You know it's almost fall when the Sugar Shack Bakery ushers into the new season with

Owner Claudia Hessa said she has lots of seasonal items with pumpkin, apple and other traditional fall flavors.

"Somebody asked me that the other day, as far as apple or pumpkin," Hessa said. "Pumpkin hands down."

To prove it, the Sugar Shack has a maple iced pumpkin bread. Hessa said they usually try to do different flavors throughout the year to "think outside the box."

Hessa said the reaction to the new flavors of breads has been great so far, especially their new maple pumpkin, which will continue to be available throughout the season.

"We've been going through 40 to 50 loaves a week," Hessa said.

The maple pumpkin was something her baker wanted to try out, she said.

"We try to come up with something [new] every season," Hessa said. "We try to get so we don't have too many choices, but we don't want to limit ourselves to the same thing from the last five years, either."

Hessa said they're always finding ways to change things up.

"Then, of course, the small decorative cookies we always flip over to whatever season it is," Hessa said. "Now we have fall. We have football because a lot of the schools have their football games and things."

Sugar Shack will also have cookie kits with Halloween decorations coming next month.

"It's kind of fun," Hessa said. "When all the COVID things started, there were a lot of kids at home. They needed things to do."

Hessa said they have more delicious treats throughout the year, especially Christmas cookies. They will also move to other treats like gingerbread flavors for things.



hen is a coffee shop more than a coffee shop? When it becomes a training ground for students.

Enter: Stone Bru Coffee.

Brad Lepper, owner of Stone Bru Coffee, said Briar Cliff officials approached him about a year ago about the possibility of opening up a location on the college campus to fill on the coffee business," Lepper up an empty café space.

During the first weeks of the semester, Lepper said, employees from Stone Bru's other locations came to Briar Cliff to train student employees.


"Students have done a phenomenal job so far," he said.

It's an inside job

Turns out the perp was in-house.

A former Plymouth County Sheriff's deputy has been iailed on multiple felony charges in connection with burglaries and thefts that took place over a period of more than two years, while he was employed with the department.

Ex-deputy Aaron John Leusink, 41, was taken into custody by agents with the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation Sept. 24, according to a press release from the Iowa Department of Public Safety.

Leusink was charged in connection with burglaries and thefts that took place between December 2017 and January 2020, while he served as a sheriff's deputy. The thefts were related to prescription medications.

The following charges have been filed against Leusink:

- One count of first-degree burglary, a class B felony
- Two counts of second-degree burglary, a class C felony
- Two counts of third-degree burglary, a class D felony
- Felonious misconduct in office, a class D felony
- Unlawful possession of prescription drugs, a serious misdemeanor
 - One count of fourth-degree theft, a serious misdemeanor
 - Three counts of fifth-degree theft, a simple misdemeanor

Leusink's bond was set at \$30,000, and he was held in the Plymouth County Iail.

The Plymouth County Sheriff's Department became aware of Leusink's criminal activities in April, during a review of internal records. Plymouth County Sheriff Michael Van Otterloo requested that the Iowa Division of Criminal Investigation review and handle the investigation.


Leusink was placed on administrative leave during the investigation, then terminated in April.

In a separate press release Sept. 24, Sheriff Van Otterloo registered his displeasure with Leusink's alleged misconduct.


"Every day the employees of the Plymouth County Sheriff's Office put forth a tremendous amount of effort to serve with integrity, honesty, and public trust. It is disheartening to have that effort tarnished by the actions of one person, whose misconduct does not define who we are. Former deputy Leusink neglected his oaths in acting in a manner unbecoming of an officer of the law. He will fact the consequences of his actions. Meanwhile, the men (and women) of the Plymouth County Sheriff's Office are dedicated to serve and protect and will continue to do so, Van Otterloo said in the statement.


