked hard to make the meaning behind the words clear."

9 that give you in-depth looks at your running metrics. With WatchOS 10 you can also connect Bluetooth cycling accessories like power pedals to the watch.

The Series 9 also has the S9 chip that enables the Double Tap gesture so you can pinch your thumb and forefinger together to control the watch when you can't reach it with the other hand. Battery life generally lasts 18 hours with typical use, so you will need to charge this watch every day.

The battery can last as long as 10 days, so you won't need to charge it as often as other Fitbits. The screen is small, so it can be more difficult to read than other trackers and smartwatches.

Fitbit Charge 6

The Fitbit Charge 6 is the best Fitbit you can get right now. With great health and fitness features including an electrocardiogram (ECG or EKG) app and excellent sleep tracking, it now connects to gym equipment and fitness apps so you can see your live heart rate data during a workout. The Charge 6 also connects to Google Maps from your phone for turn-byturn navigation on your wrist and has closer integration with other Google apps like YouTube Music and Google Wallet.

The Charge 6 has a built-in GPS so you can track outdoor workouts without your phone, plus a blood oxygen sensor.

The Daily Readiness Score can also tell you if your body is up to taking on a workout, or if you should take a rest day. But many of Fitbit's most useful features, like this score, are available only as part of Fitbit's \$10-a-month Premium service. Without a Premium subscription, you can still use the Charge 6 for fitness and health tracking, it just won't give you the most
