TWEEN 12 AND 20 DR. ROBERT WALLACE

What should I do to help her?

R. WALLACE: My friend is vaping, and this makes me want to help her quit right away! This week when I was hanging out with some of my close friends, one of them pulled out a Juul smoking device and continually used it in my car. We are both 17 so I'm not sure what the rules are on this type of smoking or vaping.

After talking with her a little bit more about it, it turns out she has been smoking it for over a year now consistently because she loves the various flavors! I've come to know a lot of information about how dangerous this can be, especially to someone of our ages. I am worried about her health and how addictive this device is.

How can I voice my opinion to her so that she does not smoke anymore without me coming off as judgmental or rude? — Want to Provide Subtle Help, via email

WANT TO PROVIDE SUBTLE HELP: Well, you can use the power of the federal government to bring this topic up to her. The Food and Drug Administration just announced last week that Juul must stop selling its vaping device and its tobacco- and mentholflavored cartridges. This action was part of a sweeping effort by the agency to bring scientific scrutiny to the multibilliondollar vaping industry after years of looking into the potential harm these devices and the inhaled vapors can cause to young people especially.

To stay on the market, companies must show that their e-cigarettes benefit public health. This theoretically means proving that adult smokers who use them are likely to quit or reduce their smoking, while teens are unlikely to get hooked on them. But there have been indications that many teens do become regular users, just as your friend has. Juul filed an appeal with the courts, and until the courts hear the case, Juul can continue to sell its electronic cigarettes, at least for now, as this created a temporary block of the government's ban. This matter is far from settled and will no doubt stav in the news over the next few months at least.

Use this matter to show your friend just how dangerous vaping can be to a 17-year-old girl. Read up on this matter and be sure to show her all you've learned as that may convince her to stop. And if she persists, it would be wise to discreetly notify her parents so that they can have an open discussion with her about this. Your letter did not mention whether her parents know about her vaping, but my guess is that they do not yet know. You have the power to change this, and accordingly, likely help your friend in the long run.

MY OLDER BROTHER MIGHT BE BINGEING

DR. WALLACE: My older brother lives at home even though he recently turned 20 and attends a college about 25 minutes away from our family's home. He's usually home during the week but he stays with his college friends over the weekend most of the time.

I'm his younger sister and I care a lot about him since we've always been pretty close. We are the two oldest siblings out of four in total. The younger ones are 10 and 12, so the age gap leaves us with two sets of two siblings for the most part. Anyhow, I was hanging out this past weekend with my friends and I overheard at a backyard barbecue that someone was saying that my older brother is a binge drinker who blacks out! I couldn't believe my ears! Nobody knew who I was or that I was related to him. since when I overheard this my best friend was inside the house and the people talking had no idea who I was. But I know it's him they were referring to because they discussed some details like his vehicle type and his personal features.



What should I do about this if anything? I love him and don't want anything bad to happen to him. — *Worried Sister, via email*

WORRIED SISTER: Speak to your brother immediately and tell him directly what you heard. Let him know you love him and that you'll help him in every way you can. He may confirm this, but he might also deny it. Do your best to study him and ask around to find out if the story you heard is true. If you're convinced it is true and if he continues to deny any binge drinking, then you must inform your parents right away. Yes, your brother is an adult as he's over 18, but he's not yet 21 so he should not be drinking alcohol at all, much less binge drinking. Since he's living in your parents' home, they have a right to know what is going on with their son while he's living under their roof.

Inform your parents for your brother's own

good. If you sit silently by now that you know this, you risk living a life of regret if something tragic were to happen to him while you did nothing to try to help him get the support and assistance he urgently needs. You love vour brother and if he's bingeing, he urgently needs help. Binge drinking is extremely dangerous for the drinker and for others in the immediate vicinity of such a person once deep intoxication kicks in.

Poor piggies

A rural Early, Iowa, woman was arrested June 30 after more than 1,000 deceased hogs were discovered at two hog confinements in Sac County.

Elana May Laber, 33, was charged with two counts of livestock neglect and two counts of first-degree criminal mischief.

After receiving a report about the dead hogs, law enforcement officers responded to two separate hog confinement sites, which are located approximately half a mile apart from each other on Otter Avenue.

A statement from the Sac County Sheriff's Office said that deputies interviewed Laber, whose job is to maintain both

sites. Laber first told deputies that someone had shut off the breakers that control the electricity the night before, causing the hogs' deaths. It was determined after a veterinarian inspection that the hogs had been dead for at least a week, according to the statement. Laber later told deputies that she knew the hogs had been dead for a week but did not know what to do. The hogs were in different stages of decomposition. They had no access to feed or water.

The hogs were owned by Corey AGR Inc., of Lytton, Iowa. The estimated loss is more than \$150,000, according to the statement.

Laber was held at Sac County Jail in lieu of \$22,000 cash bond.

Scene of the Crash Rockabilly Car Show revs up for its eighth year

ow can you turn a 60-year-old Buick Skylark into a drag racer? Jack it up, paint it red and give the dashboard a fake furry makeover, for starters.

In other words, leave it in the experienced hands of Rodney Reisdorph, who has a knack for switching up vintage automobiles by giving them some rockabilly love.

"At first, I thought a 1962 Skylark was too new a model for me," the Sioux Cityan and proud owner of a 1953 rust-colored Chevy 210 sedan, explained. "But I figured, what the hell. I needed a wintertime project and restoring cars is relaxing for me." Reisdorph was one of the founding fathers of the Scene of the Crash Rockabilly/ Psychobilly Car Show.

Currently in its eighth year, it will take place Friday and Saturday at South Sioux City's Dakota/Thurston County Fairgrounds, 1527 Stable Drive.

In addition to showing off a host of mainly post-WWII era cars, Scene of the Crash will also offer mini bike ride, hot rod dirt drags, food trucks kid activities as well as a Bettie Page-style beauty contest, hosted by Rodney Reisdorph's wife Kara, who is also a dead ringer for Page, AKA the 1950s "Queen of the Pinups." "I knew Rodney was way into cars when we were dating," Kara Reisdorph said.

Indeed, both of the Reisdorphs call their nearly 70-year-old Chevy sedan the couple's "honeymoon car."

"We drove from Sioux City to Las Vegas in Rodney's rusty little sedan," Kara Reisdorph remembered with a laugh. "I figured it must be love since I stay married to a guy who drives crosscountry in a car with absolutely no air conditioning."

While Kara prefers to stay in the passenger seat in her husband's cars, Hollie Fahrendholz can't wait to get behind the steering wheel of the 1950 Chevrolet Styleline Deluxe that she and Varian Green completely refurbished.

"When you think of cars, you think it will be a guy thing," Fahrendholz said, standing in front of the cherry-red car. "But when there's a woman behind the wheel you know she means business."

Green can identify that it takes a certain personality to drive a car that has seen more than a few birthdays.

"I'll drive a vintage car to work every day," he explained. "People will see me driving on the Interstate, figuring I'd be slow or something. Then, I'll gun it and pass them with no problem."

Like Green and Reisdorph, Zach Ankrum is a Scene of the Crash veteran.

The Sioux City man is proud of his 1964 Chevy C-10 pickup truck. So is his favorite passenger.

"Kids love cars, trucks and anything that moves," Ankrum said. "When my 3-year-old daughter Rory sees me pulling in the driveway with my shiny green green pickup, she's grinning from ear-to-ear."

Rory is even happier when she and her dad make a fast getaway.

"What's your favorite thing to do when you're in daddy's truck?" Ankrum asked.

"I like it when we burnout of a parking lot," Rory said without much hesitation.

"Now, that's a girl who will be interesting to watch growing up as a teenager," Kara Reisdorph noted with a smile.

However, her husband was quick to point out that Scene of the Crash has a strong family

element.

A portion of the event's proceeds will go to Midwest Welding Academy, which offers a free, weeklong welding class for teenagers.

Which is important to Reisdorph, who was a son of a gearhead and a dad of a gearhead.

"That's how a lot of us got started," he explained. "We became interested in cars because we had family members who were always fixing something interesting the garage."
