
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



WOES YOUR FOR ANSWERS



TWEEN 12 AND 20 ROBERT WALLACE

He's the answer I've been looking for, but he has a problem

DR. WALLACE: I've met a great guy who truly loves me, but he has a drinking problem that's pretty concerning. I'm now 20 and I have a daughter who is 2 and will turn 3 in March. He blacks out about twice two days in a row.

On the other hand, in many ways he seems like the answer to my dreams. The father of my child took off to another state the moment he found out I was pregnant and told him I would have the baby. Back then I was only 17 years old, and the father of my child was 22. This new guy is 24, so he's four years older than I am but he does have a good job and he treats me very well. He also tells me he will adopt my daughter. However, his drinking has caused him to be randomly absent from his work and I'm afraid he'll lose his job if he doesn't get his act together soon.

He wants us to get married in late May and to move in together a few weeks before nothing and that you girls are approaching the ceremony. Do you think if I marry him and we move in together, I can help him make the necessary changes he obviously needs to make? — Want to Help Him Stabilize, via email

WANT TO HELP HIM STABILIZE:

I think for your sake and especially your daughter's sake that you should concentrate on helping him immediately rather than planning to marry him in May and seeing if you can help him after you've married him.

Since you describe his problem as quite concerning, you can take action to help him "stabilize" right away: Encourage him to seek professional treatment for his affliction. If he refuses to do so now, what would give you the confidence to think he

would magically seek treatment in May or June?

Marrying someone dealing with such a deeply troubling issue that could spill over to affect you and your child is not a wise idea. Seeking to help him right away is a good idea. I recommend that you seek to help him now, and when he truly makes a positive change in his life you can begin to consider a future with him.

We don't like how dad speaks to mom

DR. WALLACE: My sister and I don't like the way our father speaks to our mother. He's often rude and condescending

Our mom is a great cook, and she keeps a month and he's rarely sober for more than our home together quite well. She's literally the glue that holds our family together.

> We would like to approach our father about this issue because we feel our mom won't confront him. I'm 17 and my older sister is 18 so we are old enough now to be able to speak out about matters like this. However, we don't want to start any arguments either. Do you feel it's best to say something to our father or to just continue to stay silent? — Two Sisters, via email

TWO SISTERS: I do feel you should speak your mind tactfully and respectfully. Perhaps you might seek an opportunity to speak with your father sometime when your mother is not present.

Let him know that your mother said your father on your own behalf. Explain that you love both of your parents, and you want what is best for your family always.

Don't try to trap or demean your father as you speak to him. Start by telling him all the things you like and respect about him and then gradually get to the point of how you'd like to see your father show your mother more respect on a regular basis.

Adult interpersonal relationships can be complicated, and you likely don't know everything that has gone one between your parents. Don't ask for any explanations but be aware that there is much you likely don't know. Simply focus on improving the decorum in your family home and perhaps give your father a hug after you complete this conversation with him.

"Even though John is Laotian, he specializes in Cajun food," she said. "I'm Chinese and I'm smart enough to leave John alone in the kitchen."


Yet La does know how to make a mean spring roll. She'll be

Even though he came up with the name of the website, Kolbo doesn't consider himself Sioux City's sole foodie.

"No. there are a lot of foodies out there who are far more knowledgeable than I." he insisted.

Indeed, Kolbo said the original mission of the blog was "to highlight the time-tested, trusted and locallytouted food spots that one might not

"Sioux City has so many small, independently owned restaurants that may have a unique cuisine or may have just flown under everybody's radar," he explained.

"I wanted to put the spotlight on

When the Sioux City Foodie blog began. Kolbo was able to profile local eateries like Shahi Palace India Grill, Diamond Thai and Pierce Street Coffee Works.

Taking a long hiatus from the site, he decided to give Sioux City Foodie a more timely, post-COVID

necessity," Kolbo said. "They couldn't eat at their favorite restaurant yet they continued to miss the food."

At the height of COVID, the sale of cookbooks and home kitchen equipment skyrocketed.

Bringing back the Sioux City Foodie franchise, Kolbo wanted to incorporate a greater DIY aspect.

"Food should be delicious to eat," he reasoned. "But it also can be accessible enough to make at home."

Which is why WITCC's Chef Gasaway will be around for "Sioux City Foodie Live," offering a tutorial on spring roll making.

"I call it cracking the code," Kolbo said. "People will have a better appreciation of their favorite dish if they knew the steps that went into its making."

After that, conversations will start flowing.

"People love talking about food," Kolbo said. "Whether it is talking about our family or a favorite holiday, food has a way of entering the conversation."

Ultimately, that is what Sioux City Foodie is all about.

"We're all foodies, whether we know it or not," Kolbo said. "If you enjoy eating, you're a foodie."

This is a sentiment that La also shares.

Growing up in the grocery industry, she was always surrounded by food.

To better serve her customers, La needed to supply products she was familiar with.

"We sell food product from China, Japan, Korea, Vietnam, the Philippines, you name it," she said. "Our customers demand it."

Over time, La said, she's seen traditionally Asian ingredients like sriracha, Thai chilis and ramen become American pantry staples.

Through the popularity of Korean pop (K-pop) groups like BTS and BLACKPINK, she's also seen a customer base that is becoming younger and trendier.

"As soon as we see an online food food," he challenge like eating spicy (Korean) said.

Samyang Ramen, we know young people will be asking for it," La said with a smile.

However as foreign as certain foods can be, there are also plenty of similarities.

"Asians may put different types of ingredients in a spring roll or use different types of dipping sauces," La said. "But if you can fold a burrito, you can also fold a spring roll."

"Different foods from different countries," she continued. "But they are also very similar."

That is also another example of cracking the food code, Kolbo said.

"Once you think about it, food isn't very mysterious," he said.
"Around the world, we all eat things that are sweet, salty and savory.
Ingredients may differ but the foods have a similarity."

Those are the types of things that Kolbo want people to take away from Sioux City Foodie.

"The main requirement to being a foodie is a love of food," he said.

From cat cafes to beer ice cream, Siouxland saw innovation when it came to dining out

Is restaurant ownership a dog-eat-dog endeavor?

Not if you ask Megan Thompson, owner of Coffee & Purrs Cat Cafe, a coffee shop at 504 Nebraska St. and one of the quirkier new members in the Sioux City cafe scene.

Officially opened a few weeks ago, Coffee & Purrs is pretty much what it sounds like. You purchase a latte or frappe in the coffee shop portion. If you're in an especially frisky move, you can walk over to the "cat cafe" part of the business and nuzzle up to one of the kitties-in-residence.

Yeah, we know what you're thinking. A cat cafe, really?

Even though Coffee & Purrs is the first business of its kind in Sioux City, cat cafes have found success in Omaha and Des Moines as well aa other parts of the country.

"I thought it would benefit Sioux City a lot," Thompson said of Coffee & Purrs. "The goal for this place is to get more cats adopted out to Sioux City, (while providing them) another safe space while they wait for their 'furever' homes."

Coffee & Purrs was not the only unique food-related business to open in 2022.

Crumbl Cookies, part of a Utah-based chain, opened at 5822 Sunnybrook Drive, in September 2022.

Known for having a weekly, rotating menu of gourmet cookies, Crumbl bakes such quirky cookies as Confetti Cake, Lemon Cheesecake, Rock Road and a Classic Pink Sugar.

One thing that Crumbl does not have is a beerflavored cookie, which is good news for Anthony Roark and Nicki Werner, the two masterminds behind Jefferson Beer Supply.

Opened in May 2022 at 202 Main Street in
Jefferson, S.D., Jefferson Beer Supply is a craft
beer brewery and a taproom located inside a
Union County, South Dakota town of 633 people. in 2022.

Even though Jefferson is a tiny town, both Roark and Werner has big ambitions as well as a sense of humor when it comes to beermaking.

While you can order a conventional beer, Jefferson Beer Supply has also

experimented with
both beer-flavored
ice cream as well as a
coffee milk stout beer
called the Jefferstone Bru,
which is a collaboration between
the craft brewers and Sioux City's

Unfortunately, a few restaurants called it quits in 2022.

Los Amigos Mexican Restaurant, a longtime Elk Point, S.D. eatery closed after a more than 20 year run in April 2022.

Similarly, Zort's Prime Time Casino – a popular place for prime rib – cashed out its North Sioux City restaurant – in July 2022.

Madonna Rose Cafe, home of humongous breakfast platters and Indian bread, shut down after a multi-year run while Tony's Pizza – a perennial candidate in the Weekender's Siouxland's Choice Award – closed on Jan. 1, 2023 after more than three decades of business.

Share with your son and daughter-in-law how much it means to you to open gifts face to face. Perhaps they aren't big gift-givers and don't understand the importance for you. And the next time you visit them all, just say that you are bringing your grandchildren presents - no special occasion required.

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
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
